## Scenic Moraine Conference Basketball Champions



Here they are! Kewaskum High School's 1969-70 Scenic Moraine Conference basketball champions. The Indians completed the conference season Friday with an excellent 13-1 record, three games ahead of Slinger and Hartland Arrowhead, tied for second with 10-4.

Kewaskum established a fine overall record of 16-2. Their only conference defeat was at Slinger with Clark Eichstedt, junior star, out of the lineup with a broken wrist (he has been out since). The only other school to beat them was Plymouth in the opening non-conference game of the season at Plymouth in overtime. Plymouth, incidentally, went on to win the

Eastern Wisconsin Conference championship with a glossy 9-1 record and is favored to win the WIAA District tournament at Kiel this weekend.

Junior Clark Eichstedt was the leading scorer and rebounder on the team up to the time of his unfortunate injury. Glenn Eichstedt, only a sophomore, is his brother and also saw quite a bit of action during the season. Bartelt wound up seventh in conference scoring with 227 points on 99 field goals and 29 free throws. Dolan of Hartland was the leading scorer with 307 points, followed closely by Pewaukee ace Brattebo with 304. Three other Indian starters, Butschlick, Stern and Koth, also finished high in scoring. Kewaskum had a balanced offense,

rather than one or two individual stars, with three or four players usually scoring in double figures. Tessar ordinarily was the sixth man and a starter since Eichstedt's injury.

This is Kewaskum's first championship since the 1955-56 season when the Indians were members of the Valley Tri-County conference before entering the strong Scenic Moraine loop.

This Weekend the Indians are hosting and participating in the WIAA District tournament. They face North Fondy in the second game at 8:30 tonight. Mayville and Campbellsport meet at 7:00 in the opener.

## Primary Election For County Board Seat Here Mar. 3

INCUMBENT ROMAINE TO BE OPPOSED BY 2 CANDIDATES

Primary elections will be held in five of Washington county's 29 supervisory districts next Tuesday, March 3, to nominate two candidates in each district for the runoff Spring Election April 7. The supervisory contests are the only primary races to take place in the county area.

Primary contests are required by state statute for county board seats when three or more candidates seek election to a district seat.

The Village of Kewaskum, District 9, has three candidates seeking nomination in the primary. Elywn M. Romaine, veteran incumbent supervisor, and county board chairman, will be opposed by Francis Bohn and Marlene Shepherd.

Contests will also be held in Dist. 1, West Bend's 1st ward; Dist. 6, West Bend's 6th ward; Dist. 11, the Town of Addison, and Dist. 17, the Town of Polk. Three candidates are seeking the county board seats in four of the districts, but in the Town of Polk a four way race will be held.

Interest in the contests for the Kewaskum seat result in a good response in this district.

Election in the village will be held at the fire station of the municipal building and the polls will be open from 9 a. m. to 8 p. m.

## School Board Approves Busing of Students to Immunization Clinic

HIRING BUSINESS MANAGER FOR DISTRICT DISCUSSED

The Board of Education at its regular meeting Monday night, gave its approval to provide the needed busing of students to an immunization clinic against Rubella (German measles) at the Kewaskum Elementary School on the afternoon of March 11.

In presenting the proposal, Richard E. Zarling, director of elementary education said that children kindergarten through grade five will be immunized free of charge. The clinic will be financed on an appropriation of \$7,000 by Washington county. The State Board of Health will provide the equipment and personnel.

Since morning kindergarten pupils cannot take part, Zarling said, other arrangements have been made for them. The proposed schedule is: Wednesday morning, Farmington and Kewaskum morning kindergarten groups would be bussed to West Bend, and immunized there.

On Wednesday afternoon, Beechwood third graders, Farmington kindergarten through fifth grade and elementary special education pupils and Wayne kindergarten through fifth grade will be brought to Kewaskum. Holy Trinity pupils grades one through five and Kewaskum Elementary, kin-

dergarten through fifth grade also will be immunized.

On Wednesday evening, there will be immunization available for pre-schoolers and sixth graders for which there will be a charge.

Zarling also said that the Sheboygan county nurses group will take care of Beechwood first and second graders in April. At that time, it will be necessary to bus those pupils to Sheboygan for their immunization.

The board discussed, without taking action, the possibility of hiring a business manager for the school district. The person should be someone who is not an educator but should have a college degree and a business background related to this type of work. Among the duties would be supervising of cafeteria managers, secretaries and janitors and recommending their salary adjustments.

Such person would be purchasing agent for non-instructional items and it was felt having a business manager would allow more time for Supt. Marshall Boyd to work with teachers and principals.

It was pointed out that five out of seven schools in the Scenic Moraine Conference have a business manager. Boyd was instructed to bring to the board as much information as possible on expected salary, the turn-over of such personnel and just how the business

manager is utilized in other districts.

Richard Theusch appeared before the board and said he felt the school district should reimburse him for the cost of printing petition papers used last November to demand a referendum on a proposed swimming pool addition to the high school.

The printing and making duplicate copies cost him \$47.85, Theusch said, and he feels he should be reimbursed because the pool was a district project. Theusch had informed Board President Richard L. Edwards to that effect in a phone call, previous to the board meeting.

Edwards informed Theusch that according to the district's legal counsel, that type of expense cannot be paid out of school district funds. "You have seen your lawyer. I will see mine," Theusch told the board.

The board approved negotiation of an option with Ervin Klein

owner of a parcel of land adjacent to the Beechwood School. The land would provide space if expansion of the school were needed. An option that would hold until the annual meeting will be sought.

Principal Edward Connors presented a detailed long-range planning report relevant to the high school, based on 1980 enrollment projections. The report was begun at the January board meeting and followed a study of projected building needs made by Connors, Kenneth Erickson, junior high principal and Zarling.

Consensus of board members was that it is imperative to have a long-range plan to present to the electors at the annual meeting.

For the next two months at least, the board will meet semi-monthly it was announced. Meetings are scheduled for March 9 and 23 and for April 6 and 20.

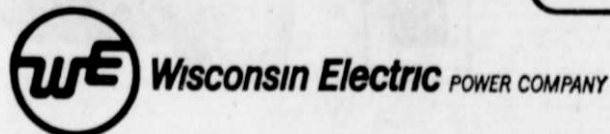

## Kewaskum to Host WIAA District Basketball Tourney This Weekend

### FOUR SCHOOLS IN MEET; TOURNEY IS SELL-OUT

It is that time of the year again when tournament fever has struck high schools throughout Wisconsin. Following district, regional and sectional tourneys, it all ends with eight survivors going to the state finals at Madison in what is known as "March Madness." A total of 419 high schools in the state start activity in the district meets this week, after which there will be only 128 survivors. They will earn berths in the 32 Regionals slated March 6-7. Winners advance to the Sectionals, which will leave but eight survivors for the state meet.

Kewaskum is one of the schools which will host a WIAA District tournament this weekend with four teams participating. They are Campbellsport, Kewaskum, Mayville and North Fondy. The pairings are as follows:

Friday, Feb. 27—Game 1, Campbellsport vs. Mayville, 7 p. m. Game 2, Kewaskum vs. North Fondy, 8:30 p. m.

Saturday, Feb. 28—Game 3, winner of game 1 vs. winner of game 2, 7:30 p. m.

On their records, Mayville and Kewaskum are favored in the local tournament with the nod going to Mayville, especially with ace Clark Eichstedt out of the Indians line-up due to an injury. Unbeaten Mayville won the Northern Little Ten conference championship with a perfect 10-0 record. They blasted second place Waupun Friday, 81-56, with their outstanding high scorer, Chuck Feller, scoring 41 points. Feller has to go down as one of the all-time basketball greats in the Little Ten. It was the 19th straight conference win for Mayville, which is hand-and-shoulders above the pack in the conference. It will be interesting to watch Feller here.

The Indians, with a 16-2 overall record, and 13-1 in the conference, probably will face Mayville in the finals Saturday night, barring an upset by Campbellsport. The Cougars ended up in 6th place in the Scenic Moraine with a 5-9 record. The fourth team, North Fondy, which meets Kewaskum tonight, wound up in the cellar with 0-14.

The district winner here will advance to the Beaver Dam Regional next week. Others in this Regional will include the winner in the Markesan District (Markesan, Randolph, Oakfield and Rosendale-Brandon); Pardeeville District (Fall River, Poynette, Pardeeville and Rio), and Waupun District (Beaver Dam and Waupun). A strong team in the Markesan District will be Oakfield, which won the Tri-County crown with a perfect 12-0 record. The winner in the Beaver Dam Regional will advance to the Manitowoc Sectional.

The Kewaskum tournament is a sell-out both nights. Tickets went on sale last Tuesday at 7 p. m. and there was a line waiting long before that time. All available tickets were grabbed off in a very short time and many, many fans were disappointed. Some lucky persons got tickets from the supplies allotted to Campbellsport and North Fondy.

## Gundrum, Laatsch Defeated in Mat Sectional Meet

Kewaskum High School's two representatives in the rugged WIAA Sectional wrestling tourna-

ment at Valders over the weekend both were beaten in the opening round on Friday evening.

Wrestling in the 155-pound class, Leo Gundrum of Kewaskum was defeated by Bielfuss of Two Rivers, and in the unlimited class Lloyd Laatsch of Kewaskum was beaten by Edwards of Milwaukee King.

These two boys qualified for the sectional mat tourney by capturing second places in the regional meet held in Kewaskum the weekend previous. Gundrum lost to Phil Mueller of Port Washington in the finals and Laatsch was beaten by Virgil Larson of Ozaukee in the finals. Both first and second place winners advance in tournament competition.

The results above show that six of the qualifiers in the Kewaskum regional also won in the sectional and will advance to the state meet.

With the victory, Kewaskum wound up with a very fine 13-1 record. It is the Indians' first basketball title in the Scenic Moraine.

The outcome didn't affect either team's position in the standings but Pewaukee and the Indians staged a thriller that was the most exciting game of the season. It was a barn-burner all the way. Pewaukee brought a large delegation of fans with an upset of the champions in mind. They were really turned on and cheered loudly for the Pirates. This inspired the Kewaskum spectators to do likewise and they were on the edge of their seats yelling themselves hoarse, especially in the closing minutes of the contest when the lead saw-sawed back and forth. When the game ended players and spectators swarmed out onto the floor to hail their champions. The Indians players tore down the nets for souvenirs.

The Indians again started out deliberately and built up a run-away lead in the first quarter, 19-8, as Pewaukee couldn't prevent their consistent hitting from the outside. It looked like an easy win coming up for Kewaskum. But in the second period, led by their

ace scorer, Brian Brattebo, the Pirates came to life and cut the Indians' halftime advantage to 33-28. The visitors closed the gap in the third quarter and from then on it was a life-or-death struggle all the way with the lead changing hands until Kewaskum scored the winning points in the closing seconds.

Brattebo, who was second highest scorer in the conference after leading most of the season, kept sniping away from outside and in to keep Pewaukee on Kewaskum's heels. He had a big night and wound up as top scorer with 26 points, 18 of them on baskets. The Indians won the game from the field where they had a 26-22 edge. Tony Butschlick also was hitting and paced the Indians with 20 points, all on baskets. Following Butschlick's pace was Steve Stern with 14 points and Dick Bartelt and Randy Koth with 12 apiece. Stern again picked off an amazing 20 rebounds. Jensen also piled up 20 points for the losers.

Tonight (Friday) and Saturday Kewaskum is hosting WIAA tournament play. The Indians face North Fondy in their first game (see separate item).
