Board Approves New Subdivision; Grants Permission for 4-Story Regal Building, 8-Unit Apartment, Home

"EXPANSION" IS KEY WORD IN BUSINESS TRANSACTED

"Expansion" was the key word in the business transacted by the village board at its regular meeting Monday night. It gave its approval to the final plat of a new subdivision and granted a building permit to Regal Ware, Inc., to construct a four-story building at its Tower St. location.

Already state-approved, the building is the second in a three-phase office complex. The first was built several years ago.

The subdivision is known as Bel-Ric Acres and it is located south of County Trunk H and west of Highway 45 on the southwest boundary of Kewaskum. Myron Belger presented the plat.

James Elder, representing Stone and Robinson, consulting engineers of Brookfield was authorized to make a study of the most advantageous place to install a lift station in the subdivision. He was also asked to prepare necessary plans for installation of sewer and water facilities there.

He reported the City of Menomonee Falls has used lift stations for sale at about 70 per cent of their original cost. No action was taken.

Permission to erect an eight-unit apartment building on lot two, block five in Bel-Ric Acres was granted to Robert Kirst, local realtor, who represented Douglas Bloom, a West Bend builder. Those plans will need state approval before the village can issue a building permit.

Board members authorized purchase of a chlorinator at a cost of \$1,050 for the sewage treatment plant. The chlorinator is required by the state as an anti-pollution measure to treat the effluent as it flows from the final settling tanks into the river.

The motion of Trustee Charles Miller to have some items of business handled in committee instead of being discussed at the open board meetings won approval of the other trustees. Only the report of the committee will then be heard at the board meeting.

Purchase of three electric door openers and necessary controls for the fire station from Minz Supply of Kewaskum on their bid of \$635 was approved as was purchase of a July 4 fireworks display from the Spielbauer Fireworks Co. of Green Bay at a cost of \$480.

Members of the Finance Committee will meet with the Wisconsin League of Municipalities to seek information and guidance on possible federal aid for contemplated improvements to the village sewage treatment plant.

The public works committee was instructed to draw up specifications for a new garbage truck and at the same time look into services and costs of hiring a private disposal company that would pick up garbage from village residents.

Approval was given to a resolution authorizing the village president and village commission-

er to make arrangements for borrowing funds from the Bank of Kewaskum for construction of the planned municipal garage.

A building permit for a home was approved for James Schultz and an operator's license was granted for Earl H. Schroeder. The board tabled a proposal to join the Wisconsin Institute of Municipal and County Employees, a consulting service designed to aid municipal employers in employee negotiations.

Five Grass Fires Keep Firemen Busy

Kewaskum firemen were kept on the run during the past week, answering five grass fire calls in five days, two on Saturday, one on Sunday, and two on Wednesday. The grass is unusually dry for this time of year and Sunday night's rainfall apparently did not alleviate the situation to any extent.

The first call came at 10:35 a. m. Saturday when fire burned over an area of grass adjoining the railroad tracks about one-half mile south of Kewaskum in the Town of Kewaskum. It is believed the blaze was started by sparks from a passing train.

The second call Saturday at 12:20 p. m. was to the farm known as the Dobrowski place on CTH G about 1½ miles north of the village in the Town of Auburn where a small area of grass burned over just east of the farm buildings.

At 2:15 p. m. Sunday the firemen put out a grass fire adjoining the railroad tracks on CTH V about 1½ miles north of Kewaskum in the Town of Auburn. The blaze spread across part of a field owned by John Neckuty before it was extinguished. Apparently this fire also was caused by sparks from a passing train as Campbellsport firemen were also called to snuff out a grass fire the same afternoon north of this area.

The firemen received two calls, one right after the other on Wednesday. The first one at 5 p. m. was at the Paul Bodden property one-half mile south of the village on Hwy. 45. The blaze, apparently started from embers from a rubbish burner, spread across a field to the east and along the railroad tracks before it was extinguished. A telephone pole also caught fire and firemen had to chop away the burning wood to put out the flames.

Firemen had just returned to the station and were backing their equipment into the building when they received another call at 5:30 p. m. This one was to New Fane in the Town of Auburn where a couple of acres of grass burned over on land owned by Tony Wiesner. The flames spread eastward from the Donald Matthews property through fields and over a large hill at the northeast end of the village. Sparks from a rubbish burner are also believed to have caused this blaze.

Two Trustees Reelected, One Unseated Here

HERRIGES AND YOOST WIN, NIGH BEATS PERSCHBACHER

Two incumbents regained their trustee offices and the third was defeated in the village election Tuesday. Raynor Herriges and Elmer Yoost were both reelected but the third seat was won by Gregor Nigh, who outpolled incumbent Myron Perschbacher by 226 votes to 181.

A total of 380 votes were cast in the village, Herriges polling the largest number among the seven candidates with 238, followed by Yoost with 229, Nigh 226, Perschbacher 181, Earl DuBois 98, Wallace Cudnoskoske 79 and William Edwards 48.

The three elected trustees will hold office for two years and will join trustees Alfred Kral, Orv Behnke and Charles Miller, and President Cyril Wietor, who hold over in office for another year, on the seven man board.

In the county supervisor race for the Village of Kewaskum (district 9), incumbent Elwyn M. Romaine, veteran chairman of the Washington County Board, easily defeated Francis Bohn, 287 votes to 89, and will continue as head of the county government for another two year term.

The county board will have seven new faces among its 29 members, including three men who pulled off upsets over incumbent supervisors in Tuesday's election. Incumbents defeated included John Kratz of West Bend's First Ward, who lost to John Steilen; Leo Geib of West Bend's Sixth Ward, who lost to Arthur Degnitz, and Germantown supervisor Ray Bast, who lost to Herman Prah. Other new supervisors are John Hetzel of West Bend's Third Ward, George Nehrbass of the Town of Polk, Jerome Faust of the Village of Slinger, and John Geddels of Hartford's District 21. The latter four were elected to seats vacated by incumbents.

In the judicial election, Justice Connor T. Hansen, unopposed in his bid for reelection to the Wisconsin Supreme Court, received 343 votes in the village. In the county he garnered 9,036 votes out of 10,998 votes cast.

Dedicate Peace Church Parsonage

The new parsonage of Peace United Church of Christ congregation at 1036 Hillside Drive on the west side of Kewaskum was dedicated during the 10:15 a. m. worship service on Sunday. The dedication prayer was led by the pastor, the Rev. Daniel Schowalter. The keys were presented to the pastor by Elmer Yoost, chairman of the building committee. About 300 persons attended an open house held at the parsonage in the afternoon, following a noon meal prepared and served by members of the consistory.

The Schowalters and their children, Deborah, Mary, Barbara and James, moved into the new home about three weeks ago. Ground was broken for the attractive two-story, four-bedroom home of colonial type design last June.

The former parsonage at 1433 Parkview Dr. served Peace church since 1901. It has been sold to St. Lucas Lutheran congregation which has its church nearby, with future expansion in mind. For the present, the home is being rented.

485 Attend Scout Pancake Supper

The 13th annual Kewaskum Scout pancake supper held in the high school cafeteria Saturday evening was attended by 485 persons. All proceeds from the event go to benefit local scout activities.

Thousands of pancakes and about 600 charcoal broiled pork links (bratwurst) were served by the scout leaders, scouts and volunteers. Home-made apple pie served with cheese, and plentiful supplies of maple syrup, butter, coffee and milk were also part of the menu.

The event was sponsored by the Scout and Cub committees of Troop and Pack 44 and Explorer Post 144 of Kewaskum.

A teacher salary schedule that reflects an increase of between seven and eight per cent over current salaries was ratified by the Board of Education Monday night after having reached an agreement with the welfare committee of the Kewaskum Education Association. The salary increases will cost the district from \$60,000 to \$65,000 over current figures.

The schedule is based on a 191-day school year, two fewer than in the 1969-70 school year. One teaching day and one in-service day were cut. The 1970-71 calendar calls for 180 teaching days, eight in-service days and three holidays.

Negotiations between the board and the welfare committee began on Jan. 15 when first proposals were exchanged.

The new salary schedule raises the base salary for the holder of a bachelors degree from the present \$6,800 to \$7,200. After 10 increments, the teacher in that category will receive a maximum of \$10,185.

A bachelors degree plus six graduate credits will earn a base of \$7,358 and a maximum of \$10,799 after 11 steps; a bachelors degree plus 15 credits will earn a base of \$7,517 and a maximum of \$11,449 after 12 steps.

A bachelors degree plus 21 graduate credits will receive a base of \$7,675 and a maximum of \$12,125 after 13 increments. Base salary for a masters degree will be \$7,834 with a maximum after 14 steps of \$12,839. Base pay for a masters degree plus 10 credits will be \$7,992 with a maximum of \$13,592 after 15 increments.

Also adopted was the 1970-71 school calendar which calls for an Aug. 28 school opening. New teachers will report on Aug. 25 and all teachers on Aug. 26 and 27 for an in-service session. June 4, 1971 is date of graduation.

Approval was given to the transfer of the \$155,000, which had been borrowed for the defeated swimming pool project, from a savings account to a certificate of deposit for not more than one year's deposit.

It was noted that although the original swimming pool project is dead, the \$155,000 borrowed for it cannot be used for any other purpose. Inasmuch as the money was borrowed at a five per cent interest rate and because borrowing rates have risen sharply since, board members felt it is wise to keep the funds available at least until contemplated long-range planning has been completed. A pool of some sort will be included in the long-range plans, it was pointed out. Meanwhile, the \$155,000 can earn a higher interest rate than what it was borrowed for.

On the recommendation of Richard Zaring, district director of elementary education, the board approved the adoption of the Harcourt-Brace textbook series for language arts in grades 2-6

throughout the district. With the adoption of the series, all study materials, kindergarten through eighth grade, are now coordinated district-wide.

Zarling said the teachers chose the Harcourt-Brace series over two others after representatives of the three companies presented their material for the teachers' consideration. The curriculum change had been under study and it was thoroughly discussed at a January in-service day, he said.

The board approved, on a one-year basis, a revised class schedule for the junior and senior high schools that will shorten the school day by 21 minutes. All classes will be shortened from 55 to 53 minutes each and each of the two lunch periods will be cut from 42 to 35 minutes. School will dismiss at 3:16 instead of the present 3:37 p. m.

At a cost of \$1,200 the board approved purchase of Century fencing to complete the encirclement of the elementary school grounds. It will be the same five foot high fencing that now extends along Third St., and along the kindergarten buildings. There will be access points to adjacent

streets. The fencing item has been in the budget for several years, it was noted.

Representatives of the board met with the consistory of Salem United Church of Christ at Wayne at 7:30 p. m. Thursday in regard to possible renting of its church hall for classroom use next school year.

Board member Allen Tessar was designated to distribute diplomas at high school commencement. The board was also represented at the telephone conference on The Kellert Report on Education at 9 p. m. Thursday, sponsored by the Wisconsin Association of School Boards.
