## Kadinger Garage at New Fane Is Destroyed by Fire Early Wednesday

### Two Trucks, Tools, Other Contents of Building Also Lost

#### LOCAL FIREMEN FIGHT BLAZE IN 16 BELOW ZERO WEATHER

A fire early Wednesday morning destroyed the service garage owned and operated by Frank Kadinger in the Village of New Fane about three miles northeast of Kewaskum. Lost also when the building burned to the ground were two trucks, tools, and all other contents of the building.

The Kewaskum fire department received the call at 7:31 a. m. and responded with 16 men to fight the blaze in bitterly cold 16 degrees below zero weather.

The two-story frame building, about 64 by 84 feet in size, was a blaze and leveled quickly. The fire was out of control when firemen arrived at the scene. They concentrated their efforts on protecting the Kadinger home, located nearby on the south side of the garage, other small buildings on the property and a grocery store on the north side. Some windows in the Kadinger home were cracked from the heat.

Kadinger said that two persons, Roland Heberer and Mrs. Walter Woyach, had left their cars in his garage overnight so they would start in the morning. When Mrs. Kadinger entered the garage about 6:30 a. m. to assist Mrs. Woyach in removing her car, the Heberer auto had already been taken out. She said she did not detect smoke or fire at that time.

Later, from her house, Mrs. Kadinger noticed what she believed was steam escaping from the garage windows. Her husband went to investigate and found flames already coming out of the eaves and he was unable to get into the building due to the dense smoke and fire.

Kadinger tried calling the fire department from his home but the service was severed in the garage building. He ran to the neighboring Milton Elbert residence and Mrs. Elbert called firemen.

A farm truck in the garage, owned by Ray Bales, on which Kadinger had been doing repair work, and Kadinger's wrecker truck were destroyed in the blaze, along with the owner's tools, some new, and all other contents. ## 2 Young People Escape Death in Car, Train Crash

#### AREA RESIDENTS HURT IN CRASH AT LOCAL CROSSING

Two Kewaskum area young people narrowly escaped death or serious injury when the car in which they were riding was struck by a speeding northbound Chicago and North Western passenger train at the First Street crossing in Kewaskum at 7:32 p. m. last Friday.

According to local police the collision occurred when a car driven by Gerald R. Geidel, 25, of R. 1, Kewaskum, was traveling east across the railroad tracks a block north of Main St. As he was crossing the tracks he saw the approaching train and accelerated his auto in an effort to get across the crossing before the train. But the train struck the right rear of Geidel's car.

The force of the impact spun the car around, threw it off the tracks into a snow bank at the northeast corner of the crossing. The rear of the car, a 1969 model, was demolished. The train was reported traveling about 70 miles per hour at the time. Geidel said he did not hear the train's whistle.

Geidel suffered a cut over the right eye, and a passenger, Miss Patricia N. Nigh, 21, of 124 Forest Ave., Kewaskum, his fiancée, incurred right ankle injuries. Both were removed to St. Joseph's Community Hospital, West Bend, for a checkup and treatment in the Kewaskum fire department ambulance and were later released.

The engineer of the train, Lawrence R. Michels, 47, of rural Fond du Lac, told Police Chief Donald Hlavaty the train was traveling about 80 miles per hour. There are no wig-wag signals at the crossing, only the normal stationary signs.

**Indians Win  
2 More, Hike  
Record to 8-0**

PEWAUKEE, GRAFTON  
ARE LATEST VICTIMS

Kewaskum's undefeated leaders of the Scenic Moraine conference hiked their record to 8-0 in the conference and 11 in a row overall with two more victories over the weekend. They bested Pewaukee there Friday night, 65-62, and romped over Grafton here the next night, Saturday, 81-67.

The Indians showed their ability to win on the road against a tough opponent at Pewaukee but it wasn't easy. Pewaukee usually proves troublesome for Kewaskum and this was no exception as the Indians had to rally from a

44-35 halftime deficit to pull out the win. Coach Walt Bade remarked, "It was a big win for us. We knew Pewaukee had a fine ball club, but our boys came through in the clutch."

Junior Clark Eichstedt led the Kewaskum scoring attack with 19 points and Dick Bartelt hit 15 in points and rebounds. Playmaker Randy Koth also contributed 14 points to the win. The Pirates scoring ace, Brattebro, paced the losers with 18 points.

Only 19 personal fouls were called in the closely contested game, and only 7 of them on Pewaukee. As a result Kewaskum sank just one free throw and this is usually their long suit. The victory kept the Indians unbeaten at the midway point of the schedule.

After trailing by 9 points at the intermission, 44-35, the Indians, ordinarily a strong second half team, displayed their strength by coming back strong to outscore the Pirates, 14-9, in the third quarter and 16-9 in the final period to bag the win.

The game with Grafton before a packed house of howling fans here Saturday opened the second half of play. After playing to a 19-19 stalemate in the first quarter, Kewaskum got hot to outscore the Blackhawks by sizable margins in every one of the next

three quarters to gain a one-sided victory by a margin of 24 points, 81-57. It was one of the Indians' better nights.

Kewaskum gained a two-game lead in the conference for the first time by besting Grafton, as second place Hartland Arrowhead was upset by Slinger, 50-48. This gives the Indians a more comfortable cushion in their quest for the championship although they have some tough ones left.

The pace-setting Indians got 21 points from Bartelt and 18 from Eichstedt in their lopsided win. Steve Stern again helped immensely with 14 points and 18 rebounds. The Indians again showed a balanced scoring attack and team work with five players hitting in double figures. Others were Tony Butschlick with 14 points and Koth with 10. For the losers Strenger and Bartelt each scored 12, Siewers 11 and DeLeeuw 10.

Tonight (Friday) the Indians have a big one. They play a very crucial game at Hartland against the second place team. An Arrowhead win will cut Kewaskum's lead back to one game while an Indian victory would give them a comfortable three-game lead. This contest could have a very important bearing on the title. The Indians defeated hot-shooting Arrowhead in their first meeting here after

a tight first half.

Bartelt wound up as top scorer even though he missed some easy layups. Kewaskum got some quick points on fast breaks but could have scored a lot more except for missing many layups. Grafton's defense seemed to leave a Kewaskum player open nearly every time.
