## New 50 Home Building Project in Progress in Kewaskum

### Development by Five Milwaukee Builders First of Kind Anywhere

HOMES WILL BE BUILT IN BEL-RIC ACRES; 5 MODELS WILL BE SHOWN

A collaborated building project among five Milwaukee builders, the first of its kind anywhere, is in the offing for Kewaskum. The project involves 50 homes in Bel-Ric Acres.

The homes will be built on family priorities under the Farmers Home Administration plan with federally-subsidized interest rates to aid families in buying a home.

Linus Murray, who heads one of the firms, met with the village board during an adjourned meeting Monday night and said each of the builders is committed to put up a model home plus nine more. The firms are banded together under the name of Metropolitan Builders Association.

Jan. 20 is the target date. Murray said for the five models to be shown in a "parade of homes."

"Our restrictions are such," he continued, "that there will be no two homes alike, opposite each other or alongside each other."

The village board will be asked to approve the necessary building permits after the state gives its approval to replatting of the lots involved as requested by and at the expense of the builders. In the replat, lots will be reduced in size from a present 100 foot average width to about 70 feet.

Representatives of this same builders group appeared before the village board in June asking sanction of a building project on the same subdivision, but under the Federal Housing Authority's FHA-235 plan. That plan had to be abandoned, according to Murray, because one home already had been built in Bel-Ric Acres under the Farmers Home Administration and the two agencies will not mix. All homes must either be Farmers Home or FHA-235.

"I am real disappointed we couldn't go 235," Murray said, but added that the home built under Farmers Home is an upgraded type and will produce a better subdivision. The plans call for a garage and 1½ baths while the requirement for FHA-235 is that all homes be built initially without a garage and with only one bath.

On the question of when the group would be able to pay for bringing sewer and water facilities to the lots, Murray replied that they have a letter of credit for \$50,000 from a Milwaukee bank.

Also appearing was a representative of Channer-Newman Securities Co., Chicago, who as requested by the board offered guidelines for financing the cost of expansion to the village sewage treatment plant, currently estimated at \$375,000.

James Elder, consulting engineer, said the initial estimate was \$190,000 but to meet state requirements, provisions for phosphate removal had to be included; four

aeration tanks were called for instead of the planned one; and more blowers and other equipment had to be added.

"We expect to get a total of 75 per cent of the cost from state and federal aids," Elder said. "Right now we are waiting for the state's final approval of plans."

The securities representative said that a municipality's borrowing limits are based on its equalized valuation, and that with a valuation of almost \$21 million, Kewaskum "has plenty of room to borrow."

He said there are three borrowing options, promissory notes, general obligation bonds and revenue bonds. He recommended the notes because of flexibility, being the cheapest and the repayment privileges that are on the same basis as an amortized mortgage. The village will seek bids, interest-wise.

In other action, a resolution was adopted authorizing the borrowing of \$65,000 on a 10-payment promissory note from the Bank of Kewaskum at five and one half per cent interest to finance the municipal garage under construction.

Also approved was a building permit for Harry Koch to remove the one car garage and erect a two car garage at his residence and one for Lloyd Hron to build a garage at the east side of his home.

An operator's license was approved for George Gavin, 137 Main St.

### Record Crowd of Over 10,000 People At Turkey Shoot

EVENT BIG SUCCESS; MORE THAN 500 TURKEYS BAGGED

The 18th annual Kewaskum Turkey Shoot held at the Bar-N Dude Ranch Sunday is believed to be the largest in the history of the event. The shoot drew a record crowd of more than 10,000 people from throughout the state and neighboring states and shooters killed more than 500 turkeys on the 34 lanes with live targets, not to mention many more taken in the five artificial lanes, bow and arrow shoot, trap shoot, sausage shoot and pistol shoot.

Club members felt the great amount of statewide publicity given to the controversy surrounding the shoot before the event and in the past helped draw a record crowd. This year's shoot again proved big news as area metropolitan daily newspapers and others splashed pictures and stories on the shoot over their front pages. One Milwaukee daily on Monday morning carried a huge 6-column photo and news item that filled half of the front page, taking precedent over national and international news. Another paper carried a full page of pictures taken at the shoot.

Warm, sunny weather also helped make the event a great success. There was no opposition or demonstrations as everything went along smoothly, despite the fact that heavy opposition had been levelled against the shoot's alleged cruelty to animals. Marksmen shoot at the turkeys with 22 rifles at a distance of 80 yards. Only the turkeys' heads are visible above the bunkers. The ranch was posted against demonstrations and picketing. Turkeys were reported hit at a rate of one every 30 seconds.

The club expected to gross about \$16,000 on the shoot, of which approximately \$10,000 would be profit. The profits are used for civic projects in Kewaskum and area.

By far shooters preferred the lanes with live targets rather than the five with artificial targets. The ones with live turkeys were kept busy while those with dummy heads were idle quite a bit of the time. The shoot has been under criticism as being inhumane, with a protest suit being filed in a Fond du Lac county court. A hearing is scheduled for Friday. Kiwanis International will also review its policy toward the event and the local club Oct. 1 in Chicago. The Kewaskum Club maintains that there's nothing wrong with the shoot either legally or morally and they are not about to back down.

Representatives of the press were intercepted and no cameras were allowed in the pits. However, reporters who requested so were escorted there.

### Indians Mauled By Power-Packed Mayville, 36-0

FIRST HOME GAME WITH  
GERMANTOWN TONIGHT

It was the Kewaskum Indians' misfortune that they had to take on powerful Mayville (a new team in the conference formerly of the Northern Little Ten) in their first Scenic Moraine game there Friday night. The Cardinal juggernaut rolled over the Indians unmercifully by a 36-0 score.

The Mayville football machine

has not been defeated nor have they been scored upon as yet. They have rolled up an amazing 95 points in three games against good opponents while no team has yet crossed their goal. The Cardinals blanked Horicon, 23-0, battered New Holstein, 36-0, and in their latest scoring romp, shut out Kewaskum, also 36-0. One thing in the Indians' favor is that they have this game out of the way and won't have to face Mayville again, while all of the other conference teams do. The Cardinals and Grafton were picked as favorites but from what we saw at Mayville we can't see any team beating the Big Red.

Not only is Mayville big but they are tough as some of the injured Indians found out. They also have speed, good passing, solid running and a real stout defense. John Beauprey scored 3 touchdowns for Mayville and gained almost 100 yards rushing. Quarterback Glen Loest completed over 70% of his passes to maintain his average, and ran for 130 yards.

The Cardinals scored early with Loest running over from the 5 after a sustained drive. The Indians drove back but it ended when Bob Krahn fumbled on the Cards' 30. With Beauprey doing most of the

running behind the blocking of 205 lb. fullback Jeff Stieve, Mayville controlled the ball.

In the second quarter Mayville scored on a 1 yard run by Beauprey and on a 16 yard fieldgoal by Paul Kurtz, an excellent high school kicker. The extra point try was blocked.

In the second half the Indians were able to halt Mayville's strong running attack for a while but the Cardinals scored on some long plays. Beauprey ran one for 27 yards, took a pass from Loest for a 38 yarder and Loest passed to Kurt Kuehl for a 33 yard score.
