Voters to Pick State, County Officials at Election Tuesday

GOOD TURNOUT SEEN AS INTEREST SOARS

Tuesday, Nov. 3, is General Election day in Wisconsin. On this date citizens of the village, county and state will go to the polls to elect a complete slate of state, congressional and county officers.

Polls in the Village of Kewaskum will be open from 9 a. m. until 8 p. m. at the fire station in the municipal building. Balloting for the Town of Kewaskum will be during the same hours at the Labor Center in the village.

Campaigning on the part of the candidates has been heavy, especially the last week or two, when they have been very busy. Interest has also been mounting as the election approaches and in some instances has reached fever pitch. As a result a large turnout is anticipated at the polls, especially in Washington County, which has a full slate of candidates on both the Republican and Democratic tickets except for one office—county treasurer.

Reports indicate that the main interest lies in the races for governor, U. S. Senator, representative in Congress, state senator, and representative to the assembly. Close contests could develop for these offices.

Besides Republican and Democrat, the American and Independent parties also have some candidates on the ballot. A complete list of candidates on the two major parties follows:

Over 200 Attend Dem Chili Supper

Last Thursday evening, over 200 people attended the chili supper fund raising event sponsored by the Farm-Labor Committee, United for McKenna-Eichstedt, held at Schwai's Hall, Cedar Creek. The program for the evening was headed by campaign speeches by State Senator, Dale T. McKenna and Lee Eichstedt, candidate for Representative to the Assembly.

Sen. McKenna told the audience that he was highly pleased by the endorsement for re-election he received from the Milwaukee Sentinel. "The Sentinel calls for the retention of the rational voice of Dale McKenna in the 13th District," the Sentinel editorial stated. The Sentinel is regarded as a Republican orientated newspaper.

All the candidates for county office on the Democratic ticket were introduced. Carl Hulbert of WTKM, Hartford, acted as master of ceremonies, and music was provided by Jake Weinert. Ken Nyhouse, ticket chairman, announced that 400 tickets were sold for the event.

Destroy Political Signs in County

Charges against two Washington County young people, 20 and 19, will be drawn up by Dist. Atty. Robert Kauffman in connection with the destruction of a large political sign just south of Kewaskum on Hwy. 45, which reportedly was torn down, dragged over the North Western railroad tracks and discarded on the east side of the tracks.

The sign, urging the election of Republican candidates, was one of a number of political signs of BOTH parties which were torn down in scattered areas of the county and in West Bend over the weekend. Democratic signs were also among the casualties. An officer in West Bend said he believed removing of the signs was not politically motivated but primarily "an early Halloween prank."

As it should be, sheriff's department deputies are continuing an investigation of other incidents of removal or damage to signs.

Possibly it all started when the county zoning officer first informed Democratic State Senator Dale McKenna that some of his campaign signs were in violation of the county zoning ordinance and ordered them removed. McKenna filed a complaint, incidentally, and his signs still remain.

Youth Accepted at Military Academy

Todd scored 99 per cent on his entrance examination which not only was the highest score recorded for the fall semester but the highest reported in the history of the institution. Todd is one of 450 students enrolled in the 9th grade for the fall term and he plans to complete his high school work at the academy. In addition to his studies, Todd will participate in football, soccer, sailing, swimming and band. He also participated in football and band in his previous schooling as well as a band member in Boy Scouts.

The Chief Sez:

A reminder that Nov. 1, our winter parking ordinance goes into effect.

Section 9.30 (1) of the village code restricts winter parking. No person shall park a private vehicle on a public street or highway in the Village of Kewaskum from Nov. 1 to April 1 between the hours of 11:00 o'clock p. m., and 6:00 o'clock a. m., unless such person parks the vehicle in accordance with the following subsections:

(a) On the even numbered side of the street or highway on those dates which bear an even calendar date at 11:00 p. m.

(b) On the odd numbered side of the street or highway on those dates which bear an odd calendar date at 11:00 p. m.

KETTLE MORaine ENDS INDIANS' REIGN AS SCENIC CROSS COUNTRY CHAMPIONS

Kewaskum's conference reign in cross country came to an abrupt end, Friday, Oct. 16, as the 1968 and 1969 champs plummeted to fifth place in the 1970 Scenic Moraine Conference meet at Kettle Moraine. The Indians, as well as the rest of the conference, were no match for a mighty Kettle Moraine team, as the Lasers placed 4 runners in the first 5, and 6 of the top 15.

The points were: Kettle Moraine 22, Mayville 55, Grafton 79, Arrowhead 80, Kewaskum 120, Washington 171, Slinger 188, and Pewaukee 238.

At the gun, Mayville's star sophomore, Jim Malesovich, moved into the lead with 4 Kettle Moraine runners strung out directly behind

him. Then the runners entered the part of the course run in the woods. When they came out, Malesovich and Joe Whitmore were way out in front, running stride for stride. Then, in the final straightaway, Whitmore pulled ahead to win in 13:37.6 for the 2.5 miles. Malesovich, in second, was timed in 13:41. 

LETTERS TO THE EDITOR



To The Editor:

Destruction, removal and theft of billboards, signs, posters and cartops containing names of Republican candidates occurred on Saturday night, October 24th, in the West Bend and Kewaskum area.

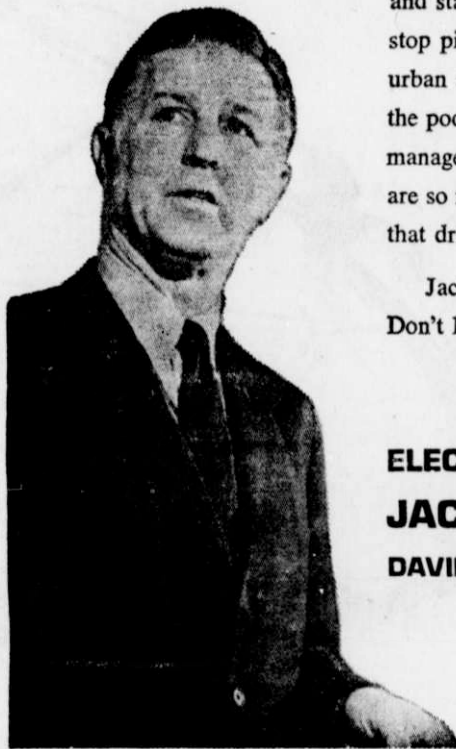

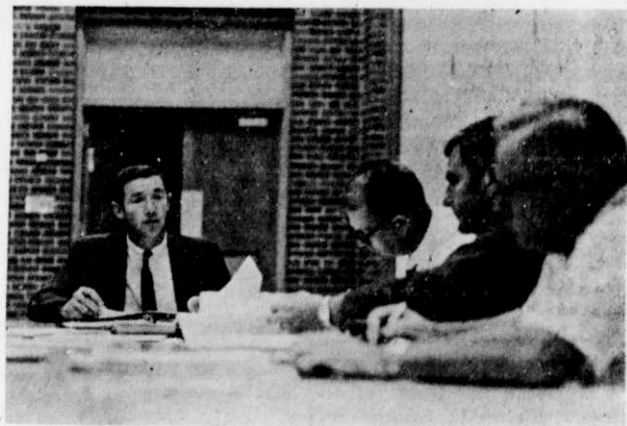

Indians Snow Under Hartland Arrowhead, 53-8

CLINCH TIE FOR 2ND; KRAHN RUNS TIE FOR 34 POINTS

The Kewaskum steamroller continues to flatten opponents by overwhelming scores. The latest victim to be crushed was Hartland Arrowhead here Friday night in the final home game played in a steady rain. The Indians swamped Arrowhead even worse than the others by a whopping 53-8 score.

The victory was the fifth in a row for the Indians and clinched at least a second place tie. The only hurdle remaining in the Indians' path is a game at Pewaukee this (Friday) afternoon. Pewaukee is in 7th place with a 1-5 record. The time of this contest, the last of the season, has been moved up to 3 p. m. instead of 3:30, as scheduled, due to the early hour of darkness now.

In their last 5 victories, the Indians have amassed a total of 194 points while holding their opponents to a mere 35. Their margin of victory over Hartland was surprising as Arrowhead came into the game with a formidable team and 3-2 record. A closer battle was anticipated. Kewaskum beat Hartland by 45 points, a much greater margin than leading, unbeaten Mayville, which won over them by only 20 points the week before. Local coaches, players and fans are now wishing the Indians could only get another crack at Mayville. The Indians have come a long way since their opener.

The rain and wet field didn't seem to hamper the Indians too much as they amassed a total of 362 yards. In his biggest night of the season, Bob Krahn ran wild to score a total of 34 points alone, more than most teams do. Krahn gained 190 yards in 22 carries, an average of better than 8 1/2 yards per carry. Quarterback Mike Doherty kept calling on Bob and he came through with flying colors.

Kewaskum scored all of its 53 points in the last 3 quarters after a 0-0 score at the end of the first period. This is an average of 18 points per quarter. It started like a tight game but was just no contest from the second quarter, in which the Indians ran up 22 points.

Krahn started the scoring with his first of 5 touchdowns (he also added 4 extra points) on a 3 yard plunge following an 80 yard drive. Hartland fumbled the kickoff and the Indians took advantage by scoring on a 9 yard run by Doherty. Kewaskum kept possession of the ball nearly all of the 2nd quarter, having it for 24 plays to Hartland's 4. Krahn also scored the final TD of the period on a 4 yard run. He also ran for 2 2-point conversions.

To start the second half the Indians capped a drive with a 17 yard touchdown pass from Doherty to Clark Eichstedt. Krahn began the last quarter with a score from the one and the Indians passed for 2 more points, Doherty to Joe Backhaus. Krahn then put the icing on the cake with scores on runs of 18 and 73 yards. Bob Mertz and Rod Czerwonka scored 2 points each for the extra points

to make it 53. Doherty, although he gave the ball to Krahn much of the time, scored his 13th TD and remains in the scoring lead in the conference. He also has a total of 9 touchdowns passes for the season. Czerwonka and Krahn are right up among the scoring leaders.

Some of the heat from last year's grudge battle at Hartland lingered on with several players

being ejected from the game for extra curricular activities. Statistics: First downs—K 17, H 9; yards rushing—K 295, H 92; yards passing—K 67, H 49; total yards—K 362, H 131; passes completed—K 6-8, H 3-6; passes intercepted—K 1, H 0; fumbles lost—K 0, H 2; yards penalized—K 62 1/2, H 117.

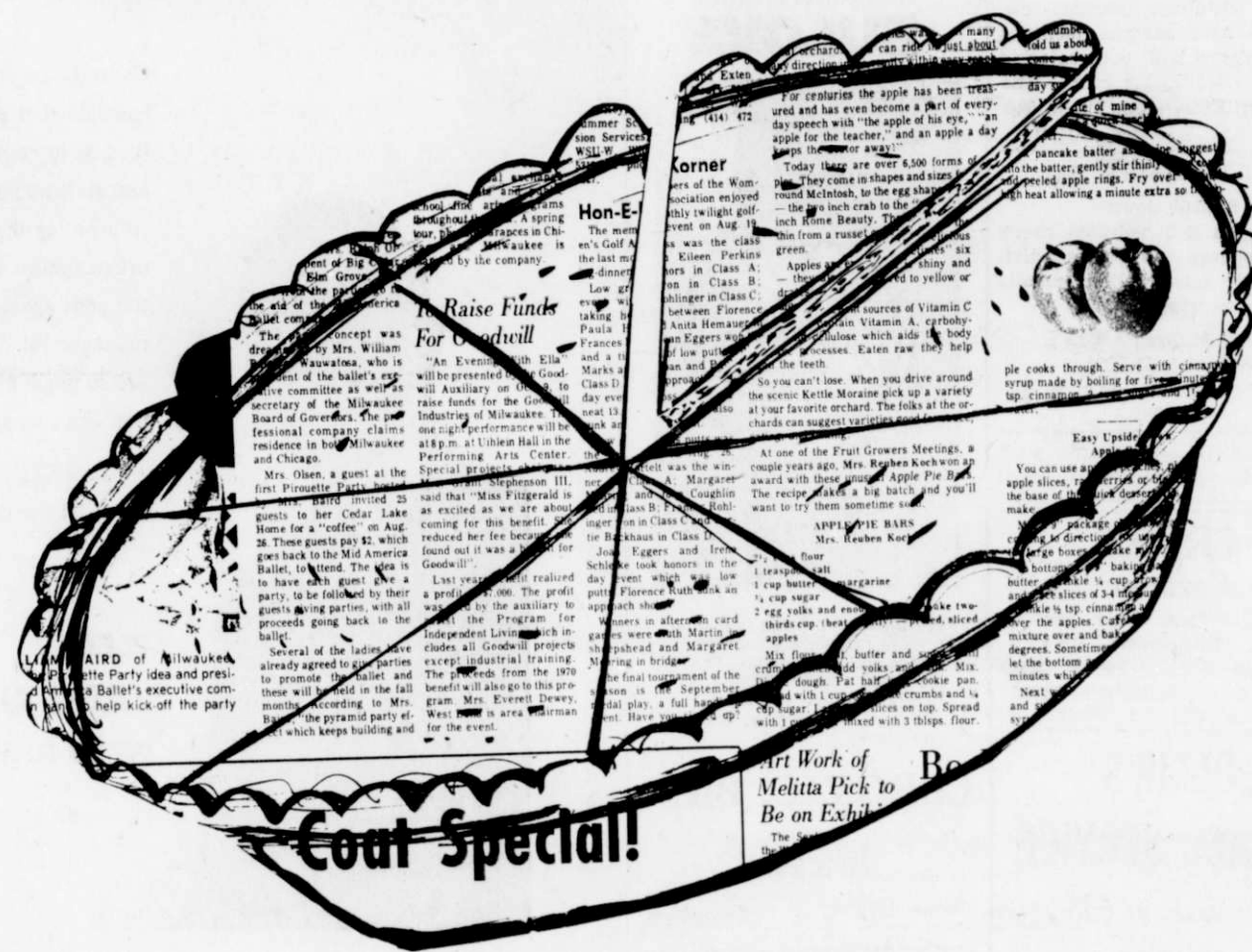

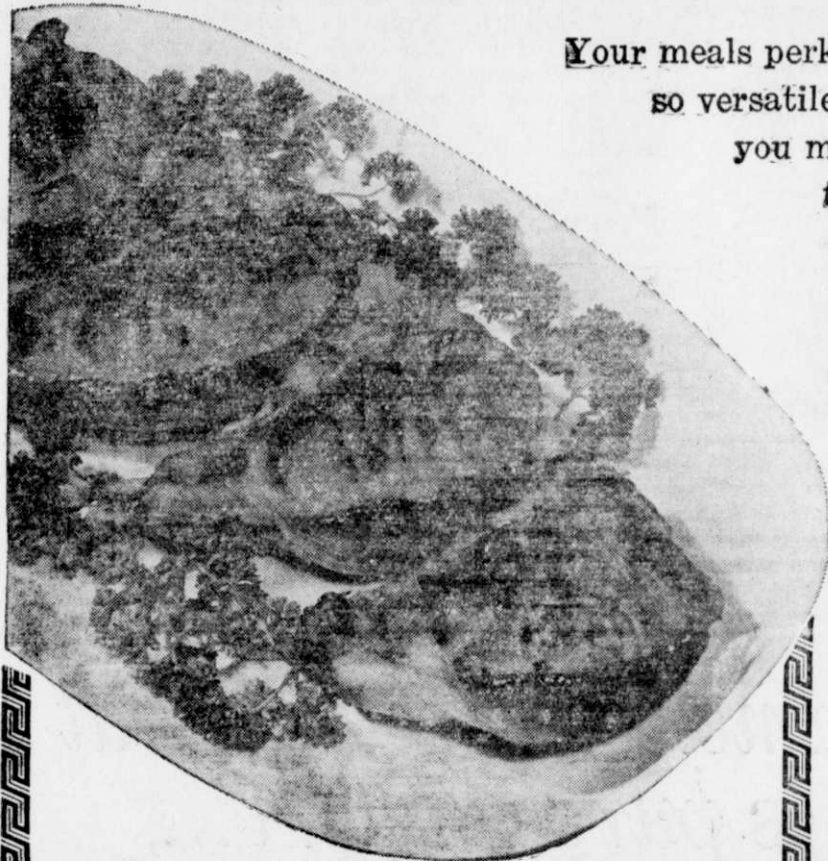
