Board OK's \$20,000 Compromise Fee To Architects for Swim Pool Service

At its regular meeting Monday night, the board of education voted to pay the architectural firm of Schutte-Mochon, Inc., the sum of \$20,000 which is the compromise fee for the firm's professional services in connection with designing the defeated swimming pool addition to the high school. Payment will be made from the pool sinking fund. The board had accepted the compromise offer at its March 9 meeting.

The firm's services actually amounted to \$28,290 but said it would settle for \$20,000 if given the opportunity to design the proposed new high school project, or, \$23,904 if it did not get the high school job.

As an added compromise, Schutte-Mochon said it would be willing to have payment deferred until the high school project preliminary design was completed. But the consensus Monday night was that "we have a moral obligation to pay it and it might as well be paid now."

The \$155,000 which was borrowed for the pool was invested in two certificates of deposit with an Oct. 7 due date. One is for \$20,000, the other for \$135,000.

In other action, the board approved a tuition contract with Charles Algiers of Campbellsport under which his daughter will attend kindergarten in Kewaskum. Campbellsport does not have a kindergarten. The contract stipulates tuition costs of \$35 per month for ten months. The parents will provide transportation.

Also approved was a resolution addressed to the State Legislature stating that "whereas the constitution of the U. S. and the statutes of the state of Wis. have placed the responsibility for education at the State Dept. of Public Instruction and practices in public schools, and by designating local school board members as officers of the state, and

Whereas, the local property tax is felt to be an inequitable tax since it does not necessarily tax citizens according to their ability to pay, and further, may tend to discourage property improvements, and

Whereas, said local property tax is contributing a greater and more disproportionate share to the Kewaskum Community Schools budget (66% in 1969-70 and 70.5% in 1970-71).

Be it resolved that the Kewaskum Community Schools, Joint District No. 2 School Board, on behalf of the citizens of the district, protest this inequity and urges that the State Legislature take immediate steps, at its next session, to remove these inequities and to consider the eventual abolition of the local property tax as the primary source of financial support for public education."

The bid of Schaezel Oil Co. to provide fuel oil to all schools in the district at 13.5 cents per gallon was accepted. Also approved was a contract for Hollis Kirk Erdmann to teach vocal music.

The next meeting of the board will be at 8 p. m. Monday.

Local Residents Hurt in Mishaps

William L. Gruhle, 24, of R. 1, Kewaskum, suffered a facial cut when his car rolled over on County Trunk V, 2 1/2 miles south of Eden, late Sunday night.

Gruhle told Fond du Lac county officers that he must have fallen asleep at the wheel of the auto to which was wrecked in the accident. The car left the road, hit a fence and rolled over two or three times, police said. Gruhle was alone at the time.

Jeanne A. Staehler of Kewaskum suffered facial and hand cuts and was advised to see a physician after an 8:05 p. m. accident Tuesday about three miles north of Kewaskum on County Trunk V near the Hefter auto salvage yard. Her daughter, Christine, a passenger in the car, escaped injury but suffered from shock.

The driver told officers that a horse ran directly into the side of her car. The animal, a riding horse owned by Harold Schlosser of Kewaskum, was killed in the accident. Mrs. Staehler and daughter were fortunate in escaping more serious injury from flying glass. Her auto was quite badly damaged.

David R. Jacak, R. 3, Campbellsport, in the crossing the railroad tracks on the Auburn-Ashford town road at 3:42 p. m. Sunday, lost control of his car, which left the road and struck a metal culvert and fence. The mishap occurred 4 1/2 miles north of Kewaskum.

Village to Borrow \$65,000 to Finance 18th Annual Municipal Garage Turkey Shoot This Sunday

Arrangements to borrow \$65,000 to finance construction of a municipal garage, currently underway, were announced at the Monday night regular meeting of the village board. The funds will be borrowed through the Bank of Kewaskum in the form of a mortgage note or notes over a period of ten years or less. A resolution to that effect will be presented to the board at an adjourned meeting next Monday night.

Also, at that meeting, the village trustees will meet with a representative of Channer-Newman, a financing consultant firm of Chicago, regarding financing the cost of proposed expansion of the village sewage treatment plant. Those plans are awaiting state approval.

The plat as accepted by Robert Kirst in behalf of Schulz Realty of Fond du Lac. The plat calls for reducing the size of 11 lots in Bel-Ric Acres purchased by Schulz Realty from Myron Eelger. The smallest lot will be 60 by 165 feet, the largest 84 by 155 feet.

Police Chief Donald Hlavaty presented information on a state-funded training program for police personnel in any one of 12 approved training stations in the state. The number of hours of training vary from department to department but while in attendance, the officer would be reimbursed by the state for wages lost, travel expense to the training session plus cost of meals, tuition and books.

That will also be presented for board action in the form of a resolution at Monday's meeting.

A purchase order was approved in the amount of \$205 to enable the Wisconsin Electric Power Co. to install underground service to the new municipal garage. Also authorized was advertising of bids for a complete unit garbage truck.

A building permit was approved for Russell Krueger to construct a residence on River View Drive for Edwin Frohman, Kewaskum.

James Elder of the engineering firm of Stone and Robinson gave a progress report on the municipal garage. There has been a delay due to the fact that the rain has prevented the plumber from completing his work. The steel girders are up and as soon as primary work is finished, the construction will move along.

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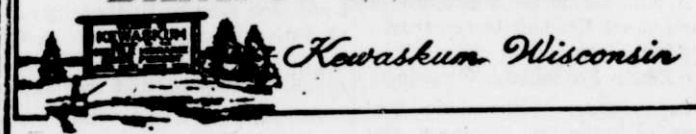

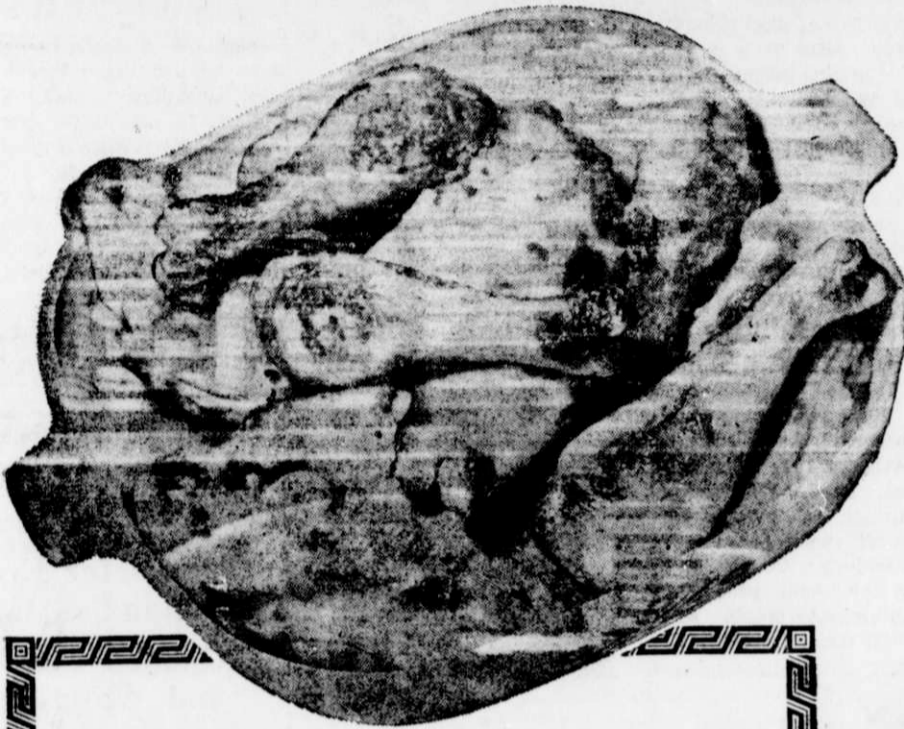

The principal stockholders of the new corporation are James O. Reigle, president, and L. N. Peterson, secretary-treasurer. Both are from Massillon, Ohio. The new corporation will continue government work and plans on going into the aluminum utensil business after the war. The new owners intend to expand the plant and build an addition. The Kewaskum Aluminum Co. was incorporated Oct. 4, 1919.

Mrs. John F. Schaefer announced the engagement of her daughter,

Kathleen Elizabeth, to Cpl. Paul Kral, son of John Kral.

A total of 77 men from Washington County left to report for induction into the armed forces. The group included two from Kewaskum and five from the Town of Wayne. They included Joe Rossman Jr., T. school 25 years ago). The enrollment in the grades is 103. There are 43 freshmen. The enrollment at Holy Trinity School is 91.

William F. Schaefer of Kewaskum has become the new owner of the Bird Trucking Co. which operates interstate out of Green Bay. Schaefer purchased the business from Mrs. J. C. Bird. Schaefer also operates a trucking line in Kewaskum.

Relatives here received word of the death of Mike Braun of Wabeno, a native of the Town of Kewaskum. His wife is the former Tillie Schaefer of Kewaskum.

Terlinden .585, Schleif .585, Thom .500, Roesel .500, M. Mertes .500, and L. Terlinden .355. Can you imagine "Toot" being the lowest batter on the team with a .355 average? 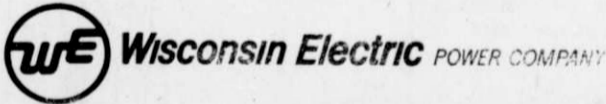

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Indian Fumbles Give Sheboygan Falls 19-6 Win

FACE POWERFUL MAYVILLE IN LOOP OPENER TONIGHT

In a non-conference game at Sheboygan Falls Friday night, the Kewaskum Indians learned the hard way that no matter how much you outgain your opponent you can't win with fumbles and interceptions. The final score was 19-6 in favor of the Falcons of Falls.

In the statistics the Indians had it all over Falls, but games are won on points. Kewaskum out-gained the Falcons by a wide margin, 340 yards to 157 but fumbles and interceptions plagued them on this night of frustration.

Against a fairly small but quick Falls team, Kewaskum started out like they did in their easy victory over Campbellsport the week before. They scored early in the first quarter. The defense held Falls on their first series and after a short punt, the Indians gained possession on the Falcons' 32. Shortly after quarterback Mike "Joe Namath" Doherty flipped an 11 yard scoring pass to end Bob Mertz. Clark Eichstedt's kick sailed wide and Kewaskum had a 6-0 lead.

The Falcons were forced to punt again and before you knew it the Indians were threatening once again. Doherty carried close to the goal line but an illegal procedure penalty moved the ball back to the 10 and the drive stalled.

Then came the fatal second quarter, in which Falls scored all their points and decided the ball game. Going against the wind, Kewaskum made its first big mistake when Doherty fumbled on his own 14. After 3 downs, and with a fourth and seven, an 8 yard pass to their big 6 ft. 6 in. end gave Falls a first and goal. Craig Melger scored from the three and a partially blocked ball that still went through the uprights put the Falcons ahead, 7-6.

Before long, another fumble set

up another touchdown for Falls. Their big end took a 27 yard pass for the score. Defender Rod Czerwonka had him covered but was too short to knock the ball away. The try for conversion was short and the score remained 13-6. With the quarter running out Kewaskum tried to ring up another score and possibly tie the game. Doherty's pass was intercepted by Dirk Hudson and carried back about 65 yards for a third Falls TD. The try for conversion was stopped and the half ended, 19-6. There was no scoring in the second half and this is where the score remained.

In the second half the Indians continued to roll up yards but just couldn't score. They gained 169 yards to the Falcons' 47 but all of them were between the end zones. Bob Krahn did a large share of the running in the second half to the point where the Falls defenders anticipated it. A third quarter Indian drive was stopped on the 15 and when the game ended Kewaskum was on the Falcons' 5 yard line but time ran out. It was one of those nights.

Krahn gained 135 yards and was followed closely by Rod Czerwonka with 115. The defense did another commendable job, holding ace back Hudson to just 27 yards rushing. He had gained 170 yards the week before against Sturgeon Bay.

The Cardinals are unscored upon, no team yet crossing their goal while they were running up 59 points themselves in two games. Some indication of Mayville's strength can be gained from the

fact that they clobbered Horicon 23-0, and then Horicon went on to defeat North Fondy, the team that was picked to win the Flyway Conference title, 26-14, last week. A comparison would make Mayville 35 points better than North Fondy, Flyway favorites. The Cardinals' strong points are a good passing game, solid running and a stout defense. What else is there?

Steve Backhaus came limping in 8th place to become Kewaskum's first runner to cross the finish line after Lomira's Bob Sampson and Campbellsport's Glen Stommel had waged an exciting duel for first. Sampson finally won in a time of 13:08, a course record for 2.45 miles. Kewaskum's other top finishers were Gordon Darmody 13th, Steve Bremser 14th, John Backhaus 16th and Dennis Smith 22nd.

Campbellsport also won the JV race with 21 points. Tom Zehren was Kewaskum's first JV to finish when he came in 5th.
