## First Day Enrollment of 658 in High School, 1,256 in Grades

### Attendance Up By 76 Students

**TOTAL ENROLLMENT 1,914; 188 FRESHMEN IS RECORD**

Kewaskum Community Schools opened last Friday and according to the district's Newsletter circulated this week, first day attendance was up by 76 students over last year, and is up by 404 over first day attendance in 1966, the first year of K-12 operation.

First day enrollment in high school is 658 students, an increase of 39 over last year's opening day figure of 619. First day attendance in the elementary schools is 1,256 pupils, an increase of 37 over last year's enrollment of 1,219. This brings the total enrollment in the school district to 1,914, an increase of 76 over last year's 1,838. Adding to this number the 255 pupils enrolled at Holy Trinity Parochial School brings the total number of children attending school in the Kewaskum district well over the 2,000 mark, exactly 2,169. That's a lot of kids!

Several more students had enrolled but did not attend school the first day. Official enrollment figures are taken the third Friday in September each year.

Prior to the opening day of school, the largest freshmen class in history had registered at Kewaskum Community High School with 188 students enrolled.

## Plan Girl Scout Round-Up Sept. 9

Weekly meetings will begin the following week. Registration will be closed at that time. Any girls not attending these meetings will have to wait until late January to join, without further notice.

## Long Lake Fire Destroys Cottage, Burns 5 Persons

Fire destroyed a cottage Sunday along Hwy. 67 in the Long Lake area and five persons were treated as out-patients at St. Agnes Hospital, Fond du Lac, following the blaze.

Campbelsport firemen were called to the scene at 8:30 p. m. Sunday when a newly-installed gas furnace exploded and engulfed the cottage in flames. The gas explosion took place when an attempt was made to light the furnace.

The cottage destroyed is owned by Dennis Netko, 49, of Milwaukee. Firemen reported that the only thing left standing was a portion of a chimney. An estimate of the damage was not available.

Persons treated and released for minor burns included Netko, Mrs. Netko, 50, August Bialocki, 78, Mrs. Raymond Fryt, 49, and Raymond Fryt, 47. All are from Milwaukee.

The firemen were able to save a neighboring cottage located just eight feet away from the Netko building. The adjoining cottage was charred on the side facing the Netko cottage and the roof, and there was some smoke and water damage.

A spokesman for the fire department said that some water was taken from the lake and 6,000 gallons were hauled from Campbelsport to fight the blaze. A total of 23 firemen responded to the call and were under the direction of Chief Joe Thelen.

The size of the destroyed building was estimated at 35 feet by 28 feet.

## Hold Primary Election Next Tuesday, Sept. 8

### TO NAME STATE AND COUNTY CANDIDATES

Primary election will be held next Tuesday, Sept. 8, and it seems little interest has been stirred up in Kewaskum and Washington County although some contests will be placed before the electors on both the county and state ballots.

Election polls in Kewaskum will be open from 9 a. m. to 8 p. m. and balloting will take place at the fire station in the municipal building.

Two contests exist on the county ticket. Incumbent Sheriff Paul Humbel is opposed for the Republican nomination by a deputy in the sheriff's department, Clarence Schwartz. The only other county race is for county clerk on the Democratic ticket with James Lochen and James Miller facing each other to oppose Republican clerk Anton Staral in the Nov. 3 General Election.

In the only opposition on the state Republican ticket Roman Blenski will face Jack B. Olson for the nomination as governor candidate. On the state Democratic ticket there will be opposition for every office except attorney general. There are three candidates for nomination for governor, five for lieutenant governor, two for secretary of state and three for state treasurer.

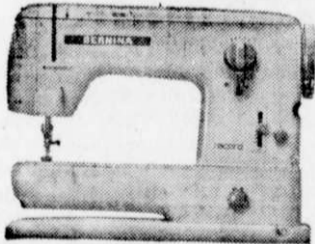

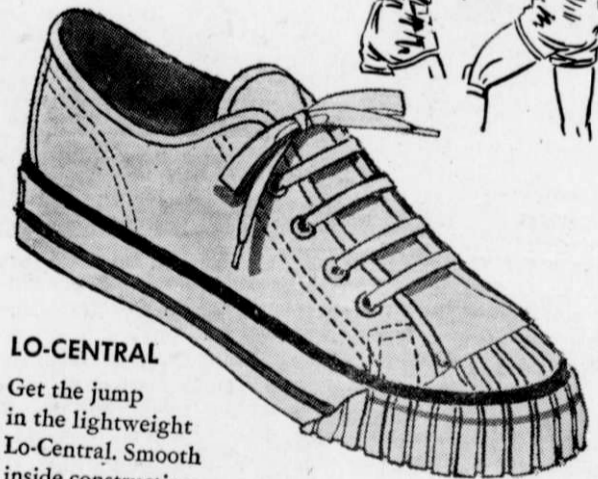

Robert Zarling moved to present the proposed budget of \$1,022,892.85 for operating expense levy for the 1970-71 school year to the electors at the Annual Meeting. Ernest Howell seconded. Motion carried by a hand vote of 141 "for" and 33 "against."

Donald Schulz moved to adjourn the Budget Hearing. Donald Diels seconded. Unanimously carried at 9:27 p. m.

Annual Meeting — July 27, 1970

The Annual Meeting was called to order at 9:28 p. m. by Richard L. Edwards with 215 electors present.

Mr. Donald Jones nominated Norbert Dettmann as Temporary Chairman of the Annual Meeting. Mrs. Marian Belger seconded. Desmond Smith nominated Richard L. Edwards as Temporary Chairman. Roger Schleif seconded. August Bilgo, Jr. moved to close nominations. Ernest Howell seconded. A hand vote was taken. Norbert Dettmann received 105 votes and Richard Edwards received 68 votes. Norbert Dettmann was declared Temporary Chairman of the Annual Meeting.

RESOLUTION NO. 2 — Be it resolved by the electors of Kewaskum Community Schools, Jt. School District No. 2, that the 1971 Budget Hearing of this district be set for the fourth Monday of July in the year 1971 (July 26, 1971) at 8:00 o'clock in the evening in the high school building, to be followed by the Annual Meeting.

Bert Preis moved to accept Resolution No. 2, Charles Gehrke seconded. Unanimously carried.

RESOLUTION NO. 3 — Be it resolved by the electors of Kewaskum Community Schools, Jt. School District No. 2, that the school board of this district be and they hereby are authorized to make such temporary loans as may be necessary to pay expenses until funds for the payment thereof are realized from the current levy or investments.

Ernest Howell moved to accept Resolution No. 3, Mrs. Norbert Dettmann seconded. Unanimously carried.

RESOLUTION NO. 4 — Be it resolved by the electors of Kewaskum Community Schools, Jt. School District No. 2, that the school board of this district be and hereby is authorized to provide a scheduled accident insurance policy for pupils in atten-

dance at the public schools operated by the district.

Mrs. Irma Gehrke moved to accept Resolution No. 4, Daniel J. Rodenkirsch seconded. Unanimously carried.

RESOLUTION NO. 5 — Be it resolved by the electors of Kewaskum Community Schools, Jt. School District No. 2, that the salary of the school board members be set at \$400.00 per member per year and that the payment of actual and necessary expenses of board members be reimbursed for necessary duties performed outside the district.

Mrs. Norbert Dettmann moved to accept Resolution No. 5, Mrs. Irma Gehrke seconded. Unanimously carried.

RESOLUTION NO. 6 — Be it resolved by the electors of Kewaskum Community Schools, Jt. School District No. 2, that the school board be authorized to sell or dispose of obsolete or unused furniture and equipment which is no longer needed or used by the school district.

Robert Zarling moved to accept Resolution No. 6, Ernest E. Howell seconded. Unanimously carried.

RESOLUTION NO. 7 — Be it resolved by the electors of Kewaskum Community Schools, Jt. School District No. 2, that the school board be and hereby is au-

Marshall H. Boyd explained the long range plans for the Kewaskum Elementary and High School 7-12 and the status of the long range plan.

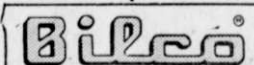

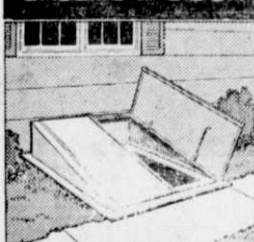
