Three Members to Be Elected to School Board at Election Monday

Information on 7 Candidates Is Presented

BUDGET HEARING, ANNUAL SCHOOL MEETING TO FOLLOW

On Monday, July 27, from 1 to 8 p. m. an election will be held to determine the election of three members for the Kewaskum Community Schools' school board. The election will be held at the Kewaskum High School building. The two candidates receiving the most votes will receive three year terms and the third highest candidate will receive the one year term to fill the unexpired term to which Mrs. June Berg was appointed upon the resignation of Mrs. Anne Panzer. **ALL QUALIFIED ELECTORS IN THE DISTRICT ARE URGED TO CAST THEIR BALLOTS.**

The election will be followed by the budget hearing and annual school meeting of the district at 8 p. m.

The following information is presented for the information of the electors with the candidates presented in alphabetical order:

MYRON P. BELGER—Mr. Belger, a life time resident of the community, now resides in the Village of Kewaskum, formerly having lived in the Town of Kewaskum. He is a retired employee of the Wisconsin Telephone Company and an honorably discharged veteran of World War II. Mr. Belger is a widower and the father of six children. No statement was given by the candidate.

MRS. JUNE BERG—Mrs. Berg is a resident of the Town of Kewaskum, housewife and mother of six children. She is a high school graduate and has attended college for two years. Of her candidacy Mrs. Berg says, "A school board needs the balance that a housewife and mother can bring. I am truly concerned about the future of our Kewaskum school system."

ERNEST "EARL" HOWELL—Mr. Howell resides in the Town of Scott, is the father of three children and has operated a tavern at Crooked Lake for the last five years. He is a high school graduate, has two semesters of Jr. College and three years of military service in the Army Air Force during World War II. He served as a professional police officer for the City of Milwaukee for 16 years prior to moving to the Town of Scott. Mr. Howell served as a past President of the Beechwood P.T.A. His statement for candidacy is, "I am interested in community affairs; and I feel if given the opportunity, I would be a good school board member."

MRS. EDGAR (ZONA) MISKE—Mrs. Miske and her family reside in the Town of Wayne where they own and operate a dairy farm. She is the mother of five children, two are graduates of Kewaskum High School, two are in high school and one is attending the Wayne Elementary School. Mrs. (Continued on page 5)

Hundreds View British Flying Scotsman Here

The Flying Scotsman, one of England's most famous steam locomotives, pulled into Kewaskum early Sunday afternoon as it headed north on the Chicago and North Western Railroad tracks from Chicago to the National Railroad Museum at Green Bay.

An estimated 100,000 persons gathered along the route to view the train. In the Kewaskum area, hundreds of persons turned out to view the train in this village and at all vantage points along the tracks between West Bend and Kewaskum and Kewaskum and Campbellsport. A surprisingly large crowd gathered at the Main Street crossing here and many had cameras.

The apple green speedster from Great Britain was unable to use its speed, however, as crowds along the way, many of them standing on the tracks, slowed it down to almost a crawl. The crowds delayed the train, which was scheduled to pass through Kewaskum about noon but did not arrive until one and one half hours later. It was also held up in Butler due to the crowds and to take on a new crew and refuel. By the time the train arrived in Green Bay it was three hours behind schedule.

The train will remain in Green Bay for five weeks as part of a British trade mission. The train's nine cars along with carrying numerous dignitaries were also filled with British and American commercial and historical exhibits. Two cars the Isle of Thanet and the Lydia, will be added to the National Museum's permanent collection. The two pullman cars were used by Winston Churchill and Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower during World War II. The train also included an observation car at the rear.

They were also used by the royal family for many years and were part of Churchill's funeral train. The cars will be linked to the Eisenhower locomotive which is a permanent part of the museum.

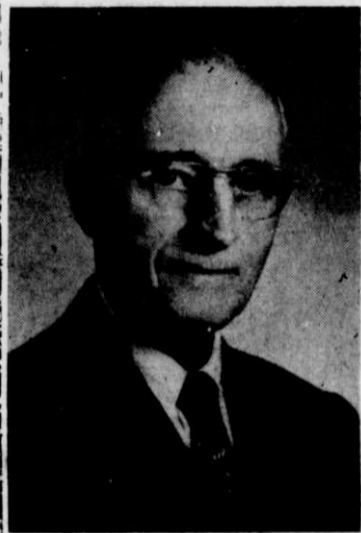
The Flying Scotsman was the first locomotive to travel officially in excess of 100 miles per hour. In 1934 it made a record run from London to Leeds, a distance of 183 miles, in 114 minutes, a record which still stands, unbroken even by diesel power.

The 48-year-old steam locomotive was built in Doncaster, England, for the Great Northern Railway of Britain.

Elwyn Romaine Of Village, County Board Head Dies

Elwyn M. Romaine, 77, of 1439 Park View Dr., Kewaskum, veteran chairman and member of the Washington County Board of Supervisors, passed away at 8:45 a. m. Monday, July 20, at Sheboygan Memorial Hospital. He had suffered a heart attack Sunday afternoon while golfing with his son at Sheboygan Town and Country Golf Club.

Since he was elected to the county board on May 2, 1939, Mr. Romaine represented the Village of Kewaskum over 31 years. He was elected chairman of the board on May 2, 1944 and has served as chairman ever since, a period of 26 years. Just this spring, on April 21, 1970, he was re-elected chairman for a two year term.

The well known Mr. Romaine was a dedicated chairman of the county board. He ruled with a tight rein but gentle hand and permitted few outbursts from supervisors. Although conservative he was not opposed to new ideas when they were in the best interests of the county, and always careful to safeguard the taxpayer's pocketbook.

Mr. Romaine engaged in the insurance business many years, in which he was still active on a part-time basis. He was formerly associated with the former Farmers and Merchants State Bank in Kewaskum.

A year ago the 1969 Washington County Junior Fair premium book was dedicated to Mr. Romaine. During his many years as board chairman, the book stated, "he gave leadership to many individual committees. He has shown a genuine interest in young people of the county and their activities." One of these committees included the Agricultural Committee through which he indirectly contributed leadership to the fair.

It was reported that Joseph A. Schmitz, veteran supervisor from the Village of Germantown, would succeed Romaine as chairman of the county board. He will serve out the two year term to which Romaine was elected this spring. The new chairman will appoint a successor to succeed Romaine as supervisor from the Village of Kewaskum.

The village board, by a unanimous vote, last Tuesday evening again filled its police staff by hiring a third full-time officer in Kewaskum. He is a West Bend man, David St. Louis, 21, of 821 Silverbrook Drive.

The new officer was selected from a field of nine applicants for the position and began his duties last Friday.

St. Louis is a native of Antigo but has made his home in West Bend for the past eight years. He is a graduate of West Bend High School and a former Marine Corps and Vietnam veteran. St. Louis received his honorable discharge from the service in April and since that time has been a radio operator on a part time basis for the West Bend Police Department.

Other full-time members of the Kewaskum police force are Chief Donald Hlavaty and Patrolman James Wyman. Neal Denniston, a physical education teacher at Kewaskum High School, is a part-time officer.

Two Injured in Area Accidents

A Kewaskum youth and a Monroe truck driver were injured in area mishaps reported the past week, and there were no injuries in a third accident which occurred in the village.

Mark L. Eichstedt, 18, Kewaskum, narrowly escaped serious injury early last Saturday when he fell asleep at the wheel and his car left County Trunk M and careened into the North Branch of the Milwaukee River south of Fillmore. He was driving north on M about 2:30 a. m. when the accident occurred.

His car went off the east edge of the highway at the bridge, struck a guard post and river marking sign, and the front end

then hit the concrete bridge abutment, flipped into the air and landed upside down in the river, approximately 60 feet from the point of impact with the abutment. Eichstedt, who summoned the sheriff's department from a nearby home, escaped with lacerations of the scalp and right arm.

In a mishap which occurred on Hwy. 28 and CTH W south of St. Kilian in the Town of Wayne at 5:08 a. m. Wednesday, a large milk tank truck was badly damaged, its contents spilled along the roadway, and the driver injured. The truck apparently went out of control and flipped over in the ditch. 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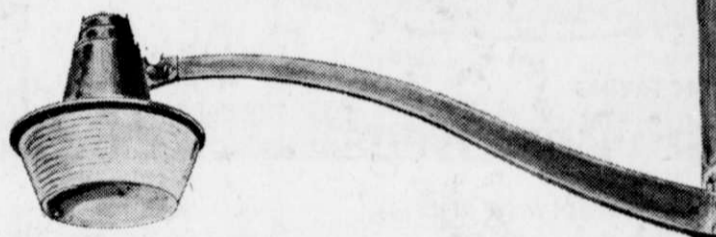

THE SMARTER GENERATION

In being absolutely fair, I charge today's youth with being too sure of itself. Some of our young people think that at seventeen or eighteen they know everything there is to know; how to run the government, how to run the schools, how to run other people's lives.

These big-shots don't need parents, teachers, or even God; no one can possibly have anything to tell them that might be of any worth.

Students who have never been within thousands of miles of any war suddenly seem to know more about it than their fathers, who actually fought in them. War is immoral, futile, purposeless to them. What would these same kids, who rely so much on the freedom of speech only this form of government can give them, do if a foreign army occupied America and allowed them to say only certain things?

To put it bluntly, eighteen year olds are just too immature for some of the things they demand! They're too impressionable; a lot of noise, a lot of action, and

you've got them on your side. In this way it is just as much the fault of some adults as of the kids for the riots and violence we have today. I refer to those adults who gain by capitalizing on the immaturity of teens, those adults who goad and prod and tell kids that this mess they're making is a good thing, those agitators who love to see a good fight.

And I am not saying that all the kids in the riots and demonstrations are bad. It is their constitutional right to peacefully let their ideas be known — peacefully. But some get carried away, and with the help of those who are just itching for a fight, the whole assembly can turn into mayhem with killing, burning, and sheer disaster.

True, the teens today are more informed about and more aware of the world about them. But they haven't really seen it yet. Eighteen year olds are just out of or still in high school. Now can they possibly be the judges of their elders?

They should use these next three years not in changing their ideas — some of them are really great — but in refining them, thinking out these reforms before acting on them, living as an independent in America. Then they can have a chance to change

things the way which is most effective, fastest, and safest — legally. American youths have long lives to live that don't end at twenty-one, but begin there.

Cougars Nip Indians, 2-1, in Extra Innings in Regional Semi-Finals

GO ON TO BEAT WEST BEND IN WIAA TOURNAMENT FINALS

The Campbellsport Cougars, who finished second in the Scenic Moraine Conference with a 10-4 record, were forced into extra innings to defeat the Kewaskum Indians in the semi-finals of the WIAA Regional tournament at West Bend Thursday night by a 2-1 score.

Kewaskum reached the semi-finals by blasting North Fondy, 7-1, in the tourney opener the previous Saturday. After being postponed Tuesday night because of wet grounds, tournament play resumed Thursday night with West Bend blanking Ozaukee, 5-0, and Campbellsport shading Kewaskum, 3-2 in nine innings (high school teams play 7-inning games). The Cougars went on to defeat West Bend, 6-2, in the tournament finals Friday afternoon. Campbellsport, which drew a bye in the Regional opener, advanced to the Sectional tourney at Howards Grove and was scheduled to meet Chilton Wednesday afternoon, followed by the Plymouth-Cedar Grove game at 6 p. m.

The Campbellsport-Kewaskum semi-final game Thursday was one of the best played games seen in a long time. Don Geidel of the Cougars and Randy Koth, a converted second baseman, hooked up in an airtight pitchers battle before Campbellsport squeezed out a close 2-1 win over the stubborn Indians.

Geidel was fortunate in getting the nod over Koth in this splendid pitching duel. Both teams were held to five hits but Koth had a three-hitter going until the decisive ninth when he gave up two hits which won the game for the Cougars. In their five-hit performances, Geidel struck out 13 batters and Koth fanned 9.
