## Sgt. Clifford Bales, Companion Are Found Dead in Philippines

### Kewaskum Airman's Death Caused by Knife, Other Wounds

#### BODIES UNEARTHED FROM GRAVE IN REMOTE AREA

An Associated Press release on Wednesday reported that the bodies of two U. S. airmen were found Tuesday, with their hands tied behind their backs, in a grave in a remote area of Clark Air Base, Manilla, Philippines, U. S. officials said. The victims were identified but officials withheld their names until the families could be notified. The cause of death was not immediately known because the bodies were decomposed.

One of the bodies has since been officially identified as that of Sgt. Clifford J. Bales, son of Mr. and Mrs. Sylvester Bales of R. 1, Kewaskum.

The Statesman learned from Mr. and Mrs. Bales Thursday that on April 4 they received a letter from Major General R. G. Dupont, Military Personnel Center, HQ USAF, Randolph Air Force Base, Tex., informing them that their son was missing in the Philippines. The letter read in part, "he and a companion departed from Clark Air Force Base in the Philippines on the morning of 2 April. They were both on motorcycles enroute to Mabalacat Hills, west by northwest of the bay. They failed to report for duty on the afternoon of 3 April. Search was then conducted."

After notification of Sgt. Bales being missing, Mr. and Mrs. Bales received four telegrams at three-day intervals confirming them of the continued search for the missing airmen.

Then on Wednesday morning of this week, April 15, another let-

ter from Major General Dupont was delivered in person to Mr. and Mrs. Bales by Air Force personnel which confirmed the death of their son. The letter read in part:

"Reference my previous communications concerning the missing status of your son, Sgt. Clifford J. Bales, it is with deep regret that I officially inform you of his death. He died in the Philippines on 2 April, 1970. A search party unearthed his body approximately 5 miles from the north portion of the Clark Air Force Base perimeter fence on 14 April 1970. The exact cause of death is presently unknown, however, the probable cause was due to knife wounds and wounds by unknown blunt instruments inflicted by unknown assailants."

Plans for burial are being withheld pending the arrival of the body.

Sgt. Bales, who graduated from Kewaskum High School in 1966, enlisted in the Air Force in November of 1967. He was stationed in Pakistan from August, 1968, until September, 1969 and had been stationed in the Philippines since October, 1969.

He was a brother of Mrs. Gary (Sue) Reigle of this village.

### Blood Bank to Make Collection Here on May 6

#### GOAL IS 150 PINTS; VOLUNTEERS NEEDED

The annual Kewaskum Blood Bank will be held on Wednesday, May 6, from 1 to 7 p. m. in the multi-purpose room of the high school.

Co-chairmen Mrs. Mark Rodenkirch and Mrs. Wayne Rimmel are issuing an urgent appeal to area residents to sign up immediately to replenish the rapidly dwindling supply of blood. Kewaskum's goal for this year is 150 pints.

Anyone living in Washington county except residents of Polk, Erin, Hartford and Richfield townships is eligible to contribute.

Anyone can volunteer to donate a pint of blood, with these simple restrictions: 1. You must be between the ages of 18 to 61; 2. Women must weigh at least 110 pounds and men must weigh more than 125 pounds; 3. You must not have had cancer, diabetes, malaria, heart disease or jaundice.

If for some reason you are not able to give blood, suggest a member of your family, a friend or neighbor donate. With the cooperation of all members of the community, blood will always be available if YOU need it.

Donating blood is an easy, quick and NO-COST way to help your community.

## New Fane Church 2 Local Drivers To Hold Concert Seriously Hurt Of Choral Music In Head-on Crash

The members of St. John's Lutheran Church of New Fane, and their pastor, the Reverend Arthur A. Haupt, announce a concert of choral music to be presented in their church the evening of Sunday, May 3, beginning at 8 p. m. The program will be sung by the fifty voices of the Lutheran A Cappella Choir of Milwaukee, directed by Eldon Balko, and is open to the public without admission charge. A free-will offering only will be taken.

The concert in New Fane will be the last stop of an all-day trip that will take the singers to Oconomowoc in the morning, where they will participate in worship services, and to Watertown in the afternoon, where the full concert will also be sung. The concert to be presented at St. John's will be substantially the same program that the group will present the following week in Uihlein Hall of Milwaukee's new Performing Arts Center, and which is being publicized as a "Bach Festival Concert."

At New Fane the choir will perform two of Bach's motets, "Sing Ye to the Lord," and "Jesus, Priceless Treasure," each of which is an extended piece of music, but in two entirely different moods. The first one named is a powerful and complex composition based on several passages from the book of Psalms, while the latter is based upon a familiar Lutheran chorale, with several variations on the hymn tune separated by musical settings of several verses from the book of Romans.

Also to be performed on the program the evening of May 3 will be a number of shorter choruses from Bach's major works, including two from his "Mass in B Minor."

The choir is made up of men and women of Lutheran churches in the greater Milwaukee area (Continued on page 2)

Kewaskum drivers of two cars were removed to St. Joseph's Community Hospital, West Bend, in the Kewaskum firemen's ambulance for treatment of serious injuries after a collision on County Trunk G near the Mauthe Lake headquarters entrance in the Town of Auburn at 11:15 p. m. last Friday. The mishap occurred seven-tenths of a mile south of County Trunk SS.

David F. Wietor, son of Mr. and Mrs. Cyril Wietor, and Sally A. Tyda, both of Kewaskum, were alone in their autos when they collided almost directly head-on. The two vehicles were traveling in opposite directions.

Wietor was pinned in his auto following the crash and it took some time to remove him. Four members of the local ambulance rescue squad went to the scene to assist in removing him.

It was reported that Wietor suffered a compound fracture of his arm, dislocated hip, sprained ankle and other injuries. Mrs. Tyda sustained fractures of both of her legs, a fractured jaw and other injuries. Both are still confined at the hospital.

Both cars were demolished in the crash.

Norman A. Beyer, 31, of 316 Braatz Dr., Kewaskum, was taken to St. Joseph's Community Hospital, West Bend, by Campbell's ambulance early Friday for treatment of head, leg and back injuries suffered in a one-car accident on County Trunk V, about 4½ miles north of Kewaskum. Fond du Lac county police reported that Beyer's car skidded on loose gravel and rolled over several times. The accident took place at 12:30 a. m.

## Fire Sirens to Sound Tornado Alert April 20

### TORNADO SAFETY RULES ARE LISTED

Beginning Monday, April 20, at 10:30 a. m., the fire sirens of Washington county will sound to acquaint the people with a tornado alert. Alerts will be held monthly on the third Monday of each month through October.

The sound of the alert shall be a series of steady blasts of the siren from three to five minutes in duration. Family plans should be discussed and children reminded to seek shelter.

When a tornado approaches, your immediate action may mean life or death. Seek inside shelter, preferably in a tornado cellar, underground excavation, or a steel-framed or reinforced concrete building of substantial construction. Stay away from windows!

In office buildings—Stand in an interior hallway on a lower floor, preferably in the basement.

In factories—On receiving a tornado warning, post a lookout. Workers should move quickly to the section of the plant offering the greatest protection in accordance with the following:

who enter the group on the basis of a vocal audition and who are held to a strict rehearsal schedule by the director, who is also professor of music at Milwaukee's Concordia College. Since the choir's founding in 1937, more than 700 individuals have sung with the group. Three of the present members were also in the original 1937 choir, although the majority of the singers are men and women in their twenties and thirties.

Each year the chorus prepares and presents two completely different concert programs—one in the late fall, the other in the spring—singing them in Milwaukee and on concert trips such as is taking place on May 3. Thus far in the 1969-1970 season, the choristers have sung in Chicago, Arlington Heights, and Kenosha in addition to the regular Christmas concert in Milwaukee and a special Epiphany service in their home city in January. A stereo record of the choir's singing has recently been made, and will be available for purchase at the concert in New Fane.

dance with advance plans. In homes—The basement usually offers the greatest safety. Seek shelter under a sturdy workbench or heavy table if possible. In a home with no basement, take cover under heavy furniture in the center part of the house. Keep some windows open but stay away from them.

Mobile homes are particularly vulnerable to over-turning during strong winds. Trailer parks should have a community shelter. Appoint a community leader responsible for constant radio monitoring during threatening weather or during watch periods.

In schools—Whenever possible, go to an interior hallway on the lowest floor. Avoid auditoriums and gymnasiums or other structures with wide, free-span roofs. If a building is not of reinforced construction, go quickly to a nearby reinforced building, or to a ravine or open ditch and lie flat.

In open country—Move away from the tornado's path at a right angle. If there is no time to escape, lie flat in the nearest depression, such as a ditch or ravine.

Keep listening—Your radio and television stations will broadcast the latest tornado advisory information. Call the Weather Bureau only to report a tornado.

**REMEMBER:** Tornado watch means tornadoes are expected to develop. Tornado warning means a tornado has actually been sighted.

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**Set April Cancer Crusade Goal for County at \$11,655**

"We need people who care enough to conquer cancer," said Gerhard C. Spielman, West Bend, chairman of the American Cancer Society's April 1970 educational and fund-raising Crusade in Washington county.

A goal of \$11,655 is being sought, approximately the same as last year's crusade — attained after a few extensions.

"For every person who cares enough, there is a proud title waiting—volunteer—and a rewarding job to do," he said. What can a volunteer do?

Alert friends and family to ways of helping to protect themselves against cancer;

Raise the funds, that raise hopes that cancer will be conquered.

"Last year dozens of volunteers in Washington county gave their time and talent to this great effort. They worked together in thousands of American communities.

Volunteers for Crusade 1970 are urgently needed by the Wash-

ington County American Cancer Society Unit, West Bend. "Women are especially needed," Spielman said, "and it would be greatly appreciated if they would call Mrs. Jerry Chapman at 334-5521.

"We need even more of these dedicated people on our side this year. There is a job for everyone, with even a few hours to spare," he said. Facts about cancer need to be communicated; records must be kept; every house in the community must be realized in Crusade 1970 which commenced April 1. An important part of the Crusade will be the distribution of a leaflet listing protective measures against cancer.

"Many cancer deaths are needless because the chances of a cure are excellent if a diagnosis is made early. There are 1.5 million Americans alive today who are cured of cancer," he said.

Examples of safeguards include the Pap test for early detection of uterine cancer and the procto, or examination for one of the most common forms, bowel cancer.

"Each dollar given to the American Cancer Society goes to work in so many ways to fight this cruel disease," Spielman said.

Milton D. Coulter, 53, of R. 1, Allenton, passed away of carcinoma at Maple Manor Nursing Home, Fond du Lac, on Wednesday, April 8, following an illness of 1½ years.

He was born Aug. 26, 1916, in the Town of Wawne, a son of the late David and Mary Doms Coulter, and married the former Elva Schaefer of Kewaskum on Feb. 22, 1941, at Peace Church in Kewaskum. After their marriage the couple moved to Mayville where they resided for 15 years. Mr. Coulter was employed as a machinist at Maysteel in Mayville and also served as city water commissioner there for several years until 1955. Then the Coulters built and operated the Texaco station and M & E Restaurant on Hwy. 41 near the intersection with Hwy. 28 in the Town of Wayne for a number of years.

Mr. Coulter was a member of Vesper Lodge No. 62 F. and A. M. of Mayville and St. Paul's Lutheran Church in Mayville many years.

About 12 per cent of the student body was listed on the honor roll. The school had an enrollment of nearly 7,900 during the first semester.

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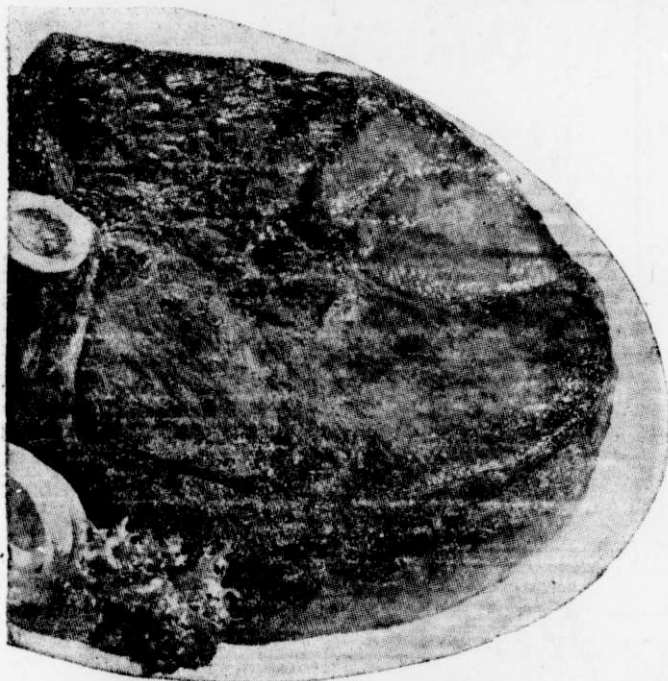
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25 YEARS AGO

One of the lightest votes in years was cast at the village election, only 120 voters turning out. Their was no opposition on the ballot. All village officials were re-elected as follows: President, Charles Miller; trustees, K. A. Honeck, Henry Rosenheimer and A. P. Schaeffer; clerk, Carl F. Schaeffer; treasurer, John Marx; assessor, Joseph Mayer; supervisor, E. M. Romaine; justice of the peace, Lyle Bartelt; constable, George Kippenhan. The Town of Kewaskum also had no opposition and only 45 votes were cast. Re-elected were: Ed Campbell, chairman; Jos. Schoofs and Wm. C. Backhaus, supervisors; Alfred Seefeldt, clerk; Martin Schmidt, treasurer; John Etta, assessor.

Ten men were inducted into the armed forces in Washington county. They included Francis Braun of RR. 1, Kewaskum, a senior at Kewaskum High School; Vernon Sarauer and Robert Rosbeck of near St. Kilian.

The Kewaskum fire department rented their tavern and residence building on Main St. to Edwin "Murphy" Miller of West Bend who will take possession July 1. The present operator, Edwin Bartelt, is retiring from the tavern business.

Kewaskum's first businessman and family man has been added to the long list of World War II dead. He is Technician Fifth Grade Sylvester N. Harter, who was killed at Moselle, France, Mar. 5 while in the line of duty when he hit an enemy mine which exploded. News of his death was received by his wife, Mrs. Anna Harter, in a letter. Harter, owner of the Kewaskum Frozen Foods locker plant, was a son of Mr. and Mrs. Jacob Harter of the Town of Auburn, with whom his wife and young daughter reside. T/5 Harter was inducted into the army nearly three years ago.

He writes that he is spending his nights in a foxhole and lost 80 pounds in weight since he left Australia. Miller also mentioned that he met Pfc. Byron Bunkelman on Leyte. He has been promoted to seaman first class. In his letter to the Statesman, Lloyd also mentions that he is fine and writes, "I still get the Statesman way out here but sure would like to see some white women and bright

51 YEARS AGO  
1919

One of the biggest one-day auction sales in Fond du Lac county was conducted by Auctioneer George Brandt of this village when he sold the personal property of J. B. Day and Herman Krueger near Campbellsport. The property consisted of \$17,000 worth of livestock and machinery. It was believed it would take two days to dispose of the hundreds of articles and livestock but Brandt completed the sale by 5 p. m. The sale started at 8 a. m.

Math Boisbier sold his house and lot on Wilhelmina St. to John Schaeffer of St. Michaels.

The first official casualty report to strike this community announced the death of Pvt. Pearson "Sunny" Brown, who was with the Rainbow Division on the firing line in France. The message, received by his father, Floyd Brown of Campbellsport, stated that he died of atelosis. Pvt. Brown graduated from Kewaskum High School with the class of 1917 and was a star member of the school basketball team. Buswell Attends  
Driver and Traffic  
Safety Conferences

Earl Buswell represented Kewaskum Community Schools at the Wisconsin School Safety Coordinators Association's Spring Conference, held last Friday, April 10, in Stevens Point.

Buswell joined nearly 150 other educators and administrative personnel at this conference to discuss the school's role in traffic and general safety.

The keynote address was given by Dr. James Weygandt, a Sheboygan Falls physician and chairman of the Federal Commission on Safe Transportation. The afternoon session was highlighted with an address by State Superintendent of Schools William C. Kahl.

Dr. Weygandt spoke on the growing problems of alcohol and drugs involvement in motor vehicle accidents. Superintendent Kahl pointed out that accidents take their greatest toll from the young and that the schools were the logical places to build safety awareness at an early age.

Other subjects covered in the one-day session included negligence and liability in the schools, accident reporting, the school safety coordinators responsibilities, natural disasters, student disturbances, classroom safety education, and school bus safety.

Buswell also attended the Eighth Annual State Conference for Driver and Traffic Safety Education at Stevens Point last Saturday, April 11.

More than 550 high school driver and traffic safety education teachers, school administrators, and curriculum coordinators attended the largest state driver education conference in the nation. National and state exhibits featuring new methods, equipment, and teaching aids were on display both Friday evening and Saturday morning. This annual state conference is co-sponsored by the Wisconsin Driver and Traffic Safety Education Association and the State Department of Public Instruction.

Honor level grades were earned by 51 of the 149 students enrolled part time last fall at The University of Wisconsin, Washington County Campus, West Bend.

Forty-one of the students earned A averages (4.0) including 35 taking a single course and six taking six or more credits. Ten students, all taking more than one course, had grade point averages ranging from 3.33 to 3.73.

Women outnumbered men among the part-time honor students 38 to 13.

Commenting on the fact that more than one-third of the part time students did honors work, UWWC Dean Harry J. Maxwell said, "There's no question about it. I know that a significant number of adult students at other Center System campuses earn scholastic honors every year. We have the highest percentage of part time students in the system. We're proud of their achievements, but our main concern is that area people take advantage of the chances for personal enrichment at UWWC. We feel the school is enriched by the part time student."

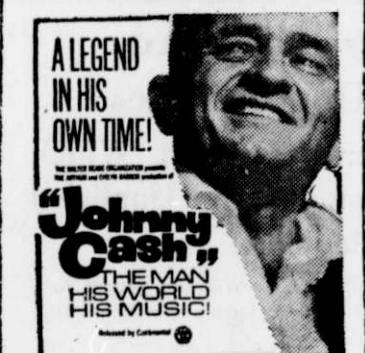

## Program on Wild Flowers Presented To Woman's Club

### FORMER CLUB PRESIDENT, MRS. ALBRECHT IS SPEAKER

A program on "Wild Flowers of Wisconsin" was presented by Mrs. Paul Albrecht of Kiel to members of the Kewaskum Woman's Club at their Saturday meeting. Through close-up, colored slides, they were able to observe the wild flowers nestled in their natural habitat on the forest floor on the Albrecht farmland located three miles south of Kiel.

The speaker, who is a former Kewaskum resident and past president of the Kewaskum club, declared she is not a botanist but rather "a late blooming, field naturalist" with a special enthusiasm for our natural heritage of wild flowers.

The slides gave a panoramic view of the 120 acres adjacent to the Sheboygan River on which she said "the family roams, winter and summer."

The first flower of spring to be found in the lowlands is the broad-leaved skunk cabbage. Its inner warmth pushes plant growth to the surface very early—usually in March. Next to appear is the marsh marigold, a member of the buttercup family.

First to appear on the highlands is the hepatica which Mrs. Albrecht described as the gem of the woods, for there are no two alike. Appearing next in order are the mayflower and spring beauty. Wisconsin's state flower, the blue violet, can be found from the Arctic to the gulf, she said.

It is against state laws, and there is a penalty, to pick lotus, trailing arbutus, wood lily, all species of orchids, trilliums, pitcher plant and American bittersweet.

The spring flower theme was carried to the tea table by the hostesses, Mrs. A. M. Hron and Mrs. Allen Tessar. A sprig of flow-

ers was placed on each plate.

During the business meeting, Mrs. Marvin Martin and Mrs. Tessar were elected to the executive board to serve with the program chairman, the officers and the past president and past treasurer. President-elect, Mrs. Wilmer Falk announced the program committee for the next season will consist of Mrs. Al. Zehren, Mrs. Tessar, Mrs. Gary Gerhartz and Mrs. Neil Denniston. On the ways and means committee will be Mrs. Ray Schaefer, Mrs. Dan Schowalter, Mrs. E. E. Miller and Mrs. Vincent Groh. Mrs. O. E. Behnke and Mrs. Schaefer will be delegates to the sixth district convention in Fond du Lac.

## EXTREME FIRE HAZARDS NOW EXIST IN AREA STATE PARKS

Extreme fire hazards now exist in the state forests located in the East Central Conservation District, according to Robert G. Hummel, district director.

Because of a lack of spring rains, the forest, marsh and marshlands within the parks and the Kettle Moraine State Forest are in a very dry condition. Campers, hikers, fishermen and citizens living close to these areas should be careful with fire. No campfire should be left unattended at any time. Smokers—be careful to put out cigarettes.

A fire now in our parks is disastrous. Any fire seen within or near a park or forest should be reported to the nearest park forest office.
