High School to Offer 23 Adult Evening Courses

Residents of the Kewaskum area may take advantage of 23 Adult Evening Education courses, ranging in interest from dairy herd management to ceramics, which will be offered during the fall semester at Kewaskum High School.

The courses are offered by Vocational, Technical and Adult Education - District 10 in facilities rented from the high school.

According to Edward E. Connors, program supervisor, registration will be Sept. 8 and 9 from 7 to 8:30 p. m. at the high school. Beginning date, time and cost of courses are listed in brochures which have been mailed throughout the area. Copies may be obtained from Connors at the high school or by calling 626-2166.

The broad offering of interesting and informative courses includes 1 in agriculture, 2 in business education, 14 in general improvement, 3 in home economics, and 3 in trade and industry.

During the fall semester, Vocational, Technical and Adult Education - District 10 will be offering a total of 701 Adult Evening Education courses at the three schools and 17 adult education centers of the district, which is comprised of Washington, Fond du Lac and Green Lake counties, the major part of Dodge County, part of Waushara and Winnebago Counties and the New Holstein School District.

Vocational, Technical and Adult Education - District 10, with its schools and adult education centers, serves the needs of both youth and adults not enrolled in other educational programs, by providing occupational education to meet the employment demands of agriculture, business and industry and helping to meet the needs of all in the basic preparation for life.

Publishers Guests At Centennial of Fond du Lac Reporter

Mr. and Mrs. William Harbeck and guests, Mr. and Mrs. William Martin, were guests at the centennial celebration of the Fond du Lac Commonwealth Reporter which observed its 100th anniversary Saturday with a dedication program, tour of the historical Galloway House Museum and Pioneer Village and a buffet dinner on the Galloway House grounds on Pioneer Road. About 500 persons were guests at the affair.

On the occasion of its anniversary, the Commonwealth Reporter dedicated it restored early daily newspaper and print shop to the Fond du Lac Historical Society as the publication's centennial year gift to the society. The print shop is outfitted with an old press and other printing machinery, type, desks and other equipment of the kind used 100 years ago.

The main speaker at the dedication was Chief Justice E. Harold Hallows of the Wisconsin Supreme Court, a former employee of the Commonwealth Reporter. Rep. William A. Steiger added his congratulations to the newspaper and displayed the 4.6 billion year old moon rock brought back to earth by American astronauts in a space adventure that cost the nation \$28 billion. The moon rock was shown under security guard in the old Daily Newspaper and Print Shop for a short time.

State Sen. Walter Hollander read a citation for the Commonwealth Reporter signed by Gov. Warren P. Knowles. Accepting the citation was Louis A. Lange Jr., executive vice president of the Reporter Printing Co., who also presented the keys to the Daily Newspaper and Print Shop to Mrs. Margaret Baker, president of the County Historical Society. At this time a plaque was also unveiled and formally dedicated, and bells of the Pioneer Village were rung. Two area assemblymen also participated in the program, namely Earl McEssy and William Schwefel. The Rev. Raymond Fox delivered the invocation, and Keith Mulligan was master of ceremonies. Mr. and Mrs. E. P. Galloway were special guests.

Firemen Put Out Two Grass Fires

Kewaskum firemen were called out twice the past week to snuff out grass fires. Both blazes were along the North Western Railroad tracks, one south of Kewaskum and the other north of the village.

The first call came at 1:45 p. m. Saturday when a fire burned over a small area of grass along the railroad right-of-way about a half mile south of Kewaskum in the Town of Kewaskum. Firemen were summoned again at 10:45 p. m. Monday when a blaze burned over a patch of grass between the railroad tracks and CTH V about a half mile north of the village in the Town of Kewaskum.

It is believed that both fires were caused by sparks from a passing train.

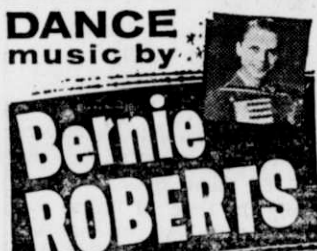
