School Board Members Asked to Decide in What Direction Building Program Should Move

At a regular meeting of the Board of Education here Monday night, Chairman Richard L. Edwards asked the members to come to the next meeting on May 25 with a fixed thought on what direction the district's building program should move.

He asked the seven members to get their decision "firmly in mind" as a roll call vote will be taken.

Ever since the defeat of a \$2.9 million package plan in an April 6 referendum, the board has made the building program a continuing discussion. But they have been divided on which way to go.

The issues have been whether a package plan should be offered again as the next step. Or, if a piecemeal plan is decided on, which school should have priority. Again, some felt Wayne has the most pressing need; others contended the junior high has the more critical space shortage.

Another possible solution came to light when Interim Superintendent Edward Connors stated that the Schutte-Mochon architectural firm had suggested in a letter that "the board might consider the possibility of our firm building the school and leasing it to the district with an option to buy."

Connors was instructed to contact the firm for details on leasing costs and what buildings, exactly, it had in mind.

It was noted that Floyd Brenholt who will be coming here June 21 to take over as the new superintendent of schools has indicated he would like to look over the district's space problems. "We could still come up with a July referendum, if we would move in that direction," said Edwards.

Meanwhile, Schutte-Mochon will be ready within a week to advertise for bids on a project to convert a high school basement area into useable industrial arts space. The project is estimated at between \$26,000 and \$30,000.

Connors reminded the board that if an adjacent garage is also converted into a classroom, that "we will have lost all our storage space. I am not suggesting we go out and build but we should be thinking about some storage area," he stated. He said a figure of \$2,400 had been quoted to construct a metal storage facility.

If, as a temporary measure, it is decided to use the Wayne gym as a fifth and sixth grade classroom, the Industrial Commission has stated that it would approve the plan for only one year, Connors reported.

Junior High Principal Kenneth Erickson said that by some tight re-scheduling, he was able to put the seventh and eighth grade health classes back into the high school building rather than rent space from a church as was planned. He added that every room will be used every hour.

Erickson noted "we can't predict the elementary conditions at the present because we don't have a means of predicting enrollments in view of new families moving into a new subdivision development here."

Also, as a temporary solution,

the St. Michael's church board has said it would be willing to sit down and discuss renting any or all of its four-room school, hall and dining area to the district, if the school board felt it would like to make such a move.

Board member Gerald Zimmer reported that several local businessmen had called his attention to the fact that the board is purchasing some items out of town when they could be purchased locally at no higher cost.

Connors replied that "we like to buy in town;" then added that sometimes purchases are made from salesmen who call at school rather than going out locally to get prices.

Teacher contracts were ratified for Mrs. Elizabeth Felt for part-time home economics; Miss Kathy Spylek, junior high physical education; Arno Cords, Grade 6 Kewaskum Elementary; Mrs. Deri Ament, Grade 5 Wayne; and Miss Patricia Zebrasky, Grade 4 Wayne.

Approved was the addition of a half-time teacher for the music department. It was felt the district's size warranted the addition.

Fire Burns Hole In Floor of Barn

Kewaskum firemen went on a midnight ride (actually a little later, at 12:35 a. m.) Saturday when they answered a call to the Richard Bonenfant farm in the Town of Auburn, located on CTH D east of New Fane.

A blaze, believed to have been caused by a defective heating lamp, burned a hole through the floor in the granary part of the cattle barn. Bonenfant, with the aid of a neighbor and members of his family, doused the fire with a garden hose and had the flames out when firemen arrived. However, the firemen soaked the charred floor once more before leaving. Firemen remained at the scene nearly an hour. Fortunately Bonenfant had the garden hose handy or the entire barn might have been destroyed.

Final Meeting of Season Is Held by Jr. Woman's Club

TELEPHONE CO. PRESENTS PROGRAM; REPORTS GIVEN

The Kewaskum Junior Woman's Club held its final meeting of the season at the Kewaskum Public Library Thursday evening, May 13.

The program presented was a lecture-demonstration, "A Laser in Your Future," by Harry J. Snobarger, Madison, community relations manager for General Telephone Company of Wisconsin.

Snobarger explained the operating principles of solid, liquid and gas laser systems and demonstrated the application of gas lasers in the communications industry by using a helium-neon laser, developed by General Telephone & Electronics Corporation, General of Wisconsin's parent company.

A single laser system, Snobarger pointed out, has the theoretical capacity to simultaneously transmit more than 100,000 telephone conversations, or more than 160 television programs, all over a single beam of light.

Industrial welding and diamond drilling, using lasers that generate temperatures of 18,000 degrees F., or twice that at the sun's surface, were among other applications of laser light that Snobarger discussed. Lasers have also been used to perform delicate surgical operations without cutting into the human body, such as removing tumors from the eye, or repairing detached retinas.

Lasers have also been found useful in radar systems, Snobarger said. A prototype of laser radar that measures speeds to one-tenthousandth of an inch per second has already been built. The device is so precise that it could be used in the rendezvous of space vehicles, such as permitting spaceships to dock without bumping.

Although the laser, which is an acronym for Light Amplification by Stimulated Emission of Radiation, was invented only eight years ago, Snobarger said that laser technology is advancing so rapidly that by 1976 lasers will be used in a great many aspects of everyday living.

One brother was killed while serving his country in Korea.

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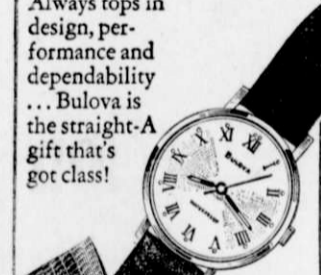
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George Scannell Called in Death

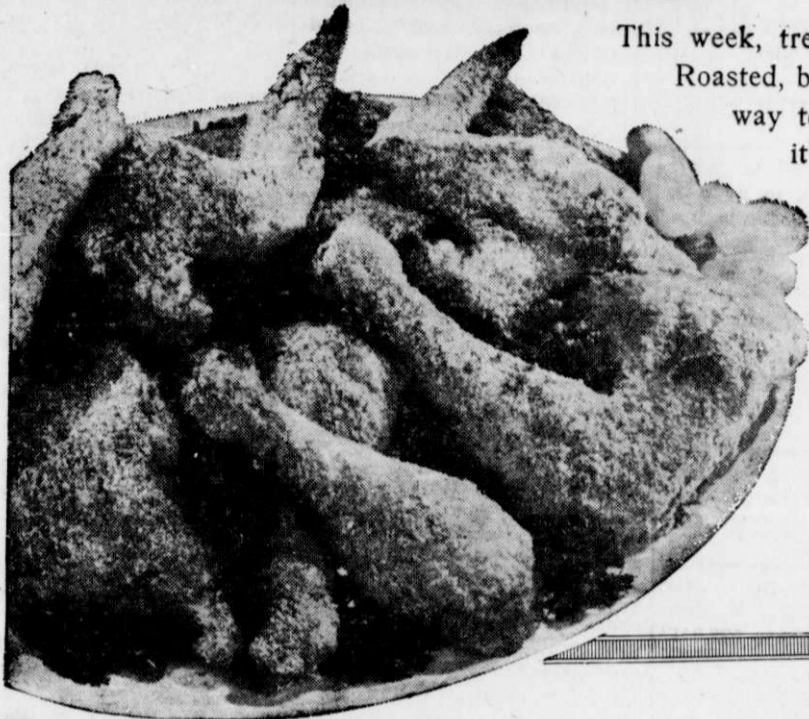

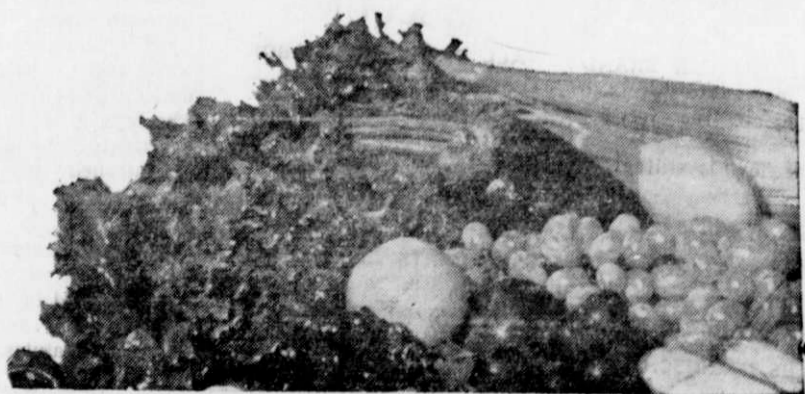

Civic Association Meets at Fillmore; Plan River Clean-up

Tips on how to organize a river clean-up were given to members of the Tri-County Civic Association by Bill Wolf, Grafton, president of the Milwaukee River Restoration Council. The association voted at its May 12 meeting in Fillmore to begin organizing a river clean-up. It will participate in a general river clean-up planned for next spring by the restoration council.

Wolf was questioned as to why the river clean-ups were always held in the spring rather than in the summer when the rivers are lower. He said that the level of pollution is lower in the spring due to the melted snow and that in the summer body contact in the water could present a health hazard.

When asked what could be legally removed from the river, Wolf said anything in the water can be removed. He suggested contacting all the property owners along the river to notify them of the clean-up. "Usually you have no trouble with the owners if you talk to them," he said.

Among the tips for running a clean-up were the suggestions that participants wear high leather boots, rather than rubber boots. "Rubber boots can pull off in the mud, or get cut. Wear gloves. You are less apt to wipe your face if you have gloves on," Wolf continued.

Captains should be appointed for each stretch of the river it was suggested. Those working in the river should be in pairs and carry lengths of ropes, to attach to objects that have to be pulled from the river. It will also be necessary to set up first aid stations and have places for the workers to wash. Clean-up officials should work closely with elected officials. The counties are usually willing to provide trucks to haul the refuse away, Wolf said.

Discussion of restoring the old mill ponds on the north branch of the Milwaukee river was postponed until the next meeting. According to Wolf the soil conservation office would be of help in the

mill pond project.

It was announced that a meeting on I-57 will be held May 21 at 8 p. m. at the Pleasant Valley school, Cedarburg. Bill Decker, Waldo, of the Stop I-57 Environmental Alliance said his group was obtaining statements from organizations throughout the state to stop I-57.

The next meeting of the Tri-County Civic Association will be held at 8 p. m. June 9 at the Newburg Firemen's hall. All citizens in the area interested in preserving the environment and in governmental reform are invited to join. Dues are \$1 a year.

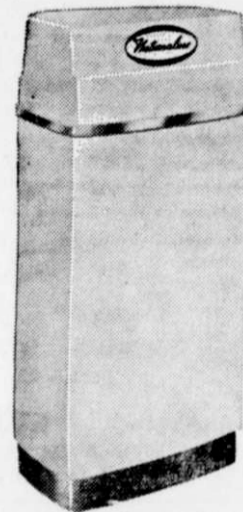

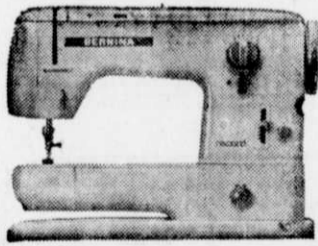
