Kewaskum Gets Federal and State Grants for Sewage Treatment Plant

AIDS WILL COVER MORE THAN HALF OF TOTAL COST

The Village of Kewaskum and this office have received word that more than half of the cost of the village's addition to its sewage treatment plant will be covered by federal and state aids.

In a release by the State Department of Natural Resources, it was announced that the state would cover about 20 per cent of the total \$485,200 Kewaskum project. The state share from the ORAP-200 funds will be \$90,975. The federal share of the project will cover 37 per cent of the cost, or \$171,010.

The state department cited a "tremendous surge" in the number of applications for the \$33.4 million provided for sewage projects under the \$200 million bonding program. The department sees this as evidence that the program is working to stimulate local governments to build new facilities.

Other area state grants include Meyville \$2,650 for a plant addition, Saukville \$3,575 for a plant addition, Port Washington \$63,275 for a plant addition and Cedarburg \$301,925 for a plant addition. Other federal grants nearby include Allenton \$7,700 toward a \$14,150 chlorination addition, Fredonia \$10,170 toward an \$18,500 chlorination project, Saukville \$10,500 toward a \$19,100 chlorination project, Port Washington \$356,400 for a \$1,012,500 secondary treatment addition.

185 Deer Killed Opening Weekend In County Area

Deer hunting in Washington County was good over the opening weekend as 185 animals were registered as of 9 a. m. Monday at the five checking points in the county according to Armin Schwengel, area conservation warden. Reports from the northern part of the state also were that the deer kill was heavier than last year.

Brought in for registration at the county sheriff's department were 89 deer. Frank's Tavern at Jackson registered 50 animals, the Hartford police department 22, Tally Ho Inn 14 and Breitenbach's Tavern in the Town of Erin 10 for a total of 185.

Hunters had until Tuesday to take any deer in the county, after which bucks only can be taken until 4:30 p. m. Sunday when the season closes. The deadline for registering deer is 5 p. m. Monday, Nov. 29.

A total of 104 deer were registered with another 81 checked in Sunday. In Ozaukee County 90 deer were registered over the weekend.

Reach Over 73% Of Hospital Goal

Pledges to the St. Joseph's Community Hospital Expansion and Development Campaign have reached \$1,754,000, or 73.1% of the campaign's announced goal of \$2,400,000, according to General Chairman B. C. Ziegler.

The new figure represents an increase of \$276,000 since the last report on Nov. 6 and an addition of \$520,000 to the total of advance gifts announced at the campaign's kick-off dinner in October.

"The campaign has really picked up momentum within the last week since the Special Gifts and Employee Divisions have swung into high gear," Ziegler said. "I expect it to continue to gain momentum in the days ahead as the efforts of these two important divisions reaches its peak."

Ziegler also pointed out that another major division, General Teams, is just now beginning its drive. As a part of the General Teams effort, up to 400 volunteers will be calling on all those throughout the hospital area who will not be contacted by any of the drive's other divisions.

"When we first announced the goal for this campaign, there were some who expressed the belief that it was too big a project for this community to handle," Ziegler said. "I firmly believe that such people misjudged our community. Though we are still quite a ways from reaching that goal, I am becoming more optimistic with each passing day that it was and is a completely realistic one. The entire community is uniting behind this campaign for a new hospital, and, united, we will certainly succeed."

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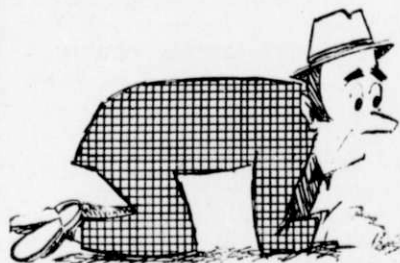
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24 YEARS AGO

NOTICE OF REFERENDUM ELECTION

TO: ELECTORS OF THE KEWASKUM COMMUNITY SCHOOLS, JOINT SCHOOL DISTRICT NO. 2 OF THE VILLAGE OF KEWASKUM, TOWNS OF KEWASKUM, BARTON, FARMINGTON AND WAYNE, WASHINGTON COUNTY, TOWNS OF ASHFORD AND AUBURN, FOND DU LAC COUNTY, AND TOWNS OF MITCHELL AND SCOTT, SHEBOYGAN COUNTY, WISCONSIN

PLEASE TAKE NOTICE that a referendum election will be held by The Kewaskum Community Schools, Joint School District No. 2 of the Village of Kewaskum, Towns of Kewaskum, Barton, Farmington and Wayne, Washington County, Towns of Ashford and Auburn, Fond du Lac County, and Towns of Mitchell and Scott, Sheboygan County, Wisconsin, on December 13, 1971, on the question of whether or not the initial resolution set forth in the referendum question below shall be approved, said initial resolution having been adopted by the School Board of said School District on the 1st day of November, 1971.

The referendum question is:

Shall the following initial resolution be approved?

RESOLVED that The Kewaskum Community Schools, Joint School District No. 2 of the Village of Kewaskum, Towns of Kewaskum, Barton, Farmington and Wayne, Washington County, Towns of Ashford and Auburn, Fond du Lac County, and Towns of Mitchell and Scott, Sheboygan County, Wisconsin, borrow an amount not to exceed \$2,660,000.00 by issuing its general obligation coupon bonds for the purpose of building and equipping additions to the Farmington and Wayne Elementary Schools, and The Kewaskum Community High School, and the Kewaskum Junior High School, and of building and equipping a new Kewaskum Elementary School in said School District.

EXPLANATORY STATEMENT

The electors will have an opportunity to vote either "Yes" or "No". A "Yes" vote will indicate an elector's approval of the borrowing in the amount and for the purpose described in the initial resolution, and a "No" vote will indicate the elector's rejection of such borrowing for such purpose.

INFORMATION TO ELECTORS

(a) Upon entering the polling place, an elector shall give his name and address before receiving the ballot from the ballot clerk. The initials of 2 ballot clerks must appear on the ballot. Upon receiving the ballot, the elector shall retire alone to a voting booth and mark his ballot. A ballot clerk may inform the elector of the proper manner for marking a ballot, but he shall not in any manner advise or indicate for whom to vote.

(b) On referenda questions, the elector shall make a cross or other mark in the square at the right of the answer which he intends to give.

(c) The ballot should not be marked in any other manner. If the elector spoils a ballot, he shall return it to an election official who shall issue another in its place, but not more than 3 ballots shall be issued to any one elector. Not more than 5 minutes' time shall be allowed to mark the ballot. Unofficial ballots or a memorandum to assist the elector in marking his ballot may be taken into the booth and copied. The sample ballot shall not be shown to anyone so as to reveal how the ballot is marked.

(d) After the official ballot is marked, it shall be folded so the inside marks do not show but so the printed indorsements and ballot clerk's initials on the outside do show. After folding the ballot, the elector shall leave the booth, give his name to the inspector in charge of the ballot box, hand him the ballot to be placed in the ballot box, and leave the polling place promptly.

(e) An elector may be assisted by 2 election officials of different political parties in marking the ballot if he declares to the presiding official that he is unable to read or that due to physical disability he is unable to mark his ballot. If an elector declares that he is visually handicapped, he may have anyone assist him in marking his ballot or operating a voting machine. Indians Beat Plymouth in Opener, 76-67

The Kewaskum Indians opened the basketball season with a non-conference game at Plymouth Friday night and came home with a 76-67 win over the Panthers.

The Indians were down by 7 points at halftime, 44-37, but really turned it on with a third quarter spree in which they outscored Plymouth 21-8 to go ahead, 58-52. They also outpointed the Panthers in the last stanza, 18-15, to win going away.

No doubt the margin of victory would have been bigger except that Kewaskum found itself in early foul trouble (one player had 5 fouls, two had 4 and one had 3). The Indians were forced to keep ace Glenn Eichstedt on the bench the entire third quarter because of 4 fouls. Eichstedt, despite his foul difficulties, led the Indians with 21 points.

But the Indians shot 70 per cent in the second half with Mitch Misko, a transfer from Ohio, coming up with some brilliant play to spark the winners. Misko scored 6 of his 18 points in the third period and his rebounding, passing and all-around floor play added up to a great debut performance. Misko's twin brother is another good ballplayer who is expected to bolster the team but he did not get to play in the Plymouth game.

Besides Eichstedt and Misko, Craig Carr with 14 and Jim Gaffke with 13 points also scored in double figures. For the Panthers

Adams led the way with 21 points, followed by S. Groene with 18 and Schutte with 12.

After being dead in the first half Kewaskum came to life and played good ball, also forcing many Plymouth turnovers. The Indians hit on only 10 of 19 free throws while the Panthers made good on 17 of 23 for 74 per cent. The Indians shot 47 per cent from the floor.

One of five Kewaskum lettermen returning, Mitch Ogi, is out of action with illness but may get to play late in the season. Before opening at Plymouth, the Indians held two scrimmages with Hartford and West Bend West of the Little Ten Conference, with Eichstedt being held out because of a leg injury.

Plymouth won the JV game, 65-33.

Next Tuesday at 7:30 the Indians host Campbellsport of the Flyway Conference in another non-loop affair. The Cougars beat Random Lake, 62-50, in their opener. Kewaskum opens conference action next Friday with Slinger here.

In non-conference games last Friday Scenic Moraine teams broke even, winning 4 games and losing 4. Besides Kewaskum, other winners were defending champ Mayville, which blasted Horicon.
