## Mrs. Shepherd's Case Dismissed In County Court

Action against Mrs. Marlene Shepherd, controversial housewife from Kewaskum, came to an abrupt halt last Wednesday when she appeared before Washington County Judge Robert J. Stoltz, who heard a motion submitted by her attorney, James Walrath, calling for a rehearing on the motion to dismiss the complaint filed against her.

Walrath submitted the motion on May 20 after an earlier motion for dismissal was denied by Judge Stoltz in April. Judge Stoltz then dismissed the charges against Mrs. Shepherd after considering the new motion. The dismissal came as a result of new case citations by Walrath which pointed out that the complaint failed to meet various technical requirements as specified by recent court decisions.

The dismissal was made on technical grounds and as such, the matter could be brought before court again through the issuance of a new complaint. Dist. Atty. Robert Kauffman declined to say if any further action would be taken against Mrs. Shepherd. If no further action is taken by the county, a federal countersuit which was filed by Walrath on behalf of Mrs. Shepherd will also be dropped.

The constitutionality of the state's truancy law which forbids a parent from taking a child out of school "without a legal excuse" and its specific application to Mrs. Shepherd was at issue in the countersuit.

Mrs. Shepherd took her children with her to Madison last fall when she participated in the welfare demonstrations at the state capitol led by Father Groppi. Returning to Kewaskum, she found letters from the Kewaskum and West Bend school administrators stating that her children had been out of school without legal excuse. Mrs. Shepherd also received a summons based on a complaint by county juvenile officer Hugh Carpenter.

## Census Places Population of County at 63,495

**GROWTH JUMPS 35%; WEST BEND POPULATION 16,516**

Preliminary announcement of the population of Kenosha, Milwaukee, Ozaukee, Racine, Washington and Waukesha counties and incorporated places over 10,000 population was made by the U. S. Census Office in Milwaukee on Wednesday.

Washington County's population was listed as 63,495, which represents an increase of 17,376 people above the 1960 census figure of 46,119. Thus the county's growth during the last decade jumped 35% to easily outstrip that of neighboring counties.

The census figures placed the population of the City of West Bend at 16,516 persons. That figure means the city has grown by 4,978 people, or a 43% increase between the 1960 and 1970 censuses.

The census figures for municipalities over 10,000 and counties in Southeastern Wisconsin were released at the Federal Building in Milwaukee by district census supervisors. West Bend was the only municipality over 10,000 in Washington County.

At this point, the counts are only preliminary. Final figures on population will be released next fall when tabulations are completed. No date was given on when the detailed housing and other information will be released. Figures for all areas in the county, including Kewaskum, will be released in fall.

## Tax Increases In Store, Speaker Tells Kiwanians

If the next session of the Wisconsin legislature in 1971 follows the pattern set by the 1969 legislature sharp tax increases are in store, John D. Hennick, Milwaukee, a representative of the Public Expenditure Survey of Wisconsin told the Kewaskum Kiwanis Club here Monday night at the Hon-E-Kor Country Club.

The Survey is a private non-profit nonpolitical government research and service agency for state-wide and community taxpayer organizations.

Hennick said the \$1,547,000,000 general purpose revenue budget authorized for the 1969-71 biennium represents a 35 per cent increase over the spending of the 1967-69 biennium while the growth in the economy during the same period was expected to be only 17 per cent.

He said if the trend continued it would mean \$550 million more in spending while the present tax structure would produce only \$265 million more.

"This would leave \$285 million to be provided by additional revenue, Hennick said. "This is equivalent to boosting the sales tax from 4 per cent to 6 per cent. It could mean a 24 per cent individual income surtax or a 125 per cent increase in the corporation income tax."

Hennick said Wisconsin already is the third highest state in per capita individual income tax collections and only 18th in personal income per capita.

## LOCAL STUDENTS AWARDED VARSITY LETTERS AT UWWC

Varsity letters have been awarded 13 sophomores and 17 freshmen at The University of Wisconsin, Washington County Campus, West Bend.

In announcing the letter winners, Tom Brigham, UWWC athletic director, said, "At our campus the criteria for awarding a letter is not based on the win-loss record alone, but attitude, time spent and the coach's evaluation."

The six women and 24 men winning letters come from eight area communities including Milwaukee 3, Cedarburg 5, Germantown 1, Kewaskum 2, Mayville 1, Slinger 2, Mequon 1, and West Bend 15.

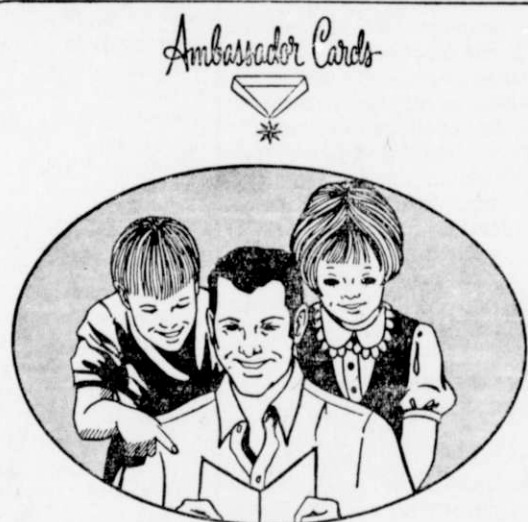

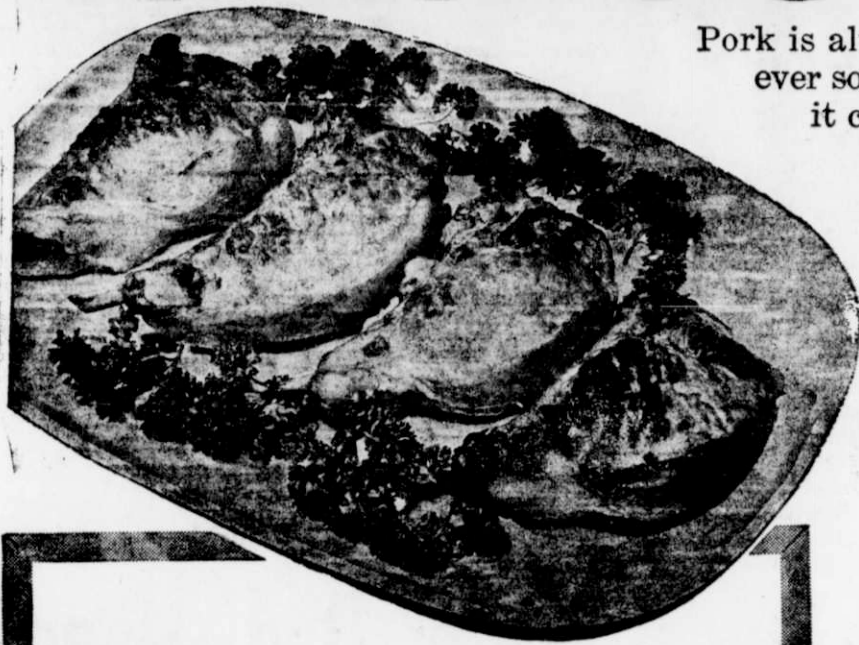

**MANUAL ARTS VS.  
INDUSTRIAL ARTS**  
By Gerald Wegman

Industrial Arts has changed greatly in the past fifty years. Only a few years back the term Manual Arts was used to describe what is now called Industrial Arts. Not only has the terminology changed, but also the spectrum of course offerings has been greatly broadened. Industrial Arts is not meant to be a preparation for a vocational occupation, but is set up to be an exploratory field of study in the industrial area. It has been

greatly expanded from what was once a limited field of woodworking and metalworking to vast areas such as synthetics, power mechanics, hydraulics, photography and many more.

Education should be a well rounded pursuit of study, not just a study of one area. Many of our students are discouraged from taking vocational courses because they might "short themselves of an academic background" for what they call "college preparation." Many of our small colleges, which the majority of our students attend, offer and some require a course in introductory industrial arts. Therefore it would be to most students' advantage to pursue some type of vocational education course in that school.

It may appear that we are begging for more students to enroll in industrial arts courses. This is not the case, but contrary to this idea, most of our classes are now over crowded. As the situation lends itself, I feel that many of our students are depriving themselves of a complete education by deleting many areas of study.

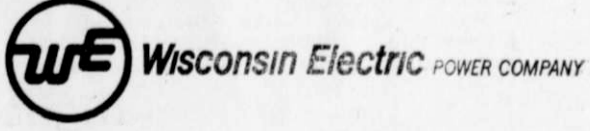

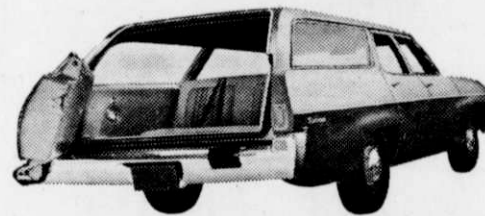
