In October, the board contracted the services of the Milwaukee bank for long range financial advice, for bonding and referendum advice and to secure a financial rating for the school district. It was felt having a financial rating could result in lower interest rate: in a bond issue.

For convenience of the snowmo biler, the department has plowed out seven or eight parking areas adjacent to main highway crossing sites along the marked trails.

Maps of the areas open to snowmobiling can be obtained at the Kettle Moraine State Forest Headquarters at Mauthe Lake, or by writing to the Department of Natural Resources, Box 426, Campbellsport, Wis. 53010.




