Romaine to Seek Reelection To County Board Position

Marlene Shepherd, Local Housewife, Also Enters Race

3 INCUMBENT VILLAGE TRUSTEES ALSO FILE

Elwyn M. Romaine of Kewaskum, veteran member of the Washington County Board of Supervisors since 1939, and chairman of the board since 1944, will be a candidate for re-election in the Spring Election April 7, it was learned this week.

Romaine, who is presently vacationing in Florida, informed County Clerk Anton P. Staral that he would be a candidate. His nomination papers are presently being circulated in the village.

Mrs. Marlene Shepherd, controversial Kewaskum housewife, has also tossed her hat in the ring for a seat on the county board of supervisors and will oppose Romaine for the position. Mrs. Shepherd picked up nomination papers from the county clerk's office Friday and began getting signatures Saturday.

Among other county incumbent supervisors filing papers this week was John A. Oelhafen, from Dist. 8, representing the towns of Wayne and Kewaskum.

All three incumbent trustees in the Village of Kewaskum who face election in April have taken out nomination papers for re-election according to William Martin, village commissioner. They are Raynor Herriges, Myron Perschbacher and Elmer Yoost.

Local Native Named Superintendent of Fond du Lac Schools

Jerome N. Strupp, 190 Vincent St., Fond du Lac, acting superintendent of Fond du Lac schools since Sept. 12, Tuesday was named to the vacant superintendency by the Board of Education. Strupp is a former resident of Kewaskum and attended schools in this village.

The appointment was made effective Jan. 1 at an annual salary of \$19,500, plus \$100 per month for expenses. Strupp will work under a one-year contract.

A 20-year veteran of the Fond du Lac School District, Strupp, 42, succeeds Ludwig A. Petersen who resigned last September.

The board's statement announcing the appointment said that the job of directing personnel and public relations, also held by Strupp, "will not be filled but the duties of this position will be assumed by the present administrative staff." Strupp said he will continue to select and assign personnel but that his former public relations role will become a team effort by the administrative staff.

Strupp, who carries the endorsement of many and varied organizations into the office with him, began his career in Fond du Lac schools in 1940 following graduation from Oshkosh State College. He taught mathematics for five years at Roosevelt Junior High School and social studies for another five years before becoming assistant principal in 1959.

He became principal of the school in 1960 after the death of Frank Sabish and continued there until 1962 when Roosevelt was closed. He then was transferred to the principalship of Woodworth Junior High School. In 1967, the board created the position of director of personnel and public relations and Strupp became the first appointee. He continued to hold that post as acting superintendent of schools.

Strupp also served as president of the 41,000-member Wisconsin Education Association during 1969. He will continue on the executive board of the W.E.A. for another year.

Strupp is a native of Kewaskum and gained a master's degree in education administration from the University of Wisconsin in 1959. He has served on the board of directors of the Fond du Lac-North Fond du Lac United Fund as president of the Northeastern Wisconsin Education Association and as first vice-president of the W.E.A.

He and his wife, Gerda, have six children. The new superintendent was one of 33 candidates for the position.

AFS Student Is Woman's Club Meeting Speaker

MESSAGES ARE ALSO HEARD FROM 8 WHO PRECEDED HER

A personal message from Kewaskum's present American Field Service student and messages via letters from the eight who have preceded her were heard by Kewaskum Woman's Club members and guests at their meeting Saturday afternoon.

Speaking to an audience that included most of the American mothers of former students was Miss Janthea Dawe of Bristol, England. Up-to-date whereabouts and slides of former students was given by Mrs. L. N. Peterson, president of the local AFS chapter.

The slides ranged from those taken of the students arriving and meeting their new family at the airport or bus station in Milwaukee to those of AFS gatherings during their year stay here.

In her first speaking engagement before any local group, Janthea said: "It was difficult for me to write this speech because Kewaskum is so much like home and you have made me feel so much at home."

She lives with Mr. and Mrs. Earl Buswell and their three children, Peggy, Beth and Terry.

Describing a typical day in Bristol, Janthea said, "I leave home at 6:15 a. m. to catch a bus to be in school by ten minutes of nine. The school's headmaster conducts a religious assembly that consists of a prayer, a hymn, the Lord's Prayer and Bible reading.

"Our lessons are 45 minutes long; we have an hour and a half for lunch and classes end at 3:45. We do not have the same lesson schedule every day," she pointed out.

She is home by 4:15, Janthea said. "Then I have a cup of tea and a snack. I help prepare supper and help with dishes. Then I do homework and about 7:15 I am off to play badminton for a couple of hours."

"Jon," as she is called, said her mother likes to have her in by 10:30 p. m., but isn't too particular about the time "so long as I get up early in the morning!"

Her interests are badminton in the winter, tennis in the summer and netball which is played out-of-doors all winter, similar to our basketball and played by girls with a seven-member team. She is also active in youth groups, she said, and she enjoys the theater. "I go as often as possible."

Mrs. Peterson's slide commentary began with Norwegian AFS'er Walborg Pettersen who lived with Mr. and Mrs. Charles Miller in the 1961-62 school year. Now married to a man she met in the Norwegian Peace Corps and mother of a little girl, Walborg works in a social services agency in Oslo.

Next was Georgia Malamaki of Greece who lived with Mr. and Mrs. Ralph Erdmann and three children. She reported in her letter that "I see Kewaskum in my dreams." Married to a doctor and the mother of a two-year old daughter, Georgia teaches private classes in English and ancient Greek. "Housework doesn't add to

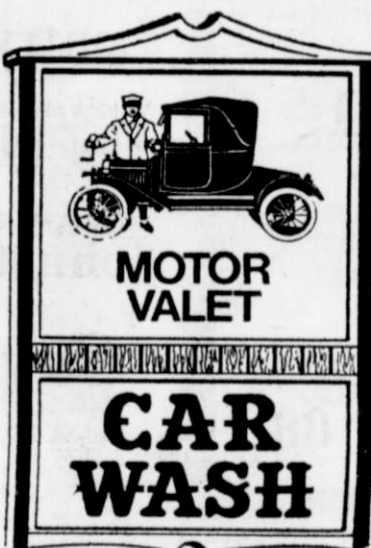

Mr. and Mrs. William Bunkelman of this village were informed in a telegram that their son, Pfc. Byron Bunkelman, was seriously wounded recently in action on Leyte Island in the Philippines. No details were given.

Service news: Mr. and Mrs. Carl Hafemann received a letter from their son, 2nd Lt. Bernard Hafemann, that he suffered injuries when the B-17 (known as the Flying Fortress) on which he is copilot crashed in the Gulf of Mexico. The Fortress sank in 30 seconds but members of the thoroughly trained crew succeeded in getting out of the plane and into life rafts, although nearly all were injured. Lt. Hafemann was confined to the hospital several days.

John A. Lehnerz Called in Death

John A. Lehnerz, 77, of R. 2, Kewaskum, passed away Monday, Jan. 12, at St. Joseph's Community Hospital, West Bend, following an illness of several months.

He was born July 25, 1892, in the Town of Kewaskum. He married Barbara Schneider at St. Michael's church, St. Michaels, on June 19, 1919, and the couple settled in the Lehnerz homestead.

Surviving are five children, Albin of R. 1, Kewaskum, Joan (Mrs. Cecil White) of Sheboygan, Genevieve and Harold of R. 2, Kewaskum, and Mercedes (Mrs. Robert Hetebrueg) of West Bend; 18 grandchildren, and other relatives. Mrs. Lehnerz predeceased him June 29, 1968, and a brother and three sisters also preceded him in death.

Mr. Lehnerz was a member of the Holy Name society, St. Michael's Aid Society, Catholic Knights of Wisconsin and Apostolate of Suffering.

Funeral services were held Thursday at 9:15 a. m. at the Schmidt Funeral Home, West Bend, and at 10 a. m. at St. Michael's church. Rev. I. Staskunas officiated and burial was in the parish cemetery. Visitation at the funeral home was after 2 p. m. Wednesday and the parish vigil was at 8 p. m.

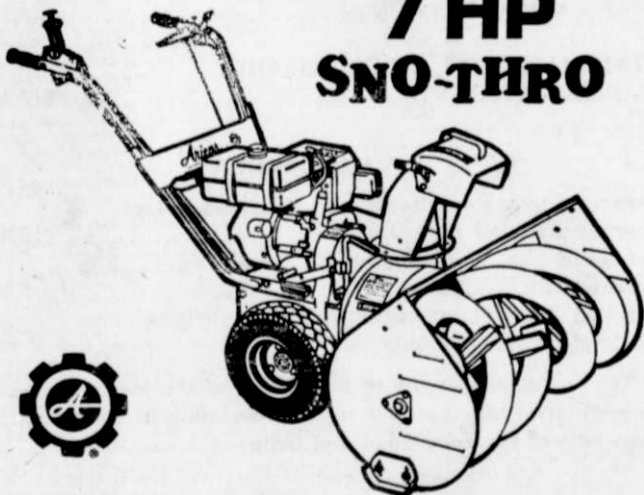
