## 115 Acres of Grass, Forest Burn in Dundee Area State Park, Camp Fires 5 Fire Departments, About 300 Men Fight Blazes for 7 Hours

A dangerous fire which threatened to get out of control and burn over hundreds of acres, swept over 94 acres of grasslands and timberland in the Dundee area of the Kettle Moraine State Forest, Sunday and a separate blaze burned over a 21 acre tract of a private campground nearby.

Very dry and extremely hazardous fire conditions prevailed throughout the Kettle Moraine area. Fortunately the foliage is green at this time which helped prevent the fires from becoming more serious and spreading farther. Some rain this week eased the situation somewhat.

The initial fire broke out shortly after 11 a. m. Sunday just southwest of Dundee and north of Hwy. 67 in Section 34 of the Town of Osceola. According to Clyde Smith, assistant district director of the Bureau of Parks and Recreation of the Department of Natural Resources, formerly the Conservation Department, approximately 94 acres of forest plantations of 8 to 10 year old green ash, jack-pine, Norway spruce and white cedar were destroyed, together with the grassland, in the blaze.

Attempts were made to halt vehicle traffic on State Hwy. 67, County Trunk Hwy. G and other area roads to give fire fighters and equipment access to the fire scene but the lake area weekend traffic together with spectators attracted by the fires continued to pour through the area and slowed up fire fighters.

The fire from Campbellsport and Kewaskum were summoned initially to the Birchwood Lake area off Hwy. 67 where the first blaze originated. Other fire fighters from the Eden, Beechwood and Plymouth departments were also called in. All available conservation department personnel were summoned along with their firefighting equipment and many volunteers also aided in controlling the fire. All told an estimated 300 men fought the fire. Smith attributed the controlling of the blaze to the excellent cooperation of the firemen and conservation workers. The first blaze was attributed to children playing with matches.

The second fire broke out about 1 p. m. at a nearby youth camp, Vist-We-Yon-Wauntka, operated by Father Joseph Fischer, and was caused by sparks from a camp rubbish burner. It burned over close to 21 acres of wooded and grassland on the campgrounds and state forest land. The camp is northwest of Dundee, about a mile distant, on Little Cedar Lake.

Twenty-eight men from the Kewaskum department responded to the fire alarm. Many of the firemen were just about to leave the village to participate in the Allenton picnic parade when the fire call was received. One local fireman suffered minor burns about the mouth and two others were almost overcome from the heat and smoke.

Hot weather and high winds, with gusts of from 20 to 30 miles per hour, added to the fire fighting problems in the tinder dry grass and forest lands. A peat marsh area in the district was still burning Monday morning, creating much smoke, but the other fires were under control. Conservation men were estimating the acreage burned and damage as well as checking possible danger points.

Firemen and conservation workers were on the scene from 11 a. m. to 6 p. m.

## Barn, Contents Lost in Fire at Otto Giese Farm

Only about 2 1/4 hours after retreating from the fires in the Kettle Moraine State Forest in the afternoon, Kewaskum firemen were called out again Sunday. The second call came about 6:45 p. m. to the Otto Giese farm several miles west of the village and about a mile north of Hwy. 28, in the Town of Auburn, where a barn, pigs, chickens, hay and farm machinery were destroyed in a barn fire.

Local volunteer firemen spent a busy day fighting fires, giving up their planned Sunday activities. They fought the state forest fire more than four hours, returned to the fire station for a snack and refreshments, and later responded to the Giese fire where they spent most of Sunday evening and night battling the blaze, with some firemen remaining at the scene all night.

The barn was already in flames when Giese came out of the house and discovered it. It appeared that the blaze, burning out of control, had already engulfed the barn, when firemen arrived. It started in the northeast corner of the barn. The cause of the fire and amount of loss had not been determined.

The entire 40 by 68 structure was destroyed. Lost with it were a chopper, blower, seeder and other farm machinery and equipment. (Continued on page 2)

## Schools Open Aug. 28; Expect 665 In High School, Record 188 Freshmen

NINETY-TWO TEACHERS WILL STAFF SCHOOLS

The Kewaskum Community Schools will open next week following the summer vacation. Friday, Aug. 28, will be the first full day school for the students. Holy Trinity Parochial School will also open the same day.

The largest freshman class in history had registered at Kewaskum High School as of Monday of last week, with 188 students enrolled. A total of 665 students are expected in high school grades 9 through 12.

Orientation for freshmen and eighth graders will be held at the high school and Junior High School on Thursday, Aug. 27, at 1 p. m. At this time, students will pay their fees, receive books, learn of homeroom assignments and get acquainted with teachers, other students and their individual schedules. Students must provide their own transportation to the orientation meeting, but the buses will take them home.

All students will be reporting on Friday, Aug. 28. The buses will make regular runs beginning that day and the routes will be similar to those of last year.

The starting time is 8:15 a. m. for students of the Junior and Senior High Schools, the Kewaskum Elementary School, and Wayne Elementary School. Beechwood and Farmington schools will begin their day at 8:30 a. m. All schools will be let out at 3:16 p. m.

The hot lunch program will also start on the opening day of school. The cost of a single ticket remains at 35 cents. A monthly ticket for September, which includes the two school days in August, will sell for \$7.

Ninety-two teachers will staff schools. (Continued on page 7)

## Car Stolen Here Recovered; Youth Confesses Theft

A blue 1965 Volkswagen owned by Ernest Mitchell, which was parked at the curb in front of his home at 121 Prospect St., was stolen early Tuesday morning. Mrs. Mitchell had parked the car there between 11 and 11:30 p. m. Monday night.

The auto was recovered by Kewaskum police at 8 p. m. the same evening behind the Honeck Chevrolet, Inc. garage on Fond du Lac Ave., where it had been parked after being driven about 95 miles. The vehicle was not damaged.

An hour later, at 9 p. m., police picked up a juvenile suspect who is on probation and placed him under arrest for being uncontrollable. He was taken to the Washington county sheriff's office and booked for being uncontrollable.

The suspect was searched and the key to the Mitchell car was found taped under the arch support in his shoe. He said he found the key and hid it there to avoid suspicion. Police questioned the youth Wednesday afternoon and obtained a confession at that time that he stole the car about 1:30 a. m. Tuesday. The case was turned over to the Washington County Juvenile Division.

## Boy, 11, Fatally Hurt Here; Guard Rail Pierces Car

RURAL FREDONIA YOUTH IS VICTIM IN CRASH TUESDAY

In an accident which occurred at 11:30 a. m. Tuesday, an 11-year-old rural Fredonia boy was fatally injured. The crash took place on U. S. Hwy. 45 at County Trunk Hwy. V near the overhead bridge one-quarter mile north of Kewaskum.

Killed in the mishap was Jeffery Barger, 11, R. 1, Fredonia. He was pronounced dead on arrival at St. Joseph's Community Hospital, West Bend.

Jeffery was a passenger in a car with his father and another adult when it struck a guard rail and posts at the intersection. The rail penetrated the rear compartment of the compact auto where the youth was riding, fatally injuring him.

The driver of the auto in which the youth was riding was Gilbert A. Backhaus, 37, of 405 N. 39th St., Milwaukee. Glenn Barger, father of the boy, was riding in the right front seat. The youth and his father, who suffered cuts and shock, were both removed to the hospital by the Kewaskum fire department rescue squad ambulance.

County officials reported the Backhaus auto was traveling north on Hwy. 45 when an unidentified southbound vehicle approached over the center line. Backhaus stated, He swerved his car to avoid the oncoming vehicle and it struck the guard rail on the right shoulder of the road. One of the guard rails reportedly penetrated Jeffery's body.

The boy's death was the 13th fatality on Washington County highways in 1970, compared to 14 at this time last year.

Funeral services will be held at 2 p. m. today (Friday) at the Ozaukee Baptist Church in Cedarburg for Jeffery, with the Rev. Gordon DeHaas officiating. Interment will be at Zur Ruhe cemetery in Cedarburg. Visitation at the Gunther Funeral Home, Cedarburg, was from 6 p. m. Thursday.

Surviving are his parents, a sister, Jo Ann, and his paternal grandmother, Mrs. Lucy Barger of Tulsa, Okla.

## Memorial Set Up For Sgt. C. Bales By Air Base Club

The Ridge Riders Motorcycle Club of Clark Air Force Base near Manila in the Philippines has set up a memorial for the late Sgt. Clifford J. Bales, son of Mr. and Mrs. Sylvester Bales of R. 1, Kewaskum, one of two American airmen who were found slain in the Philippines in April of this year. Filipino police attributed the slayings to Communist led Huk terrorists.

They have made arrangements with the Kewaskum Shop to place flowers on Sgt. Bales' grave at Holy Angels Cemetery, West Bend, on his birthday for the next ten years.

ment, two brood sows and a boar, 17 small pigs, 50 chickens and approximately 10 to 15 ton of baled hay.

Firemen attending the Allenton picnic and others in various places were called in to help fight the blaze with 29 men at the scene. Some firemen remained for several hours, others until midnight, and eight stayed all night to prevent the fire from spreading to nearby buildings. They returned to the fire station at 8 a. m. Monday.

Chief Armin Oppermann attributed the rapid spread of the blaze to the extreme dryness. No one was injured in fighting the fire, he said.

**Hay Is Removed, Barn Saved on Westerman Farm**

A barn was saved from burning on the Harold Westerman farm, R. 1, Allenton, located on County Trunk Hwy. H several miles west of Kewaskum last Wednesday.

The weather was hot and Westerman was worried because he had nearly 150 tons of chopped hay packed into the mow of his barn, some of which was still curing. If conditions in the mow are good, usually there is no cause for concern but if there is a little too much moisture in the hay (the small amount of fermentation that takes place in the hay after

it is cut and dried causes the problem) and the temperature is just right, spontaneous combustion might occur.

Harold had about 50 tons of recently cut hay that had him worried with the temperature in the 90's all week. Finally, about 6 p. m., he called Kohlsville Fire Chief Wilmer Herman, who is experienced with barn fire prevention, who came and checked out the situation. The danger point was between 150 and 160 degrees. The thermometer they pulled from deep in the mow read a hot 180 degrees. They either had to clean out the barn or let it burn.

The fire alarm was sounded in Kohlsville at 7:30 and at 10:30 Allenton sent five men over to lend a hand. Firemen and Westerman's friends and neighbors worked throughout the night, getting the hay out of the barn with pitchforks, tractors and other means. Huge fans blew cool air

into the mow.

Toward the end workers found the trouble spot, a rather small patch of heat-blackened hay hidden deep in the mow. It was only a step away from burning.

**8 BUILDINGS DESTROYED IN BERRES FARM FIRE**

Fire destroyed eight buildings,

livestock and machinery on the farm of Alvin Berres located about eight miles north of Kewaskum on Hwy. 45. The loss was estimated at \$175,000 and \$200,000. Firemen from Campbellsport fought the blaze and Kewaskum firemen's tank truck with several firemen assisted in battling the fire.

## First 25 Year Club Banquet Held by Regal Ware



The first 25 Year Club Banquet marking the founding of Regal Ware Inc. was held on Aug. 6 at the Glacier Inn. It was on that date in 1945 that J. O. Reigle, together with a small group of associates, organized what is today, the largest independently owned and operated manufacturer of cookware in the United States.

Present at the occasion were the original employees of the Kewaskum based company. This group of twenty-seven represents the original work force of forty-seven people on the founding date. This employment figure has since grown to nearly 2,000 people in four plants and four sales offices located throughout the country.

Two of the original founders were in attendance. They were Edna M. Oster, Executive Assistant and L. N. Peterson, Executive Vice-President-Treasurer.

One of the highlights of the evening was a silver scroll presentation to J. O. Reigle, founder and Chairman of the Board, from the original staff in appreciation of his great leadership and friendship throughout the years. The award was accepted by his wife in behalf

of Mr. Reigle, who was unable to attend. All charter members of the 25 Year Club received engraved wrist watches to commemorate the affair.

Congratulations were given to Arnold J. Zeimet for the longest term of employment. Mr. Zeimet was with the old Kewaskum Utensil Co. since 1922 or for 23 years before Mr. Reigle purchased the firm in 1945. This totaled 48 years of continuous employment at the Kewaskum plant for Mr. Zeimet.

Master of ceremonies for the evening was James D. Reigle, president, who stated, "the great Regal growth was reflected in its personnel, not material things, and that teamwork and dedication were one of the company's outstanding accomplishments." L. The comedy continues with the unexpected arrival of another brother, Jonathan, played by Doug Acker, and his shifty plastic surgeon friend, Einstein, played by Dana Acker. Brother Jonathan has also acquired the "bad habit" of killing and brightens up the party by bringing a corpse of his own along. Rounding out the comedy are Doreen Rumsey, playing the part of Mortimer's fiancée, Elaine; Dave Benzschawel, as her father, Rev.
