Village Tax Rate Is Hiked to \$42.22, Proposed Budget Indicates

Raise Amounts to \$3.31 Per \$1,000 With State Tax Credit

Village taxpayers can count on paying higher property taxes in 1971. A proposed budget totaling \$818,627.22 has been prepared by the Village board. It reflects an increase of \$74,288.77 over the current one. The tax rate will also go up.

The proposed budget would call for a tax rate of \$42.22 per \$1,000 of assessed valuation but the figures are subject to a few changes, according to Village Commissioner William Martin. "We hope to pare the 22 cents from the tax rate," he stated.

In addition, the state tax credit has not been received by the village. That amount will be deducted from the tax rate. Last year, Martin said, it amounted to \$2.02 per \$1,000 assessed valuation bringing the net tax rate to \$36.69.

The final draft of the budget will be presented at a public hearing on Dec. 7 at 8 p. m. in the council rooms of the municipal building, preceding the regular board meeting.

Local school tax is the budget item showing the largest increase. The 1971 figure is \$398,778.54, an increase of \$42,149 over 1970.

Estimated increases are also noted in general government listed for 1971 at \$44,525 (up \$2,766.52); protection of property and person \$45,310 (up \$1,089.25); health, welfare and sanitation \$36,075 (up \$2,707.12); transportation \$42,350 (up \$2,330.27); education and recreation \$13,500 (up \$5,698.30); indebtedness \$33,996.75 (up \$3,974.13).

State taxes on property \$4,157.96 (up \$310.34); county taxes on property \$94,589.96 (up \$5,212.76); vocational school district tax \$24,551.93 (up \$1,457.14).

Outlay expenditures for 1971 are listed at \$42,500 compared with \$83,615.61 this year.

240 Deer Taken In County Area Up to Wednesday

As of Wednesday morning the deer kill in Washington County continued to mount with the five day shotgun "any deer" season still having a day to go before closing at 4:30 p. m. Wednesday.

Registrations at the five checking points in the county Wednesday morning showed a total of 240 deer had been shot. This figure is only 24 behind the overall total last year when 264 deer were registered. A record deer kill was in prospect.

A total of 183 deer were reported registered Monday morning. The weekend kill surpassed last year's tally when 166 were registered and also the year before, 1968, when 173 were tallied on the opening weekend.

Hunters in the surrounding area reported better success than those in the north where deep snow in some areas, high winds, blowing snow and cold greatly hampered hunters, especially over the weekend. One local hunter said that in his 16 years of hunting up north this was the worst weather he ever experienced. Many hunters who expected to stay longer returned home early this week because of the severe weather. Others were snowbound. There was no snow on the ground here until Wednesday after a snowfall late Tuesday night and early Wednesday. This was expected to benefit

Board Approves Acquisition of Kewaskum Bank

The Board of Governors of the Federal Reserve System approved the application by Valley Bancorporation of Appleton for prior approval to acquire the capital stock of the Bank of Kewaskum.

Gus A. Zuehlke, president of Valley Bancorporation, said that in keeping with Valley's policy the bank will continue to operate with its separate directors and officers, who are acquainted with the people and the economy of the area. It is expected that formalities of the acquisition will be completed early in 1971.

With the new affiliate bank Valley Bancorporation will have 14 banking offices serving eastern Wisconsin.

Word of the affiliation was received last Thursday by Wayland Tessar, executive vice-president of the Bank of Kewaskum, from Gilbert J. Relien, vice president, secretary and director of Valley Bancorporation. Application for affiliation of the two banking institutions was filed in September.

Tessar reported the entire Kewaskum bank staff was pleased over its affiliation with Valley Bancorporation and said the affiliation will place the local bank in a much better position to serve the area in large financial transactions due to the vast resources of the Valley corporation. 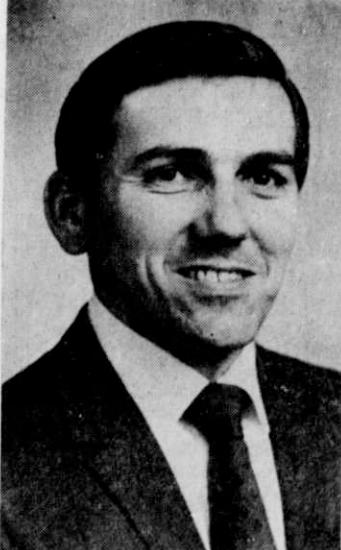
Zarling Is Named Vice President, General Sales Manager at Regal; Other Appointments Announced

Notice is hereby given to the localities concerned and to all interested persons that the Wisconsin Department of Transportation, Division of Highways, through its Highway Commission, will hold a public hearing in the Plymouth High School Auditorium, Plymouth, Wisconsin, at 10:00 o'clock in the forenoon on Tuesday, December 1, 1970, and at the Reedsville High School Gymnasium, 340 Manitowoc Street, Reedsville, Wisconsin, at 10:00 o'clock in the forenoon on Wednesday, December 2, 1970, at which time all persons will be given opportunity to be heard concerning their views on the Highway Commission's proposal, under the authority of Section 84.29, Wisconsin Statutes, to establish and construct a state trunk highway as a route of the National System of Interstate and Defense Highways, hereinafter referred to as the Interstate System. This hearing relates to establishing such routing in Brown, Outagamie, Calumet, Manitowoc, Fond du Lac, Sheboygan, Washington and Ozaukee Counties.

The portion of the Interstate System to be established through this hearing is part of the Milwaukee-Green Bay route authorized by the Congress of the United States and assigned to the United States Department of Transportation, Federal Highway Administration, on December 13, 1968. This section of the Milwaukee-Green Bay route begins about one mile northeast of the Village of Saukville, in Ozaukee County, and continues northerly in a broad corridor to near the south limits of the City of Green Bay, on the east side of

the Fox River, in Brown County. The entire section will be discussed and all interested persons will have opportunity to appear and be heard on the entire proposed route at either of the hearing locations mentioned above.

Information on the proposed corridors, including maps, sketches, and studies made by the Division of Highways, as well as documentation filed by others on the proposal, is available for inspection and copying at the Division of Highways' District Offices, 310 South West Avenue, in Waukesha, and 1125 North Military Avenue in Green Bay.

Exhibits depicting the general corridor will be on display at the sites of the hearing and staff members will be present to answer questions from 4:00 p. m. to 8:00 p. m. on Monday, November 30, 1970, in the Plymouth High School Auditorium, Plymouth, Wisconsin, and on Tuesday, December 1, 1970, from 4:00 p. m. to 8:00 p. m., in the Reedsville High School Gymnasium, 340 Manitowoc Street, Reedsville, Wisconsin. All interested persons are invited to attend these informal sessions to discuss the proposed project with staff members of the Division of Highways.

All interested persons are invited to attend the public hearing and present concise, relevant oral or written statements concerning the economic, social and environmental impacts and effects of the proposed Interstate Highway location and whether they are or are not in the public interest and consistent with the goals and objectives of such area planning as has been promulgated by the communities.

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Indians Rap Plymouth in Opener, 67-48

The Kewaskum Indians, defending champions of the Scenic Moraine Conference, opened the 1970-71 basketball season with an impressive 67-48 non-conference win here Friday night over Plymouth, defending champions of the Eastern Wisconsin Conference. The victory avenged an overtime loss to the Panthers in last year's opener which was one of only two games lost by the Indians all season.

As might be expected in the first game, the play was ragged in spots. The Indians were charged with a number of turnovers, mainly traveling violations, which cost them several baskets. Still Kewaskum had enough to win rather easily by a margin of 19 points.

The Indians started the game and the season on the right foot, running up an early 5-0 lead and building up a 19-7 cushion at the quarter. From then on they maintained the lead throughout the contest. The scoring was almost even in the second and third quarters but Kewaskum outscored the Panthers by 8 points in the final stanza to win going away with subs finishing the contest.

Clark Eichstedt, the only starter back from last year's team, and one of the top scorers in the conference, led the scoring with 23 points. He also led in rebounds with 17. Clark received much assistance from Bob Mertz and brother Glenn Eichstedt in both the scoring and rebounding departments. Mertz scored 13 points and Glenn 8.

In the first game under their new coach, Mike Williams, the Indians swept the boards most of the time. Their 1-2-2 zone defense bothered the Panthers, causing them to shoot from the outside a great deal. For an opener, Kewaskum did well from the free throw line, hitting on 19 of 27.

Kewaskum led at the quarter, 19-7, 30-19 at halftime, 42-31 at the end of the third period.

margin. The Indian JV's held the lead but blew it at the end. Jim Gaffke led Kewaskum with 16 points and Gary Marx tallied 8.

The Indians' next outing will be a non-conference game at Campbellsport Tuesday, Dec. 1. The Cougars have almost their entire team back from last year and should provide a real test for Kewaskum. The Indians play their first Scenic Conference game at Hartland Arrowhead next Friday, Dec. 4, another toughie.

Pick Mayville to Win Scenic Title

Rival coaches in the Scenic Moraine Conference have selected Mayville, which made its presence felt in its 1970 debut by winning the football championship, to also add basketball laurels. The Cardinals have been tabbed to dethrone Kewaskum as conference champion.

Coaches expect pressure on Mayville to come from Pewaukee and Hartland Arrowhead with Grafton having an outside chance. No mention was made of the Indians being a contender, probably because of the loss of five starters from last year's title team. But this writer is of the opinion Kewaskum may surprise and be in the first place battle all the way.

Mayville has six veterans returning. A year ago the Cardinals breezed to the Northern Little Ten championship with a 10-0 record and yielded only 46 points a game. Defense is their strong point and it is only natural they should be picked as favorites. The Cardinals are led by Jeff Stieve, a 6-4, 193 pound junior who is a good rebounder and stands out on defense.

Hartland has an abundance of agility and speed and is paced by a pair of 6-2 performers in Rod Barbera and Scott Bong, plus 6-5, 250 pound John Hauke.

Pewaukee has strength at the forwards with Rick Wank and Guy Thomas. Wank was second in conference scoring last year and his rebounding helped earn him a second team all-conference berth.

Despite the loss of Dave Sievers, last year's No. 2 rebounder and the third leading scorer in the loop, rebounding will be one of Grafton's strong points. The Blackhawks should get strong scoring from Harry DeLeeuw, who was the club's leading scorer and averaged 74% from the free throw line.

Germantown has five returning lettermen, including Wilbur Henry, an all-conference second team

choice. Bruce Beaty, 6-4, should give the team help on the boards. Defense is a problem, however.

Clark Eichstedt, an all-conference runnerup choice at forward, and a pair of speedy guards, John Nohr and Dennis Smith, could put Kewaskum in a contending position. Glenn Eichstedt and Bob Mertz, two big boys who saw much action last year, will help considerably.

Gary Huebner heads a corps of good outside shooters at Kettle Moraine, another new entry. Mike Huebner and Mike Braun should help in that department. Scott Howard, the big man on the squad at 6-5, came along strong last year.

Slinger has only two lettermen back. The Owls have speed but lack height. However, their 80-65 win over West Bend East last week indicated they might surprise.
