## Bids for Extension of Sewer, Water Facilities in Bel-Ric Acres Opened

### Financing Project Next Step Taken In Board Action

29 BIDS RECEIVED ON 2 SEPARATE PROJECTS

Bids for extension of village sewer and water facilities to the Bel-Ric Acres subdivision were opened at the regular meeting of the village board Monday night.

Bids were received on two separate projects. Number one covers the costs which will be paid by the property owners in the subdivision, on a per foot basis. Project No. 2 is, for the most part, the obligation of the village. Included are a lift station and force mains from the subdivision, along County Trunk H, to Highway 45.

Bids were opened by James Elder of Stone and Robinson, consulting engineers of Brookfield. He said the bids could be let individually or in a package deal. After study, he will give his recommendations to the board. Bids will be accepted at 7 p. m. on Nov. 10 at an adjourned board meeting.

There were 16 bidders on project No. 1 and the bids ranged from \$111,499.03 to \$182,329.50. The figures changed slightly on alternate bid for a concrete storm sewer.

Apparent low bidder was J. L. M. Contractors of New Berlin. On the alternate, their bid was \$109,709.31.

There were 13 bids on project No. 2. They ranged from the apparent low of \$47,640 submitted by Debelak Bros. of Milwaukee, to \$72,850. J. L. M. Contractors bid was \$50,691 bringing their combined project bid to \$162,190.03 or \$160,400.31 on the alternate, for the apparent low bid.

Financing the project was the next step in board action. Funds will be borrowed from the Bank of Kewaskum on a five-year installment note with a pre-payment clause.

It was estimated the village share will be about \$37,000 but it will be necessary to borrow funds to finance both projects to cover the time lapse between construction and the payment of the special assessment by property owners.

Village Commissioner William Martin told the board that the plans to enlarge the village sewage treatment plant have been given state approval. "They came through today," he said.

The board authorized Martin and Village President C. N. Wietor to arrange for financing and instructed Elder to advertise for bids to be opened Dec. 14. The expansion project is estimated at \$400,000 of which 55 per cent is guaranteed in state and federal aids. It is possible aids could reach 80 per cent, Wietor said hopefully.

Norbert Schiller, 56, of 926 W. Washington St., West Bend, died Sunday, Nov. 1. Coroner Robert Boltz reported that Schiller died northeast of St. Michaels of carbon monoxide poisoning. He was an employee of Barton Products Corp. He was born May 30, 1914 in the Town of Kewaskum and married Erna Kufahl at St. John's Lutheran Church, West Bend, on June 11, 1938.

Survivors include his wife, two sons, James and Richard of West Bend; two daughters, Mrs. Janet Gettelman of Germantown and Eileen (Mrs. Dale Eckert) of West Bend; a son-in-law, a daughter-in-law, 10 grandchildren, a sister, Laura (Mrs. Floyd Updyke) of Greenwood, Wis., and two brothers, Jerome of Kewaskum and Lawrence of West Bend.

Funeral services were held at 1:30 p. m. Wednesday at the Techtman-Myrhum Funeral Home, West Bend. Dr. H. W. Baumer officiated and burial was in Newark Cemetery. Visitation at the funeral home was after 4 p. m. Tuesday.

## Former Milw. Detective Killed In Area Crash

SURVIVOR OF GUN BATTLE FORMERLY RESIDED HERE

George A. Legge, 73, of 3415 N. 44th St., Milwaukee, was fatally injured in a car-truck crash at the intersection of County Trunks DA and DD about a mile north of the Washington-Fond du Lac county line shortly before noon last Friday. A retired Milwaukee Police Department detective, Legge was pronounced dead at the scene of the accident.

Fond du Lac county authorities said Legge was alone in his car when it and a cement truck driven by Ralph May, 43, of R. 1, Fredonia, collided. May is a driver for the Goehring Ready Mix plant at Fredonia. He was injured in the crash and was removed to St. Joseph's Community Hospital, West Bend, in the Kewaskum firemen's ambulance. May was reported in satisfactory condition Friday but was being kept at the hospital for further checkups.

The Fond du Lac sheriff's department reported that they did not have the details of how the crash occurred, but unconfirmed reports indicated Legge may have gone through a stop sign at the intersection.

Legge was a former resident of rural Kewaskum. For a time he made his home on County Trunk H at Kettle Moraine Drive south east of the village in the former schoolhouse which he remodeled into a home.

Legge retired from the Milwaukee Police Department in 1955 after serving for more than 27 years. He was made a detective in 1937. That year, Legge was involved in a gun battle with four men during an attempted robbery of the old Luick Dairy Co., 1132 N. 8th St. Although wounded, Legge shot and killed one of the burglars. Legge's partner was killed in the shootout.

Legge worked in the protection department for Gimbels after his retirement as a policeman. Officials at Gimbels in Capitol Court Shopping Center said that he worked at both the downtown and the Capitol Court stores.

## Town Farmington to Sponsor Meeting on Waubeka Reservoir

Farmington Township is sponsoring an informational meeting on the Waubeka reservoir. All town residents, as well as interested citizens of neighboring towns and counties are invited to attend. The meeting will be held at 8 p. m. Nov. 12 at the Farmington school gym. Farmington school is located on Boltonville road, one-half mile north of County Trunk H.

Norbert Dettmann, town chairman, said details of the reservoir as proposed by the Southeastern Wisconsin Regional Planning Commission will be given. It is also hoped that an ecologist will be in attendance to give his view. Area residents will be able to speak for or against the proposed reservoir.

### Kiwanis to Stop Using Live Birds At Turkey Shoot

The future of the Kewaskum Kiwanis Club Turkey Shoot was "for the birds" following a vote by the club members at their meeting Monday night to stop using live animals in its annual shoot. Under threat of suspension of its charter, the club voted 29-9 not to use live birds, but has not decided whether the shoot would be continued with some other targets.

The Kiwanis International Board of Trustees last month threatened to suspend the charter of the Kewaskum club unless it had written assurance by February that the controversial turkey shoots would be halted. Various animal protection groups have protested the event for years and it has been under pressure from critics.

Kiwanis members were not pleased over the International Board's action particularly because the board had not sent a representative to observe the 18th annual turkey shoot held Sept. 20. At this event the club used five dummy targets as an experiment. The lanes were the least used of the 39 on the line. It has been debated for some time on whether to end the live bird feature of the event.

The club drew its biggest crowd ever this year, with more than 10,000 people in attendance, partly as a result of the widespread publicity it received. The live birds were the crowd pullers and it remains to be seen how much their absence hurts the fund raising event.

## Adult Recreation Program to Begin At School Nov. 11

The Kewaskum Community Schools will again sponsor an adult recreation program beginning Nov. 11 for all residents of the Kewaskum school district which includes Beechwood, Farmington and Wayne, at the Kewaskum Elementary School gymnasium. Since it is a "fun" program, adults should not hesitate to take part because of no previous experience.

The program will be free of charge and will be open to any and only adult residents of the Kewaskum school district, 18 years of age or older, who are no longer attending high school. High school students and/or other children will not be allowed. This is an "adult" program for the district. Adults will have an opportunity to get some recreational physical exercise through basketball, volleyball, etc. The program depends on those who participate.

Beginning on Nov. 11 and 12, Wednesdays from 8:00 - 10:00 p. m. will be for men and 8:00 - 10:00 p. m. on Thursdays for women. There will be no program operating during vacation periods or on days when the school is closed due to custodial work schedule conflicts. Locker room and shower-

## Democrats Lucey, Proxmire, McKenna, GOP's Steiger Win

ASSEMBLYMAN SCHROEDER GIVEN RUN BY EICHSTEDT

A record turnout of voters for a General Election visited the polls in the Village of Kewaskum Tuesday. A total of 724 votes were cast. More ballots, in the neighborhood of 750, were cast in the last Presidential Election, but 724 is believed to be a new high in an off-year election.

Many Democrats were swept into office, ousting Republicans, in cities, counties and states throughout the nation. This included the State of Wisconsin where Democrat Patrick J. Lucey was elected governor, defeating Jack B. Olson. Lucey won the state's first four-year term as governor. Also a first in the state is that the governor and lieutenant governor were elected as a pair. Lucey's running mate and the lieutenant governor-elect is State Sen. Martin Schreiber.

The Democratic triumph pushed another Republican, State Treasurer Harold Clemens out of office. He was defeated by Charles P. Smith. Two other Republicans, Secretary of State Robert C. Zimmerman and Attorney General Robert W. Warren retained their offices.

Democrat U.S. Senator William Proxmire dealt Republicans their most crushing senatorial defeat in Wisconsin political history, winning re-election with 71 per cent of the vote. He ran away from his opponent, John E. Erickson, and even swept Washington County, a traditional Republican stronghold, by a 2 to 1 margin. Proxmire carried every precinct in the county. Proxmire was ahead of Erickson by a 2 1/2 to 1 margin in the state, 948,106 to 380,080.

However, one Republican to win big was Sixth District Cong. William Steiger. He garnered an unofficial 107,853 votes in the 7-county Sixth District to defeat Democrat Frank Utech, running for office for the first time, who totaled 50,624 votes. Steiger took 66.9 per cent of the votes.

Another Democrat, Dale T. McKenna, kept his seat as State Senator of the 13th District, defeating Republican Bill Ward in all three counties of the district. His margin came to 53.5 per cent. In Jefferson County, base for both candidates, the totals were McKenna 10,044, Ward 8,855; in Washington County, McKenna 10,013, Ward 9,127, and Dodge County, McKenna 5,623, Ward 4,363. McKenna won by a margin of 3,335 votes.

Wisconsin Democrats won overwhelming control of the State Assembly, winning 67 seats, but

Washington County's seat was retained by Republican incumbent Fred Schroeder, who had to turn back a strong challenge by Democratic candidate Lee Eichstedt. Schroeder received 10,176 votes for 53 per cent of the county vote to Eichstedt's 9,098 votes for 47 per cent. Schroeder's 1,078 margin was 1,078 votes. The village president automatically becomes a member.

The unsolved and continuing problem of fly-ash from the village incinerator again came up for discussion. Persons whose cars are parked nearby are complaining continually, several board members said.

Armin Oppermann, superintendent of public works, said he thinks the problem could be alleviated somewhat by installing another baffle. He was instructed to get a cost estimate.

gin was a sharp drop from his margin in 1968 when he won re-election by almost 9,000 votes. Eichstedt, running for the first time, gave Schroeder a surprisingly close race in strong Republican Washington County. Eichstedt polled the most votes of any losing Democratic candidate in the county.

As usual all of the other Republican officials in Washington County were reelected. They include County Clerk Anton P. Stalal, County Treasurer Robert J. Klein, Sheriff Paul Humbel, Coroner Robert H. Boltz, Clerk of Circuit Court Helen Berend, District Attorney Robert J. Kauffman and Register of Deeds Olga Perrin.

Village voters didn't follow the county and state trend. All of the state and county Republican candidates won out here except two, Proxmire and McKenna. Locally Proxmire headed Erickson by almost a 2-1 margin, 438 to 276, but McKenna bested Ward by a narrow 362 to 341 margin. Surprisingly Schroeder beat Eichstedt by only 78 votes, 393 to 315.

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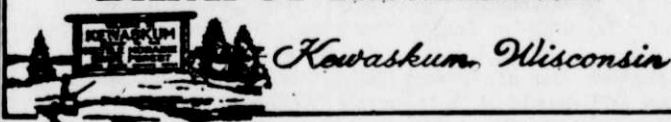

## From Farm Laborer to Master Builder In Nicaragua Story of Local Capuchin

**BROTHER HERRIGES VISITS HOME; KEWASKUM MEANS "A STONE RIVER," INDIANS SAY**

From farm laborer to master builder is the story of Capuchin Brother Isidore Herriges currently home for a visit from his mission post in Eastern Nicaragua. Brother Herriges is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Anton Herriges of R. 2, Kewaskum, and was born on the family farm m39 years ago.

In 1951, he left the family farm and entered the Midwest Capuchins to prepare for the life of a religious brother. He made his Solemn Profession as a Capuchin Brother in 1959 and in 1964 volunteered for service in the missions of Eastern Nicaragua.

To this Capuchin Brother, "necessity is the mother of invention." Since going to Nicaragua, he has planned, supervised and done much of the labor on building everything from a full sized church in the port city of Puerto Cabezas to small chapels in the jungle.

When necessary tools aren't available, which is most of the time, Brother Herriges improvises his own. The same holds true for needed materials. Often times if lumber is needed, it means cutting down trees and planing the boards.

Cement grill work is often used in Nicaragua's tropical climate in piece of windows. When grill work is needed, Brother Herriges draws the design to scale, builds the forms, mixes the cement and then supervises the pouring of the molds.

The Capuchin Brothers' most recent project was designing and building a front entrance on the still unfinished forty year old Cathedral in Bluefields, Nicaragua.

"This was kind of a complicated job," Brother Herriges said. "First, we had to tear down an old free standing clock and bell tower. We knew that there was a termite problem in the old beams but we didn't realize how serious it was until we started the demolition process. Since we don't have anything like a wrecking ball, it was strictly swinging a sledge hammer by hand and everytime you swung the sledge hammer you practically put your life in the hands of God."

"The tower had the church bells in it and the town clock," he went on. "So first we had to devise a pulley arrangement to get them safely on the ground. They are in good condition and will be used when and if we are able to put up a new tower. The people in town are after us to rebuild a tower because they really depended on the clock and the tower was the town landmark."

"The front of the Cathedral is sixty feet high and we had to build a scaffold before we could start work," the Capuchin Brother explained. "Naturally there are not any cranes in Bluefields, so all of the materials had to be hauled up by hand. This is really tiring work especially because of the intense heat and the humidity in the area. A man can only work at this hand hauling for about an hour at a time."

Brother explained that he designed the new front to keep the rain out and yet give as much ventilation as possible. The average yearly rainfall in Bluefields is between 200 and 240 inches so this is a major concern. They brought the roof forward and designed the front of open precast cement sections. Brother Herriges designed the sections with various religious symbols and then built the wooden forms and poured the cement. Once the forms were set, they were hauled up by hand and set into place.

"With the help of one of the Christian Brothers, we designed and made a twenty foot relief of the Blessed Mother standing on the world," Brother Herriges said. It is about halfway up the facade of the Cathedral and is the predominant feature."

The total cost of the project including labor and materials was approximately ten thousand dollars in American money. This included salaries for the three to ten men who worked with Brother Herriges at different times during the construction.

When first working on the Cathedral, Brother build a community house for the Divina Pastora Sisters in Bluefields, worked on a medical clinic in Waspm, Nicaragua and did some finishing work on the church he built in Puerto Cabezas, Nicaragua. He said his work schedule when he goes back depends on what priorities the new Bishop of Bluefields sets up. The Bishop, the Most Rever-

end Salvator Schlaefter, O.F.M. Capuchin, is a native of Campbellsport Work needed to be done on the seminary and the rest of the cathedral needs to be remodeled. So if he doesn't know exactly what project he will be working on, he does know that his natural talent for planning and building will be kept busy.

Brother Herriges visited the Statesman Office this week and we learned that the area they work in in Nicaragua is about one-half the size of Wisconsin. The northern half has mostly Indian tribes which live along the rivers and sea.

The Brother said, "Last July I was helping build a clinic in one of their villages. They would ask me where my home is and when I told them the name of Kewaskum they were very interested and started asking more questions like, if there is a river running through the town, if it had stones in it. They said Ke-was-kum means a-stone-river. Ke is stone, was is a river or creek, and kum would be like 'a' or 'the' in English. They

would ask if we still speak their Indian language here and if we plant our rice and beans on the river banks like they do. These Indian people are very simple people and know very little of where they come from, or how the rest of the world is now. So they think we live in huts here and have a life very similar to theirs. Waupun in their language means 'to go.' They use this word frequently."

Notice is hereby given to the localities concerned and to all interested persons that the Wisconsin Department of Transportation, Division of Highways, through its Highway Commission, will hold a public hearing in the Plymouth High School Auditorium, Plymouth, Wisconsin, at 10:00 o'clock in the forenoon on Tuesday, December 1, 1970, and at the Reedsville High School Gymnasium, 340 Manitowoc Street, Reedsville, Wisconsin, at 10:00 o'clock in the forenoon on Wednesday, December 2, 1970, at which time all persons will be given opportunity to be heard concerning their views on the Highway Commission's proposal, under the authority of Section 84.29, Wisconsin Statutes, to establish and construct a state trunk highway as a route of the National System of Interstate and Defense Highways, hereinafter referred to as the Interstate System. This hearing relates to establishing such routing in Brown, Outagamie, Calumet, Manitowoc, Fond du Lac, Sheboygan, Washington and Ozaukee Counties.

The portion of the Interstate System to be established through this hearing is part of the Milwaukee-Green Bay route authorized by the Congress of the United States and assigned to the United States Department of Transportation, Federal Highway Administration, on December 13, 1968. This section of the Milwaukee-Green Bay route begins about one mile northeast of the Village of Saukville, in Ozaukee County, and continues northerly in a broad corridor to near the south limits of the City of Green Bay, on the east side of the Fox River, in Brown County. The entire section will be discussed and all interested persons will have opportunity to appear and be heard on the entire proposed route at either of the hearing locations mentioned above.

Information on the proposed corridors, including maps, sketches, and studies made by the Division of Highways, as well as documentation filed by others on the proposal, is available for inspection and copying at the Division of Highways' District Offices, 310 South West Avenue, in Waukesha, and 1125 North Military Avenue in Green Bay.

Exhibits depicting the general corridor will be on display at the sites of the hearing and staff members will be present to answer questions from 4:00 p. m. to 8:00 p. m. on Monday, November 30, 1970, in the Plymouth High School

Auditorium, Plymouth, Wisconsin, and on Tuesday, December 1, 1970, from 4:00 p. m. to 8:00 p. m., in the Reedsville High School Gymnasium, 340 Manitowoc Street, Reedsville, Wisconsin. All interested persons are invited to attend these informal sessions to discuss the proposed project with staff members of the Division of Highways.

All interested persons are invited to attend the public hearing and present concise, relevant oral or written statements concerning the economic, social and environmental impacts and effects of the proposed Interstate Highway location and whether they are or are not in the public interest and consistent with the goals and objectives of such area planning as has been promulgated by the communities.

Provisions will be made for the submission of written statements and other exhibits in place of or in addition to the oral statements presented at the public hearing. This additional written testimony and exhibits may be filed with the Highway Commission if post-marked not later than midnight, December 14, 1970. Mail these statements and exhibits to the Highway Commission Secretary, Wisconsin Division of Highways, 4802 Sheboygan Avenue, Madison, Wisconsin 53702.

Relocation assistance will be available to persons who may be displaced by the later construction when the specific location for the improvement has been established.

Federal aid highway funds may be used as a part of the cost of development and construction.

The Division of Highways will review the testimony and will consider any feasible location of the National System of Interstate and Defense Highways and of the State Trunk Highway System in the general areas indicated in this notice.

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## Indians Blast Pewaukee, 28-14, Finish Second

**CZERWONKA NETS 144 YDS. IN SIXTH STRAIGHT WIN**

The powerful Kewaskum Indians wound up their season at Pewaukee Friday afternoon with a 28-14 victory to wind up in undisputed second place in the Scenic Conference with a fine 6-1 record. Their overall record for the season was 7-2.

The Indians had one bad game, their opener at Mayville, and this cost them the championship. If this one could only be replayed. Since then all of their six straight easy wins have been by lopsided scores in which they amassed a total of 222 points while holding their opponents to 49. Here are the scores: Kewaskum 31, Germantown 6; Kewaskum 40, Grafton 14; Kewaskum 36, Kettle Moraine 7; Kewaskum 34, Slinger 0; Kewaskum 53, Hartland 8; Kewaskum 28, Pewaukee 14. In most of these games the Indians beat their opponents by bigger scores than Mayville did.

Coach Jim Kommers of Pewaukee said, "I still think that Kewaskum has a better team than Mayville. They are very quick."

The Indians held slim hopes that tail end, winless Germantown might upset Mayville in the finale, to give them a share of the title but it didn't turn out that way. But Germantown gave them a surprising battle, losing only 19-7. (Kewaskum trounced Germantown, 31-6).

The conference leader, speedy Rod Czerwonka, gained 144 yards rushing against Pewaukee in 20 carries to pace all runners.

Kewaskum scored one touchdown in each quarter as follows: Czerwonka capped a 78 yard march with a 10 yard run for a TD; Krahn scampered 10 yards for a score and also ran for the extra points; Doherty scored his 16th touchdown of the season with a 7-yard run and Marv Raschka ran the extra points; Czerwonka scored from the 14 after an 81 yard march in 9 plays. Pewaukee scored with only 1:30 left before the half on a 1-yard sneak by Bill Behnke and scored again in the fourth quarter on a Behnke to Jay Baumann pass for 67 yards.

Kewaskum had one TD nullified when an official called a penalty on a Kewaskum player for, of all things, "chewing on his mouthguard."

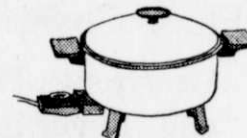


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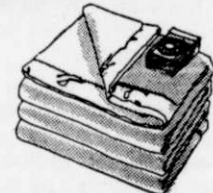
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
