Since he was elected to the county board on May 2, 1939. Mr. Romaine represented the Village of Kewaskum over 31 years. He was elected chairman of the board on May 2, 1944 and has served as chairman ever since, a period of 21, 1970, he was re-elected chairman for a two year term.
