Annual Firemen's Picnic and Parade Here Sunday, July 12

11 BANDS AND DRUM CORPS TO HIGHLIGHT BIG PARADE

The annual Kewaskum Firemen's Picnic will be held in the village park on Sunday, July 12. Plans have been completed to make this year's event another outstanding affair.

To start off the picnic, an excellent parade has once more been arranged which should prove to be the highlight of the event. The parade will feature at least 11 bands and drum and bugle corps, drill teams and other musical organizations, together with scores of other units. Hundreds of persons will participate in the parade, which will get underway at 12:30 p. m. sharp. The parade will form at the high school parking lot and athletic field and adjacent streets, from where it will proceed to the park. All participants should be present to line up at noon.

Featured musical organizations in the parade will include the following:

Milwaukee Continental Cadet Band—One of three Continental Youth Bands, ranging in age from 12 through 14 years, who have traveled through four states. There are approximately 85 musicians and 15 baton twirlers. Choraliers Drum and Bugle Corps of Milwaukee—Corps of 100 members including 36 horns, 18 man drum line and 45 member all-girl color guard. This unit has won a number of championships. St. Matthias Prep Drum and Bugle Corps of Milwaukee—The Preps have won numerous awards and have an 80 member unit. Windjammers Drum & Bugle Corps of Port Washington—Nautical group of young people comprising 60 members, winners in competition a number of times. Star Spanglette Baton Corps and Little Dippers of Menomonee Falls—Winners of several awards throughout the state, over 100 individual trophies and 80 medals. This unit has approximately 60 members. West Bend Drum and Bugle Corps. Hartford Civic Band. Three Germantown High School bands, and Kewaskum High School band.

Other parade highlights will include Milwaukee Civic Riders Motorcycle Club, orchestras, beautiful floats, baton twirlers and drill teams, children's specialties, visiting firemen and equipment, American Legion posts, comic entries, ancient cars, riding horses, clubs, organizations, scouts, individuals and many, many others. Floats are especially invited to enter the parade. Cash prizes will be awarded the best floats and children's entries and youngsters will be given tickets good in trade in the park.

Immediately after the parade there will be exhibitions by drum and bugle corps as well as band music in the park. This will be followed by continuous music and entertainment throughout the afternoon and evening by the popular Two Hits and a Miss and The Polka Dots.

Also featured again this year will be the popular beer garden with tables and chairs for your comfort. Admission to the beer garden will be FREE! Beer maids will serve you with pitchers and

Formerly pastor of St. Cloud parish, St. Cloud, Fr. Stoffel retired last year. He is the son of the late Mr. and Mrs. Simon Stoffel of Kewaskum.

He was principal celebrant of a concelebrated Mass at 4 p. m. in the chapel of St. Anne's Home for the Elderly, 3800 N. 92nd St., Milwaukee, where he now lives. Concelebrants were a brother, Fr. Clarence N. Stoffel, pastor of St. Martin's, near Cross Plains, and Fr. R. J. Schmitt, C.S.S.R., of Oconomowoc, who also preached.

Bicycle Safety Test to Be Held

A bicycle safety test will be held at the Kewaskum Elementary School on Tuesday, July 14, at 3 p. m. The safety test will be set up in the following order:

Bicycle safety inspection which includes handle bar grips, red rear reflector, warning device, fenders, chain sprocket guard, brakes, pedal and crank, saddle, tires, frame and wheels.

A child must pass the bicycle inspection test before he may participate in the riding skill test.

The riding skill test includes balancing at slow speed, steering, riding in a circle, maneuvering, braking.

There will be points deducted from a possible 100 points for each violation on each test.

Things your child should know about his or her bike: 1. Bicycle make. 2. Color. 3. Double bar. 4. Single bar 5. Serial number.

There is also a knowledge test which will be given in a group orally. Five points will be deducted for each incorrect answer from a possible score of 100. A total of 80 points must be achieved for a passing grade. Please bring a pencil.

Local Students on UWWC Dean's List

Fifty-eight students from seventeen communities are on the 1970 spring semester Dean's List at the University of Wisconsin, Washington County Campus, West Bend.

The list recognizes full-time students who earned a grade point average of 3.25 or better. Five students received highest honors with 4.0 (A) averages; 13 high honors with 3.75 to 3.99 averages; and 40 honors with 3.25 to 3.74 averages.

OTHER BUSINESS ON AGENDA AT MEETING

A budget totaling \$1,676,753.04 will be presented for approval of district electors of the Kewaskum Community Schools district at the annual meeting July 27. The budget, subject to final audit, was approved by the Board of Education Monday night, and is \$118,887.02 higher than the one for 1969-70.

Of the total, \$52,265 is allotted for administration—a decrease of \$1,635.05; instruction \$1,000,750.33—an increase of \$120,444.37; transportation, \$167,950—up \$175; operation of plant, \$117,975—up \$9,895; maintenance of plant, \$51,395.48—up \$31,642.48; fixed charges, \$47,503.01—up \$3,895.41; student body activities, \$12,945—up \$3,945; debt service, \$155,900.47—up \$265.06; capital outlay, \$65,050.75—a decrease of \$48,240.25.

The increased maintenance cost is attributed mainly to planned tuckpointing of the junior high building plus a new floor in the boys' locker room at the high school. The two projects total about \$20,000.

To be included on the annual meeting agenda will be acquisition of about five acres of land adjacent to the Beechwood School; long range building program in the district and a change in school board election procedure whereby, beginning in 1971, board members would be elected at the regular spring election rather than on the day of the annual school district meeting.

In other action, the board went on record as being willing to participate in a drug alert education program to be developed by C.E.S.A. Agency No. 16 in which a qualified person would be hired by C.E.S.A. to give direction to the teachers on a cooperative basis. The cost to each district would be contingent on how many schools would share in the program.

LUCEY FOR GOVERNOR GROUP TO HOLD MEETING, BRAT FRY

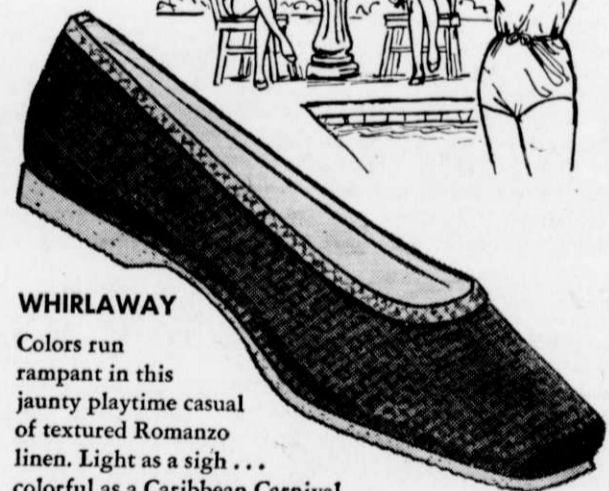

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Tax Districts in General Telephone's Kewaskum Exchange to Receive \$4,913.45

Checks totaling \$4,913.45 are being sent from the state treasurer's office to tax districts located in General Telephone Company of Wisconsin's Kewaskum exchange.

The sum represents the exchange's portion of license fee taxes paid to the state by General Telephone on the gross local and miscellaneous revenues it earned in Kewaskum during 1969, according to Lowell H. Boehm, service office supervisor for the company. Boehm said that gross revenue

or license fee taxes are paid each year by all telephone companies in Wisconsin in lieu of property taxes. General Telephone's total gross revenue tax for 1969 totaled more than \$2.1 million.

State law requires that 85 percent of the taxes paid to the state on local and miscellaneous revenues be returned to the taxing districts in which they were earned, Boehm explained. The rest of the taxes are retained by the state.

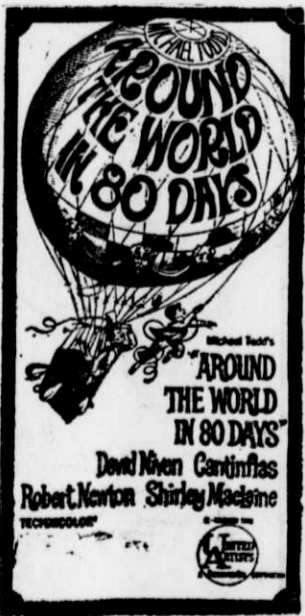

WHY STUDY FOUR YEARS OF GERMAN?

By Peter Ritter

The study of a foreign language, whether German or Spanish or any foreign language requires a singular devotion to a goal not required by the ordinary subjects studied in high school. The study of a foreign language requires that the student be interested in the language and culture of the language studied. In order to learn a language much work is necessary, usually two to four years in one subject.

The study of a foreign language in high school does not include just the process of speaking a different tongue. The language of a foreign country is the prime target but the customs and life styles of the foreign country are just as important. In order for a student to be able to communicate in a foreign language he must understand the different customs and different life styles of the foreign country.

Students can learn to speak the language in two years sufficiently to meet the requirements of colleges for foreign languages. But in two years students will learn very little of the customs and life styles of the foreign country. In four years of study the student will learn much more language, more customs, more idioms and the ability to think in the foreign language.

The last mentioned facet of foreign language study is the most sought after goal by the student who studies one foreign language for four years. If a student learns to think in a foreign language he has mastered something which few people have mastered. The ability to think in a foreign language marks the difference between a

person who studied a language and a person who knows a language. It is the single most important consideration of a serious student of a language, to be able to think in a foreign language and this is the criterion for knowledge of a language. A student who has once learned to think in a foreign language will never forget this skill even though he may forget many verbs, nouns, and grammatical constructions.
