Sewage Disposal Problem Is Reviewed by Village Board

Commercial Pick-Up Proposals Heard; To Resurface Main St.

MUST DESIGN FACILITIES FOR EXPECTED INCREASE IN POPULATION TO 4,400

Whether the village should buy a new, needed garbage truck or dispense with village pickup service and convert to a commercial type of refuse collection was a main topic of discussion at the regular meeting of the village board Monday night. No action was taken pending study of the facts.

The board members also heard a report of a study made on the most advantageous installation of a sanitary sewer system in Bel-Ric Acres, a subdivision at the southwest limits of Kewaskum. Also, plans were reviewed for expansion of the village sewage treatment plant and a report was heard on state and federal aids available that will offset the cost estimated at \$190,000.

Orval Behnke, chairman of the public works committee, reported that he and his group have heard proposals of three commercial-type disposal companies. If the village goes to that type of plan, it will assume costs for it. There would be only one combined weekly collection of garbage and refuse. He noted that the twice weekly schedule now in effect is more often than average for many municipalities.

"We have been very kind to our citizens," Behnke remarked and Village President Cyril Wietor expressed the thought that "we have spoiled our people."

The proposals of each company varied. One offered the service for \$2 per residence and \$5 per commercial per month which included hauling the refuse to its own sanitary landfill site. If hauled to the village dump, the cost would be reduced by 25 cents per pickup per month.

Another company offered to pick up refuse for \$1.80 from residence and commercial alike with an added cost of \$75 per month if hauled to its own site. There was another offer of \$1.50 per month for residence and commercial alike and the village would have to use its dump. The figures were based on 450 residences and 70 commercials. A new garbage truck would cost about \$15,000, it was said.

Board members pursued many avenues of thought. With the current emphasis on air pollution, is it wise to burn the refuse in the village incinerator? Will the once-a-week collection compel many residents to install garbage disposals in their kitchen, thus adding to the ever-rising costs of sewage treatment? Except for the commercial establishments who now haul directly to it, should the incinerator be abandoned? Should the village go to sanitary landfill? "Let's give this some study," was the temporary decision.

In connection with refuse disposal, discussion centered on the contract which the village has

with Campbellsport under which Campbellsport hauls its refuse to Kewaskum and it is burned in the local incinerator. The contract in effect since Feb. 1, 1965 calls for a charge of \$2 per cubic yard for which the Village of Kewaskum is paid about \$356 per quarter.

It was agreed that the rate is too low. A meeting will be set up with Campbellsport village officials that will include general discussion on what their future plans in refuse disposal may be.

A report on the study of sanitary sewer installation in Bel-Ric Acres was given by Jim Elder of Stone and Robinson, consulting engineers of Brookfield. From three possibilities he recommended one that calls for a lift station in the northwest corner of the subdivision. Total cost was stated to be \$37,500, the least costly of the three.

He also reported sewage treatment plant expansion plans are almost complete noting that it will be able to handle one million gallons of sewage per day which will slightly more than triple the present capability.

He gave a run-down on the equipment to be added. Included is a chemical pump for phosphorous removal to comply with a Dec. 1972 state order. He said phosphorous removal is a very costly procedure and that new developments are coming out right along.

In view of Kewaskum's population projection of 4,400 in 1995 it is necessary, Elder said, to design facilities for an additional 2,400 persons. Present population is estimated at 2,000. It is unrealistic, he indicated, to design beyond a 25-year span. He said that a used life station that the board is considering buying from the City of Menomonee Falls will accommodate a population of 3,460.

Wietor reported that he, Commissioner William Martin and Trustee Charles Miller had met with state officials in Madison and they learned that the state guarantees aid amounting to 25 per cent of the total cost. Federal aid is usually 30 per cent. If federal aid is not available, the state guarantees 50 per cent. If funds are available, state aid can go as high as 50 per cent; federal as high as 30 per cent.

The board unanimously adopted a resolution that calls for resurfacing of Main St. from the bridge to the railroad crossing with the state and village sharing equally in the total cost estimated at \$10,000. An appropriation for \$5,000 is covered in the current village budget.

The board delayed action on a petition signed by 12 residents of Braatz Drive, asking for installation this year of curb and gutter on the section of Braatz Drive that lies west of Western Ave. It was pointed out that the board went on record earlier this year not to put in any curb and gutter this year. The matter was referred to committee.

Chief of Police Donald Hlavaty reported he is scheduling monthly meetings for his auxiliary police group that presently totals 17. He favors having them dressed

Runaway Auto Smashes Beer Stand in Park

Shoplifting in Village Admitted By Six Teen-Agers

Police Chief Donald Hlavaty reports that six boys ranging in age from 14 to 16 years, have admitted shoplifting in Kewaskum. He said the boys shoplifted in at least three business places in the village.

The boys are all students of Kewaskum Community High School and all reside within the same general rural area. Hlavaty said about \$100 worth of merchandise has been recovered including a tape recorder worth about \$50, a pair of shoes, a bracelet and many smaller items such as cigarette lighters, pens and key chains.

The shoplifting occurred during the school lunch periods recently. Hlavaty received information regarding the shoplifting from a person not connected in any way with the situation. He questioned four boys Friday, one on Monday and the sixth boy Tuesday at the high school.

The boys have been released in custody of their parents pending an appearance before Judge J. Tom Merriam of the juvenile court. No date for the appearance has been set. Hlavaty said his investigation is continuing.

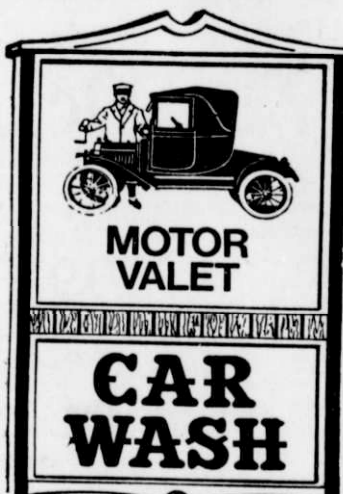

in appropriate uniform with badge and hat when performing their duty; that perhaps the village could put out the initial outlay of cash and through a fund raising affair, the auxiliary group could reimburse. He plans to schedule informative sessions on any police-related subject they might like to learn about, such as drug alert. He has had one session on disaster, he said.

He also reported that a recent traffic survey to determine if an automatic stop and go signal is needed at the intersection of Fond du Lac Ave. and Main St., revealed that some 8,700 cars crossed the intersection in an eight-hour period.

The board agreed that the village would assume cost of registration, room and meals to send two firemen each to each of two schools. One is a mechanics school at Oshkosh on May 14 and 15 and another is an aircraft school at Madison on May 21 and 22. Chief Armin Oppermann said he feels the latter is important because there are plans to extend the runway at the West Bend Airport to be able to accommodate business jets. "You never know when one will miss," he said.

A residence building permit was granted to Schulz Realty which was represented by Robert Kirst, agent, of Kewaskum.

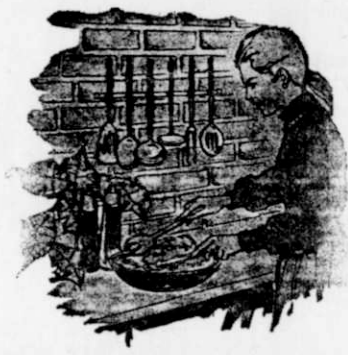

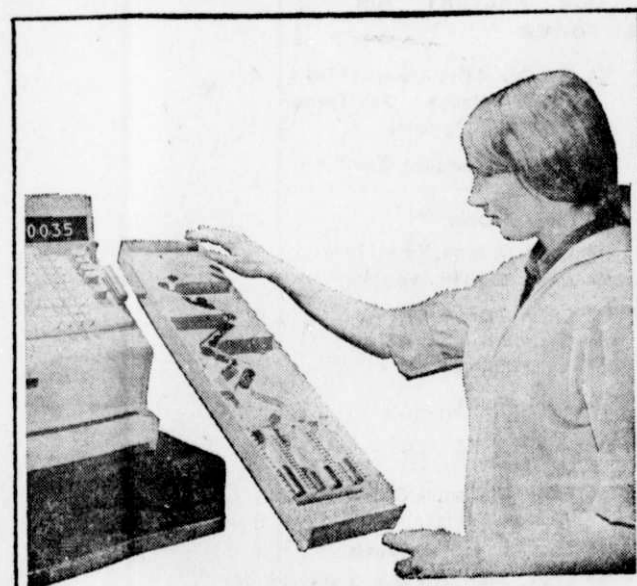
