Tax Impacts of \$2.6 Million Building Program Heard by School Board

THEUSCH OPPOSES ISSUE; NON-PAYMENT TO BAUMANN BUS ASKED; TEACHERS HIRED

The board of education heard a financial report Monday night on the tax impacts that could be expected from a proposed \$2.6 million package building expansion program.

The study, made at the board's request, was presented by John Underwood, an investment department officer of the First Wisconsin National Bank in Milwaukee. He emphasized, that, at this point, the figures are hypothetical. "We are looking only at projections," he said.

He asked the board members "to study the material and determine the direction you want to take." The decision they will have to make is whether to ask electors' approval of the package program or have them vote individually on expansion at Wayne, Farmington and the Kewaskum High School.

In October, the board contracted the services of the Milwaukee bank for long range financial advice, for bonding and referendum advice and to secure a financial rating for the school district. It was felt having a financial rating could result in lower interest rates in a bond issue.

The 1970 tax levy for all debt service is \$178,294.98 and results in a tax rate of \$3.13 per \$1,000 assessed valuation. Projections show a rate of \$5.56 in 1971; \$5.59 in 1972; \$5.64 in 1973. In 1974, the rate would start declining and is projected at \$5.58. At the end of the bond issue in 1986 the rate would be \$2.93.

Underwood said he based his projections on the assumption that electors would approve a package deal referendum some time next spring and that the bond issue would be dated June 1, 1971.

In arriving at his figures, he said he took into account the present district indebtedness and the big balloons that will be coming due and the equalized valuation of the district which has shown an average growth of \$4,987,520 per year since reorganizing into a K-12 district. He said he "dovetailed" his report around those factors to come up with what he termed a "flexible debt service."

Also included were figures on how present indebtedness could be re-funded and yet be included in the total package.

He said a bond issue can be spread over a 20-year period but he suggests the district go to a shorter span for a significant saving, interest-wise. Based on present interest rates, his report projected that a 15-year bond issue would result in a saving of \$464,916.66.

"The market looks good now," he stated, adding that the present bond buyer index which is a barometer of the municipal bond market presently is 5.33 per cent, having declined from what he termed "end of the world rates" of a round seven per cent last spring.

He said the district finances were "in pretty good shape." A school district can go into debt up

to ten percent of the equalized value of the district. If the district went into debt for the whole package of \$2.6 million, the ratio of direct debt to equalized value would be 5.79 per cent which is a "pretty good financial rating," he said. As of June 30, 1970, the district's debt ratio was 2.30 per cent.

"Of course, you read the same newspapers I do," he said, "and you know that since mid-September many school referendums have lost out." But he viewed this as a trend. Earlier in the year, seven out of nine were being passed, he said.

Richard Theusch was the only board member to speak out in opposition to a package bond issue. "Let's get some bills paid before jumping in with some more," he commented.

He also suggested a study be made of the full-year school. "It was brought up at the last annual meeting," he noted, "and let's have some answers if it is brought up again at the next annual meeting."

Supt. Marshall Boyd reported that Kenneth Erickson, who is in charge of student transportation, recommended non-payment to Baumann Bus Co. of Campbellsport starting immediately, because William Baumann, owner, does not respond to or correct complaints and irregularities.

Resignations were accepted from Mrs. Mardell Borgen as high school girls' physical education instructor and from Mrs. Janet Hughes, kindergarten teacher at Farmington, effective at the end of the first semester. Contracts were approved for Miss Carol Stapleton who will replace Mrs. Borgen and for Miss Rita Featherstone replacing Mrs. Hughes. Both new teachers will graduate at mid-semester.

Mrs. Zona Miske was appointed delegate and Gerald Secor alternate to the Wisconsin Association of School Boards' convention in Milwaukee on Jan. 27.

A transportation contract was approved for Brian Skrentny to attend a special public pre-school class conducted at St. John's Lutheran School in West Bend.

Worker Injured In Cave-In at New Subdivision Here

A worker for the J L M Contractors of New Berlin in the new Bel-Ric Acres subdivision at the southwest village limits of Kewaskum was painfully injured shortly before noon on Wednesday when an excavation trench in which he was laying sewer pipe caved in.

The man injured is Wilfred Kuehl, 36, of Watertown, an employee of J L M Contractors. The entire lower section of his body was buried in mud in the cave-in. The extent of his injuries was not learned.

Kuehl and a fellow worker were working in an excavation ditch about 10 to 12 feet deep, it was reported. His companion had left to get some more pipe and when he returned 15 or 20 minutes later he found Kuehl in an upright position buried about shoulder-deep in mud. He appeared to be unconscious.

The fellow worker yelled for aid and other workers came to his assistance. They dug Kuehl out by using hand shovels. He was placed in a front-end loader and driven from the field some distance to the road (CTH H) where he was picked up by the Kewaskum Fire Department rescue squad and placed in the ambulance for removal to St. Joseph's Community Hospital, West Bend. The fire siren was sounded at 11:45 a. m. and firemen sped to the scene with their equipment truck and ambulance.

Freight Car Derailed on Track Here

Southbound Chicago and North Western railroad freight train No. 298 derailed in Kewaskum at 12:30 p. m. Friday.

The derailment happened a short distance north of the Second St. crossing near the Regal Ware, Inc. plant. As the derailment did not occur on a crossing, traffic was not disrupted, except momentarily while cars were uncoupled.

One of the freight cars reportedly left the track, damaging a rail and the roadbed. The derailment was caused by a burned out journal.

Brought to the scene of the derailment by the railroad was a large "cherry picker," a railroad designation of an automotive type wrecker-truck with cranes to put derailed cars back on the track. The wrecker and repair crews worked about seven hours repairing the rails before traffic resumed.

Young Man Badly Injured in Truck, Train Collision

A rural Allenton young man was seriously injured and was reported in "stable" condition at St. Agnes Hospital, Fond du Lac, Wednesday after he suffered head injuries and bruises in a truck-train crash near Campbellsport shortly before noon Tuesday.

The victim, John H. Spoerl, Jr., 21, of R. 1, Allenton was removed to the hospital by Campbellsport ambulance after his milk tanker collided with Chicago & North Western Railway engine No. 1522 at a crossing on Century Drive, a mile south of Campbellsport or about five miles north of Kewaskum.

Details of the mishap were still incomplete late Wednesday morning. Sgt. Irving Gauthier of Fond du Lac County police is continuing his investigation.

Listed as the engineer on the train was Louis Fenger of Milwaukee. The accident occurred at about 11:43 a. m. Tuesday.

Local Teacher New Part Time Police Officer

Police Chief Donald Hlavaty this week announced the appointment of George B. Allmann, 26, teacher of senior English and journalism at Kewaskum High School, as a part-time officer on the Kewaskum village police force. He replaces James Wyman, who resigned recently.

Allmann, whose appointment had to be approved by the police commission, consisting of Raynor Herriges, Alfred Kral and Charles Miller, before the announcement was made by Chief Hlavaty, began his duties immediately.

The new officer has had previous police experience with the Sheboygan County Sheriff's Department where he served while residing in the Plymouth area. He also served as a member of the Kettle Moraine state park police.

Allmann's joining the village police again brings the force to four members, consisting of two fulltime and two part-time officers. In addition to Chief Hlavaty, Officer David St. Louis is a regular full-time officer and the other part-time officer is Neil Denniston, also a teacher at Kewaskum High School.

Officer Allmann has been a member of the high school teaching staff for three years. He is married and has one daughter. They live at 1417 Fond du Lac Ave. in the village.

Wisconsin State University-Eau

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New Snowmobile Regulations Set Up for Kettle Moraine State Forest Northern Unit

Snowmobiles no longer have open range on the Kettle Moraine State Forest according to Dennis W. Konkol, State Forest Superintendent. The new regulations permit SNOWMOBILING ONLY ON TRAILS marked for snowmobile use and areas posted as open snowmobile areas. This does not mean, however, that snowmobiles will not have ample room to enjoy the outdoors. Fifty-five miles of marked trails have been provided, and an additional 1,800 acres of open snowmobile area has been set up in two locations.

One is a 750 acre area in the Town of Mitchell, Sheboygan County, just off County Trunk Highway "A" east of the Parnell Lookout Tower. The other area is 1,050 acres in size, and is located just south of New Fane in Fond du Lac County and extends south to State Highway 28 and west of the Kettle Moraine Scenic Drive.

For convenience of the snowmobiler, the department has plowed out seven or eight parking areas adjacent to main highway crossing sites along the marked trails.

Maps of the areas open to snowmobiling can be obtained at the Kettle Moraine State Forest Headquarters at Mauthe Lake, or by writing to the Department of Natural Resources, Box 426, Campbellsport, Wis. 53010.

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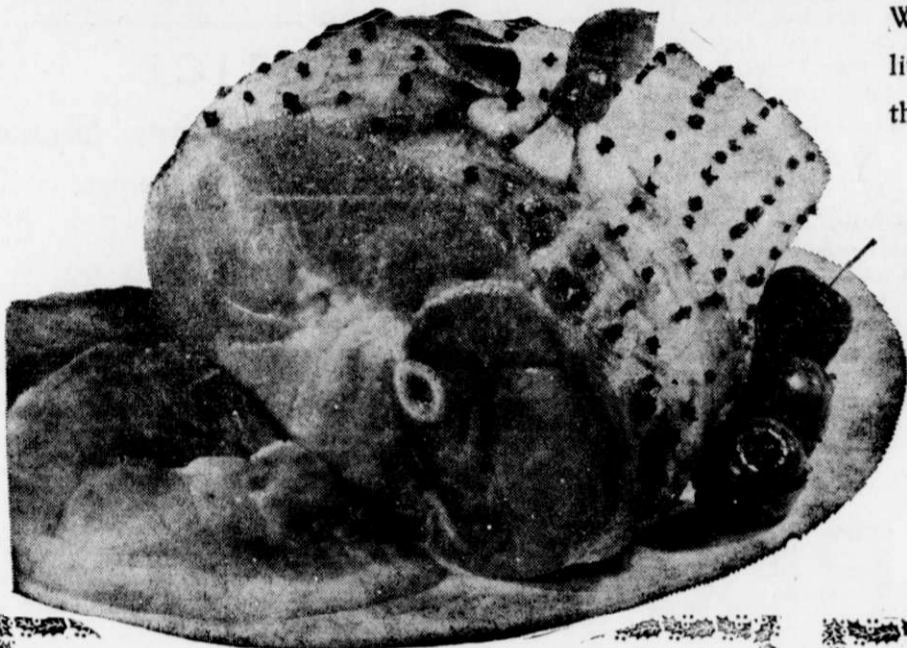

It was no contest after the first few minutes of play. After leading 20-12 at the end of the quarter, the Indians were way ahead at halftime, 45-28. Kewaskum put the game out of reach in the third period, outpointing the Lasers, 21-5, to take a commanding 66-31 runaway lead of 35 points. Moraine managed only 2 buckets in this quarter and Kewaskum's reserves took over for the rest of the game. With subs in the game the Lasers were able to outscore the Indians and cut down the margin to 28 points in the final stanza.

Kewaskum had 4 players scoring in double figures with 14 points or more each. The Indians small but speedy guard, Dennis Smith, playmaker who also causes many turnovers, led the scoring with 18 points. Most of his points were made on breakaway shots when he raced down the floor past the Laser's defense for lay-ups. With Kewaskum controlling the boards, he could do this and his mates got the ball to him on long passes repeatedly.

The younger Eichstedt, junior Glen, who has been coming along fast, outscored his veteran brother, Clark 17 to 15, but in all fairness to Clark it must be mentioned that he sat out much of the game after getting into trouble with 3 quick ones. Bob Mertz was the other player in double figures with 14. Top scorers for the Lasers were Howard with 14 and G. Huebner with 13.

Kewaskum made 37 of 71 shots from the floor for better than 50%, while Kettle hit on only 33%. The Indians' strong rebounding was a big factor. Mertz hauled in 8 and the Eichstedt brothers

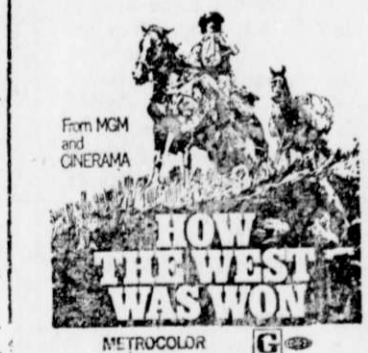

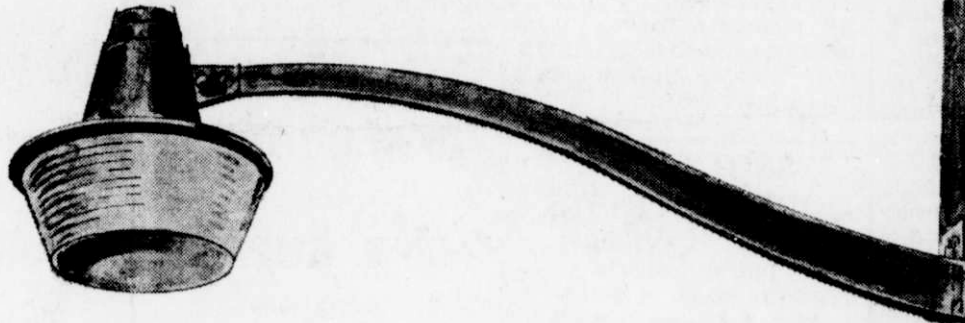

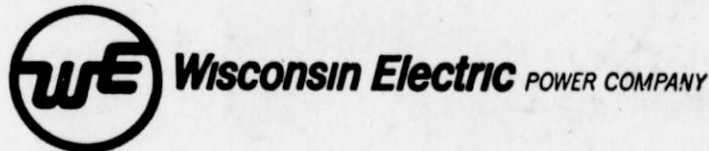
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
