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

25 YEARS AGO Friday, April 27, 1945

A war department telegram was received by Alfred Kral informing him that his brother, Sgt. Arnold Kral, was slightly wounded in action in Germany. He was a mem-General Patton's third army. Mr. and Mrs. John Roden, R. 2, received a letter from their son-in law, T/5 William Otten, in which he stated that he is in a hospital in Italy, having been shot through the ankle when a pistol in the hands of a companion accidentally discharged.
