#### 115 Acres of Grass, Forest Burn in Schools Open Aug. 28; Expect 665 Boy, 11, Fatally Dundee Area State Park, Camp Fires In High School, Record 188 Freshmen Hurt Here; Guard

A dangerous fire which threatened to get out of control and still burning Monday morning, day school for the students. Holy swept over 94 acres of grasslands and timberland in the Dundee area of the Kettle Moraine State Forest Sunday and a separate blaze burned over a 21 acre tract of a private campground nearby.

Very dry and extremely hazardous fire conditions prevailed throughout the Kettle Moraine area. Fortunately the foliage is Barn, Contents green at this time which helped prevent the fires from becoming Lost in Fire at more serious and spreading farther. Some rain this week eased the situation somewhat.

The initial fire broke out shortly after 11 a. m. Sunday just southwest of Dundee and north of Hwy. 67 in Section 34 of the Town of Osceola. According to Clyde Smith, assistant district director of the Bureau of Parks and Recreation of the Department of Natural Resources. formerly the Conservation Department, approximately 94 acres of forest plantations of 8 to 10 year old green ash, jackpine, Norway spruce and white cedar were destroyed, together with the grassland, in the blaze.

Attempts were made to halt vehicle traffic on State Hwy. 67, County Trunk Hwy. G and other area roads to give fire fighters and equipment access to the fire scene but the lake area weekend traffic together with spectators attracted by the fires continued to pour through the area and slowed up fire fighters.

Firemen from Campbellsport and Kewaskum were summoned initially to the Birchwood Lake area off Hwy. 67 where the first blaze originated. Other fire fighters from the Eden, Beechwood and Plymouth departments were also called in. All available conservation department personnel were summoned along with their fire fighting equipment and ma ny volunteers also aided in controlling the fire. All told an estimated 300 men fought the fire. Smith attributed the controlling of the blaze to the excellent cooperation of the firemen and conservation workers. The first blaze was attributed to children playing with Shoot Sept. 20 matches.

Only about 21/4 hours after returning from the fires in the Ket. I tudents and their individual schetle Moraine State Forest in the afternoon, Kewaskum firemen were called out again Sunday. The second call came about 6:45 p. m. to the Otto Giese farm several miles west of the village and about a mile north of Hwy. 28, in the Town of Auburn, where a barn, pigs, chickens, hay and farm machinery were destroyed in a barn fire.

Local volunteer firemen spent a busy day fighting fires, giving un their planned Sunday activities They fought the state forest fire more than four hours, returned to the fire station for a snack and refreshments, and later responder to the Giese fire where they spenmost of Sunday evening and night battling the blaze, with some fire men remaining at the scene a!

The barn was already in flame when Giese came out of the house and discovered it. It appeared that the blaze, burning out of control, had already engulfed the barn when firemen arrived. It started in the northeast corner of the barn. The cause of the fire and amount of loss had not been determined.

The entire 40 by 68 structure was destroyed. Lost with it were a chopper, blower, seeder and other farm machinery and equip-

County officials reported the Backhaus auto was traveling north on Hwy. 45 when an unidentified southbound vehicle approached over the center line, Backhaus stated. He swerved his car to avoid the oncoming vehicle and it struck the guard rail on the right Aug. 17-Ronald Mueller, Ke shoulder of the road. The boy's death was the 13th fatality on Washington County highways in 1970, compared to 14 at this time last year.
