## Marine's Acquisition of Bank of Kewaskum Turned Down

The Federal Reserve Board in Washington D. C. has unanimously rejected the application of the Marine banking group to acquire the Bank of Kewaskum.

Agreement had been reached by the directors of the two institutions in late December. A joint announcement on Jan. 1 said the agreement contemplated acquisition of 80 per cent of the Kewaskum Bank stock by Marine. The shareholders of the two corporations later ratified the actions of their directors.

In its ruling, the seven-man reserve board stated that the merger would have "a significantly adverse effect on competition, without offsetting benefits."

The key factor in the decision by the reserve board was the proximity of the Bank of Kewaskum to the West Bend Marine Bank 7½ miles to the south.

The board concluded that the relevant market was made up of West Bend and the surrounding communities, including the Kewaskum area, the upper two-thirds of Washington County, the lower portion of Fond du Lac County, including Campbellsport.

The board further concluded that the West Bend and Kewaskum communities are economically linked and that the West Bend Marine and the Bank of Kewaskum compete in the same market. To acquire both banks would therefore eliminate competition. They state the Bank of Kewaskum is the third largest in Washington county, controlling almost 16% of the deposits in the area.

They stated the financial condition and management as satisfactory and prospects as appearing favorable whether or not acquired by the applicant (Marine).

## School Board Approves Work-Study Program

The Kewaskum School Board has given approval to a proposed Work-Study Program for the high school. The program was originally proposed and approved by Kewaskum High School's Advisory Council on Vocational Education.

As a result of the board's approval, a limited number of students who meet specific criteria will be granted release time from school in order to work at school approved employment. One of the criteria is that the job experience must be related to the student's course of study at high school. Course credit for the job experience will be granted by the Kewaskum Community High School. Further information concerning the program can be obtained from the high school office. ## Rural Kewaskum Young Man Is Killed in Crash

Myron Prescott, 26, son of Mr. and Mrs. Esau Prescott of R. 1, Kewaskum, was fatally injured in a traffic accident on US Hwy. 41 about 250 feet from the intersection with State Hwy. 49 in Dodge county at 1:30 a. m. Wednesday. The crash took place just south of the Fond du Lac county line.

Prescott was reported dead on arrival at St. Agnes Hospital, Fond du Lac. He died of extensive head injuries. His parents live about three miles northeast of Kewaskum in Fond du Lac county.

According to the Wisconsin State Patrol, which investigated the accident, Prescott was a passenger in a car driven by Gregory K. Smith, 21, of Vesper (Wood county). Smith was taken by ambulance to the Fond du Lac hospital for treatment of a right eye injury and abrasions to the back.

According to the accident report, filed with Dodge county authorities, the Smith auto was southbound on Hwy. 41. Smith reportedly failed to notice a semi-truck driven by Raymond J. Vanderbush, 26, of Waupun, enter the highway at the intersection with 49. In attempting to avoid a collision, Smith lost control of the car which struck the left rear of the truck and then rolled in the roadway, landing on its top partly on the median. The car was demolished. Damage to the semi owned by Johnson Truck Service, Waupun, was estimated at \$300.

### Local Theatre To Close Doors As of June 1

The Kewaskum Theatre will close its doors on June 1. This announcement was made by Mr. and Mrs. Kilian Honeck, who operated the theatre for the past 15 years. In announcing the closing Honeck said:

"It is with regret that I am closing the Kewaskum Theatre. My wife and I, with help from a small number of very faithful employees, have operated the theatre for approximately 15 years. Without the help of these employees, who worked for very small compensation, the theatre would have been closed many years ago. The effective date of closing is June 1, 1970.

"The community no doubt will miss the theatre, especially the younger children. The prime reason that my wife and I had to keep the theatre open was to provide entertainment for the young people. Many of the young people did appreciate that the theatre was for their enjoyment. Some of the children, however, did cause extensive damage to the theatre equipment and building, the ladies' rest room and the seats attest to this fact."

Honeck added that some of the children were unruly and misbehaved, and had become difficult to control. Another reason for closing the theatre was that it was not patronized sufficiently by adults of the community, many of whom chose to attend movies in surrounding cities.

Honeck also announced that the building would be put up for sale or would be available to anyone interested in operating the theatre. He added that he would be willing to offer his help in any way possible.

A letter to the effect that the theatre was closing was sent out to businessmen last week. The last film to show at the theatre will be this weekend. It is "Topaz" a spy thriller.

**Work-Study Program, Teacher Contracts, Other Items Approved by School Board**

**ACCEPTS LEGION OFFER FOR FOOTBALL FIELD FLAGPOLE**

A work-study program relative to vocational education at Kewaskum Community High School won unanimous approval of the Board of Education Monday night. This new phase is the result of long-range vocational program planning by the State Department of Public Instruction. Local high school department chairmen worked with two advisory committees in developing it.

Outlining the program, Principal Edward Connors said it will basically function on a very limited scale. It could build into a larger program, he said, but for the present perhaps only a half dozen students will be involved.

The work-study phase will be co-ordinated through the guidance department and geared to three types of students: Those who qualify through vocational rehabilitation will work through the Sheltered Workshop in West Bend. The business education student who possesses advanced levels of training in specific areas will be allowed to spend one or two hours of the school day in a business office where he can gain a wider experience through first-hand observation. The student classified as a potential drop-out will be put on a planned program in which he will spend about half of each school day in actual employment in his vocational area.

In other action, the board approved adoption and authorized purchase of 150 copies of the textbook "A World and Its People" at \$7.44 per copy for a junior high

world geography course. In the 1970-71 school year it will be taught to seventh and eighth graders, thereafter to seventh graders only.

The board approved a request from Kenneth Erickson for secretarial help for the junior high school. Also approved was the request from Richard Zarling, Kewaskum Elementary Principal, for an additional teacher aide. She will work with four teachers in grades five and six at Kewaskum.

Zarling reported the use of teacher aides in the district on a 20-hour week per aide basis has worked out very well but that he recommends their hours be expanded. That request was tabled as "a budget item."

Contingent on final enrollment figures, the board approved the request of Charles Algiers of Campbellsport to have his daughter attend Kewaskum kindergarten because Kewaskum kindergarten has none. He will have to pay tuition and transportation.

The board accepted the offer of the Robert G. Romaine American Legion Post of an illuminated American flag and pole on the football field. The post will also provide a color guard for flag-raising ceremonies before each game.

Teacher contracts were approved for Miss Kathleen Mulcahy of

Brookfield to teach second grade; Donald Seaman to teach Cudahy; teach art and Lois Kiehnau of Egg Harbor to teach business education. All are 1970 graduates. A combination industrial arts-mathematics position remains unfilled.

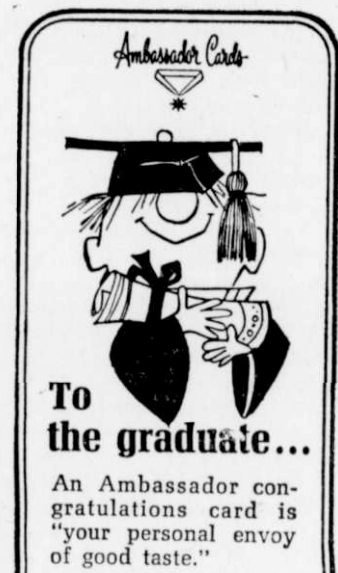

We weren't able to cement the blocks back together again, but we neatly piled the big ones, threw the smaller pieces in the trash barrel, then cleaned out all the leaves, glass and paper from under the platforms inside. We also picked up a lot of paper and glass around this building and the park. We hope it will stay clean because we worked

very hard. We'd like everyone to keep our park and Kewaskum clean by using trash barrels or by keeping the paper until they get home. If people wouldn't throw litter around in the first place, we wouldn't have to spend so much money to have it picked up again. Litter makes our land look ugly!

We're going to remember this—how about YOU!

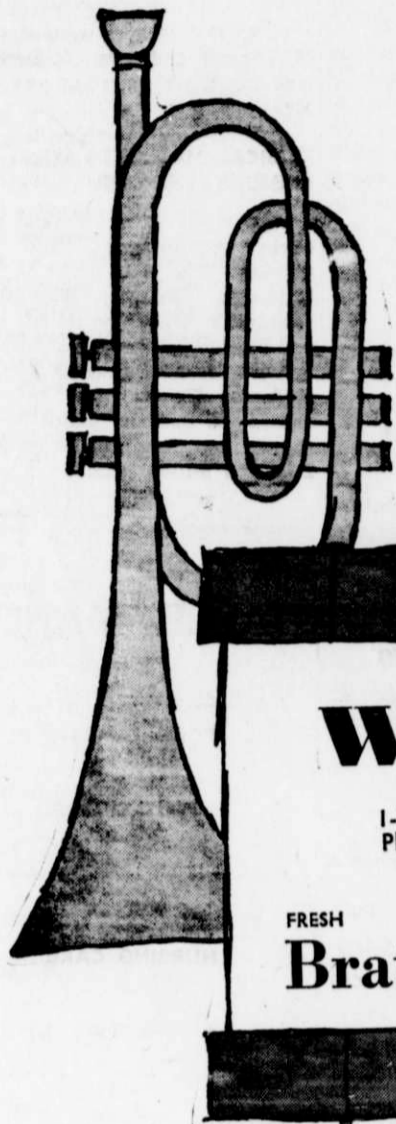

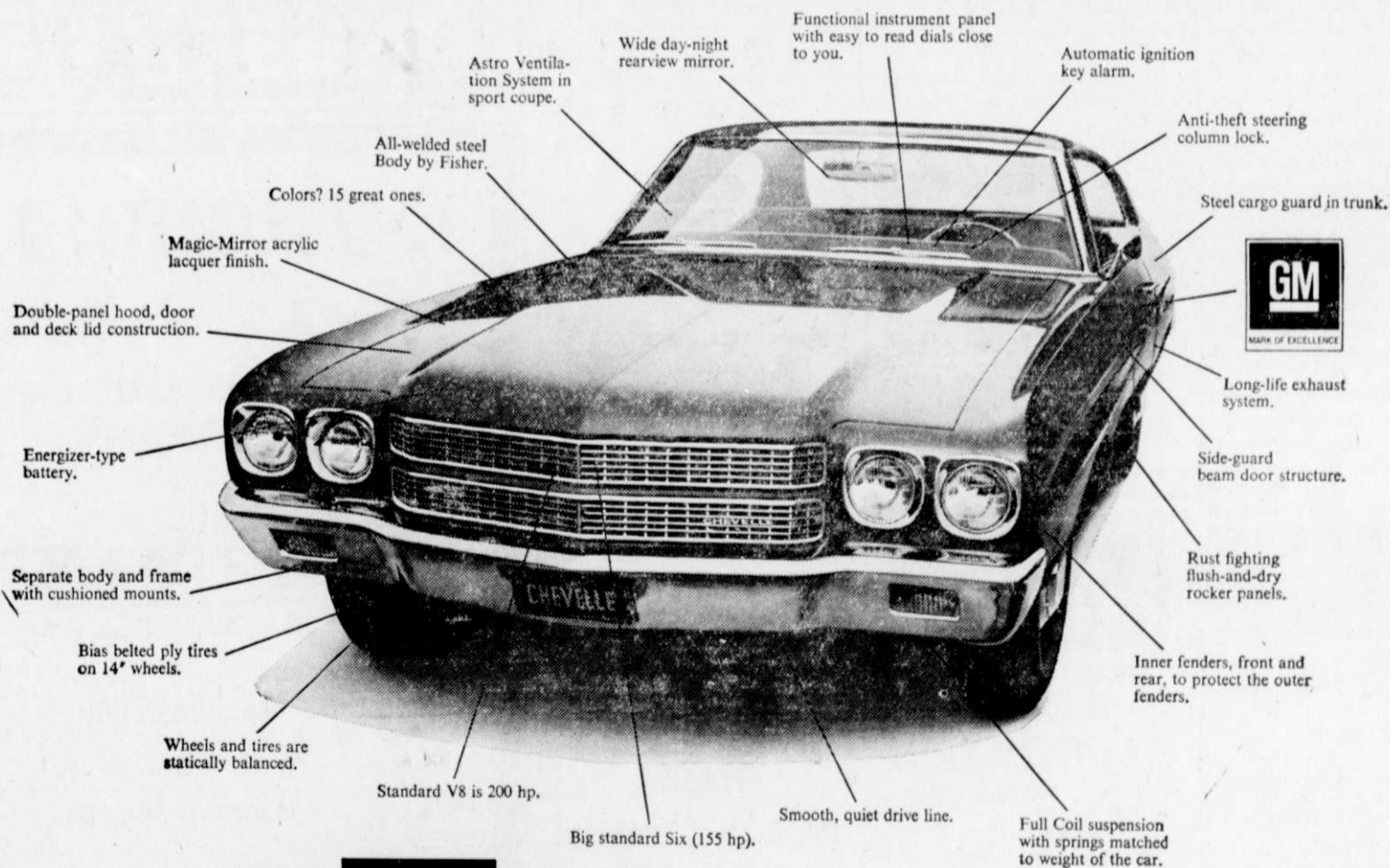
