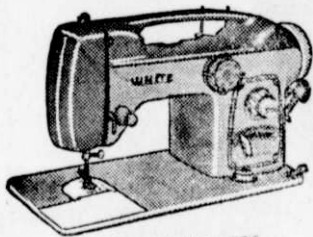

25 YEARS AGO

Friday, March 23, 1945

Mr. and Mrs. Otto Ramthun, Jr. received a letter from the former's brother, Pfc. Wilmer Ramthun, in which he informed them that he was slightly wounded for the second time in action in France and is confined to a hospital. Pfc. Ramthun was also wounded in combat late last summer when he wrote relatives he received a gunshot wound in the back. He was awarded the Purple Heart on Aug. 21 of last year.

Albert Wesenberg, Jr. of the Town of Auburn is confined at St. Joseph's hospital, West Bend, with an injury suffered while at work at the Kewaskum Aluminum Co. While he was working on a machine a die broke and a shrapnel-like piece of steel penetrated his leg. He lost much blood but is coming along very well.

S/Sgt. Howard Schmidt, who just returned home after serving 37 months as a radio operator in the China-Burma-India theater, gave a talk on his experiences and travels at the Peace church. This was followed by the showing of slides. Howard also talked and showed his slides at the high school.

Peace E. and R. church was the scene of a 7 o'clock wedding ceremony in which Violet Eberle, only

daughter of Mr. and Mrs. William Eberle, became the bride of S/Sgt. Howard Schmidt, only son of Mr. and Mrs. George H. Schmidt.

Kewaskum firemen made a run to the Ray Schaefer farm home in the town of Kewaskum where fire which started in the basement caused damage to the residence. An oil heating furnace became flooded and oil spilled out onto the floor. The flames then flared up, igniting the oil, support beam to the basement ceiling. The ceiling burned through in one spot and rafters and joice were damaged. There was also smoke damage.

Service news: The day after receiving a telegram from the war department informing them that their son, Pfc. Byron Bunkelman, was wounded in the fighting on Leyte Island in the Philippines, Mr. and Mrs. Wm. Bunkelman received a letter from their son advising them he had been released from the hospital and returned to his outfit. He suffered a shrapnel wound in his hand. He was in on

the invasion of the Philippines writing that it was pretty tough and if the Lord hadn't held him by the hand he wouldn't be alive today. Byron would meet Capt. Fred Miller of Kewaskum on Leyte Island.

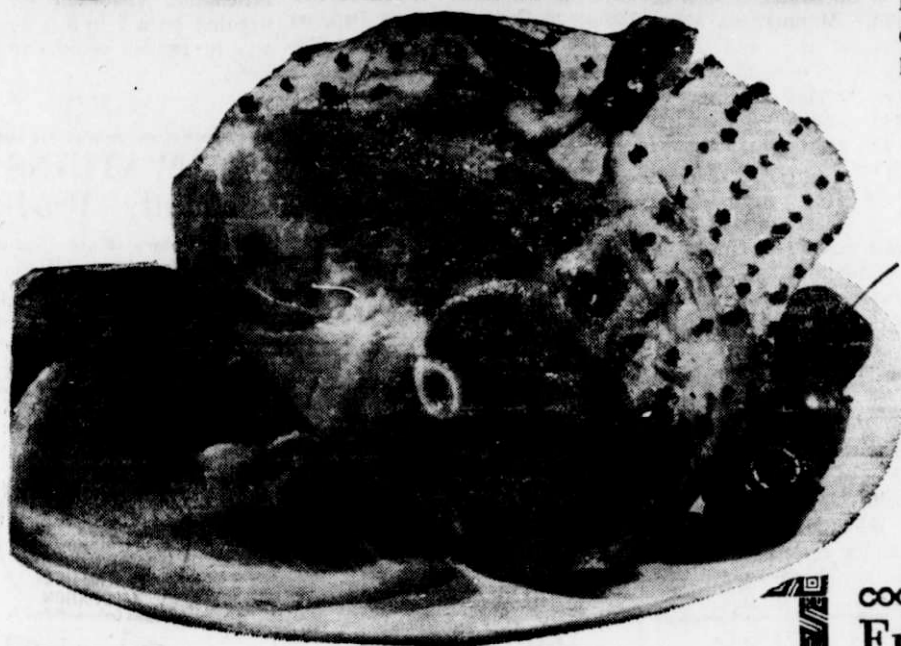

The regular monthly meeting of the school board of Kewaskum Community Schools, Jt. School District No. 2, held Monday, Feb. 23, 1970, at 8:00 p. m. in the high school board room was attended by all members. Also in attendance were: Mrs. Norman Held, Richard Theusch, Mr. Ray Boden, Richard Zarling and Edward Connors.

Allen Tessar moved to approve the minutes of the February 16, 1970 meeting. Harry Oelhafen seconded. Motion carried.

Richard Theusch requested that the district pay his expense for petition on the pool referendum. Mr. Edwards informed Mr. Theusch that the district legally cannot do this.

The board was questioned on the subjects not on agenda by Mr. Theusch and he was requested to submit his questions ahead of time so that proper information

would be available.

The board discussed land purchase at the Beechwood School and instructed Mr. Boyd and Mr. Jadro to discuss with Mr. Ervin Klein a possible option on the property subject to elector approval.

Allen Tessar moved to recess for one-half hour to allow the board to attend the National Honor Society Induction Ceremony in the multi-purpose room. Mrs. Zona Miske seconded. Motion carried at 8:30 p. m.

The recessed meeting of the school board was called to order at 9:05 p. m. by Director Richard L. Edwards.

Mr. R. E. Zarling requested board approval for transportation on immunization clinic days. Gerald Secor moved to approve transportation by bus for children to German Measles Immunization Clinic. Harry Oelhafen seconded. Motion carried.

The board discussed the position of a Business Manager. This item was tabled for future discussion.

Discussion was held regarding the teacher intern program.

Allen Tessar moved to approve the data processing contract with C.E.S.A. No. 12 of Portage, Wisconsin. Mrs. June Berg seconded. Motion carried.

Mrs. June Berg moved to schedule regular semi-monthly meetings during March and April, 1970 for the school board, on March 9 and 23, and April 6 and 20. Harry Oelhafen seconded. Motion carried.

Allen Tessar moved to raise salary 10c per hour for probationary teacher aides after six months of service. Mrs. June Berg seconded. Motion carried.

Mrs. Zona Miske moved to approve payment of general fund invoices, payroll and debt services, totaling \$143,334.39. Harry Oelhafen seconded. Motion carried.

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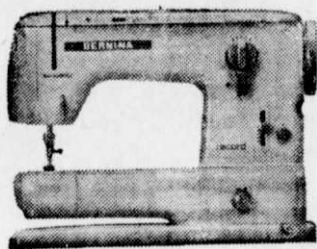
