## Schools Will Open Monday; Expect Enrollment of 700 in High School

### FRESHMEN WILL REPORT FOR ORIENTATION TODAY

All Kewaskum Community High School freshmen will be reporting for their first day of school today (Friday), Aug. 27, at 1 p. m. Freshmen are expected to provide their own transportation to this meeting. Buses will take students home at 4 p. m. on this day.

It is very important that all freshmen be present for orientation. The orientation is planned to acquaint them with the teachers, the school, the class schedule, and other class members. Deposits and fees will be collected, lockers and homerooms will be assigned, and books will be distributed.

All high school students, including freshmen, will begin school at 8:15 a. m. on Monday, Aug. 30. Buses will make a regular run to transport students to and from school on that day.

Expected enrollment is 700 students in high school, which is a new high. Last year 658 students reported on opening day.

Grades K-6 of the Kewaskum Community School District which includes the Beechwood, Farmington, Kewaskum and Wayne Elementary Schools will also open on Monday, Aug. 30. Daily starting and closing times will remain the same as last year with Beechwood and Farmington starting at 8:30 and closing at 3:01 and Kewaskum and Wayne starting at 8:15 and closing at 3:16.

All elementary pupils will be housed in district schools. Grades 5 and 6 at the Wayne School will be housed in the gymnasium and Wayne kindergarten pupils will again be in the supplemental building on the school property.

New staff members and their assignments include the following: Mrs. Karen Kuehl, 1st grade, and Miss Mary Murphy, 2nd grade — Beechwood; Mrs. Linda Cox, 2nd grade, Miss Sharon Lechner, 3rd grade, and Arno Cords, 6th grade — Kewaskum; Miss Patricia Zebrasky, 4th grade, and Mrs. Deri Ament, 5th grade — Wayne; John Rindo, music, Mrs. Linda Rindo, music, and Miss Jeanne Suttner, speech therapy.

If you are new to the district and have not yet registered your child, please do so at the Kewaskum Elementary School as soon as possible.

## Local Firemen at Gas Spillage in Campbellsport

What could have been a possible major disaster was prevented in Campbellsport shortly before noon Tuesday.

A resident of a trailer court, Mrs. Louis Heltemes, notified village officials that there was a strong odor of gasoline in the area. Eldon Spradau, police chief and village clerk, investigated and discovered that gasoline was spilling from an underground vent pipe due to an open valve on a storage tank above the ground.

Spradau obtained assistance and the vent pipe was closed until the operator of the Chicago bulk station could be located to shut off the tank valve. The bulk station is located along the Chicago and North Western railroad tracks.

Joe Thelen, fire chief, was also alerted and 12 Campbellsport firemen also responded. Kewaskum firemen were called and Chief Armin Oppermann, Assistant Chief Ollie Staehler and Capt. Rick Boden responded with a fire truck and the local firemen's foam generator was placed in service to cover the spilled gasoline with foam to reduce the risk of a possible fire or explosion.

Chief Thelen said the spilled gasoline estimated at 2,500 gallons, was siphoned from the grave and roadway in the tank area into drums. The entire area was then covered with a layer of sand, he said.

Firemen remained at the scene until about 4:30 p. m. cleaning up the gasoline and sanding the ground and roadways. They finished their work before the storm which swept over this area broke. Trains were held up from passing through the village during this time to reduce the hazard of fire or explosion.

### GRASS FIRE CALL

Kewaskum firemen also answered a call at 12:45 p. m. Sunday to extinguish a grass fire one mile north of the village on Hwy. V near the C and NW railroad tracks.

A number of the firemen were participating in the Allenton picnic parade at the time but eight men responded to the call. Those in Allenton were alerted by equipment radio and stood by but their services were not needed. Fire Chief Armin Oppermann reported a flare left by railway workers may have started the blaze as a train had been parked at that location for several hours in the morning, he said. The flare was found near the fire.

## Julie Ebert, 17, Killed When Struck by Car

Miss Julie Lynn Ebert, 17, of 1208 Stark St., Kewaskum, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Elmer Ebert, was fatally injured when she was struck by a car Saturday evening about 8 p. m. on U. S. Hwy. 45 about two miles south of Kewaskum. Miss Ebert would have been a senior at Kewaskum High School this fall.

Miss Ebert's death was the 24th traffic fatality in Washington County this year. Two more fatalities were added to the list this week to bring the total to 26, as compared to 18 all during 1970. A West Bend young man, James Berend, 20, was killed Tuesday afternoon in a Hwy 41 crash and an Allenton woman was reported killed in an accident on Hwy. 33 near the junction with 144 Wednesday afternoon. These last two fatalities were the 7th and 8th in the county in 25 days.

According to the sheriff's department, Miss Ebert was walking with another girl on the west side of Hwy. 45 when some friends came along the highway, driving north, and she ran across the highway to talk to them.

Deputies reported she dashed into the path of a southbound auto driven by Frederick Kissinger, 39, of R. 2, Kewaskum, who was unable to stop in time to avoid hitting her. Kissinger and members of his family, who were riding with him, were not injured. He was not held.

Miss Ebert was removed to St. Joseph's Community Hospital, West Bend, by the Kewaskum

## Burckhardt's Is Burglarized, Get \$4,000 in Items

Merchandise valued at a cost of \$4,000 was taken in a burglary at Burckhardt's TV and Appliance Store in Kewaskum some time during the night or early Thursday morning. It is believed the burglary occurred between 2 and 8 a. m.

The burglary was discovered Thursday morning when an employee, Mrs. Eldon Ramthun, R. 2, Campbellsport, opened up the store at 8:30 a. m. She notified the Kewaskum Police Department. Jack Jadro, store manager, said he closed the store at the usual time, 5:30 p. m. Wednesday. Jadro, a member of the Kewaskum School District Board, was notified of the burglary at a reception for teachers at the school.

An inventory taken Thursday revealed that items taken included a number of color television sets, both console and table model sets, a number of radios, tape recorders, one stereo and equipment, two toasters, shavers and records. No cash was taken.

Chief of Police Donald Hlavaty, along with two county detectives, were called to the scene to investigate. They discovered that a side basement window was broken first but believed that when the burglars couldn't get in that way or decided against it they forced entry by prying open a rear door. Telephone lines had been cut.

The store's owner Robert Steiner of West Bend, believed that the burglary must have taken a length of time as some of the items taken were quite heavy. He said it looked like a professional job.

Police figure that a small truck or van was used to haul away the merchandise from the size of tracks found at the rear of the building. Detectives also obtained some finger prints.

## Hot Lunch Prices Will Remain the Same at Schools

Prices for hot lunches at the Kewaskum Community Schools will remain the same as last year for the beginning of school, but other procedures will be somewhat changed from previous years.

Ticket prices for the start of the year will be as follows: Five-meal ticket — student, \$1.65; daily ticket — student or adult, .50; five-meal ticket — adult, \$2.00.

Extra milk at meals and milk-break milk will be 1c for students and 5c for adults. The five-meal ticket may be used for any five days rather than having to be used in a given week, as was previously the case. No monthly tickets will be sold, but if parents prefer to buy monthly, rather than weekly, they may simply purchase four (4) five-meal tickets. Students should bring money on the first day of school if they will be participating in the hot lunch program.

No refunds will be made for any lost or stolen tickets.

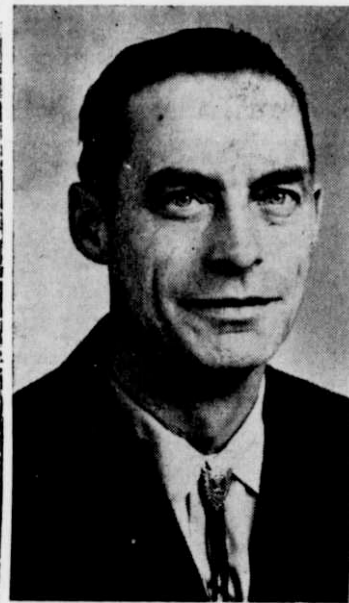

rescue squad. She was pronounced dead at the hospital, the sheriff's report stated. She suffered head, internal and other injuries.

### INFORMATION TO ELECTORS

(a) Upon entering the polling place, an elector shall give his name and address before receiving the ballot from the ballot clerk. The initials of 2 ballot clerks must appear on the ballot. Upon receiving the ballot, the elector shall retire alone to a voting booth and mark his ballot. A ballot clerk may inform the elector of the proper manner for marking a ballot, but he shall not in any manner advise or indicate for whom to vote.

(b) On referenda questions, the elector shall make a cross or other mark in the square at the right of the answer which he intends to give.

(c) The ballot should not be marked in any other manner. If the elector spoils a ballot, he shall return it to an election official who shall issue another in its place, but not more than 3 ballots shall be issued to any one elector. Not more than 5 minutes' time shall be allowed to mark the ballot. Unofficial ballots or a memorandum to assist the elector in marking his ballot may be taken into the booth and copied. (d) After the official ballot is marked, it shall be folded so the inside marks do not show but so the printed indorsements and ballot clerk's initials on the outside do show. After folding the ballot, the elector shall leave the booth, give his name to the inspector in charge of the ballot box, hand him the ballot to be placed in the ballot box, and leave the polling place promptly.

(e) An elector may be assisted by 2 election officials of different political parties in marking the ballot if he declares to the presiding official that he is unable to read or that due to physical disability he is unable to mark his ballot. 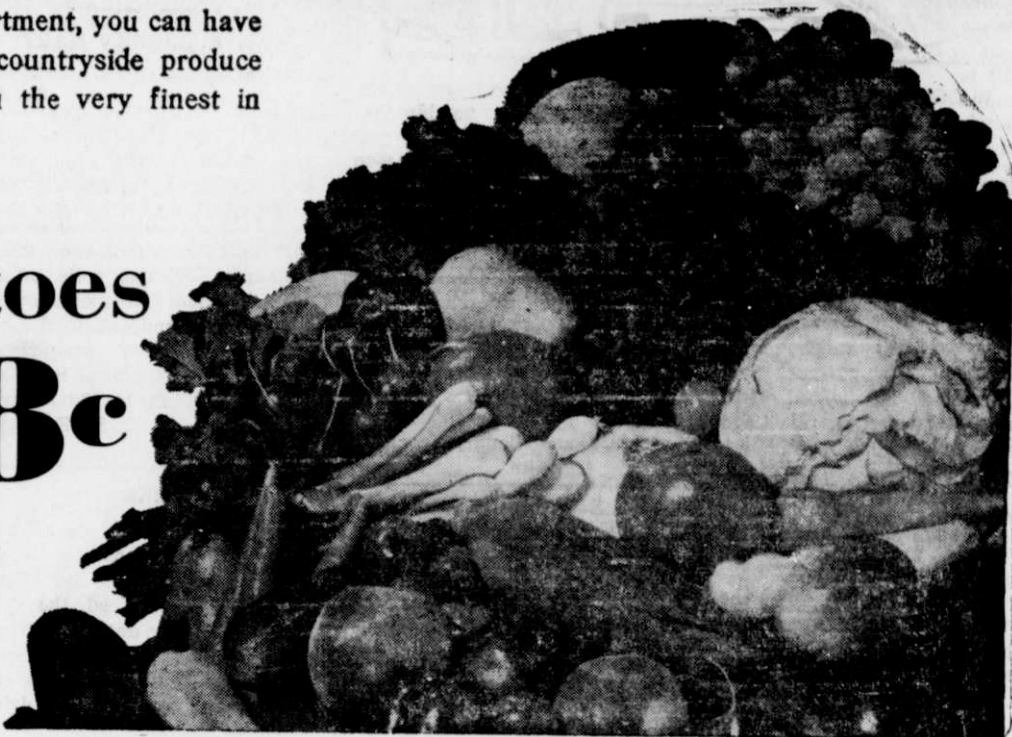

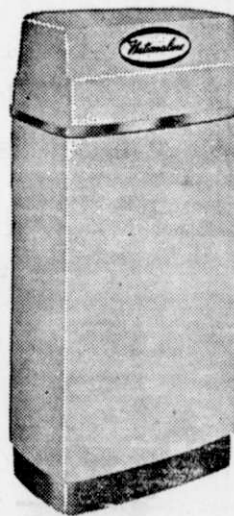
