## Boundary Lines for Bussing Private School Students Reported to Board

BOARD STATES NEW POLICY ON STUDENT ATTENDANCE

Varied reports occupied the attention of the board of education when it met Monday night. Junior High Principal Kenneth Erickson reported on the progress that has been made in having heads of private schools establish attendance boundaries for student bussing purposes, as required by state law.

Erickson is in charge of all student transportation for the Kewaskum district. He said that a law enacted Aug. 30, 1969 requires that the district shall provide transportation to and from private schools if situated within the school district or not more than five miles beyond district boundaries.

An attendance area is defined as "the geographical area designated by the private school's governing body." Attendance areas may not overlap and all areas must be claimed, according to Erickson.

He stated all of the schools involved are church-related. Parish lines, "as much as possible," were used to define attendance areas. Boundaries must be established on mutual agreement between schools and district, he said.

Erickson was instructed to send a map he has drawn with the cooperation of private school heads, and showing attendance areas each claimed, to each school for its final O.K. before coming back for board approval.

Schools involved are St. Kilian's of St. Kilian; St. Theresa's of Theresa; St. Mary's and St. John's, Lomira; Holy Trinity, Kewaskum; Holy Trinity and St. John's in Newburg; Good Shepherd and St. John's West Bend.

Mrs. William Thull, R. 2, Kewaskum, told the board that the district's policy of requiring a doctor's permit for a student to return to school after three consecutive days' illness has been deleted from state statutes. She said she learned this through her doctor after a recent illness of her daughter.

The board then gave a first reading to a new policy on attendance that states "re-admittance after an absence shall be on the basis of a signed explanation from parent or guardian."

It further states that "principals may require parent or guardian to provide a certificate of a reputable physician on absence of more than three days if contagious diseases are suspected, or if the health officer has declared a health emergency in the schools or attendance areas." Parents would be notified if such an emergency exists.

"If the several scarlet fever cases that we've had reported would turn into an epidemic, that would come under this policy," Supt. Marshall Boyd said.

He reported the citizens advisory building committee has gone over specifications of the proposed long-range building program and that it will be meeting with various high school department heads for a determination of space

needs.

A committee member will bring a progress report to the school board at 8 p. m. on Nov. 30. With the Wayne School being so extremely overcrowded, Boyd said he feels working drawings for its building program should already be underway.

He also reported that despite several requests from him, the Town of Barton has not paid its tax levy that was due the school district Aug. 15. The amount is between \$8,000 and \$9,000. He was instructed to make another request.

Due to lack of space at the high school, Boyd said, home economics child care classes will be held in the educational building of Peace Church. For two weeks, beginning Nov. 23, students work with preschoolers for a first-hand experience in child care.

Also reported was that junior high instructors will be attending classes taught cooperatively under CESA Agency 16, to prepare them for teaching a course at the 7th or 8th grade level on the facts about drug abuse.

The board accepted the resignation of Mrs. Ione Herges as third grade teacher at Beechwood School effective Dec. 23 and in her place approved a contract for Miss Anne Dembowiak who will graduate in January from WSU-Oshkosh. Meanwhile, a substitute will teach the class.

## Otten, 10 Others Leave for Year's Study in Africa

Nine Wisconsin State University-Oshkosh students left from Wittman Field in Oshkosh recently and were joined at Chicago by another WSU-O student and one from WSU-Stout for a year's study in Africa as part of the university's "Study in Africa" program.

Dr. Lee N. Newcomer, program coordinator, indicated that 20 WSU-O students, two from WSU-Stout, one from WSU-Whitewater and two from colleges outside Wisconsin, are participating in the African study program this year. Now in its third year, the program is organized by the WSU-O Department of International Studies to give students an opportunity to live and study in a non-Western culture.

The three of the WSU-O students are attending the University of Lagos in Nigeria. They are William J. Gilbert, Appleton, an English major; Eileen B. Mueller, Luxemburg, a nursing major, and Michael E. Otten, Kewaskum, a geography major.

Each student studying in Africa has been enrolled at WSU-O for the year and will receive full credit for the courses taken in Africa. English is the language of instruction at these universities in Africa.

Students participating in the African study program attend regular university lectures and tutorials and live with African room mates in residence halls. While a variety of subjects has been taken

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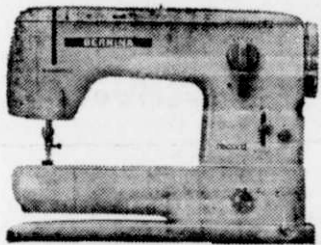

## Over 650,000 People Visited Northern Unit of Kettle Moraine State Forest

### KONKOL REPORTS INCREASE OF 25% OVER LAST YEAR

The 1970 recreation year was exceptional according to Dennis Konkol, Kewaskum, Forest Manager. Over 650,000 people visited the Northern Unit of the Kettle Moraine State Forest through September and this represents a 25% increase for the same period last year.

Ample snowfall provided snowmobile enthusiasts with many enjoyable hours of fun during the winter months. Campers arrived in conjunction with warm spring weather and outdoor recreation seekers were very much in evidence throughout the months of June, July and August. The hot, dry summer weather was very conducive to public attendance, but by the middle of August a severe forest fire hazard existed. On Sunday, Aug. 16, four fires occurred which burned over 114 acres of forest land before they were brought under control. Excellent cooperation was received from local fire departments and local residents who helped suppress these fires. A total of 26 forest fires have occurred this year. This is the largest number of fires in any one year since the forest was established in 1936, a record of dubious distinction. The 7 plus inches of rain received during the month of September greatly alleviated the fire hazard at that time.

The Forest Naturalist Program, designed to inform and interpret geology, natural features, wildlife, and history, as it pertains to the forest, was well received. Nature hikes were conducted daily and evening programs were provided on weekends. During late fall and winter the naturalist services extend to schools and adult service organizations in the vicinity. Reservations for this service should be obtained from Forest Headquarters, Box 426, Campbellsport, Wis.

Work continued on the new development project at the Long Lake Recreation Area. Facilities include a bathhouse and toilet building, picnic and beach area, parking lots, and service road. This development is located just north of the existing beach and picnic area. The scheduled open-

ing date is Memorial Day, 1971.

The forest offers an excellent opportunity for high quality recreational activities during the fall season. The large summer crowds are gone and the weather can be very pleasant with the irritation of insects such as mosquitoes and deer flies at a minimum. Popular fall activities include camping, fishing, hiking, sight-seeing (especially during the fall color period) and hunting. The 27,000 acre forest is open to hunting in season. Brochures and hiking trail maps are available at Forest Headquarters.

Winter recreational activities include skiing, tobogganing, snow shoeing, ice fishing and snowmobiling. Some hardy enthusiasts even camp at this time of year. The camp areas are open until snows block the roads and fees are not collected after Nov. 1. The forest is open to snowmobiles but a new regulation restricts their use to marked or designated trails and areas. The snowmobile trails will be maintained with a leveling device.

The Kettle Moraine provides the visitor with a large variety of recreational activities and a visit to the forest can be an enjoyable experience.

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## Indians to Host Plymouth in Cage Opener Tonight

**DEFENDING CHAMPIONS HAVE 7 LETTERMEN BACK**

The Kewaskum Indians, defending champions of the Scenic Moraine Conference, will open the 1970-71 basketball season tonight (Friday) when they host Plymouth in a non-conference tune-up game. The Indians will play an 18-game schedule, which includes 4 non-conference tilts.

Kewaskum won the title in the strong Scenic Conference last year with an excellent 13-1 record, finishing 3 games ahead of Slinger and Hartland Arrowhead, which tied for second. The Indians established a fine overall record of 16-2 during the season before losing to Mayville in the finals of the District Tournament held here.

The only schools to defeat Kewaskum last year were Slinger and Plymouth, both games played a way. Plymouth, which went on to win the Eastern Wisconsin Conference championship with a 9-1 record, shaded the Indians in overtime in the non-conference opener there. Slinger beat Kewaskum there when junior Clark Eichstedt, leading scorer and rebounder on the team, was out of action with a fractured wrist. In fact he was out for the season or Kewaskum might have risen to further heights in tournament play.

Graduation hit the champions a heavy blow. Gone are four starters and the No. 6 man. Lost through graduation were Steve Stern, Dick Bartelt, Tony Butschlick and Randy Koth, all starters, Jim Tessar, the No. 6 man, who started many games and saw much action, also graduated. The only starter back is Clark Eichstedt. Bartelt was chosen on the all-conference team last year, while Eichstedt was a second team selection. Koth received honorable mention. Bartelt also was 7th highest scorer in the conference with 227 points and Butschlick, Stern and Koth also finished high in scoring.

Despite these losses, the Indians have 7 lettermen returning and should again have a strong team. Mainstay on the squad will be Eichstedt, now a senior, who is healthy again and is sure to be one of the stars of the conference if he stays that way. Three other returnees who saw much action last season include Eichstedt's "kid" brother, Glenn, a junior, who played much as a sophomore last year, and seniors Bob Mertz and John Nohr. The three remaining lettermen back are Joe Back-

haus, Loren Bonlender, and Dennis Smith. Jim Maedke, also on the squad last year, is back, too. Other than these we haven't contacted the coach whether there are any newcomers or upcoming players from last year's freshmen team on the squad.

The Indians will play under a new head coach this year. He is Mike Williams, who succeeds Walt Bade, who asked to be relieved of his duties. Williams, a native of El Cajon Valley, California, is a graduate of San Diego State College. He taught at Lemon Grove, Calif. two years and for the past four years coached at Blanchardville (Wis.) High School. He comes highly recommended.

## KETTLE KRUISERS HOLD SNOWMOBILE MEETING

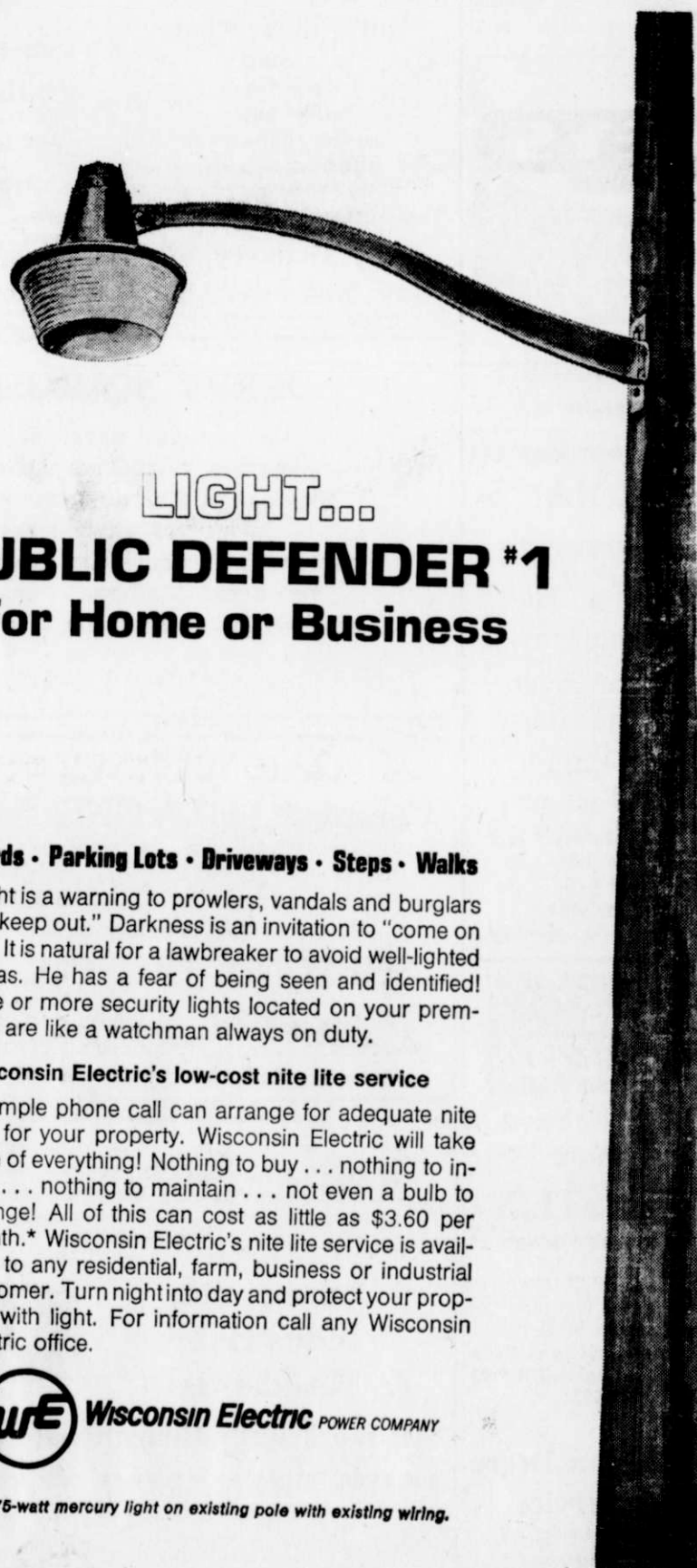
The Kettle Cruisers Snowmobile Club held their first meeting on Tuesday, Nov. 10, at Mr. Ed's Long Lake Resort.

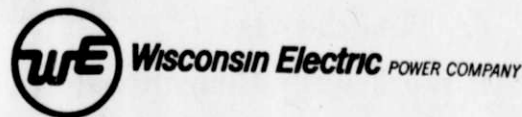
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
