State Will Repair Unsatisfactory Laid Bituminous Street in Village

WORK TO BE DONE AT NO EXPENSE TO VILLAGE

The village board Monday night heard a report from its public works committee that it has met with representatives of the State Highway Department regarding the unsatisfactory bituminous concrete laid on Main St. in August.

Weather permitting, the portions that have broken up will be given a three-quarter inch coating this week, at no expense to the village. It will be applied, curb to curb, from the railroad crossing to Fond du Lac Ave. and 11 feet on either side of the center line from the railroad crossing to the bridge.

Myron Belger, subdivider of Bel-Ric Acres, appeared to ask when he can expect sewer and water facilities. He was told the board will act when he presents the approved revised plat which he is currently having prepared to reduce lot sizes. Bids can then be called for on the entire project and the cost will be broken down to a per foot cost.

Meanwhile, each lot owner must come up with a commitment of how he plans to pay the sewer and water frontage charges. Total project costs have been estimated at \$177,000 of which \$37,000 is the obligation of the village for a lift station and force mains.

On recommendation of Village Attorney Roger McKenna, the board approved having the assistant district attorney of Washington County prosecute the village traffic cases in Washington County court. Previously McKenna was prosecutor.

Police Chief Donald Hlavaty suggested the board consider acquiring a new police car every year instead of every two and that it also consider a lease plan.

Permission was granted to Village President C. N. Wietor and Village Commissioner William Martin to attend the League of Wisconsin Municipalities conference at Madison Oct. 21-23 and to Peter Albers, sewage plant operator, to attend a conference in Beloit Oct. 28-30. Purchase of a used tractor-mower from Washington County was authorized.

An operator's license was approved for Marvin Perkins as was a building permit for Donald Ritter to make an addition to a garage at his residence at 612 Highland.

Accepted was Edward Braatz's proposal to tear down the red barn that stands on village property near the entrance to Regal Ware's office complex. His \$50 offer was the best of two received.

Jack Tessar, 16, Is Injured in Hunting Mishap

YOUTH SHOT IN RIGHT LEG WHEN SHOTGUN DISCHARGES

A 16-year-old Kewaskum youth, Jack Tessar, son of Mr. and Mrs. Allen Tessar of 1325 Brooklane Drive, was injured in a hunting accident at 3:30 p. m. Saturday near New Fane.

Tessar, who suffered severe right leg injuries when the 12-gauge shotgun of a hunting companion discharged accidentally, was reported to be in good condition by his mother in a late check made with her Thursday afternoon.

Lee Schultz, 16, son of Mr. and Mrs. Leonard Schultz, R. 1, Kewaskum, another hunting companion, was also struck in the leg with shot but only by a few pellets.

The three boys had been hunting together all day, and Tessar was in the middle and Schultz in front when the accident occurred.

After the mishap, Schultz ran to the Walter Heberer farm and called the Kewaskum firemen's ambulance. The injured youths were taken to St. Joseph's Community Hospital, West Bend, where Schultz was treated and released. Tessar is expected to be a patient there for about three weeks, and will be laid up for probably six to eight weeks.

Red Cross Drive To Begin Oct. 12

Turkey Shoot Case Dismissed

Circuit Judge Jerold E. Murphy last Friday dismissed court action in circuit court at Fond du Lac to halt the annual Kewaskum Kiwanis five turkey shoot.

Earlier, David L. Walther, attorney for Jay G. Sykes, unsuccessful Democratic candidate for lieutenant governor, withdrew a request for an injunction to halt the turkey shoot, held Sept. 20, since the shoot had already taken place, but requested that the court make an adjudication as to the legality of the shoot.

Judge Murphy also ordered Sykes to reimburse James D. Reigle and John Battaglia, both members of the Kiwanis Club, \$50 each for court costs involved in the hearing. The suit has been instituted against Battaglia, president of the Kiwanis Club when the shoot was held, Reigle, a member, and "John Doe", owner of the Bar-N Dude Ranch, where the shoot was held.

Sykes attended the hearing but left right after the decision without making a statement. Atty. Walther said he was seeking a decision as to whether the turkey shoot constituted a violation of state law under the public nuisance law.

Attorneys S. Ted Hitzler and John W. Mickiewicz of Fond du Lac represented Reigle and Battaglia. Hitzler questioned the difference between a turkey shoot on a state-licensed game farm or state licensed trapping in regard to the point that the turkey shooting constitutes cruelty to animals. Walther contended that the difference lies in the fact that the turkey shoot birds are restrained and have their heads "propped up."



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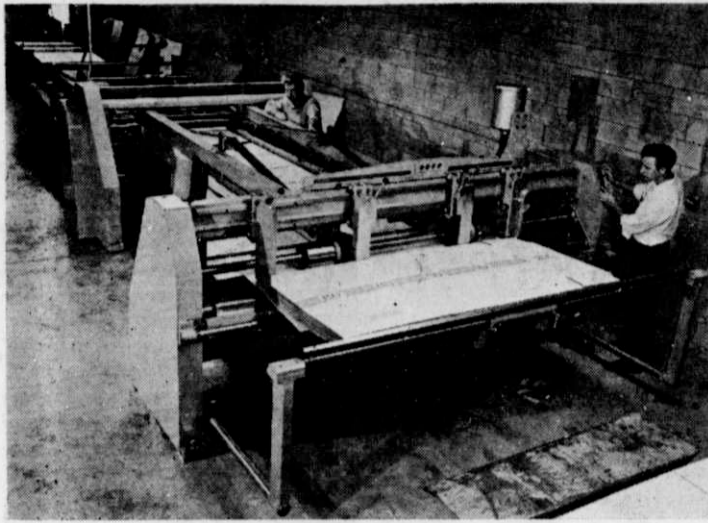

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Indians Bomb Grafton by 40-14 Score

DOHERTY SCORES 4 TD'S IN ROMP OVER CHAMPIONS

The Kewaskum Indians waited a year for this one after last year's 6-6 tie with Grafton cost them a share of the Scenic title, and they were really out to beat the Blackhawks here Friday night. They succeeded in unexpected fashion, walloping Grafton by a one-sided 40-14 score.

It was the Indians' first win over Grafton in football in nine years, although some of the games have been close and a keen rivalry has developed between these schools in sports. The Indians blasted Grafton even worse than Mayville's undefeated powerhouse did. Mayville, which trashed Kewaskum badly, beat the Blackhawks by 16 points, 34-18, while Kewaskum routed them by 28 points. The Indians put everything together Friday and came up with their best game of the season.

Kewaskum scored six touchdowns, four of them by quarterback Mike Doherty, who ran for 140 yards in 11 carries to star on offense. The Indians ran up 400 total yards, 272 of them on the ground, while holding Grafton to 254. But the defense was also a strong point, playing an outstanding game. They forced Grafton to fumble 4 times, intercepted 3 passes and blocked a punt for 8 turnovers.

Losing the toss again, the inspired Indians held Grafton on the first series of downs. They took over the punted ball on their own 21 yard line and marched 79 yards for a score with Doherty taking it over himself from the one after 7 first downs and 3 out of 3 pass completions. Clark Eichstedt's kick sailed wide but the Indians were ahead to stay.

After holding the Blackhawks again and forcing another punt, Doherty engineered a 46 yard drive and then scored from the 2. A pass to Mertz gained 2 points and made it 14-0. Later in the second quarter Grafton's John Prinz dove over from the one for a TD and they passed for a 2 point conversion.

This cut the Indians' margin to 14-8 but before long Bob Krahn scored from the 5 after the offense took the ball 45 yards in 5 plays and the halftime score was 20-8.

In the second half the Indians received and in just 5 plays scored a touchdown. A tremendous catch by Joe Backhaus gave them a first down on Grafton's 39. Doherty ran outside on the next play and went all the way. The conversion failed and it was 26-8.

Only one play after kicking off, defensive tackle Jim Schmidt picked off a Grafton pass and ran 20 yards into the end zone as the fans went wild. A kick failed and it was 32-8. Schmidt, a junior, played one of the best games ever turned in by a defensive tackle.

Grafton scored again in the 3rd quarter on a pass from Harry DeLeeuw to John Adams. On the conversion attempt, Schmidt dropped the ball carrier 10 yards behind the line of scrimmage. DeLeeuw had led the conference in scoring before this game.

But the Indians weren't finished yet. First though the referee pulled the "boo boo" of the year, which really riled up the players and fans. On the 40 Doherty faked the ball to Rod Czerwonka going

into the center of the line but instead pitched back to Krahn. The ref fell for the fake and blew his whistle, while at the same time Krahn raced down the sideline on a 60 yard run all the way into the end zone. The referee's blunder nullified the TD. But the determined Indians started again from the 40 and scored anyway with Doherty taking it in from the 10. A pass to Bob Mertz was complete to make it 40-14.

It was a team effort all the way for the Indians. The offensive line did a great job of outchargin' the bigger Blackhawks. Backhaus did a fine job of blocking for the other backs.

2 Local Teachers At Driver Safety Education Institute

More than 103 teachers and administrators, including Earl Buswell and John Thalacker of the local school district, attended a driver and traffic safety education inservice institute held Sept. 19 at Milwaukee. The inservice workshop, which is coordinated and sponsored by the Wisconsin Department of Public Instruction with assistance from the Wisconsin Driver and Traffic Safety Education Association, was held to improve driver education teaching methods and content in both the classroom and on-street laboratory driving instruction. Milwaukee was one of nine Wisconsin communities selected to host a 1970 regional inservice workshop program.

The theme of the 1970 program focused on the new, revised Wisconsin Driver and Traffic Safety Education Curriculum Guide. The afternoon program session consisted of a discussion of one unit from the Guide, "Alcohol and Traffic Safety." The presenter and group discussion leader was Dr. William T. Richards of the DPI. The members of the DPI Alcohol Workshop conducted at La Crosse State University in July-August, 1970, participated with Dr. Richards. All of Wisconsin's 421 public high schools and one-third of the 88 non-public secondary schools have a state approved complete driver education program.

I. Russell Hutter, Driver Education and Traffic Safety Consultant of the State Department, is coordinator of this Wisconsin inservice program.

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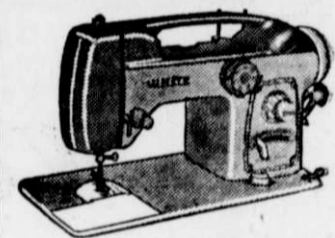
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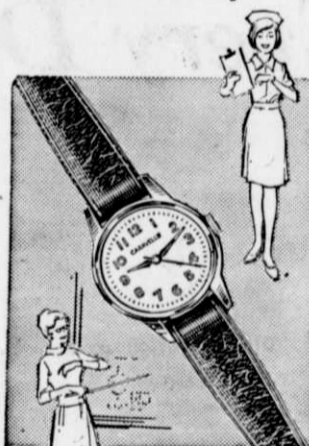
