## Annual Firemen's Picnic in Village Park This Sunday

11 BANDS AND DRUM CORPS TO HIGHLIGHT BIG PARADE

All is in readiness to make this year's annual Kewaskum Firemen's Picnic which will be held in the village park this Sunday, July 12, another outstanding affair.

To start off the picnic, an excellent parade has once more been arranged which should prove to be the highlight of the event. The parade will feature at least 11 bands and drum and bugle corps, drill teams and other musical organizations, together with scores of other units. Hundreds of persons will participate in the parade, which will get underway at 12:30 p. m. sharp. The parade will form at the high school parking lot and athletic field and adjacent streets, from where it will proceed to the park. All participants should be present to line up at noon.

Featured musical organizations in the parade will include the following:

**Milwaukee Continental Cadet Band**—One of three Continental Youth Bands, ranging in age from 12 through 14 years, who have traveled through four states. There are approximately 85 musicians and 15 baton twirlers. **Chordaliers Drum and Bugle Corps of Milwaukee**—Corps of 100 members including 36 horns, 18 man drum line and 45 member all-girl color guard. This unit has won a number of championships. **St. Mathias Prep Drum and Bugle Corps of Milwaukee**—The Preps have won numerous awards and have an 80 member unit. **Windjammers Drum & Bugle Corps of Port Washington**—Nautical group of young people comprising 60 members, winners in competition a number of times. **Star Spanglette Baton Corps and Little Dippers of Menomonee Falls**—Winners of several awards throughout the state, over 100 individual trophies and 80 medals. This unit has approximately 60 members. **West Bend Drum and Bugle Corps, Hartford Civic Band, Three Germantown High School bands, and Kewaskum High School band.**

Other parade highlights will include Milwaukee Civic Riders Motorcycle Club, orchestras, beautiful floats, baton twirlers and drill teams, children's specialties, visiting firemen and equipment, American Legion posts, comic entries, ancient cars, riding horses, clubs, organizations, scouts, individuals and many, many others. Floats are especially invited to enter the parade. Cash prizes will be awarded the best floats and children's entries and youngsters will be given tickets good in trade in the park.

Immediately after the parade there will be exhibitions by drum and bugle corps as well as band music in the park. This will be followed by continuous music and entertainment throughout the afternoon and evening by the popular Two Hits and a Miss and The Polka Dots.

## 7 Candidates Seek 3 School Board Posts

BALLOTING ON DAY OF ANNUAL MEETING JULY 27

Seven candidates have announced their intentions to run for the three open posts on the school board of Kewaskum Community Schools, to be elected on the day of the annual district meeting Monday, July 27. The filing deadline for candidates was Tuesday.

The two top vote getters in the balloting will be elected for three year terms, while the third highest will serve out the year remaining in the term of Mrs. Anne Panzer, who resigned.

The latest to file in the school district before the deadline were Mrs. Zona Miske, R. 1, Allenton, a present member of the board; Myron Belger, R. 2, Kewaskum, a former employee of General Telephone Co., and Mrs. Janet Panzer, R. 2, Kewaskum, a Regal Ware employee who served on the committee to acquire new school land.

Others who filed previously with School District Clerk Jack Jadro include Mrs. June Berg, R. 2, Kewaskum, who was appointed to fill the vacancy created by the resignation of Mrs. Anne Panzer; Ernest (Earl) Howell, Town of Scott resident and former president of the Beechwood PTA; Richard Theusch, R. 3, Campbellsport, a Gehl Co. employee, who was one of the leading opponents to the Kewaskum swimming pool proposal that was defeated in a referendum last December by a margin of nearly two-to-one, and Gerald Zimmel, R. 2, Kewaskum, a Bank of Kewaskum official.

In addition to the board seats held by Mrs. Miske and Mrs. Berg, the position held by Harry Oelhafen will also be filled. Oelhafen announced previously that he is not a candidate for reelection.

Overall, a total of 28 candidates will be seeking 13 available vacancies in the West Bend, Slinger, Kewaskum, Hartford and Germantown School Districts.

An official election notice, notice of budget hearing, and notice of annual school district meeting will appear in next week's issue of this newspaper. Absentee ballots will be available July 17.

### APPROVE CONSTRUCTION OF MILK TRANSFER STATION, PERMITS FOR NEW HOMES

The village board Monday night adopted a resolution under which the official map of the village will be revised in an area north of Main St. and east of River View Drive.

On the revised map, Stark Street will dead-end and several proposed unnamed streets will be deleted. A motion by Trustee Charles Miller to not delete the proposed streets was lost for want of a second.

It was pointed out that showing only major thoroughfares would give a potential subdivider more flexibility in developing an area. In that connection, the village maintains control in any proposed subdivision through its power to accept or deny the subdivider's plat.

The matter of the map revision was aired at a public hearing that preceded the board's regular meeting. No one was present to voice objection.

A certificate of occupancy was approved for Pure Milk Products Cooperative of Fond du Lac for proposed construction of a milk transfer station on the northwest corner of Highway 45 and County Trunk H, just south of the A & W Drive-In. Erecting a culvert would give access on County H.

A letter from Pure Milk indicated it is considering buying land from Mrs. Ada M. Meilahn. Through a certificate of occupancy, the village gives its assurance it does not object to the proposed building.

It was noted such building plans, which the board hopes would be esthetically designed, would need approval of the Industrial Commission before a local building permit could be issued.

In view of the fact that a new garage truck is needed, the board discussed again, without action, a possible change-over to a commercial-type pick-up. It was noted the present truck had recent repairs of \$358. One of the board members commented he is definitely opposed to a once a week collection, believing it would lead to "a dirty village."

Board members gave their approval to: installation of five additional street lights in the village park; a stop sign to replace a yield sign on Roseland Drive where it intersects with Clinton St; a stop sign on Brooklane Drive where it intersects with Clinton and a yield sign on Prospect St. at Park View Drive.

The application of James Schulz Realty for a building permit for a residence in Roseland Hills and the application of Richard Zarlino for addition of a family room with full basement at the rear of his home at 524 Keller St., were tabled pending presentation to the board of basement plans showing provisions for a sump pump and drain tile.

A building permit for a residence was approved for Elmer Yoost, also one for Gregor Nigh for an addition at the rear of Kewaskum Frozen Foods.

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**Bicycle Safety Test to Be Held**

A bicycle safety test will be held at the Kewaskum Elementary School on Tuesday, July 14, at 3 p. m. The safety test will be set up in the following order:

Bicycle safety inspection which includes handle bar grips, red rear reflector, warning device, fenders, chain sprocket guard, brakes, pedal and crank, saddle, tires, frame and wheels.

A child must pass the bicycle inspection test before he may participate in the riding skill test.

The riding skill test includes balancing at slow speed, steering, riding in a circle, maneuvering, braking.

There will be points deducted from a possible 100 points for each violation on each test.

Things your child should know about his or her bike: 1. Bicycle make. 2. Color. 3. Double bar. 4. Single bar 5. Serial number.

There is also a knowledge test which will be given in a group orally. Five points will be deducted for each incorrect answer from a possible score of 100. A total of 80 points must be achieved for a passing grade. Please bring a pencil.

**LETTERS TO THE EDITOR**

Dear Bill:

Once again it is that time of year for our annual Firemen-Legion Picnic in Kewaskum, which, of course, has a fine parade with many marching units.

It has been noticed by myself and many others that have participated in Memorial Day parades in Kewaskum that many people do not pay any respect to the flag of our country when it passes down the street.

The proper way for men not in uniform to salute the flag is to remove the headdress with the

right hand, holding it at the left shoulder, the hand being over the heart. Men without hats should salute in the same manner. Women should salute by placing the right hand over the heart. The salute to the flag in the moving column should be rendered at the moment the flag passes. Fire Departments of many cities prescribe that firemen in uniform shall salute the flag with a hand salute. Police Departments' regulations prescribe that police in uniform shall salute with the hand salute.

In view of the fact that policemen and firemen are members of uniformed municipal forces which, as regards discipline and other matters, are quasi military in nature, it is considered perfectly proper for them to salute the flag with the hand or baton.

When you are in a crowd of people you stand and salute the

flag regardless of what the rest of the people do. Most times people don't salute the flag because the person next to them doesn't. If people see someone else salute the flag the rest will follow.
