Erwin Bullette Graduates From Police Institute

Sgt. Erwin G. Bullette, Kewaskum, of the Wisconsin State Patrol, was graduated from the University of Louisville's Southern Police Institute in ceremonies held Friday, June 5.

In graduating its 43rd class, the Southern Police Institute has now trained 1,405 law enforcement officers in its long term program. Another 2,084 officers have attended SPI seminars.

The Institute's long term, which last 12 weeks, includes 330 hours of classroom instruction. Subjects which are taken for credit include police administration, police personnel management, constitutional law, evidence and criminal procedure, and psychology for law enforcement personnel.

Illegally Cut Logs Find Home Near Kewaskum

Some 570 white and red oak logs, which were illegally cut in the Root River Parkway in Milwaukee, are finding a legal home this week when they are being trucked to Kewaskum by the Wimmer Lumber Co., located on State Highway 28, about 1½ miles east of the village. The lumber firm was the highest of four bidders on the approximate 90,000 square feet of lumber with an offer of \$8,200.

The Milwaukee County Park Commission offered the logs for sale when it was discovered that they were illegally cut without the county's consent just north of the Racine County line.

The Milwaukee County Park Commission has directed its staff to work with the Town of Raymond in Racine County to permit the Wimmer firm to truck the logs over town roads posted with a four ton load limit. Wimmer Lumber Co. is operated by John X. Wimmer and Emil Shulka.

While the sale of the controversial timber was being consummated, the individual charged with illegally selling the timber, turned himself into federal probation authorities in Davenport, Iowa. He is Morris Stanley Browne, 48, who is wanted in Milwaukee under the name of Morey Goldfield on a charge of theft by fraud. He was also wanted on a federal charge of interstate transfer of forged securities.

It was reported by Deputy U. S. Marshall Jesse Lathrum of Des Moines, Ia. that Browne would appear in federal court on the federal parole violation charge and "it may take some time before he is turned over to anyone else to face other charges" (referring to the Milwaukee theft by fraud count).

Browne allegedly took a sizeable down payment on the timber and it was cut before it was discovered that it was public property. Browne, in the meantime, disappeared. Emory C. Pope, New Glarus, partner in a Freeport, Ill. lumber firm, said he paid "Morey Goldfield" \$2,000 for the right to cut down all trees at least 16 inches in diameter in the Root River Parkway in the Town of Franklin in Milwaukee County. Pope said he thought the trees were on private property when his firm felled them in April.

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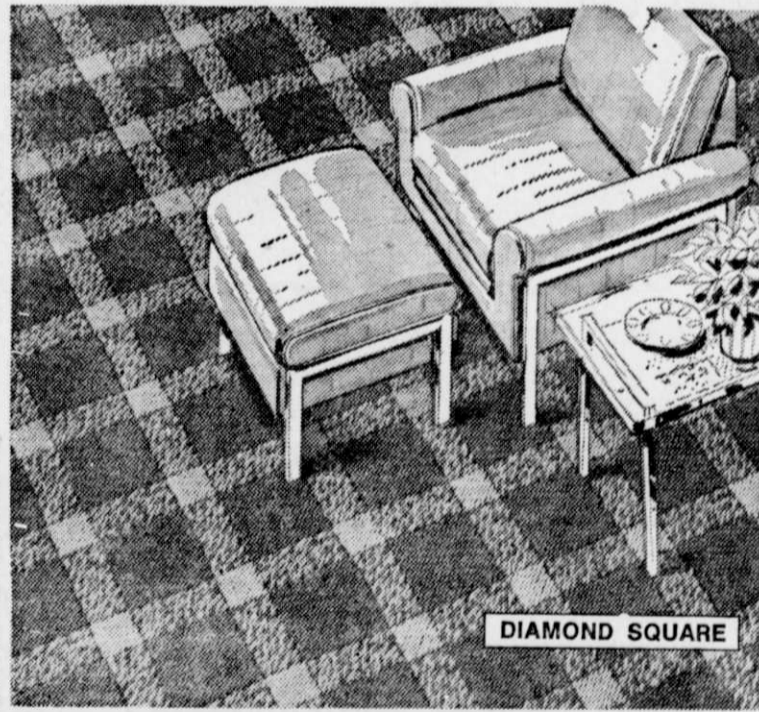
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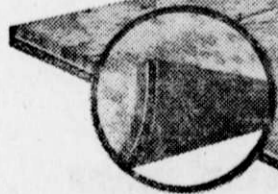

AGRI-BUSINESS IN AGRICULTURE

We are leaving the farm, should my boy continue to take agriculture? My boy just isn't cut out for farming why does he want to be in agriculture class? These are typical of the questions I have gotten from parents. When one reviews the image of agriculture classes in our high schools it is easy to understand why parents developed the attitude that agriculture was only for boys planning to go directly into farming. The program was mainly geared to promote only farming.

This idea has faded in the last years as we became aware of the fact that farming is a part of the total agriculture program. Productive farming needs fewer people each year as farms become larger and more mechanized. Today we have less than 7% of our population actually engaged in farming, yet 4 out of every 10 jobs are in agriculture. We can hardly say agriculture is declining. This decline in number of actual farmers and an increase in the agri-business has caused people in agriculture education to take a new look at the agriculture curriculum. The agri-business field has been added, FFA awards are being based on other criteria than farming programs.

The city schools have added a new agriculture program to its curriculum. Oshkosh, which has one of the older ag departments in the state, has added an instructor to teach students wishing to follow careers in fields related to farming. Agri-business conservation, horticulture, agri-business feeds and seeds, agri-business chemicals and fertilizers, food processing, and farm equipment and mechanics.

The National F.F.A. presented four awards for the first time to a boy in turf management and truck farming, another boy received an award for his work as a custom operator and the fourth boy as a meat processor.

How ya gonna keep 'em down on the farm once they've seen the lights of the city, or something like that was once a popular song. In 1969, the saying goes "you can't keep them all on the farm so show them related jobs in the city."

The 1963 vocational act was a major factor in starting activities in many states to inaugurate special programs designed to train specifically for off-farm agriculture occupations.

How has the agriculture department at Kewaskum High School been affected by these changes? The number of farms have declined in our school district not only due to general trend of consolidation of farms, but it has been hastened by the state purchasing land for recreation. An expanded curriculum has been offered at the high school level giving students a greater choice of subjects. These factors have not prevented agriculture enrollment, for the department has more than doubled in the last ten years. The curriculum has not changed as much as some schools because the instructor feels that production farming and the agri-business training still needs basic training in soils and plant conservation, plant growth, soil and animal genetics, chemicals, and fertilizers, weeds and

their control, crop production, plant and animal diseases, animal nutrition, management, marketing of agriculture products, and farm mechanics.

The other reasons for maintaining a more conventional curriculum is that over 90% of the agriculture students come from farms and when the students were surveyed by the department of public instruction over 60% selected production agriculture as their occupational choice, 1% agriculture supplies, 12% agriculture mechanics, 7% agriculture products (inspectors, graders, meat processing, DHIA testers, etc.) 0% ornamental horticulture, 11% ag resources (conservation, recreation farms, etc.) 3% forestry, 6% professional agriculture (teachers, county agent, farm credit, farm insurance etc.).

This is in contrast to our neighboring school where great changes have been made and emphasis is put on conservation and horticulture.

We are aware that agriculture is more than farming but a basic program at the present time will benefit production agriculture bound students as well as agri-business students.

The best background a boy can have to enter the field of agri-business is his experience on the home farm supplemented by basic agriculture principles, in his agriculture classes and a careful selection of other classes in school.

The June newsletters are out and will be picked up in the pro shop. Ladies planning to go to Hartford on June 24 are asked to sign up in the pro shop.

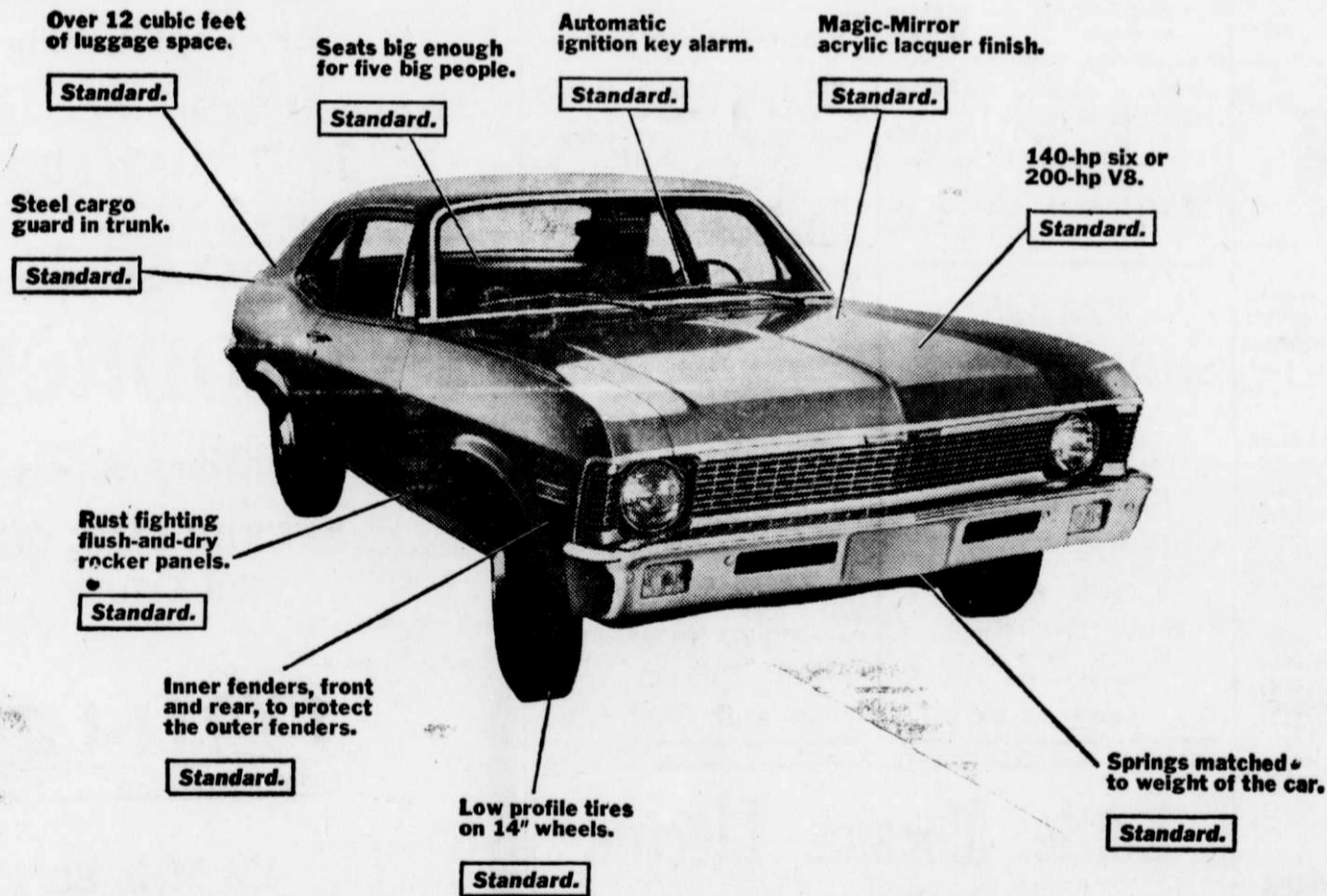
FIRST GIRLS' GOLF TEAM AT HIGH SCHOOL ENDS SEASON
