#### Financing Project Next Step Taken In Board Action

29 BIDS RECEIVED ON 2 SEPARATE PROJECTS

Bel-Ric Acres subdivision were opvillage board Monday night.

Bids were received on two septhe costs which will be paid by the property owners in the subdivision, on a per foot basis. Project No. 2 is, for the most part, the obligation of the village. Included are a lift station and force mains from the subdivision, along County Trunk H, to Highway 45.

Bids were cpened by James Elder of Stone and Robinson, con sulting engineers of Brookfield. He said the bids could be let individually or in a package deal. After study, he will give his recommendations to the board. Bids will be accepted at 7 p. m. on Nov. 10 at an adjourned board meeting

There were 16 bidders on project No. 1 and the bids ranged The figures changed slightly on alternate bid for a concrete storm

Apparent low bidder was J. L.

No. 2. They ranged from the apparent low of \$47,640 submitted by Debelak Bros. of Milwaukee, to \$72,850. J. L. M. Contractors bid was \$50,691 bringing their combined project bid to \$162,190.03 or \$160,400.31 on the alternate, for the apparent low bid.

Financing the project was the next step in board action. Funds in advance. will be borrowed from the Bank of Kewaskum on a five-year installment note with a pre-payment clause.

It was estimated the village share will be about \$37,000 but it will be necessary to borrow funds to finance both projects to cover the time lapse between construction and the payment of the special assessment by property own-

> Kiwanis members were not pleased over the International Board's action particularly because the board had not sent a representative to observe the 18th annual turkey shoot held Sept. 20. At this event the club used five dummy targets as an experiment. The lanes were the least used of the 39 on the line. It has been debated for some time on whether to end the live bird feature of the event.

#### Democrats Lucey. Proxmire, McKenna, GOP's Steiger Win

ASSEMBLYMAN SCHROEDER GIVEN RUN BY EICHSTEDT

A record turnout of voters for a General Election visited the Presidential Election, but 724 is believed to be a new high in an off-year election.

Many Democrats were swept into office, ousting Republicans, in cities, counties and states throughout the nation. This included the State of Wisconsin where Democrat Patrick J. Lucey was elected governor, defeating Jack B. Olson. Lucey won the state's first fouryear term as governor. Also a first in the state is that the governor and lieutenant governor were elected as a pair. Lucey's running mate and the lieutenant governorelect is State Sen. Martin Schrei-

The Democratic triumph pushed another Republican, State Treasurer Harold Clemens out of office. He was defeated by Charles P. Smith. Two other Republicans, Secretary of State Robert C Zimmerman and Attorney General Robert W. Warren retained their offices.

Democrat U.S. Senator William Proxmire dealt Republicans their most crushing senatorial defeat in Wisconsin political history, winning re-election with 71 per cent of the vote. He ran away from his opponent, John E. Erickson, and even swept Washington County, a traditional Republican stronghold, by a 2 to 1 margin. Proxmire carried every precinct in the county. Proxmire was ahead of Erickson by a 21/2 to 1 margin in the state, 948,106 to 380,080.

However, one Republican to win big was Sixth District Cong. William Steiger. He garnered an unofficial 107,853 votes in the 7county Sixth District to defeat Democrat Frank Utech, for office for the first time, who totaled 50,624 votes. Steiger took 66.9 per cent of the votes.




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
