## Citizens Building Committee Of School District to Meet

### BEECHWOOD SCHOOL SEPTIC SYSTEM EMERGENCY EXISTS

Electors of the Kewaskum Community Schools district who wish to serve on a citizens advisory building committee must make their intent known to Supt. Marshall Boyd or be present when the committee holds its first meeting at 8 p. m. next Monday, the board of education decided Monday night.

The meeting will be a joint one between the committee and the school board and will be held in Boyd's office. To date, six persons have responded to the board's request for volunteers. They are: Tom Gundrum, R. 6, West Bend; Earl Howell, R. 1, Cascade; Melvin Moths, R. 1, Kewaskum; Mrs. Alvin Panzer, R. 2, Kewaskum; Ray Schaefer, R. 2, Kewaskum, and Howard Zemlicka, 1527 Stark St., Kewaskum.

The committee will function in connection with a proposed long-range building program that was explained at the annual meeting but on which no action has been called for.

As a matter of information, Boyd told the board that an emergency exists in the septic system at the Beechwood School. "It has been necessary to pump the sewage and if things get worse, we'll have to close school," he said. An addition to the building since the septic system was put in, plus installation of a dishwasher have led to the problem, Boyd explained.

He said percolation tests have been taken and a plan calling for a 50 by 50 foot filter bed awaits state approval. The project could run to about \$4,000, he said.

Boyd also told the board that the school district has not been receiving a monthly fee due it from the various townships for each mobile home located within each township. Based on the previous year's tax rate, the fee is to be paid on the tenth day of every month. A sum up to \$5,000 per year is involved. "So far we haven't received anything," Boyd said.

He added that the respective assessors know the fees must be paid. The state regulation went into effect May 1. The board decided a letter be sent to each assessor.

The bid of Century Fence of Waukesha to erect a fence on the south side of the Kewaskum Elementary grounds at a cost of \$1,989 was accepted. A contract was approved for Mrs. Beth L. Leutenegger, Thiensville, a speech therapist. She will serve the district three days per week. In previous years, the district contracted such services through CESA but this year CESA did not provide a speech therapist.

The board adopted a resolution of appreciation to the Robert G. Romaine American Legion Post for the lighted flag pole and American flag it donated and for the impressive patriotic ceremonies the post members conduct at home football and basketball games.

After second readings, the board

adopted three policies that have to do with board meetings. One reads that "the school board shall normally meet twice a month, the first meeting to be on the second Monday of four-Monday months or the third Monday of five-Monday months. The second meeting will be held on the last Monday unless rescheduled at the previous board meeting."

Another policy reads that the president shall call a special meeting when so requested by two members. The president may call a special meeting whenever he or the superintendent considers such a meeting desirable.

The third policy deals with "public participation at board meetings" and states that the meetings are open to the public and it is encouraged to attend. "The public will be excluded when matters pertaining to personnel, property or other matters which may be discussed in executive session according to Wisconsin statutes are before the board."

The policy continues that executive sessions will normally be held at the conclusion of regular meetings; their purpose will be announced and no formal business will be transacted.

Persons having business for board consideration shall present it in writing to the superintendent or board director one week before a regular meeting so that proper information is available for discussion. Such properly submitted items shall be placed on the agenda.

At the conclusion of the regular business meeting, the director may ask for questions or comments from any visitors present. The director may limit these comments to a specified amount of time. Except in emergencies, the board shall not attempt to decide upon any question before examining and evaluating any information any person requests the board to consider, the policy concludes.

The next meeting of the board of education will be held at 8 p. m. on Oct. 26.

## 942 Vehicles, 113 Pedestrians Per Hour Warrant Traffic Signals Here

New automatic traffic signals were installed and went into operation at the intersection of Main St. and Fond du Lac Ave. (Hwys. 28 and 45) recently. A quick count we made showed a total of 14 signals at the crossing, including 8 "stop and go" signals (2 of them overhead standards) and 6 "walk" signals. During school pedestrian hours, a crossing guard is also on duty to assist the children.

The signals were installed at no expense to the village other than the cost of replacing concrete roadway and sidewalk disturbed in laying underground controls. They operate on an electrical timer and there are "walk" buttons for pedestrians. A push of the button stops traffic. The signals necessitated the elimination of several parking stalls at the intersection.

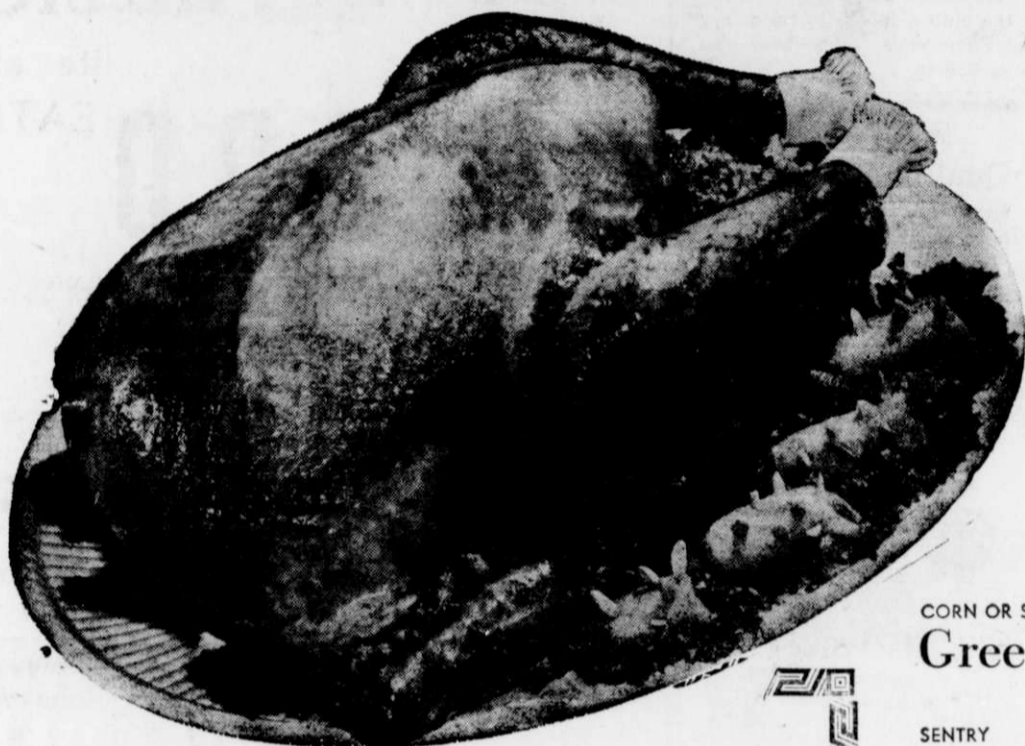

Elmo Lehman Rosenheimer, 69, of Cedar Lake, a native of Kewaskum, and president of the Bank of Jackson and the State Bank of Fredonia, died at St. Mary's Hospital, Milwaukee, on Sunday evening, Oct. 11. He had been hospitalized there for three weeks.

Mr. Rosenheimer was born in Kewaskum on Dec. 19, 1900, a son of the late Mr. and Mrs. David M. Rosenheimer. He married Isabel Farley and they lived in Jackson, later moving to Cedar Lake. After the death of his first wife, he married Mildred Riemenschneider on Dec. 29, 1965 at

Wauwatosa, who survives him. Surviving further are a daughter, Jane M. (Mrs. Frederick C. Kasten) and a son, James E., both of Cedar Lake; five grandchildren, a son-in-law, a daughter-in-law, two brothers, Ralph M. Rosenheimer of Milwaukee and Henry B. Rosenheimer of Kewaskum; two sisters, Doris Mae Blake of Kirkland, Ill. and Retha Jane (Mrs. Robert Mason) of Chicago; nieces and nephews, a stepson, Richard Riemenschneider, and his children of Middleburg, Va.

Mr. Rosenheimer served as an officer of the Ozaukee County Banking Association and the Washington County Banking Association. He was a member of the Jackson Businessmen's Association and the Fredonia Advancement Association, also an active

member of West Bend Lodge No. 138, F & A M and of Tripoli Shrine, Milwaukee.

Mr. Rosenheimer was an ardent sportsman, mainly in boating and skiing. Last year with his son James he participated in the Cedar Lake Yacht Club race on their Class E boat. He was a member of the Milwaukee Ski Club and had traveled extensively throughout Europe and the United States visit-

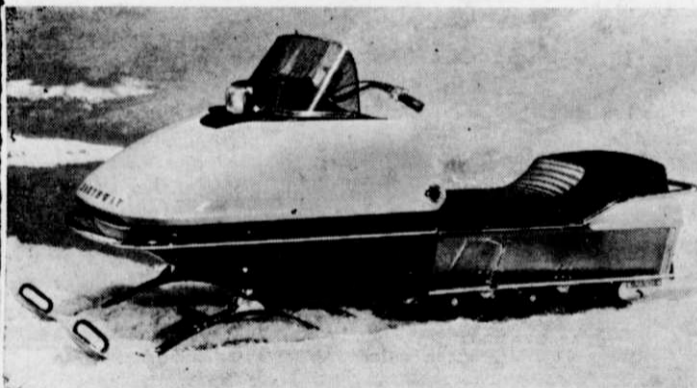

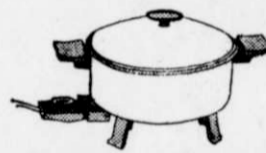

The overall individual winner was Steve Sperry of Albany, who won the No. 3 race in 14:09.9. Albany completely dominated the division as their No. 2 runner, Ron Setzer, finished second.

Baraboo won the big schools division with 70:27.6. Their leading runner, Al Adams, won in 13:24.7. Kettle Moraine, a small school, elected to compete with the big schools and finished 2nd with 70:58.9. The Lasers, of the Scenic Moraine conference, have shown more and more, lately that they could be a strong bet to take the state championship.

Saturday, Oct. 10, Kewaskum participated in another relay

meet, the Fondy Relays, at Fond du Lac.

Kewaskum picked up two important Scenic Moraine victories last Tuesday at the Scenic View Golf Course outside of Slinger. They defeated Pewaukee, 19-43, and Slinger, 15-45, in a double dual meet. Slinger took the Pirates, 22-37. Steve Backhaus won the 2.5 mile course in 14:28, despite losing about half a minute trying to find his way after he got lost. This incident allowed Pewaukee's Jim Garesch to finish only 4 seconds behind. Kewaskum gained the easy win by also taking places 3rd through 6th. **Mail Holiday Parcels Early**

Postmaster Harry E. Koch announced today that parcel post customers will have an opportunity to save money by mailing holiday packages early.

Previously approved increases of 15.4 per cent on fourth-class parcels and a 6 per cent on catalogs do not become effective until Nov. 14, 1970. Servicemen's families and other early Christmas mailers will be able to dispatch their parcels at the lower rates if they mail before Nov. 14.

To insure overseas delivery before Dec. 25, Postmaster Koch recommends the following mailing dates:

For surface parcels—Oct. 16 through Nov. 7.

For SAM parcels (airlifted overseas on a space-available basis with a five-pound limit)—Oct. 19 through Nov. 21, and

For PAL parcels (airlifted all the way on a space-available basis with a thirty-pound limit and a one dollar surcharge)—Oct. 26 through Nov. 28.
