## Village Asked to Determine Section Line at North Limits

The Village of Kewaskum was asked Monday night to determine exactly where its north village limits are, in order to resolve some existing discrepancies in property descriptions among residents there.

During the last few years, lots have been sold and homes built in the northeast section of the village and each surveyor has come up with a different description of where the section line is.

Appearing before the Village Board at its regular meeting were Wilmer Ramthun, G. C. Werner and Dean Roe of Kewaskum and Aldwin Seefeldt of West Bend, representing the Seefeldt family. All are property owners in the area in question.

They stated they are not so much concerned about losing or gaining some footage as they are about determining once and for all where the section line is. A partial survey made behind the Werner property established the section line about eight feet farther south than is shown on the village assessor's map drawn in 1957.

Also affected are the Elmer Youst and Otto Ramthun, Jr., properties. Realizing that the discrepancies have developed into a legal matter and that the village must determine where the section line really is, the village trustees referred the matter to Roger McKenna, village attorney.

John Breaker, who will have charge of the summer swimming program appeared and outlined briefly the program he intends to follow. The board granted his request for a telephone at the beach for emergency calls, as well as his request to attend a W.I.A.A. refresher swimming course. It is expected the beach will open about June 20. Debbie Rumsey of Kewaskum will be an assistant.

James Elder, consulting engineer for Kewaskum, reported that he will make arrangements to have Dr. Raymond Kipp appear before the board May 26 with his report and proposals for revising local sewage service charges.

Meanwhile, his report will be sent to local industries and commercial users to give them time to review his recommendations. They will then be invited, along with any interested citizens, to the May 26 informational meeting.

The Village Board earlier this year requested the Marquette University professor of civil engineering to study the local sewage treatment picture with an eye to setting equitable sewage charges in view of a \$425,000 expansion project underway now at the local treatment plant.

In other action, the board authorized McKenna to draft the necessary ordinance for adoption of a new building code as recommended by the Village Plan and Zoning Commission and presented by chairman Behnke.

Approved was the hiring of Robert Manthei, Kewaskum, as a public works employe at \$3 per hour, with a 20 cents per hour increase after six months. The board authorized three firemen to attend a pump operators' school

Bob Kirst, local representative for Schulz Realty, reports that a "Parade of Homes" will be held in the new subdivision later, with the tentative date set for July.

## School Board Divided on Which Way to Turn to Solve Overcrowding

SEVERAL TEACHER CONTRACTS APPROVED

Members of the Board of Education again discussed in what direction the district's building program should move to solve overcrowded conditions when they met in special session Monday night.

But they were divided in their views on which way to go and which school should have priority if it is to be a piecemeal building program. The package plan was defeated April 6.

Gerald Secor stated, "If we believe what we've been saying, why are we hesitant to proceed with a resolution to borrow money for the Wayne School addition."

John Jadro stood firmly on his view that the most critical need is in the Kewaskum schools where he contends "the junior high program is being sacrificed because of space needs."

High School Principal Edward Connors and Junior High Principal Kenneth Erickson substantiated Jadro's views with the comment "we haven't put enough emphasis on the junior high."

Because of space needs, junior high pupils have limited choices. Art, instrumental music and vocal music are their only electives and they must walk to the high school for some classes.

Richard Theusch commented "we've been living with overcrowded conditions at Wayne for years." The enrollment is 169 in a 100 pupil capacity building. A church hall and a relocatable classroom are being used.

Gerald Zimmer suggested "we get rid of one of the hurdles in the package plan—why don't we throw out the swimming pool and try again," Allen Tessar observed the pool is not enough of a hurdle. "The main issue is taxes," he said.

Mrs. Zona Miske commented there are enough people who want a pool and if the pool plan is thrown out, "pretty soon they'll start voting 'no.'"

Richard Zarlino, director of elementary education, reported that he was requested to find out what buildings in the district are available on a rental basis. He said Peace Church offered four rooms plus the church basement.

Zarlino also said he met with the Rev. William Bonesho, pastor of St. Michael's parish, to discuss possible rental of any or all of its four classrooms, a dining room and hall. The church board is meeting next Monday on the rental proposition.

Though the school has been closed several years, it is still fully equipped Zarlino said. However, it has no provisions for hot lunch. Unless a solution could be found, it would have to be used for kindergarten which would involve bussing.

Mrs. John Coulter, a village

## 3 Local Students Get A Ratings in State Forensics

Three students of Kewaskum High School were awarded A ratings at the state forensics meet held at the University of Wisconsin Campus, Madison, on Saturday, April 24. This concluded a long forensics season.

The three who received A ratings and the coveted gold medal are Rick Edwards in public address, Welda Kleinke in original oratory, and Margaret Roeder in extemporaneous speaking. Welda is a senior while Rick and Margaret are underclassmen.

The other KHS students qualified for the state meet, where they received B or C ratings. Darlene Schacht received a B in prose, Doris Beimborn earned a B in significant speech, and Linda Bullette was awarded a C in significant speech. Miss Beimborn is the only one to repeat at state from last year's squad.

Participants, in order to qualify for the state meet, had to go through a total of three eliminations. At each of these qualifying meets, the participant had to receive an A to continue on.

Approximately 1,500 students went to Madison for the state meet. The participants were judged by speech instructors from the University of Wisconsin in Madison and Milwaukee, the state universities, and certain Wisconsin high schools.

The Kewaskum forensics coach is Miss Sandra Rowley, who has coached the team for the past two seasons.

Forensics began at the local high school last November when the team traveled to WSU-Oshkosh. In December, the team returned to Oshkosh with many of the members earning certificates of excellence. A high point of the year was winning the conference championship but individually the trip to Madison is the coveted award of anyone participating.

Rick Edwards and Darlene Schacht are only freshmen and will be back to form the nucleus to an outstanding team.

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### 500 Area Residents to Participate in West Bend 'Walk for Development' May 8

More than 500 residents of West Bend, Kewaskum and the surrounding area are expected to participate in the International Walk for Development on May 8 to show local support for peaceful development of the world's human and physical resources, the chairman of the 1971 West Bend Walk said.

Tom Sarko, a student at West Bend East High School, said the West Bend walkers will join more than a million other Americans, and an additional million people in some 40 other countries in 29 to 30 mile hikes during the International Walk for Development weekend, May 8 and 9.

Sarko explained that the local walk has two goals. The first is to raise \$10,000 for development projects in this country and abroad. The second is to gain the support of the people of the area and their elected leaders for the worldwide development movement through a series of information activities prior to and after the May 8 Walk.

Sarko, a member of the Student Channel at East High, said the walk committee has chosen the Self-Help, Inc. store in West Bend and LEO Community School in Milwaukee to receive a portion of the Walk proceeds.

The Walk committee has also

selected two overseas projects, both in Honduras and both administered by Cooperacion of St. Louis, from a list of projects supplied by the American Freedom from Hunger Foundation. Young World Development, the youth division of the foundation, is sponsoring the 1971 U. S. Walk.

"We are asking for the widest possible support in our effort to make the 1971 Walk successful," Sarko said. "We hope that all the young people in town will join us as workers and walkers and that everyone else will join us as workers and sponsors."

"The way the Walk works is very simple," Sarko said. "Each of the walkers finds as many sponsors as he can who agree to pay him so much for each mile he completes on Walk Day."

Each walker will have a walk card which is stamped at checkpoints along the route to show that he has completed the distance he claims.

Sarko said that the rectangular route, as approved by the West Bend Police Department and the Washington County Sheriff's Department, is about 32 miles long and passes through West Bend, Newburg and Jackson. Walkers will start and finish their trek at the West Bend High Schools.

The West Bend Walk office is located on Room 2-B of the Fifth Avenue United Methodist Church. The office telephone number is 338-0510, and Walk committee members are on hand to answer callers' questions from 6 to 9 p. m. on weekdays and from 1 to 4 p. m. on Sunday.

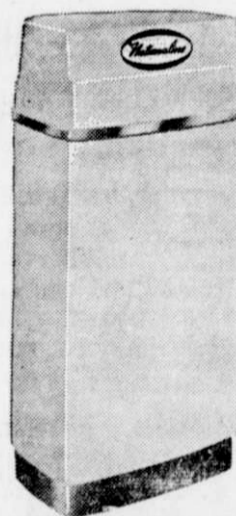

Blind bogey winners were Mike Pfeiffer, Ralph Werner, Don Theisen, Norm Held, John Holfeltz and Bud Perkins.

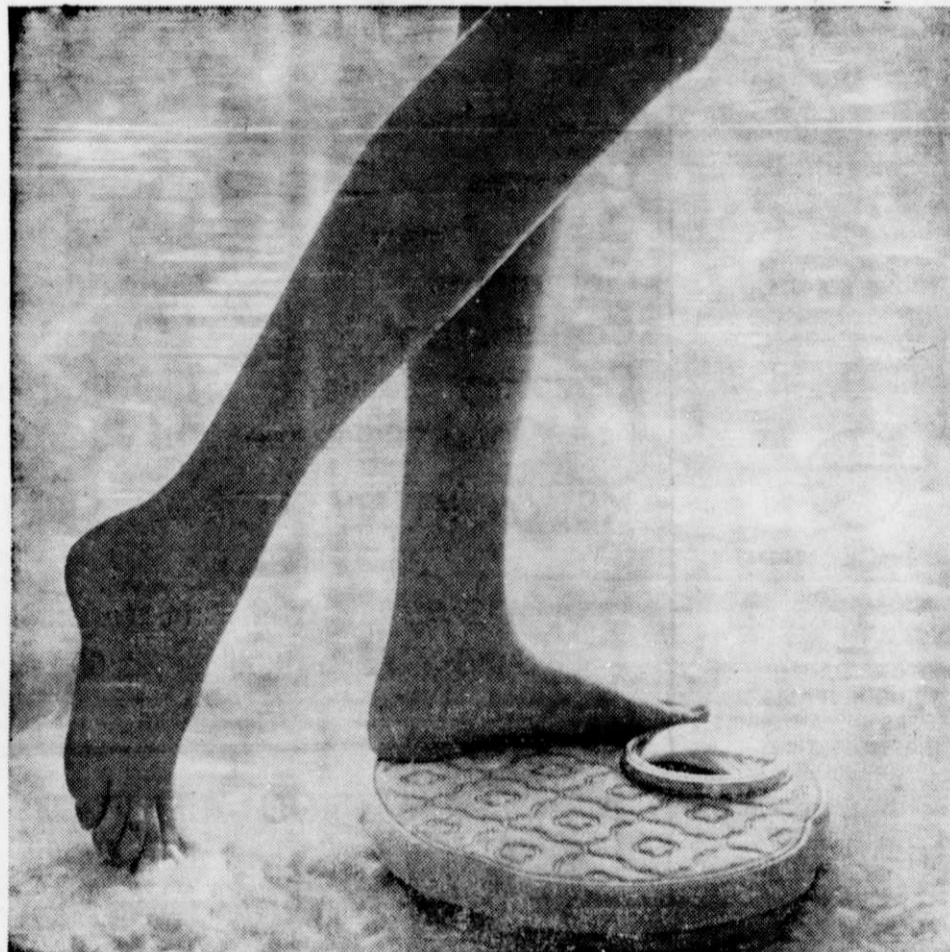
