Boy, 7, Has Narrow Escape From Drowning

AMBULANCE SQUAD KEPT BUSY WITH FIVE CALLS

A seven-vear-old rural Kewaskum boy had a narrow escape from ders. drowning in a farm pond on the Robert Thull farm on Hwy. H about three miles southeast of the village last Friday.

The youth is David Moen, son! of Mr. and Mrs. Roger Moen, R. 2, Kewaskum.

The Kewaskum fire department as summoned about 4:15 p. m. and responded with the ambulnce and equipment truck. When hey arrived the boy's mother. who leaped into the water with her clothes on, had succeeded in pulling David out of the water and laid him at the roadside to help him. He was unconscious, had already turned blue and there was no sign of broathing left. Rescue squad members immediately turned him on his stomach, gave him artificial respiration and put the resuscitator to work on him. In a hort time the boy responded with a gasp and regained consciousness. He was removed to St. Joeph's Community Hospital, West Bend, where he was still a paleat on Sunday. A doctor at the hospital commended the rescue squad attendants for doing an outstanding job in reviving the boy and saving his life.

David and his little brother were reported to have been playng in the nearby Thull pond area with some dogs. Apparently David either fell or wandered into the Moen home, which is some distance from the pond, and told his mother what had happened. She rushed to the pond and found David floating in the water, jumped

OK BUYING SCOREBOARD FOR ATHLETIC FIELD

The board of education Monday night awarded the contract for tuckpointing the junior high

building to Badger Restoration o., Madison, on its bid of \$13,700, which was low among seven bid-The firm's alternate bid of \$780

to apply a coat of paint to the north exterior of the building also was accepted. Awarding of the contracts followed a study of the bids which were opened at the July 27 board meeting.

The board officially acknowledged receipt of a petition bearing signatures of 187 district electors requesting that school board members serving the Kewaskum Community Schools Joint District No. 2 be elected at the regular spring election, beginning in 1972. Presently, they are elected on the date of the annual school meeting.

The change in election procedures has been enacted by the State Legislature and will bring uniformity to election of school board members throughout Wisconsin. Some school districts do elect their board members at the spring election. The 319 districts that do not must be petitioned for the change.

On agreement of board members, regular board meetings during the 1970-71 school year were set for the second Monday in a four-Monday month or the third Monday in a five-Monday month.

If a second monthly meeting is to be held, it will take place on the fourth Monday in a four-Monday month or the fifth in a five-Monday month. Meetings will be held at 8 p. m. in the superintendent's office.

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

AN ORDINANCE TO REGULATE DUMPING AND DISPOSAL OF GARBAGE AND REFUSE IN THE TOWN OF AUBURN, FOND DU LAC COUNTY, WISCONSIN AND PROVIDING PENALTIES

The Town Board of the Town of Auburn, Fond du Lac County, Wisconsin does ordain as follows:

Section 1. It is the intent of this ordinance to provide for the disposal of garbage and refuse in the Town of Auburn in a safe and sanitary manner.

Section 2. No person, firm, corporation or municipality shall dump or dispose of garbage, refuse or other waste material within the Town of Auburn except at the public town dump site known and described as:

The fenced and enclosed area now and for many years past used and operated as a town dump and situated in the South Half of the Southwest Quarter, (S1/2 SW1/4) of Section 10. Township 13 North, Range 19 East, in said Town of Auburn, Fond du Lac County, Wisconsin, bounded on the East by County Trunk "DD" and on the South by a town highway known as Lake Drive, with access and gates on Lake Drive.

Section 3. No dumping or disposal at said site shall be permitted except on the days and hours hereinafter set out and in the areas designated by the attendant in charge.

Section 4. Dumping shall be restricted to solid waste materials only and no waste water effluents, putrescible materials, animal carcasses, explosives, liquid or other common water pollutants or car or truck bodies shall be dumped at said site.

Section 5. Dumping and disposal shall be permitted only at the following times:

From October 1 to April 30, inclusive, on Monday and Saturday of each week from 1:00 P. M. to 5:00 P. M.; and from May 1 to September 30, inclusive, on Monday and Wednesday of each week from 1:00 P. M. to 5:00 P. M. and on Saturday of each week from 8:00 A. M. to 5:00 P. M.

Section 6. Discharge of firearms on the dump site is prohibited.

Section 7. No person shall enter into the fenced dumping areas or the roadways leading thereto at any time except during the days and hours that the dump is open as hereinabove stated.

Section 8. No waste materials shall be brought into the Town of Auburn for disposal at the dump side except by express permit from the Town Board.

Section 9. The times at which dumping is permitted shall be posted at the site.

PENALTY - Any person, firm or corporation who shall violate any of the provisions of this ordinance shall forfeit not less than \$10.00 nor more than \$200.00 for each offense.
