The student body at Wisconsin State University-River Falls showed a slight increase in the fall quarter enrollment total of 4,156. Last year, 4,123 students register-ed for the fall quarter.

At River Falls, as at all Wisconsin State Universities, enrollment of out-of-state students dropped and that of Wisconsin students increased as the result of a substantial boost in fees for nonresident students. The total number of students at WSU-River Falls includes 3,426 from Wisconsin, 684 from other states and 46 from foreign countries.

All of Wisconsin's 72 counties are represented except Menomonee County.
