## Marine's Acquisition of Bank of Kewaskum Turned Down

The Federal Reserve Board in Washington D. C. has unanimously Memorial Day rejected the application of the Marine banking group to acquire the Parade, Services Bank of Kewaskum.

To acquire both banks would therefore eliminate competition. They state the Bank of Kewaskum is the third largest in Washington county, controlling almost 16%

of the deposits in the area. They stated the financial condition and management as satisfactory and prospects as appearing favorable whether or not acquired by the applicant (Marine).




