on May 20 after an earlier motion for dismissal was denied by Judge Stoltz in April. Judge Stoltz then dismissed the charges against Mrs. Shepherd after considering the new motion. The dismissal came as a result of new case citations by Walrath which pointed out that the complaint failed to meet various technical requirements as specified by recent court decisions.

The dismissal was made on technical grounds and as such, the matter could be brought before court again through the issuance of a new complaint. Dist. Atty. Robert Kauffman declined to say if any further action would be taken aainst Mrs. Shepherd. No immediate wedding plans have been made by the couple.

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


