Village Population Grows to 1,905, Preliminary Census Figures Reveal

Increase of 333 People Recorded; Up 21 Per Cent

TOWN KEWASKUM RISES FROM 897 TO 1,143

The Village of Kewaskum showed a growth from 1,572 to 1,905, an increase of 333 persons, during the last decade, according to preliminary 1970 census figures just released by the Southeastern Wisconsin Regional Planning Commission. This is a percentage growth of 21 per cent.

The Bureau of the Census in releasing the figures indicated that the preliminary numbers were hand tabulated and that the numbers may be revised when the final counts are released.

Most village officials and residents had anticipated that the population figures would be higher.

The Town of Kewaskum showed a growth from 897 to 1,143, an increase of 246 persons, up 27 per cent. The Town of Wayne had a rise from 1,081 to 1,199, a growth of 118 persons, up 10 per cent.

The Village of Germantown, as a result in part to a large annexation in 1964 from the Town of Germantown, and in part to a 60 per cent growth rate in the area, passed the City of Hartford in population. Germantown Village hit 6,961, while Hartford was recorded at 6,502. Hartford's growth was from 5,627 in 1960 while the growth in Germantown was from 4,606. The City of West Bend had a rise from 9,969 in 1960 to 16,516, up 43 per cent.

In the other incorporated villages in Washington County, the figures were as follows: Jackson—From 458 to 564, up 23 per cent; Slinger—From 1,141 to 1,036, down 10 per cent. The Village of Slinger is the only municipality in the county to show a decline in population. However, villagers question the figures.

The census figures for towns in the county show Richfield far and away the largest. Richfield, which recorded the highest percentage growth, went from 3,172 persons in 1960 to 5,855 in 1970, an increase of 85 per cent.

Figures for other towns in the county were: Jackson—From 1,576 to 2,835, up 80 per cent; Trenton—From 2,657 to 3,171, up 19 per cent; Polk—From 2,090 to 3,027, up 45 per cent; Erin—From 1,133 to 1,608, up 42 per cent; West Bend—From 1,992 to 2,708, up 36 per cent; Barton—From 1,204 to 1,612, up 34 per cent; Hartford—From 1,870 to 2,356, up 26 per cent; Farmington—From 1,433 to 1,728, up 21 per cent; Addison—From 2,072 to 2,355, up 14 per cent. The Town of Germantown, which lost much of its population to the village, was recorded at 414. At the last census, it had 3,984.

The figures for the smaller communities in the county were released Tuesday, though the U. S. Census Bureau had said those counts would not be given out until this fall.

Previous figures released had listed the growth of Washington County from 46,119 to 63,495, an increase of 17,376 persons, up 35 per cent.

M. Boyd Named Fellow of IDEA

WILL ATTEND SEMINAR AT UTAH COLLEGE JULY 5-11

Marshall H. Boyd, superintendent of the Kewaskum Community Schools, has been named a Fellow of the Institute for Development of Educational Activities, Inc., an affiliate of the Charles F. Kettering Foundation. He will be attending the fifth annual one-week seminar which is sponsored by IDEA from July 5 through 11 at Southern Utah State College in Cedar City, Utah.

Each year, 400 outstanding school administrators throughout the United States are selected to attend these professional workshops at four regional sites. The participants are chosen from thousands of educators who submit formal applications. Selection is based on their school program and evidence of their utilization of new educational techniques.

The theme for this year's program is "The Individual in a World of Change." A series of outstanding speakers will be talking on the changing role of education in today's world. Particular emphasis will be placed on the developing impact of environmental studies, independent study, the reading crisis, and new educational innovations being employed in British schools.

This professional development program for school administrators is unique in providing the participants an opportunity to hear recognized authorities and to discuss educational problems with their peers.

Susan Behnke, 230 Clinton St., Kewaskum, was elected school board member of Elm City at Badger Girls State on the University of Wisconsin campus at Madison June 15-19.

The week-long conference, June 13-20, sponsored by the American Legion Auxiliary and University Extension, is designed to give the 500 high school girls attending it from communities in all parts of the state practical experience in good government.

More than 300 officials are elected in the state government elections, for the five mythical counties and 10 cities set up. The Badger Girls State is one of the many short courses and conferences conducted annually at the university as educational public services for all Wisconsin citizens.

MILLERS ATTEND KIWANIS CONVENTION AT DETROIT

Lt. Gov. Edward E. "Pat" Miller and his wife Virginia of Kewaskum attended the Kiwanis International 55th annual convention in Detroit this week.

At the June meeting of the village board an ordinance was passed to change the name of Tower Street to Reigle Drive. This street leads to the new Regal Ware, Inc. offices and also parallels the Regal plant.

The street was officially renamed at a special ceremony held at 3:30 p. m. Thursday in the presence of a large group of hundreds of Regal officials, office personnel and factory workers, village officials, spectators, and the press.

The street was renamed in honor of J. O. Reigle, who purchased the plant on Aug. 6, 1945, and served as its president until his retirement on Sept. 16, 1965. During this period the plant grew from an original 47 employees to a point where it now employs over 400 persons. Regal Ware is observing its 25th anniversary in Kewaskum this year.

Village President Cyril Wieter served as master of ceremonies at Thursday's ceremony, citing the progress and growth of the plant while J. O. Reigle served as president and the many benefits derived by the village and community. He mentioned that the village has grown from a population of some 700 persons to the present near 2,000 during the past 25 years.

Wieter introduced members of the village board and other officials and called upon James D. Riegler, present president of Regal Ware, for a few words. He then presented the official "Reigle Drive" street sign to Jim and it was installed on the post replacing the Tower St. sign. Edna Oster, assistant to the president, "launched" the new street name by breaking a bottle of champagne over the post to end the ceremony.

Regal Ware now has four modern plants. Besides the original and main plant they have branches in Wooster, Ohio, Flora, Miss. and Peoria, Ill. The construction on the second phase of Regal's new three-unit office administrative center in Kewaskum is now progressing rapidly. Running south from the present administration office, this second phase will be a four story structure and is scheduled for completion in the fall of 1971.

Earns First Honors AT WSU-Whitewater

A total of 2,377 Whitewater State University students achieved academic honors during the second semester of the 1969-70 school year which ended May 27.

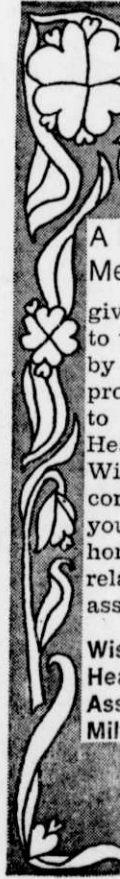

JUDGE'S ORDER DISMISSES ACTION IN VILLAGE GARAGE CASE, BUILDING TO PROCEED

Adjourned Meeting June 22, 1970

The Village Board of Kewaskum, Washington County, Wisconsin, met in adjourned session in the Council Room of the Municipal Building. President Wieter presided and all Board Members were present.

At the request of the Village Board, the following ordinance was presented by Village Attorney McKenna for consideration:

ORDINANCE NUMBER 70-3
The Village Board of the Village of Kewaskum, Wisconsin, does ordain as follows:

Section 1. That Section 13.10 of the Village Code of the Village of Kewaskum be, and is hereby created as follows:

REMOVAL AND DISPOSITION OF TREES INFECTED WITH DUTCH ELM DISEASE

13.10 (1) Removal.
The Village may remove any tree infected with "Dutch Elm Disease," at public expense, found upon public or private property within the Village, or may contract for such removal with any private contractor, but the cost of such removal may be recovered by the Village from the owner of the tree if he is known. The village may delegate powers and duties under this subsection to any department heads.

13.10 (2) Disposition.
All trees shall be burned in the Village Dump under the supervision of the Village of Kewaskum to eliminate "Dutch Elm Disease" in the Village of Kewaskum.

Section 2. This ordinance shall be in full force and effect on June 26, 1970.

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Indians Win Two, Even Record at 3-3

CLOBBER N. FONDY AND GERMANTOWN

The Kewaskum Indians shelved two opponents the past week to even their record at 3-3 in the Scenic conference. Playing at North Fondy last Thursday, the Indians clobbered the Orioles, 11-3, and hosting Germantown Monday night, Kewaskum won another decisive 13-6 game.

The Indians wasted no time at N. Fondy, pushing over 9 runs in the very first inning to ice the victory. Seven of the runs were unearned. After the first frame it was a close ball game.

Oriole starter Steve Reschke, who settled down to go the distance, started the game by walking the first three batters he faced. Tom Theusch benefitted from the early Kewaskum run explosion as he set N. Fondy down on 7 hits, striking out nine. He got 12-hit support from his teammates.

Tony Butschlick paced the winners with three hits, while Randy Koth, Jim Tessar and Ron Theusch each contributed 2. Koth also scored 4 runs. Bill Mowbray got three hits for the losers.

It was another tough night for pitchers here Monday night at Kewaskum romped over outclassed Germantown, 13-6. The Indians broke quickly from the gate with 12 of their 13 runs in the first four innings.

Tessar's run-producing triple and two runs batted in piece by Koth and Clark Eichstedt paced the Indians' attack. Tessar, Ron Theusch and Eichstedt each collected 2 hits. Schaefer got 2 for the Warhawks. Germantown's Schulteis belted a home run with a man on in the final inning.

A sophomore, Dale Luedtke, started for Kewaskum and was winning the pitcher. He was relieved by Tom Theusch and Eichstedt, and between them they gave up just four hits. Anderson and Barnes hurled for the visitors giving up 9 hits. Kewaskum committed 4 errors and Germantown 5.

Campbellsport still leads the conference with a 6-0 record.

The Indians were faced with tough pitching in their game scheduled at Pewaukee at 6 p. m. Thursday. Monday night the Indians entertain Grafton in an 8 p. m. contest, and then play again Tuesday night at Hartland at 6:00.

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

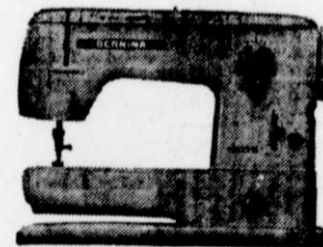

Dick and Bob Burckhardt, Steve Ehke and Tom Fischer each added two hits apiece and Fischer batted in three runs, Danny Marx and Jim Klahn got Kewaskum's only two safeties.

It was a fine 1-0 game with Wilcox and Bob Fellenz hooked up in a pitching duel until the fifth inning when the bottom fell out of Kewaskum's defense and the Lithias pushed 11 runs across the plate. Storm clouds threatened to halt the game at the time and it

would have been much better for Kewaskum if they would have. West Bend laced out six hits and took advantage of five errors in this fatal fifth. Fellenz was relieved by Mark Heise in the sixth. The Lithias pounded out a total of 13 hits in the contest. Fellenz struck out none and walked none. Heise whiffed three and walked none. Wilcox walked five.

Errors again were responsible for Kewaskum's downfall at Thiensville-Mequon Sunday. They committed six of them which led to their doom. The score was tied at 5-5 going into the 7th inning, in which the winners counted four big runs to sew up the win.

Heise and Fellenz again shared pitching duties and between them they were nicked for eight hits, while striking out eight and walking four. Madrich and Colburn worked for the winners and were blasted for 16 hits, double the number Thiensville-Mequon got, but Kewaskum could make them count for only six runs. Between them they fanned 10 batters and passed two.

Clem Jacak of Kewaskum took

hitting honors for the day with three of them, including a two bagger. Terry Melius, Klahn, "Zach" Zehren and Perry Koth each contributed two hits. LaFore was the only hitter for the winners to collect two.

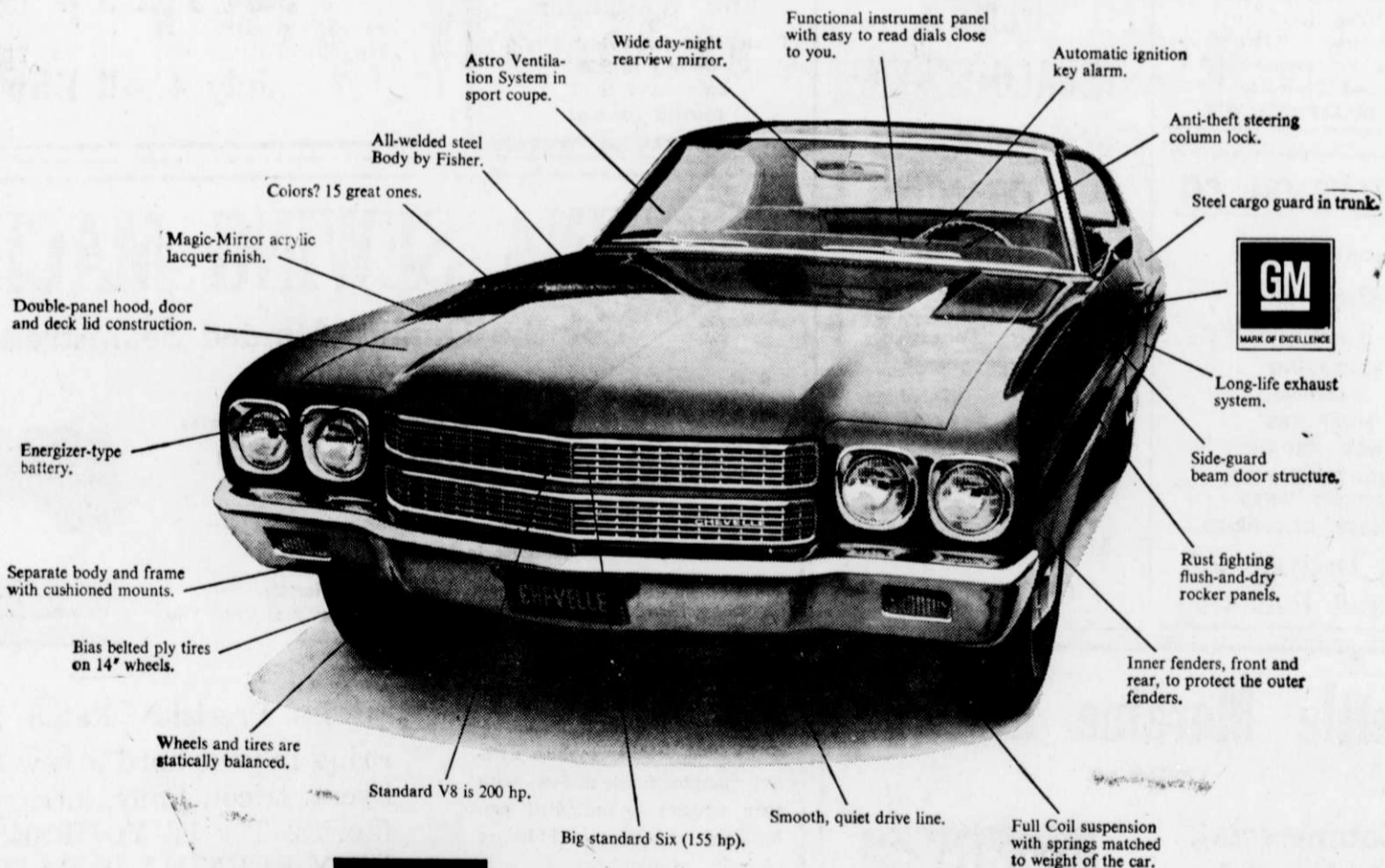
