Military Rites Today for Kewaskum Airman Found Slain in Philippines

MITES FOR SGT. CLIFFORD BALES AT T. AUBURN CHURCH

Funeral services are being held this (Friday) morning for Sgt. Clifford J. Bales, 22, son of Mr. and Mrs. Sylvester J. Bales of R. 1, Kewaskum, who last week was identified as one of two American airmen who were found slain near the Clark Air Force Base near Manila in the Philippines. Filipino police officials later attributed the slayings to Communist led Huk terrorists.

Rites for Sgt. Bales will be held at 9:15 a. m. at the Techtman-Myrhum Funeral Home, 1315 W. Washington St., West Bend, and at 10 a. m. at St. Mathias Church in the Town of Auburn, near New Fane. The Rev. Walter Morgan will officiate. Military graveside rites will be held at Holy Angels Cemetery, West Bend. Military personnel accompanied the body here and will officiate at the graveside rites, including honor guard, firing squad, pallbearers and bugler.

Visitation at the funeral home was after 2 p. m. Thursday with a parish vigil at 8 p. m. Thursday.

Also slain with Bales in the brutal murders was a companion, identified as Airman First Class Donald D. Facklam, 24, of Scandia, Kansas. Reported missing on Apr. 3, the bodies of the two airmen were discovered in a shallow grave about five miles from the north portion of Clark Air Force Base perimeter fence on April 14, according to information received here by Mrs. Bales from Major General R. G. Dupont, Military Personnel Center, HQ USAF, Randolph Air Force Base, Tex.

Information received by Mr. and Mrs. Bales indicated that "the exact cause of death of their son was unknown, but believed due to knife wounds and wounds by an unknown, blunt instrument, inflicted by an unknown assailant."

Wire service reports quoted an Air Force spokesman as saying it was the worst crime involving American servicemen in recent years. Both men had their hands tied behind their backs. Their skulls and chests were crushed, he said. A preliminary autopsy show-

ed Facklam had been shot in the chest and left arm. These reports stated it was uncertain if Bales had also been shot.

Maj. Vicente Eduardo, of the Philippine constabulary, said that villagers reported that the Huk led by a Commander Dante, killed the two Americans.

The two men had been missing since April 2 when they headed north on a motorcycle trip toward the Mabalacat-Bamban portion of the Zambales Mountains. The area where the bodies were found is about 65 miles north of Manila in Tarlac Province where Communist Huk terrorists are known to operate, wire news sources stated.

Military authorities had informed Bales' parents that he was missing, and last Wednesday notified them of his death, and the recovery of the body and that of his companion. This notification, delivered by Capt. John R. Shinneck of Milwaukee, placed Bales' death on April 2, 1970, and stated the bodies were found by a search party on April 14.

Born Jan. 12, 1948, Sgt. Bales graduated from Kewaskum High School in 1966 and from Manpower Business Training Institute in Milwaukee in July, 1967.

He enlisted in the Air Force in November of 1967 and took his basic training at Lackland Air Force Base in Texas. He then attended school at Goodfellow AFB at San Angelo, Texas, following which he was sent to Pakistan in August of 1968.

Last September he returned to his home on leave and late in October, 1969, he left for the Philippines. He was a member of the Security Branch of the Clark AFB.

In addition to his parents, Sylvester and Alice (Bohn) Bales, he is survived by three sisters, Mrs. Dennis (Barbara) Pionkowski of West Allis, Mrs. Gary (Sue) Reigle of Kewaskum, and Beth, at home; his maternal grandmother, Mrs. Edward Bohn of West Bend; a niece, Jacqueline Reigle, and a nephew, Jeffrey Pionkowski. A sister, Kristine, predeceased him.

Williams New Basketball Coach At High School

CALIFORNIA NATIVE SUCCEEDS WALT BADE

Head basketball coach at Kewaskum Community High School beginning with the 1970-71 school year will be Michael Williams. He will fill the coaching position formerly held by Walter Bade who asked to be relieved of his head coaching duties. Bade, who piloted the Indians to the Scenic Moraine championship the past season, will remain on the high school teaching staff.

Williams' contract was approved by the board of education Monday night. A native of El Cajon Valley, California, he is a graduate of San Diego State College and taught for two years in Lemon Grove, Calif. before four years of teaching and coaching at Blanchardville (Wis.) High School.

Williams will also be assistant football coach and teach history. He is 28 years old and married.

Re-elect Romaine Board Chairman

Elwyn M. Romaine of Kewaskum, veteran chairman of the Washington County Board of Supervisors, was re-elected chairman at the board's organizational meeting at West Bend Tuesday. This will be his 26th year as chairman. Romaine tallied 23 of the possible 29 member vote.

Also re-elected was the vice-chairman, Joseph Schmitz of Germantown, another veteran board member, who got 20 of the possible ballots.

Next the seven new board members elected in the county were introduced and sworn in.

By a vote of 24-5, the board turned down a resolution to create a five-man highway committee instead of the present three members. Also approved was authorization for \$6.15 per day charges for Huber Law term prisoners. Former charges were \$2.70 to cover the cost of three meals. Other business and resolutions were approved and authorized.

CONTRACTS FOR 84 TEACHERS APPROVED

The board of education Monday night ratified its part of an agreement to rent the multi-purpose room at the rear of Salem United Church of Christ in Wayne for use as a half-day kindergarten classroom by the Wayne School.

The additional classroom is needed to alleviate overcrowded conditions. The relocatable classroom at Wayne which had housed the kindergarten class will become a classroom for second graders.

For a rental fee of \$208 per month or \$52 per week, the church will provide heat, light and local telephone service. Rental period will be from Aug. 17, 1970 to June 14, 1971.

The school district will be expected to furnish janitorial service, furniture, supplies and shelving and to repair any damage that might occur. Any increase in adjustment of insurance rates will also be paid by the district. The agreement was reached at a recent meeting of the church consistory with school board representatives.

Contracts for 84 teachers were approved. New to the district will be Mrs. Signe Loberger, first grade at Kewaskum Elementary; Judith Clark, second grade at Wayne; Carol Degner, fourth grade at Farmington; Michael Schweighardt, high school German; Katherine Koch, high school chemistry, and Michael Williams, head basketball coach, assistant football coach and history. Supt. of Schools Marshall Boyd said six teaching positions are yet to be filled. Included are one second grade teacher, one elementary art, two industrial arts; one business education and one social studies.

Boyd also reported that the \$155,000 borrowed for the defeated swimming pool project has been invested in certificates of deposit as voted at the April 6 board meeting. The sum of \$20,000 has been invested in a six-month certificate at four and one-half per cent interest and \$135,000 in a 12-month certificate at 5.3 per cent interest.

May 11 is the date of the next board meeting.

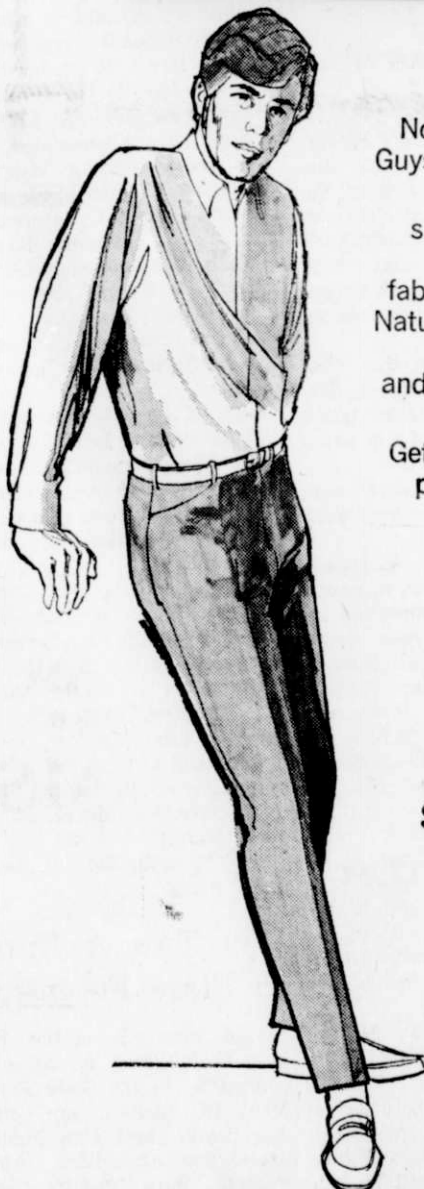

also that the environmental effects resulting from these expansions will be far less than the pollution associated with the activities replaced by the increased use of electricity.
