Five Men Appointed to Village's Zoning Code Planning Commission

BOARD ACCEPTS BID FOR REFUSE PACKER

Village President Cyril Wietor appointed five local men to what will be a seven-member Planning Commission for the Village of Kewaskum when the village board met in adjourned session Monday night.

Appointed were Earl DuBois, L. N. Peterson, Roger Strack, Charles Schultz and Wayland Tessar. According to a village ordinance, Wietor, as village president, automatically becomes chairman. The seventh member will be a village board member to be appointed by Wietor. There was no response to his request for a volunteer. The Planning Commission will be asked to draw up a zoning code for the village. Wietor made his appointments from names he asked the board members to suggest.

In other action, separate bids were opened for a truck chassis and a garbage packer. No action was taken on the truck bids. They will be studied and the board will let the bid at an adjourned meeting at 5 p. m. next Monday.

The bids received were from: Seefeld Motors, West Bend, \$5,750 for a 197-inch wheel base or \$5,695 for a 175 inch base; Cooley's, Inc., West Bend, \$5,325 with no specified wheel base; Ho-neck Chevrolet, Kewaskum, \$5,975 for a 167-inch wheel base; and Stocker Ford, West Bend, \$8,390 for a 184-inch wheel base or \$5,649 for a 174-inch base.

The board accepted the higher of two bids received for a refuse packer. Brake and Equipment Co. of Milwaukee, submitted the low bid of \$5,957 for a Heil Mark III unit but because the village is presently using a Leach packer and its crews are familiar with its operation, the bid of Bruce Municipal Equipment Co., of Milwaukee of \$6,296.80 for a Leach Packmaster was accepted. It is to carry a one year warranty on parts and labor.

Appearing before the board was Larry M. Serbin of Springsted, Inc., a St. Paul, Minn. bond consulting firm. He told of the services his firm can offer the village in handling a \$400,000 bonding issue for expansion to the village sewage treatment plant.

For a fee of \$4,120 he said his firm will prepare a preliminary economic analysis; submit bond sale recommendations; prepare and distribute 300 prospectus describing the bond issue and it will handle the sale of bonds. His firm will act as liaison between the village and potential bond buyers to obtain for the village the lowest possible interest rate. No action was taken.

Woman Suffers Minor Burns In Grease Fire

Kewaskum firemen answered two calls this week, one of them being a porch blaze and the other a grease fire in which a housewife suffered minor burns.

The first call came at 1:35 p. m. Sunday when a small porch leading into a rear door of the Burckhardt Electric building on Main St. burned. The blaze was first noticed by persons attending an auction at the John Kuehl home on the same block who saw smoke at the rear of the building. Chief Lyle Herman of the Kohlsville Fire Department reported the fire to Chief Armin Oppermann of Kewaskum, both of whom were at the auction. Almost the entire wooden porch was charred and burned. Firemen tore loose the porch from the building and doused the flames. Chief Oppermann reported he has no doubt the fire was started by children. There was some smoke inside the Burckhardt store.

The fire department responded to a call at 10:15 a. m. Thursday to the Tory Russell home just north of the village limits, where a pan of grease on the stove was left unattended momentarily, became overheated and caught fire. A cabinet above the stove was charred by the flames and Mrs. Russell suffered minor burns on her face and hands in removing the burning pan. The home was filled with smoke and firemen used their ejector to remove same. There was no further damage.

Attends Highway
Safety Meeting**

Miss Honora Ann Norton, 9045 Forest View Road, Kewaskum, recently attended a highway safety meeting at Beechcliff, the home of Atty. and Mrs. Jacob A. Fessler, 4925 Denwood Drive, Sheboygan. Mrs. Fessler was hostess at the meeting and the brunch that followed. She is president of the Wisconsin Association of Woman Highway Safety Leaders, Inc.

Representatives of many women's civic organizations were present as a steering committee for the formation of a Sixth District branch of the Wisconsin Association of Woman Highway Safety Leaders, Inc. Miss Norton was secretary pro tem for the meeting.

The thirteen women at the meeting were given information of how the newly organized WAWHSL had its start last November at Port Washington. Miss Norton attended a WAWHSL Spring Conference, which was solely devoted to furthering traffic safety, this March at Wingspread Conference Center, Racine area.

Discussions at the safety meeting were about emergency medical services, ambulance needs in the Sixth Congressional District,

expressway driving, defensive driving, pedestrian safety. Uniform traffic lights and directions would facilitate safety in driving. Safety concerning children eg. city children who walk on country roads. There was concern about children driving farm vehicles and tractors on highways. These children often are not yet 16 years and do not qualify for a driver's license.

Some of the women mentioned what is being done, concerning traffic safety, in their respective localities. All expressed a desire to have counties submit their needs for a total safety program.

Miss Norton plans to attend the WAWHSL's first annual meeting and highway safety conference at Madison later this October. Its theme is "Women Exploring Safety Priorities." The Honorable Warren P. Knowles, Governor of Wisconsin; Dr. Frazier Damron, professor and director of safety research, University of Wisconsin; Dean Van Gorden, highway safety coordinator, State of Wisconsin; Mrs. Agnes D. Beaton, manager of Woman's Activities Allstate Insurance Companies, will be speakers. A leadership conference will be an additional phase of the meeting.

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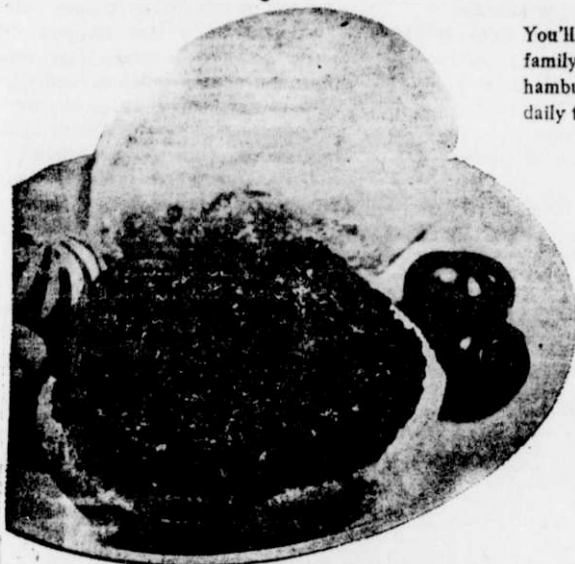

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Indians Romp in Homecoming Win Over Slinger, 34-0

HOST HARTLAND ARROWHEAD IN HOME FINAL TONIGHT

The Kewaskum Indians are still on the warpath, as the Slinger Owls definitely found out in the homecoming tilt here Friday night, when the Owls were completely overpowered in a 34-0 shutout.

The victory was the Indians' fourth in succession and they have now taken over undisputed second place with a 4-1 record. All of Kewaskum's wins have been by lopsided scores with none of the last four opponents even getting close. In these dominating victories over Germantown, Grafton, Kettle Moraine and Slinger the Indians ran up a total of 141 points while holding their opponents to a mere 27. They have averaged better than 35 points per game while checking the opposition with an average of slightly more than 6 points.

Kewaskum was expected to have a strong offense this season but the defense was a question mark with 10 defensive starters having to be replaced. Joe Backhaus, an all-conference selection, was the only returning starter. But the defense, green at the start, has really come along and has played a major role in the team's successes. In the Slinger game, the defense came up with 3 interceptions and 2 fumble recoveries to set up 3 touchdowns for the offense. And this happened with Dave Schacht, ace senior linebacker, out of the game with an injury. What's more, 7 of these boys will be back next year.

After a scoreless first quarter of defensive play, it was 0-0. On the last play of the period Joe Backhaus intercepted a Slinger pass on the 50 and carried it to the Slinger 32. The Indians continued to drive to the Owls' 1 yard line but on 4th down they fumbled and Slinger recovered.

Two plays into the 2nd quarter Slinger fumbled on the 6. Doug Stoffel recovered for the Indians and on the first play Rod Czerwonka, hard-running halfback, carried it in for the TD. He also added a 2-point conversion to make it 8-0. This completed the scoring in the first half but the Indians went right to work at the start of the second half.

After the kickoff they drove 64 yards in 5 plays to score on a fine 39 yard run by quarterback Mike Doherty to make it 14-0 and ease the situation somewhat. Moments later on a second Slinger pass, Jeff Koth picked it off and returned 19 yards to the Owl 24. Doherty called on Czerwonka for three straight carries and his second TD.

The Indians were far from through. In the final quarter they added two more scores, both on passes from Doherty to Bob Mertz in the end zone on almost identical plays. Czerwonka added another extra point to bring the final count to 34-0.

Czerwonka had another big night in rushing, gaining 150 yards in 28 carries. This was the third conference game in which he gained over 120 yards. He missed the Mayville game with an injury and Doherty was also hurt for this contest, although he played most of the game. With these two stars ailing, it made the job for Mayville a lot easier. Doherty added a touchdown and now has scored 72 points in conference play and 84 for the entire season. His 12 touch-

downs lead the league and Czerwonka is close behind in 3rd or 4th place. Mertz had a good night, catching 5 passes for 35 yards, 2 for TD's, and now has 34 points for the year.

The game ball was presented to assistant coach Walt Bade, who is hospitalized since last Wednesday with a collapsed lung. All the team signatures and score were written on the ball. The team won this one for him, Coach Joe Harlow said.

Lester Schneider of R. 2, Kewaskum, Syl. Kedinger and Bob Rosenthal of West Bend have returned from their annual moose hunting "expedition" at Ignace, Ontario, Canada. The three spent 12 days in Canada, returning on Oct. 12.

This trio has been very successful hunting in Canada and again this year bagged three moose. Each hunter shot his own moose this year, the largest one weighing over 1,500 pounds. They bagged their limit of three moose in the first three days of the hunting season, two of them on Sunday and the third on Monday. They spent the rest of the season doing some commercial fishing and "goofing off" as Lester put it.

Lester is not one to boast but he has set quite a record. He reports that he has shot six bull moose in the past four years, using up only eight shells. (After bagging their own moose, hunters are allowed to shoot one for companions under the party permit).

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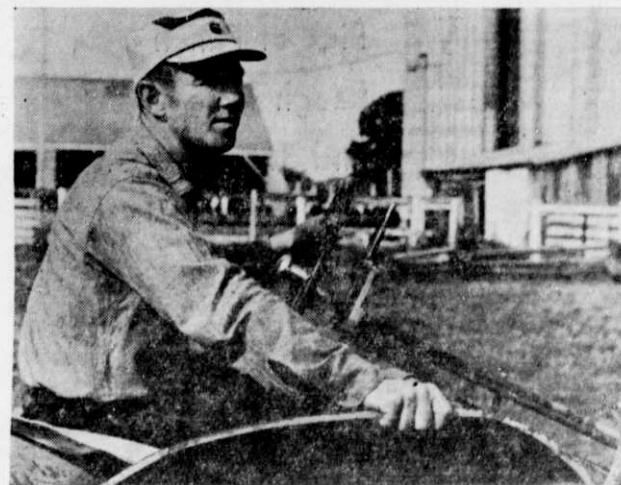

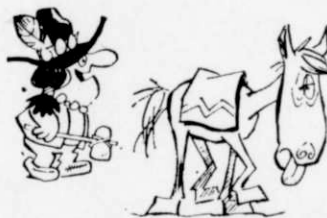
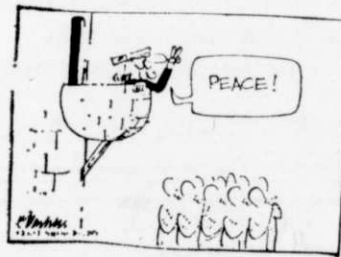
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
