## Village Taxpayers to Pay \$3.05 More Per Thousand; Tax Rate Is \$39.74

### Patrolman James Wyman Resigns; To Hire Replacement

#### LEHN PLANS TWO MORE APARTMENT BUILDINGS

Village taxpayers will pay \$3.05 more per \$1,000 of assessed valuation in 1971 than they did this year. A budget totaling \$808,520.11 calling for a tax levy of \$604,583.11 and a tax rate of \$41.59 per thousand was approved by the village board at its regular meeting Monday night. The state tax credit will amount to \$1.85 per \$1,000 of assessed valuation, bringing the net tax rate to \$39.74.

This year the tax rate was \$38.71. A state tax credit of \$2.02 per \$1,000 assessed valuation brought the net tax rate to \$36.69. Village Commissioner William Martin reported that the village's share of the tax credit was about \$1,000 less than last year.

Broken down, the tax rate apportioned 28.5 cents for state taxes; .65 for county; \$27.43 for local school district; 49 cents for the state loan to local school district; \$1.68 for vocational school tax; \$5.18 for village taxes.

The budget was adopted following a public hearing. Only one taxpayer, besides municipal employees, attended.

Trustee Orval Behnke was the only one who voted against adopting the budget as presented. He said he realizes it makes good sense to put money in reserve "for a rainy day" but he definitely feels this isn't the year to do it in view of extra expenses. Extension of sewer and water to Bel Ric Acres will cost the village some \$20,000 which it expects to pay this year. He said he feels that could have been spread over a number of years, instead.

Village President Cyril Wieter and the other board members contended that unless some money is put in reserve, "we'll find ourselves borrowing large sums of money at the end of the year."

Several years ago, little or no tax money was apportioned for village use and at the end of one of those years, we had to borrow \$50,000, they said.

Police Chief Donald Hlavaty asked for permission to advertise for a fulltime patrolman to replace James Wyman who resigned. After a discussion on whether the person to be hired should be full time or part time, Chief Hlavaty was authorized "to pick a part time man but don't hire him until you have the O.K. of the police commission" which consists of Raynor Herriges, Alfred Kral and Charles Miller. Hlavaty said he would prefer to try for a local person, because those who have been hired from out of town don't stay.

Stanley Lehn of West Bend appeared and said he is planning to buy three lots on Braatz Drive through realtor William Ruth and that he plans to build two two-story, eight units each, apartment buildings there. He asked for a

commitment from the board before he proceeds.

Lehn was told that earlier this year, home owners in that area vehemently opposed the proposed construction of one two-story eight unit apartment building on one of those same lots. At that time, Ruth appeared with Douglas Bloom, a West Bend builder. The residents got up a petition expressing their disapproval and following that, Walter Braatz, the subdivider said he would not sell any lots in that area for apartment buildings.

One board member commented "the residents will jump in the air. They won't stand for it." Wieter commented that even though Braatz may have had a change of heart, it doesn't mean the village board would O.K. a building permit for apartments there.

A village planning commission was recently appointed to set up a zoning code and until that is completed, the village board will continue to have final say on all building permits.

Lehn owns two other apartment buildings on Braatz Drive and he commented they are never vacant. "We certainly could use more," was one board member's comment. "but the question is where to build them?"

Commissioner Martin reported that he had a call from the Campbellsport Village Clerk Monday morning informing him that the Campbellsport village board has voted to enter into a contract with Fond du Lac County for use of the new county landfill and that Campbellsport will no longer bring its refuse to Kewaskum for burning in its incinerator.

It was noted that the terms of the agreement are that the contract may be terminated by either village on 30 days notice. Martin was told to notify Campbellsport that Kewaskum would like the contract terminated according to the stipulations.

## Fire Department Elects Officers

Annual election of officers was held by the Kewaskum Fire Department at the December meeting held last Thursday. All officers of the department were re-elected for another year. They are:

Assistant Chief, Ollie Staehler, Jr.; Captain, Rick Boden; Lieutenant, Eddie Miller; Secretary, Geo. Koerble; Treasurer, Donald Seil. The Chief, Armin Oppermann, is appointed by the village board and holds over in office.

Business discussed at the meeting included the salaries of officers. The department decided to hold its annual banquet on Saturday, Jan. 9, at The Wigwam. Wives, lady friends and honorary members are invited. The firemen's annual stag party will be held Saturday, Jan. 16, at the fire station. The department will be represented by two teams in the annual Badger Firemen's Association bowling tournament to be held at Cedarburg in January.

## Esser Delegate To National Vo-Ag Convention

Over five hundred teachers of vocational agriculture met in New Orleans, La. this week for the 22nd annual convention of the National Vocational Agricultural Teachers' Association. Roy J. Esser, vocational agricultural instructor at Kewaskum High School, was an official delegate and president-elect from the Wisconsin Association.

The NVATA has a membership of over 10,000 teachers of vocational agriculture with members from all of the states. There are 307 members in the Wisconsin Association. Millard Gundlach, Montfort, Wis. is president of the National Association; James Wall, Lincoln, Nebraska is the executive secretary, Sam Stenzel of Colby, Kansas, is the treasurer.

"Evaluation Today for Tomorrow's Needs" was the convention theme. The week long meeting brought together leaders from all areas of Vocational Agricultural Education for the purpose of discussing mutual problems and developing new innovations.

Dr. Arthur L. Hardwick, Associate Commissioner Bureau of Adult, Vocational and Technical Education, United States Office of Education, Washington, D. C. was the keynote speaker.

**Capt. Bob Miller Home From  
Vietnam, Receives Discharge**

Capt. Robert Miller, son of Mrs. Rose Miller of Kewaskum, who had been serving in Vietnam the past year, arrived home last Friday after receiving his honorable discharge from the U. S. Army at Oakland, Calif. He served in the army the past four years.

After a short stay at home, Bob left again Thursday from Milwaukee by air for Helsinki, Finland, to join his wife, who has been living with her mother there while he was stationed in Vietnam. The Millers will remain at Helsinki for about six months before returning to the United States next summer.

**Reilly Awarded Bronze Star Medal**

Sgt. Patrick J. Reilly has been awarded the Bronze Star medal for distinguishing himself by exceptionally meritorious service in connection with ground operations against a hostile force from December 1969 to November 1970 while serving as non-commissioned officer in charge of the Regimental Legal Section, 11th Armored Cavalry Regiment in the Republic of Vietnam. Sergeant Reilly was cited for the keen sense of responsibility, exemplary personal initiative, and maturity he displayed during his tour of duty in Vietnam. Although frequently burdened by adverse conditions and hostile action, Sgt. Reilly continuously provided exceptional service

to members of the regiment during its operation in Bien Hoa, Quan Loi, Cambodia, War Zone C, and Di An.

Reilly also received the Army Commendation medal for meritorious achievement in August 1970 for his efforts in behalf of naturalization for non-US citizen servicemen in Vietnam. He personally oversaw the naturalization of 15 members of the 11th Armored Cavalry Regiment. He also has the Vietnam Service medal, the Vietnam Campaign medal and the Good Conduct medal.

Reilly is the son of Mr. and Mrs. John W. Reilly, 320 Washington St., Campbellsport. He graduated from Campbellsport High School in 1967 and attended Spencerian Business College in Milwaukee, prior to his entrance on active duty with the US Army in 1968. Sgt. Reilly returned to Campbellsport on Nov. 12 following his discharge from active duty, arriving at Ford Ord, Calif., from Japan and Saigon.

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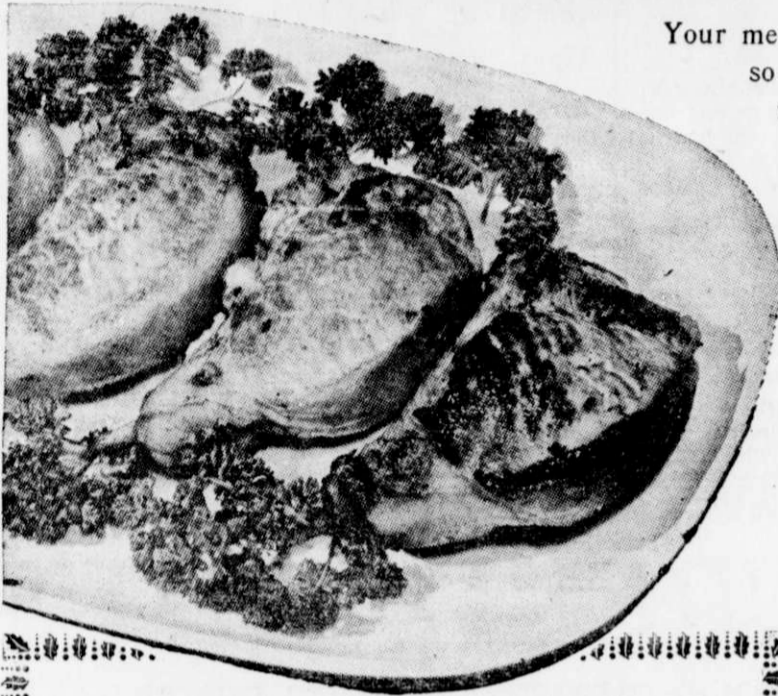

### Sentry Food Stores Plan \$15 Million Expansion

The Godfrey Co. of Waukesha, operator of Sentry Food Stores, will build its second Crestwood Bakery next year near Lake Winnebago, officers have disclosed.

The proposed bakery is part of a \$15 million expansion plan for the retail food chain during the next two years, James E. Godfrey, chairman of the board, and John A. Godfrey, president, said.

The \$15 million does not include a \$300,000 addition to Sentry's freezer warehouse at its Waukesha corporate headquarters. The addition, completed Nov. 1, increased total freezer space from 325,000 cubic feet to 725,000 cubic feet.

The planned construction covers these areas:

- A second bakery to take part of the burden off the firm's Crestwood Bakery in West Allis. That bakery now serves all Sentry stores.

- Ten to 12 new Sentry stores to be built through 1972.

- An expansion of the warehouse at the Waukesha headquarters, increasing the facility by about 20%. Square footage will be increased from 400,000 to a half

million. Current loading space for 44 trucks will be increased to 52 spaces.

- Cold Spring Eggs, Inc., Sentry's egg producing subsidiary in Palmyra, Wis., will be expanded. Plans call for hen areas to be increased from 228,000 square feet to 268,000 square feet. Egg production is expected to advance to 3.7 million dozen in 1971, up from about 3 million dozen this year.

- There now are 200 head of beef cattle at Artesian Farms, Inc., another Godfrey subsidiary adjacent to Cold Spring Eggs in Palmyra. The Black Angus herd will be built for about two more years, then annual sales of the registered herd will be held.

The beef breeding project is separate from the Sentry operation. There are no plans to produce meat for the stores, James Godfrey said.

At Artesian Farms, corn, the major ingredient of the poultry ration for Cold Springs' chickens, is grown. There is a reciprocity involved: Manure from the chickens enriches the soil on which the corn is grown, Godfrey said.

The eggs are produced for Sentry stores.

He said the company got into the business in search of fresher eggs of better quality. Eggs are shipped directly from Cold

Springs to the stores, bypassing the warehouse.

"In the long run we feel we will be able to sell eggs at a lower cost," Godfrey said.

Egg production has just recently reached the level to supply all Sentry needs, Godfrey said. He said the planned increase in egg laying buildings will allow the farm to produce all the eggs needed by Crestwood bakeries as well.

John Godfrey said the company is examining several possible sites for the second bakery.

"It will probably be in a smaller community," he said. "It now looks like it will be northeast of Fond du Lac. We hope to be near the proposed freeway linking Milwaukee and Green Bay."

The exact route of that freeway has not yet been established.

The new bakery will serve Sentry outlets north of Milwaukee. In addition, the Godfreys said the facility might enable the company to produce allied lines such as frozen meat pies, frozen biscuits and other frozen items.

The company wants to begin construction in 1971, start operation in 1972.

There are 74 Sentry stores in Wisconsin, all southeast of an imaginary line from Janesville to Green Bay. In that area, 80% of the state's population lives. The Godfreys said that, by 1972, there will be 84 stores and by the end of the decade, 100.

In 1970, the firm opened stores in Janesville and Green Bay.

Construction will begin this spring on stores in Oshkosh, Berlin and Janesville. Also planned for a spring construction start are a new store in Waterford to replace one now there and a new store in the Brillion-Reedsville area to replace a store in each of the communities. Other areas are under consideration for summer and fall construction starts.

Existing Sentry Food Stores in Madison, Racine, Fond du Lac, Fort Atkinson, Kenosha and at Calhoun Road and Greenfield Ave. in Milwaukee will be remodeled and upgraded during 1971 with an average of 6,000 square feet of additional space.

The proposed 100,000 square foot addition to the Waukesha warehouse space is needed because of a growing number of items carried in the stores. There are now 8,500 items at a Sentry store. Next year there will be 10,000 John

Godfrey said.

So far this year, Godfrey sales and profits have been at record levels, according to quarterly financial reports issued by the firm.

Godfrey began to franchise its own retail food stores under the Sentry name in 1953. In 1954, it opened its first corporate owned Sentry store. In 1956, the Crestwood Bakery was opened in West Allis.

Godfrey has 1,925 employees in Wisconsin, including 200 at Crestwood Bakery.

The next meeting is Dec. 10. David Schoofs made a motion to adjourn the meeting at 8:40, seconded by Jeanne Panzer.

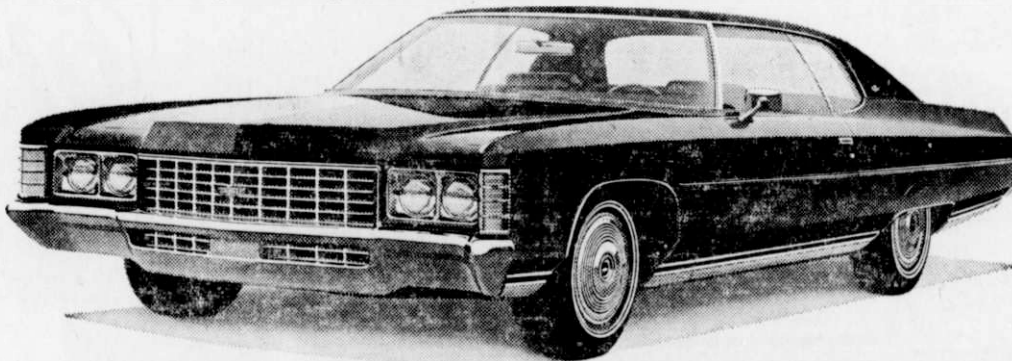
