The Statesman received a letter this week from Susan Behnke, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Orval Behnke, who is presently spending the summer in Germany as an AFS representative of Kewaskum High School. She will return home early in September. Sue's letter follows:

Bremen, den 6-8-1970

Viele Grusse aus Bremen!

I am Kewaskum's AFS representative to northern Germany. One of the first things I noticed here is that the countryside is much the same as Wisconsin's—fields, cows, and trees! But there the likeness ends. The houses are, for the most part, much smaller than in America, and all follow the same general style. One rarely sees a building made of wood, but it is not uncommon to see a thatched-roofed house or barn in the country.

My "hometown," Bremen, is one of the most beautiful and interesting cities in Germany. One famous area is Botcherstrasse, built in 1926. It is a street built with no particular design or form that has become a tourist attraction because of the huge glass glockenspiel built into one of the buildings.

Many of you are probably already acquainted with the story of the Bremen musicians—the dog, cat and rooster that supposedly saved the town from a band of robbers. They have now become a symbol of the city. In

Miller Named to Romaine's Seat On County Board

Charles Miller, 61, was appointed to fill the vacant county board seat in the Village of Kewaskum Tuesday. Miller, owner of Miller's Studio, has been serving as a village trustee.

Miller was endorsed by the entire village board for the seat held by the late Elwyn M. Romaine for the last 31 years, who was board chairman. He was also endorsed by other members of the community, according to new Board President Joseph Schmitz, who appointed him with the unanimous consent of the county supervisors.

Miller holds a B.A. degree from Lawrence University and was a member of the county Civil Service Commission at the time of his appointment. Orval Behnke, a member of the village board, and a former school board member, was named to replace Miller on the Civil Service Commission after a nomination by Miller.

Supervisor Herb Tennes of West Bend nominated Fire Chief William Oelhafen for the Civil Service post, but Behnke won out by an 18 to 9 vote on a secret ballot.

Miller was named to fill two of Schmitz' committee positions, one on the Public Property Committee and one on the Industrial Development Committee.

Boy, 7, Has Narrow Escape From Drowning

AMBULANCE SQUAD KEPT BUSY WITH FIVE CALLS

A seven-year-old rural Kewaskum boy had a narrow escape from drowning in a farm pond on the Robert Thull farm on Hwy. H about three miles southeast of the village last Friday.

The youth is David Moen, son of Mr. and Mrs. Roger Moen, R. 2, Kewaskum.

The Kewaskum fire department was summoned about 4:15 p. m. and responded with the ambulance and equipment truck. When they arrived the boy's mother, who leaped into the water with her clothes on, had succeeded in pulling David out of the water and laid him at the roadside to help him. He was unconscious, had already turned blue and there was no sign of breathing left. Rescue squad members immediately turned him on his stomach and put artificial respiration and put the resuscitator to work on him. In a short time the boy responded with a gasp and regained consciousness. He was removed to St. Joseph's Community Hospital, West Bend, where he was still a patient on Sunday. A doctor at the hospital commended the rescue squad attendants for doing an outstanding job in reviving the boy and saving his life.

David and his little brother were reported to have been playing in the nearby Thull pond area with some dogs. Apparently David either fell or wandered into the water. His brother ran to the Moen home, which is some distance from the pond, and told his mother what had happened. She rushed to the pond and found David floating in the water, jumped in and pulled him out.

OK BUYING SCOREBOARD FOR ATHLETIC FIELD

The board of education Monday night awarded the contract for tuckpointing the junior high building to Badger Restoration Co., Madison, on its bid of \$13,700, which was low among seven bidders.

The firm's alternate bid of \$780 to apply a coat of paint to the north exterior of the building also was accepted. Awarding of the contracts followed a study of the bids which were opened at the July 27 board meeting.

The board officially acknowledged receipt of a petition bearing signatures of 187 district electors requesting that school board members serving the Kewaskum Community Schools Joint District No. 2 be elected at the regular spring election, beginning in 1972. Presently, they are elected on the date of the annual school meeting.

The change in election procedures has been enacted by the State Legislature and will bring uniformity to election of school board members throughout Wisconsin. Some school districts do elect their board members at the spring election. The 319 districts that do not must be petitioned for the change.

On agreement of board members, regular board meetings during the 1970-71 school year were set for the second Monday in a four-Monday month or the third Monday in a five-Monday month.

If a second monthly meeting is to be held, it will take place on the fourth Monday in a four-Monday month or the fifth in a five-Monday month. Meetings will be held at 8 p. m. in the superintendent's office.

Other board action authorized purchase of a score board to be erected on the elementary school grounds where high school baseball and football are played. Funds for the score board and controls to cost \$2,100 will be paid from advance profits of the candy vending machine and temporarily advanced from the activity fund.

A discussion took place on the subject of a referendum for a long-range \$3 million expansion program that will include additions to the Wayne and Farmington Elementary Schools and the Kewaskum High School. Because two board members were absent, it was decided to table the matter "until a full board is present."

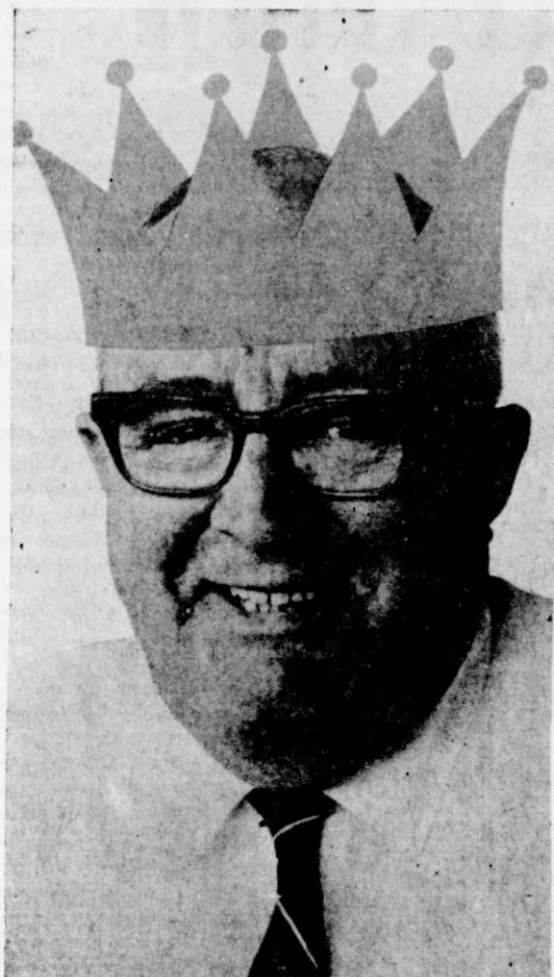
During the discussion, board member Richard Theusch suggested using the unused St. Michael's parochial school. He was told that possibility had been explored last year and it was not feasible.

Membership in the Wisconsin Association of School Boards was approved. The resignation of Paul Kilgore, a music department faculty member, was accepted. He will enter law school.

The board will meet next on Sept. 14.

The market place between the statue of Roland, the protector of Bremen. The legend says that as long as Roland stands facing the beautiful Bremen Dom, Bremen will be safe.

Bremen and Bremerhaven, about 60 kilometers apart, together make this area very important for shipping and trade. Located on the Weser River, they have modern harbors which handle imports of the best coffees and tobacco in the world, among other products. Bremerhaven also has a gigantic fishery and houses U.S. Air Force and Army posts.

In Germany, every city has a street car system, which has become a very vital part of the community. The side streets, being old and not made for cars, are also very narrow. But the Germans drive only small cars like Volkswagens and Opels, which makes it possible to drive on these impossible streets.

"Bremen Days" is an affair that has been held since 1954. In the last four days of their stay, all the exchange students in Germany come to Bremen to tour the city and discuss the two months that they lived as Germans. My home is with the Hermann Behnke family. I have five brothers and

three sisters, all younger than I, so there is never a dull moment. I have already learned so much about life here, and hope that I have also presented a good picture of American life to my German friends and family.

The American Field Service has done a wonderful job in bringing America closer to all the world. I also thank our own AFS Chapter for making it possible for me to take part in such a wonderful program of international understanding.

Postal 'Clean-Up Week' Aug. 16-22

Postmaster Harry E. Koch today announced "Clean-Up Week" for the Kewaskum Post Office as part of a nation-wide postal activity announced in Washington by Postmaster General Winton M. Blount, starting Aug. 16 thru 22.

The Postmaster General announced the program Sunday "to establish post offices as a symbol of good housekeeping and as a credit to every community in the nation."

Locally, Postmaster Koch said "CLEAN-UP WEEK" will focus on such matters as building repair, safety factors, house cleaning inside and out, better working conditions for every one.

"We are all concerned nowadays about the quality of the environment," he said, "and the Post Office — as a representative of the Federal Government — is always pleased to conduct activities that are in the best interests of the communities we serve.

"Our Post Office is one of the

busiest and most visible activities in Kewaskum and whatever we can do to improve it is of special value to our community."

The postmaster pointed out that, in addition to improved appearance for postal facilities, the national "CLEAN-UP WEEK" is designed to provide practical values, removal of safety and health hazards designed to reduce accident and illness, and repairs wherever feasible.

Koch noted that more than 40,000 post offices, stations and branches over the nation are joining in the "CLEAN-UP WEEK" proclaimed by the Postmaster General. This includes the Post Office Department Headquarters in Washington, as well as the 15 regional offices across the country.

The Postmaster General has said, Postmaster Koch noted, that while the most intensive effort will occur during the designated week, he expects post offices to maintain improvement programs as a permanent activity "that will give a new look to the postal service for customers and employees alike."

AN ORDINANCE TO REGULATE DUMPING AND DISPOSAL OF GARBAGE AND REFUSE IN THE TOWN OF AUBURN, FOND DU LAC COUNTY, WISCONSIN AND PROVIDING PENALTIES

The Town Board of the Town of Auburn, Fond du Lac County, Wisconsin does ordain as follows:

Section 1. It is the intent of this ordinance to provide for the disposal of garbage and refuse in the Town of Auburn in a safe and sanitary manner.

Section 2. No person, firm, corporation or municipality shall dump or dispose of garbage, refuse or other waste material within the Town of Auburn except at the public town dump site known and described as:

The fenced and enclosed area now and for many years past used and operated as a town dump and situated in the South Half of the Southwest Quarter, (S 1/2 SW 1/4) of Section 10, Township 13 North, Range 19 East, in said Town of Auburn, Fond du Lac County, Wisconsin, bounded on the East by County Trunk "DD" and on the South by a town highway known as Lake Drive, with access and gates on Lake Drive.

Section 3. No dumping or disposal at said site shall be permitted except on the days and hours hereinafter set out and in the areas designated by the attendant in charge.

Section 4. Dumping shall be restricted to solid waste materials only and no waste water effluents, putrescible materials, animal carcasses, explosives, liquid or other common water pollutants or car or truck bodies shall be dumped at said site.

Section 5. Dumping and disposal shall be permitted only at the following times:

From October 1 to April 30, inclusive, on Monday and Saturday of each week from 1:00 P. M. to 5:00 P. M.; and from May 1 to September 30, inclusive, on Monday and Wednesday of each week from 1:00 P. M. to 5:00 P. M. and on Saturday of each week from 8:00 A. M. to 5:00 P. M.

Section 6. Discharge of firearms on the dump site is prohibited.

Section 7. No person shall enter into the fenced dumping areas or the roadways leading thereto at any time except during the days and hours that the dump is open as hereinabove stated.

Section 8. No waste materials shall be brought into the Town of Auburn for disposal at the dump site except by express permit from the Town Board.

Section 9. The times at which dumping is permitted shall be posted at the site.

PENALTY — Any person, firm or corporation who shall violate any of the provisions of this ordinance shall forfeit not less than \$10.00 nor more than \$200.00 for each offense.
