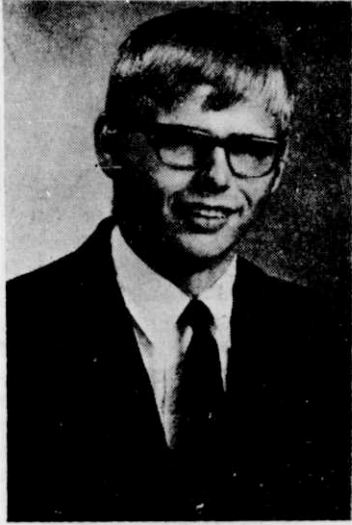

Summer Schedule For Beach, Swim Lessons Listed

MUST SIGN UP BY JUNE 19 FOR FIRST SESSION

The hours for the beach this summer will be as follows:

Monday thru Saturday: 10 a. m. - 12 noon; 12:30 p. m. - 6 p. m.
Sunday: 1 p. m. - 5 p. m.

Lessons will be conducted only on week days and during the morning hours according to this schedule:

10 a. m. - 10:30 a. m. — Swimmers.

10:30 a. m. - 11 a. m. — Intermediates.

11 a. m. - 11:30 a. m. — Beginners and Advanced Beginners.

11:30 a. m. - 12 noon — Beginners.

12:30 p. m. - 1:30 p. m. — Life-saving.

Both Junior and Senior Red Cross Lifesaving will be conducted during the above time period. Anyone enrolling in the Junior course must be 12 years old; the age requirement for the senior course is 15 years or older. Before enrolling in either of these courses the student MUST be a STRONG swimmer and have knowledge of several different swimming strokes. A test will be given during the first meeting to determine eligibility for continuing in the course. The course will stress water safety rules and provide the swimmer with both knowledge and practical application for saving not only his own life but also someone else's life should an accident occur.

SWIMMER — This classification level refers to a swimmer of advanced ability, knowledgeable of different strokes and endurance of at least 150 yds. without stopping. The course will teach advanced strokes and endurance so that the swimmer can truly "be at home in the water."

INTERMEDIATE — This level of instruction is for those youngsters that can swim the basic stroke (American Crawl) for at least 50 yds. without stopping. The course will teach different swimming styles and basic water

TRAFFIC SIGNAL FOR INTERSECTION APPROVED

Seeking an answer to long range planning for refuse disposal in the Village of Kewaskum, the Village Board met here Monday night with representatives of the Campbellsport Village Board and the West Bend City Council for an exchange of ideas on what future plans those two neighboring communities might have in regard to their refuse disposal.

The meeting was brought about by the fact that Kewaskum is in need of a new garbage truck and the Village Board has been pondering on whether to buy a new truck or convert to a commercial-type pick-up service or possibly go to sanitary landfill. Kewaskum maintains a 40-acre dump site for rubbish.

The Village Board's public service committee headed by O. E. Behnke has heard proposals of three commercial firms and presented that information to the board at its regular meeting May 5. Before taking any action, board members felt it wise to call in Campbellsport and West Bend. Also mentioned as a possibility is that Washington County is considering building a county incinerator although no action has been taken on it.

An oft-stated view was that a joint incinerator venture between several municipalities would be workable. One in operation in the Elkhart Lake - New Holstein - Plymouth area was reported working out successfully.

Included in the West Bend delegation were Mayor Ralph Schoenhaar, the city clerk and his deputy, the assistant city engineer and the superintendent of public works. They reported that West Bend presently deposits its refuse on a 37-acre sanitary landfill site which is expected to be filled in five year's time. From the facts and figures presented, the Kewaskum board drew the conclusion that a sanitary landfill is not the most economical disposal method.

The West Bend group brought with them copies of a study on the cost of an incinerator as asked for by their city. A figure of \$1 million was quoted. They said West Bend would be interested in taking on outside communities on a tonnage basis. Speaking for his committee, Behnke asked that he be kept informed of West Bend's plans.

Discussion with Campbellsport officials that included Village President David Twohig, and two board members centered around the contract the Village of Kewaskum has with Campbellsport under which Campbellsport hauls its garbage to Kewaskum where it is burned in its incinerator. Campbellsport furnishes two men and pays Kewaskum \$2 per cubic yard of garbage. Though February is

safety rules.

ADVANCED BEGINNER . . This level is for the youngster who can swim 15-30 feet using any stroke or combination of strokes. The course will teach basic swimming skills and emphasis will be placed on learning and performing these skills correctly allowing the swimmer to be more adaptable to the water, and more assured of his own ability when swimming.

BEGINNER — This level of instruction refers to someone who has little or no swimming ability and is beginning his formal instruction. The course will stress basic floating and swimming skills with emphasis on practice of these skills. Some safety hints will be provided since this level of swimmer is highly susceptible to water accidents.

The lifesaving class is the only one which is restricted by age; all other classes are dependent on ability and not age as a main factor for placement within a certain class. The course standards to be used are those designated for each level by the American Red Cross. Since these lessons will occur in the morning, the recreation swim period will be daily from 1:30 p. m. - 6 p. m. and during the hours previously mentioned for Saturday and Sunday.

Classes will be conducted in three sessions with each session lasting three weeks. The sessions are as follows:

Session 1 — June 22 - July 10.
Session 2 — July 13 - July 31.
Session 3 — Aug. 3 - Aug. 21.
Sign-up for the first session's classes must be completed by June 19; sign-up for succeeding sessions will be determined by progress made during the first weeks of instruction. Sign-up sheets will be at the village municipal building for registration in these classes.

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
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

Seven persons were injured in a two-car crash in the Town of Auburn, about two miles north of Kewaskum, Fond du Lac county officers reported. Cars driven by Thomas M. Casper, 21, of Milwaukee and Grover V. Brandt, 69, of Kewaskum collided at the intersection of County Trunks G and S at 6:13 p. m. Sunday.

Brandt and his passenger, Gertrude Brandt, were taken to St. Joseph's Community Hospital, West Bend. Brandt suffered cuts to the right arm and his passenger received head lacerations.

Casper and five passengers in his car were taken to the West Bend hospital by police and Kewaskum firemen's lacerations. Casper sustained head lacerations. His passengers were identified as: Linda Cayer, 18, Milwaukee, facial injuries; Patricia Knapp, 18, Milwaukee, facial injuries; Mary Barney, 20, Milwaukee, head concussion; Daniel Barney, 22, Milwaukee, bloody nose, and Joe Leimei, 18, Milwaukee, no apparent injury.

Casper told police that he passed the stop sign as he was headed west on County Trunk S. The Brandt auto, headed north on County Trunk G, was struck by the Casper car at the intersection. Casper's auto was demolished.

The anniversary date of the contract, it was pointed out that either party can change the contract with 30 days notice.

Behnke said "in view of the fact that a new garbage truck is needed and we would have to add to the village crew because the men are kept from doing other work because they are busy picking up garbage, we may o to commercial-type pickup on a trial basis. In that event," he told the Campbellsport group, "we will try to give you as much advance notice as possible."

It was pointed out that aside from fly ash and smoke from the village incinerator, no immediate problem is seen. It is not in the best condition but it is still usable.

Twohig reported "Campbellsport has a dump site for rubbish and we try to keep it as presentable as possible. We appreciate Kewaskum's help in burning the garbage. We have hopes that Fond du Lac County becomes interested in us now that it is preparing a central landfill operation."

In other action, the board accepted the recommendation of its public works committee to go along with the plan recommended by Jim Elder, consulting engineer, as the most advantageous for installation of a sanitary sewer in Bel-Ric Acres. In that connection, a resolution was approved authorizing purchase of a used lift station from the City of Menomonee Falls "at the best possible price." There has been communication on the subject.

It was noted that an automatic

traffic signal for the intersection of Main Street and Fond du Lac Avenue has been approved by the Wisconsin Division of Highways after a recent traffic survey.

It was also noted that some of the 12 persons who earlier this month petitioned the board for curb and gutter on the section of Braatz Drive that lies west of Western Ave. had changed their mind. As a result, the petitioners will be asked to re-state their wishes in writing by June 1. The total cost of curb and gutter is borne by the property owner.

Peter Albers, sewage plant operator, was granted permission to attend a seminar relating to his work, in Madison, June 1-5.

Referred to committee was (1) the application of Wallace Cudnoshoske to build what he described as "a 40 by 24 foot garage-type building with space for bicycle repair" at the rear of his residence at 208 North Ave.

(2.) The request from Fairmont Foods that the village pay one-half of the cost of erecting a barricade on the former depot site now leased from the C & NW Ry. by Fairmont for a parking lot. It was noted the C & NW will cancel the lease unless such a barricade is provided and the village was asked to share in the cost because part is used as a municipal parking lot.

A building permit was approved for William Kober for an addition to the rear of his home at 203 Clinton.

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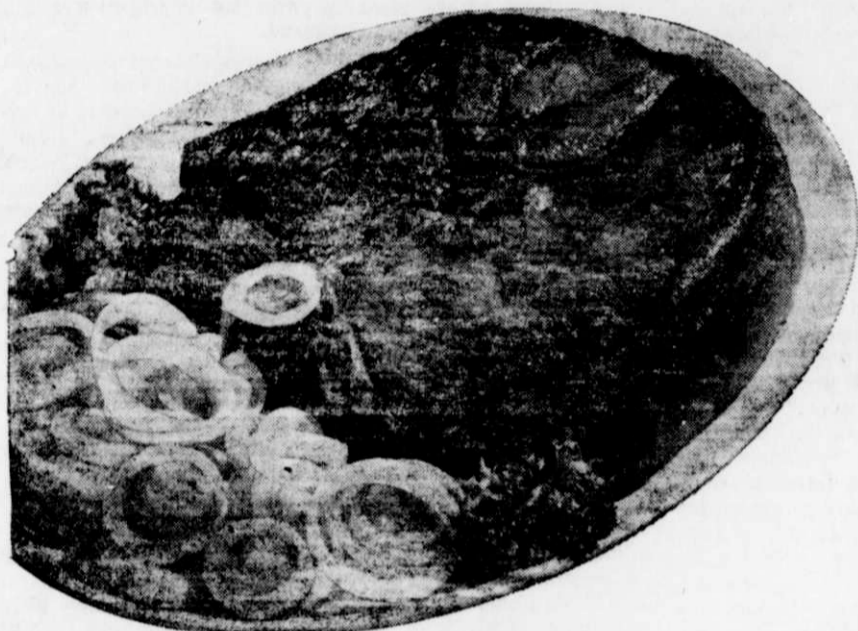

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Eichstedt Enters County Assembly Race on Dem Ticket

RAPS PRESENT ASSEMBLYMAN FOR VOTING ON TAX BILLS

Lee Eichstedt, 37, of Barton Township, R. 5, West Bend, on Wednesday announced his candidacy for the Democratic nomination for state representative for the Washington county assembly district.

A native of Wayne Township, he later moved to Fond du Lac County. Eichstedt served from 1952-1954 in the U. S. Army and was honorably discharged. He has been employed at Gehl Mfg. Co., West Bend, since 1958 and is serving his second term as president of Allied Industrial Workers Local 579. Lee is chairman of AIW Council No. 3's recently constituted special committee to study West Bend

traffic problems and also serves on the council's Scholarship Committee. He is also a member of the Washington County Human Rights Council. Eichstedt was elected chairman of the Washington County Democratic Party in 1969 and was re-elected in 1970. He serves as 1st vice-chairman of the 6th District Democratic Organization. He has three daughters, ages 12, 11 and 8.

In announcing his candidacy, Eichstedt stated:

Based on my conviction that the present Republican leadership in the legislature has ignored the problems of the average Wisconsin resident, I am today announcing my candidacy for the Democratic nomination for State Representative for the Washington County Assembly district.

My decision to run can be traced directly to my unalterable opposition to the present four per cent sales tax and the unjust burden it imposes on those who can least afford to pay it.

Furthermore it is my contention that the present Republican representative, Mr. Fred Schroeder, either wasn't listening or just ignored the sentiment of his constituents when he voted for the 4% sales tax. This one vote cost the taxpayers of Washington County an additional \$3,510,619 in new sales taxes alone. This, unfortunately, more than doubles the sales taxes that an average working family must pay.

The citizens of Washington County do not need the type of representative who supports rather than fights an increase in people's tax bills. The financial squeeze on the average working family was tightened by what I feel was an unconscionable rise in property taxes. The cost of owning a home has become almost prohibitive because of the skyrocketing property taxes. Local spending accelerates property taxes enough

without the state legislature passing a budget that shifts state costs onto local government. Yet our present Republican assemblyman supported a budget bill that will wallop Washington County residents with an extra \$198,133 in added property taxes as a result of welfare costs being shifted to the county.

I have noted with particular interest that our present Republican assemblyman, Mr. Schroeder, has taken credit for the passage of a school aids bill. There are, however, parts of that bill that Mr. Schroeder doesn't mention and understandably doesn't like to talk about in the presence of his constituents.

I refer to his vote to kill an amendment that would have sent \$34,502 in badly needed school aids to the West Bend School District and \$167,314 to the Germantown School District.

Instead of fighting for this \$201,816 in property tax relief for his constituents, he supported a move to send the money to wealthy suburban school districts in Waukesha and Milwaukee counties.

If Mr. Schroeder chooses to take dollars out of the pockets of Washington County taxpayers and send them to Waukesha and Milwaukee counties, then perhaps he should seek his assembly seat there and not here.

For these reasons, and many more, I have concluded that the residents of Washington County need and deserve more responsible, concerned and vigorous representation in the state assembly, and I pledge a campaign which will offer a full and frank disclosure and discussion of the issues.

Certainly the majority of Americans abhor violence. Riots on the campuses of this country are no exception. But they are happening, and happening out of long frustration of U. S. actions in Southeast Asia and throughout the world. Peaceful means to secure peace have been tried for the greater part of the last decade with no results and even worse with no one listening.

It is extremely easy for Americans to pretend Vietnam doesn't exist. But it does. As one who spent 12 months there I know intimately that it does, and that it has no justifiable cause.

I feel residents of Kewaskum are beginning to turn in the direction as the rest of the country has. Against the current administrative trend.

Primary elections are soon approaching as are the elections in the fall. Now is the time to work for peace. Talk with your neighbors, your council members, your clergy and your educators. Students! There is much to be done to achieve world and national peace.
