Receive Kiwanis Conservation Farmer Awards



Leo Resch, R. 1, Allenton, and Orin Kirchner, R. 2, Kewaskum, received a Conservation Farmer award at the Kewaskum Kiwanis Farm-City Banquet Monday evening, Nov. 23, at the Hon-E-Kor Country Club.

Conservation Farmer awards are presented annually by the Kewaskum Kiwanis to two outstanding farmers in the Kewaskum area. Marshall (Skip) Boyd, president of the club, presented the plaques.

Roy Esser, Kewaskum High School vocational agriculture instructor and Kiwanian, conducted the program and showed slides of the winning farms. Don Kurer, soil conservationist of the U. S. Soil Conservation Service, explained their conservation plans and accomplishments. Supervisors Fern Hembel, sister of Leo Resch, and Norbert Dettmann, represented the Washington County Soil and Water Conservation District and County Agent, Maurice Hovland, the University Extension Service.

Orin Kirchner and Leo Resch are Soil and Water Conservation district cooperators with a complete conservation plan for their farms. Both farms have nearly all of their planned practices applied.

Any farmer practicing conservation knows that it is an uphill drive. This doesn't mean that his land up and down the hills. On

the contrary, — a conservation farmer works on the level — on the contour. But it does take time, work, expense and determination to get the job done.

Stone the fences in the middle of fields and hedgerows need to be removed in many cases to run the contour strips through. Then, crop rotations need to be fit into the contour strip cropping system. This could mean plowing up some new alfalfa hay seedling. Grass waterways are vulnerable to a cloudburst, which sometimes happen immediately after construction and seeding of a waterway. The seed will wash out and the bottom will scour, which could mean a repair job and re-seeding.

Leo Resch and his son Dave, operate a 182 acre dairy farm of which 63 acres are laid out in contour strips and 17 acres to be laid out next spring. Approximately 2,000 feet (1 1/4 ac.) of grass waterways were constructed and 1500 feet of diversion terrace. The diversion terrace and waterway act as an eve trough and downspout, respectively, on the land, to safely dispose of excess water which may happen to run off during a heavy rainstorm. A total of 6,700 feet of tile were installed with 10,000 feet to be installed in 1971.

The existing wetland vegetation of an 11 acre wildlife area is being protected from fire and grazing with plans to develop a

fish and wildlife pond in the future.

Dave Resch's pet project is a two acre wildlife area which he planted to cedar, pine and spruce trees as an F.F.A. member of Roy Esser's agriculture class some 8 years ago.

Ivan Kumrow, Soil Conservation Technician, worked with the Resches on their conservation project from the beginning.

Orin Kirchner operates a 100 acre dairy and hog farm of which 52 acres are in contour strips with 6 acres remaining to be laid out in 1971. His remaining cropland is plowed and planted on the contour across the general slope. He has applied 77 acres of conservation crop rotations of grasses and legumes rotated with corn to fit the capability of the soil.

The remaining 13 acres of his farm are in permanent pasture.

It takes a topnotch crew and livestock manager to succeed on a 100 acre dairy and hog farm today, and Orin is doing the job. He raises registered Duroc hogs.

Orin, Leo and Dave will be the first to admit that their wives deserve a lot of credit because we all know that behind every successful man is a woman.

Plans for Sewage Treatment Plant Here Approved

Plans for ten sewage treatment projects have been approved by the Department of Natural Resources (DNR) for eight municipalities and two resorts in the counties of Washington, Waukesha, Walworth, Fond du Lac, Columbia, Dane and Kenosha.

They include a \$400,000 sewage treatment improvement project at the village sewage plant. Kewaskum received approval for an addition to its treatment plant which is presently overloaded because of industrial usage and population growth. The community will install new equipment to

School Board to Move Ahead With Long-Range Building Program Plans

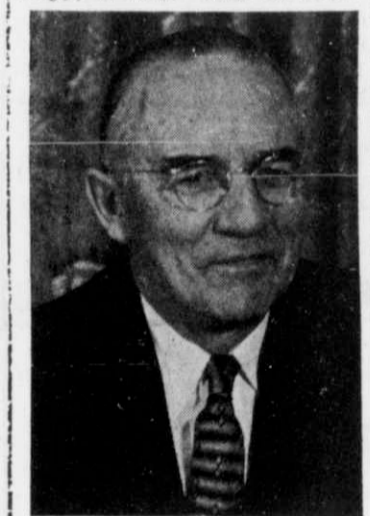

Charles E. Reigle, Vice President of Regal Ware Dies

Charles E. Reigle, 75, Vice President of Regal Ware, Inc., passed away on Saturday, Nov. 28, at St. Joseph's Community Hospital, West Bend, following a short illness.

Mr. Reigle, who resided at 1305 Roseland Drive in Kewaskum, was born in Leesville, Ohio. He was a graduate of Carrollton High School and Alliance Business College. For many years he operated the Reigle Food Market on North Cleveland Avenue in Canton, Ohio.

He joined Regal Ware, Inc. shortly after the firm was founded by his brother, James O. Reigle, in 1945. Until his retire-

ment in 1968, he directed the firm's credit department and until his death was a member of the board of directors.

Fondly known to his friends and associates as "Uncle Charlie," he was a charter member of the Kewaskum Kiwanis Club and active in civic affairs. He was also a veteran of World War I and a member of South Hills Country Club, Fond du Lac, and Masonic Lodge and Nazir Grotto in Canton, Ohio.

He was married to Irene Wilson on March 25, 1943. She preceded him in death in 1964.

The board of education Monday night decided to move ahead with plans for a long-range building program by having Superintendent Marshall Boyd contact "three or four" architects and set up interview dates. The project involves additions to the Wayne and Farmington Elementary Schools and Kewaskum High School.

The board reached its decision at quarter past midnight after going round and round discussing whether the building program should be offered to the electorate in a "package deal" or on a piecemeal basis and who the architects should be.

In a package deal, electors would be asked to approve one total sum to cover the entire building program even though all of the building would not take place at one time. If offered piecemeal, electors would vote on each individual project.

On the question of architects, board members pondered whether it should be the Schutte-Mochon firm which made a long-range study of district building needs and which presented preliminary drawings and cost estimates for the three additions to the board last June.

Schutte-Mochon were designers of the defeated swimming pool addition, and, as such, have left a "bad taste," not only among electors but among some board members as well, it was pointed out.

When the electorate first approved the swimming pool addition, they were led to believe the cost would be about \$250,000 but when it came to bidding, the bids totaled about \$350,000. Last December electors turned down a referendum asking for another \$75,000 and the project fell by the wayside. The funds borrowed for the pool remain borrowed.

Despite the "bad taste," board members concurred that Schutte-Mochon "are excellent architects and design fine school buildings;" that the only way to find out what other architects turn out is to visit buildings they have designed and talk with those building custodians.

Opinions were mixed on whether the project could be "sold" as a package deal but it was felt "we should have the plans ready even if the taxpayers say 'no'."

At the opening of the meeting, Principal Edward Connors pointed out the over-crowded situation at the high school by stating the classroom utilization rate is 90.6 per cent, far above the normal 70 per cent.

Adding to the situation, are three sections each of junior high industrial arts and home economics classes which must meet in the high school as well as junior high band students.

He called on Mrs. Virginia Froelich, home economics instructor, Neil Denniston, boys' physical education instructor and Mike Williams, head basketball coach, for their individual comments on insufficient space.

Toward the end of the meeting, the citizens advisory building committee which was formed in Octo-

ber on a volunteer basis, gave its report. The school board asked for such a committee to analyze the long-range building needs, to take a look at what had already been presented and for possible other points of view.

Chief spokesman was Howard Zemlicka, who also heads the industrial arts department. He said the group used a three per cent growth factor in arriving at the projected student population of 1,000 by 1980. Presently there are 662.

Zemlicka said the advisory committee's report was completed after meeting with high school department heads last week and that it had come up with a figure of 80,345 square feet of expansion in the high school. He said the figure does not include space for corridors or toilet rooms which might come to another 20,000 square feet.

If that is the case, "then we're talking about the same figure that had been proposed earlier—about 100,000 square feet." He went

through the plans, department by department, giving the committee's recommendation on square footage for each.

In some instances, space allotments were reduced. In others they were increased from needs recommended by Junior High Principal Kenneth Erickson, Elementary Principal Richard Zarling and Connors, earlier this year. Open concept planning was recommended throughout.

Committee members in attendance besides Zemlicka were Henry Wddig, Jr., Melvin Moths, Byron Gessner, Mrs. Alvin Panzer, Mrs. Elwood Berg and Earl Howell. Their general opinion was that there would be no problem selling the building program as a package deal, especially with "new" architects. "The ones we

had might not sell it for us locally," said one.

Boyd stated district finances are currently being studied by John Underwood of the First Wisconsin National Bank, Milwaukee. Informational meetings in various locations in the district are planned before a referendum is called.

Board members and committee members agreed that the over-crowded conditions at Wayne School merit immediate building plans. "We are going to run out of churches that we can rent classrooms from," one said.

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Jane Fenske Enters Beauty College



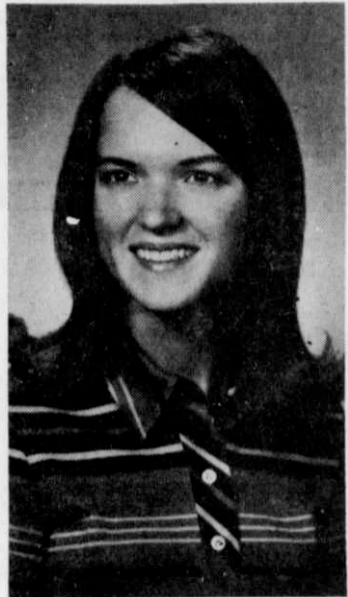
Jane, daughter of Eugene Fenske, R. 1, Allenton, has entered the American Beauty College (Marvel), Milwaukee.

bring its level of treatment up to standards specified in a DNR order.

It is anticipated that as much as 80 per cent of the sewage treatment costs may be recovered through state and federal aid. Bids on the project will be taken Dec. 21 and it is hoped to have work at the plant completed by June 1, 1971.

The Kewaskum project does not involve enlargement of the plant proper but does involve extensive upgrading and enlargement of facilities and equipment. Plant tanks and treatment equipment will be expanded along with chlorination facilities. An additional "force main" will be installed from the lift station and phosphorus removal equipment and related electrical controls will be installed.

The present plant was designed

to handle 450,000 gallons of sewage per day but is now running 600,000 gallons. The remodeled plant would increase the capacity to 1,000,000 gallons.

The village would have to borrow the funds until such time as state and federal funds are available, which could take as long as three years until approval of the installations are made. It is anticipated that the village will obtain 55 per cent of the \$400,000 funds required for the project and possibly as much as 80 per cent.

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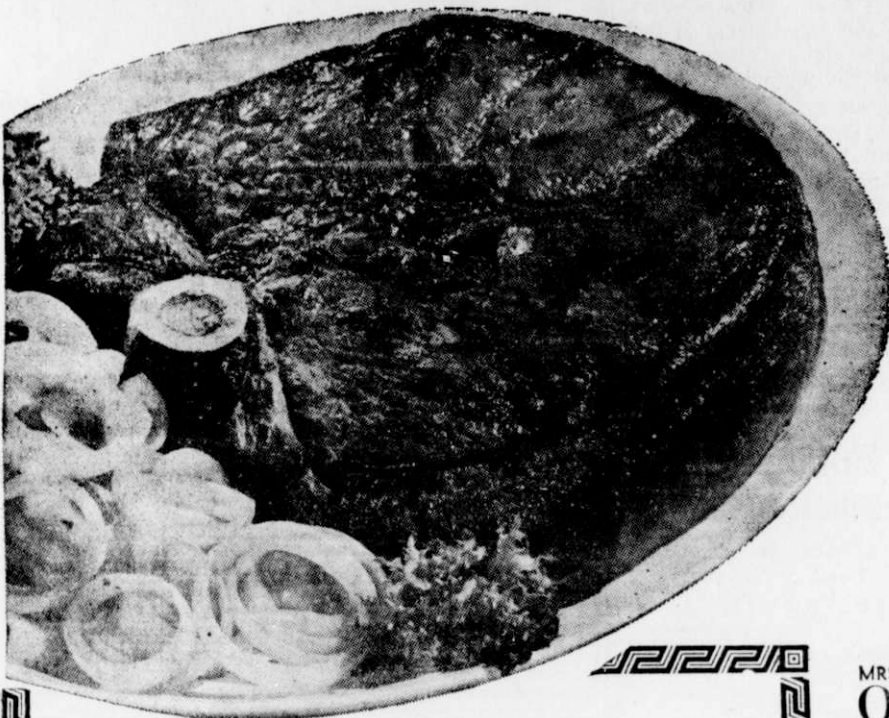

JR WOMAN'S CLUB TO HAVE SENIOR GIRLS AS GUESTS

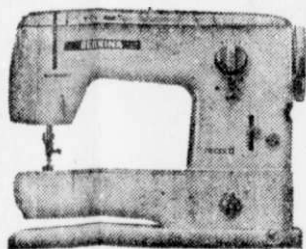

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6 Young Men Hurt In Area Crashes

Six young men were injured in traffic accidents in the surrounding area over the Thanksgiving holiday in three separate mishaps.

Gerald C. Mertz, 26, of R. 1, Alenton, was seriously injured, sustaining lacerations to his right eye and right ear and a skull fracture at 4:50 a. m. Thursday

when his westbound car crossed the center line on CTH H about four miles west of Kewaskum and one mile east of Wayne, and struck a tree. His auto was demolished. Mertz was removed to St. Joseph's Community Hospital, West Bend, by the Kewaskum fire department rescue squad, where his condition was reported as critical until the middle of this week. He has been transferred to a Milwaukee hospital.

Two Milwaukee young men were hurt and one of them had to be freed from their wrecked car by cutting a guard rail which penetrated the vehicle in a skidding accident which occurred at 9:30 p. m. Thanksgiving night on US Hwy. 45 at the Washington-Fond du Lac county line about two miles north of Kewaskum. A car driven by Ramiro R. Jaime, 23, 1513 W. Wacker St., traveling north, skidded on extremely icy pavement and spun around. The passenger's side of the vehicle struck the guard rail, which penetrated a door pinning Osvaldo Ramos, 23, of 3926 W. Cherry St., in the car. Kewaskum rescue squad members cut the

guard rail with a torch and removed both men to the West Bend hospital. Jaime suffered a laceration on his left hand and Ramos incurred a compound fracture of the right foot and other injuries. The interior of the vehicle was demolished.

Three youths were hurt in a two car mishap on CTH V about a mile north of Kewaskum at 12:52 a. m. Friday. The accident happened when a southbound car driven by John S. Robinson, 20, of Platteville went out of control and slid across the center of the road and collided with a northbound auto driven by Charles H. Hafemann, 18, of R. 3, West Bend. Both vehicles were damaged in the collision.

Robinson suffered a dislocated right shoulder and a passenger in his car, David M. Dreher, 19, of 1541 Fond du Lac Ave., Kewaskum, incurred lacerations to the forehead and left hand while Hafemann incurred neck pains and injuries and bruises to his right knee and head. All were taken to St. Joseph's Hospital, West Bend, by the local fire department rescue squad.

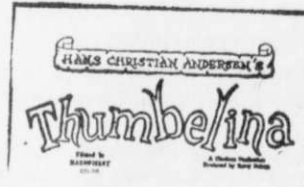

The Kewaskum Indians made it two straight in non-conference action by defeating Campbellsport on the Cougars' floor Tuesday night, 76-66. Thus the Indians took up where they left off last year when they beat the Cougars twice while they still were members of the Scenic Moraine conference.

Clark stood out right off the bat in the first quarter by rolling up 15 of his 23 points, high for the evening. Who knows how many points he would have made if he hadn't sat out almost half of the game? The Indians led by only 3 points at the quarter and 2 points at halftime. With both Eichstedts out of the lineup in the third quarter, Kewaskum increased its lead. Dennis Smith sparked the team by dumping in 8 points and standing out on defense. Bob Mertz also scored 5 points and hauled in some rebounds and reserve guard John Nohr added 4 points. At the end of the period Kewaskum was up by 9 points. Clark, Mertz and Smith combined for a total of 59 points. Eichstedt scored 23, Smith 19 and Mertz 17. Playing only half the game, Eichstedt popped in 8 baskets and 7 out of 10 free throws. Coach Williams praised Smith for his defensive effort. His speed and aggressiveness "befuddled" the opponents. 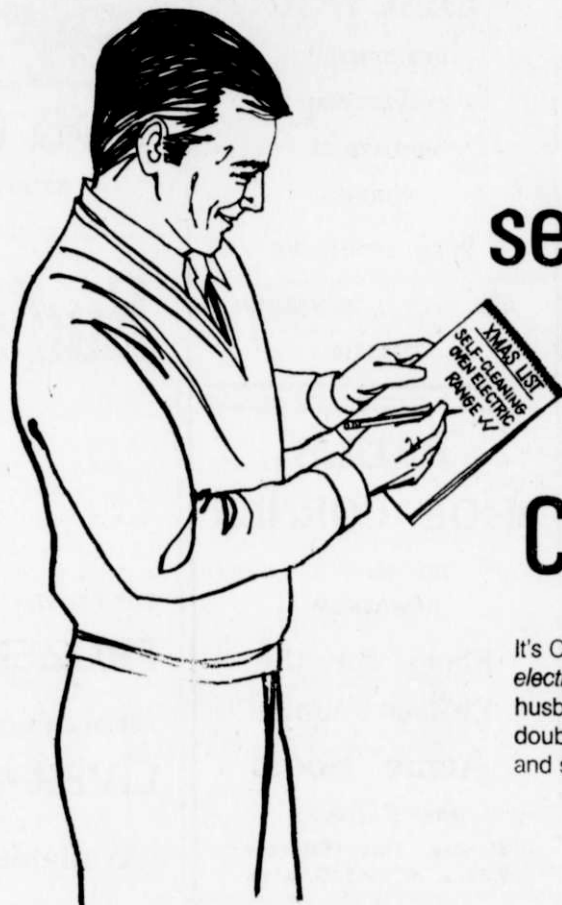

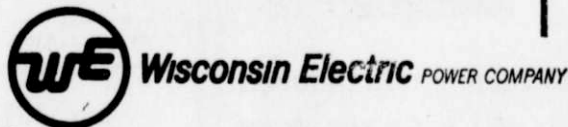

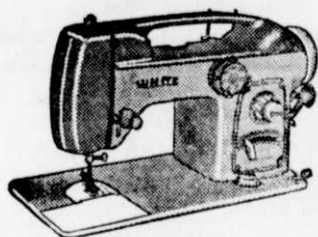
