## School Board Given Look at Current Financial Picture Facing Bond Issue

SCHEDULE FOR SPLIT SHIFT OUTLINED

Members of the Board of Education were given a look at the current financial picture regarding the proposed \$2,660,000 bond issue Monday night.

Meeting with the board was John Underwood of the First Wisconsin National Bank, Milwaukee, who said, "I have pretty good news. The bond market has firmed up, resulting in more favorable interest rates."

Based on recent bond issues sold elsewhere, he projected the interest rate at 4.78 per cent. "This is the most favorable market since we've started talking about this," Underwood observed. District electors will vote at a special referendum Dec. 13.

Going through his projections of the annual debt service, Underwood said that re-financing of present indebtedness would be necessary. Included are \$185,000 on the Farmington School, which is due in 1975, and \$325,000 on the 1966 addition to the high school, due in 1976. He further suggested the district try to repay next year the debt of \$47,300 on the Beechwood School, due in 1973.

"But," he added, "if the Dec. 13 referendum fails, we would have to re-finance the \$47,300 also. I am trying to achieve as much stability as is possible in the debt service and tax rate."

If the referendum fails, board members agreed to support implementing a split-shift program for Grades 7-12 beginning with the 1972 school year, according to a plan outlined by Supt. Floyd Brenholt. Board members went along with Brenholt's request, although some indicated they were not sold on the idea.

Grades 10-12 would attend school from 7:30 a. m. to 12:38 p. m. Grades 7-9 would attend from 10:32 a. m. until 3:45 p. m. The high school would have a "break" in the morning during which snacks or breakfast would be served.

The high school would go on a 7-period, 6-day rotation schedule, which is basically modular scheduling, Brenholt noted. Basic period lengths would be 40 minutes with some classes meeting every day for 40 minutes, some 83 minutes every other day, some 83 minutes two days of every six, etc. This would provide advantages to certain shop classes and science classes where fewer long periods can produce more efficient time usage than short periods, held more frequently, according to Brenholt's outline.

Bus routes would have to be adapted to meet the varying times, resulting in additional bussing costs of an estimated \$30,000 to \$40,000 per year. Of immediate need would be a building that could be used for an open concept area for junior high 7th and 8th graders during the morning overlap period when grades 7-12 were in attendance. This could be a metal building which would be converted to shop area later.

Elementary grades would re-

main basically on the present schedule with only some possible minor changes.

Eight classrooms would be freed at the elementary-junior high building for additional sections in grades K-6. Excess students from Wayne and Farmington would have to be bussed to Kewaskum to relieve crowded conditions.

Athletic practices and club meetings for grades 10-12 would begin at 12:30 and for grades 7-9, at 4:02.

Brenholt said split-shift would be an improvement over the present overcrowded conditions but that is could in no way improve over having the space that the proposed building program would provide. "None of the teachers would prefer split-shift over additional space," he noted.

District electors are urged to attend the informational meetings where all facets may be discussed.

Allen Tessar commented that if the referendum is defeated he wouldn't be in favor of another for a while and it would be up to the people to petition for one if they find there are "learning problems or undue problems." Richard Edwards countered with, "It is still up to the board to recommend what buildings are needed."

## Len Zuehlke, Local Garage Operator Dies

Leonard C. Zuehlke, 52, of Theresa, died suddenly Saturday evening, Nov. 27, at St. Joseph's Community Hospital, West Bend, after being stricken at work here the same afternoon. He was removed to the hospital in the Kewaskum fire department rescue squad ambulance about 3 p. m.

Mr. Zuehlke was a partner with Roger Strack in the Len & Rog Service Garage on Hwy. 45 near the south village limits, where he was stricken. He also operated a tavern business, the Z Bar in Theresa, since last summer and was a trustee on the Theresa village board.

He was born Nov. 22, 1919 in the Town of Lomira in Dodge County, a son of Mr. and Mrs. Alex Zuehlke, and made his home in that township until moving to Theresa 15 years ago. Mr. Zuehlke was married to Marie Leichte on Nov. 3, 1945.

In addition to his wife, he is survived by four children, Mrs. Robert (Carol) Bernhard of Theresa, Bonnie of Horicon, and Diana and Leonard Jr. at home; his mother, Mrs. Elsie Zuehlke of the Town of Lomira; two brothers, William of Akron, Ohio, and Arnold of Fond du Lac, and one grandchild.

He was a member of the council of St. Peter's Lutheran Church at Theresa.

Funeral services were held at 2 p. m. Wednesday at St. Peter's Lutheran Church with the Rev. B. R. Hahn officiating. Interment was in Union Cemetery, Theresa. Visitation at the Beck Funeral Home in Theresa was after 4 p. m. Tuesday and at the church from noon until the hour of services on Wednesday.

## Area Students Enrolled in UW Short Course

Several area students are enrolled this year in the University of Wisconsin, Madison Farm and Industry Short Course.

Classes began on Nov. 16 and will continue until March 10, 1972. The students choose from among 70 courses in agriculture and agri-business taught by regular professors in the college. The students live and eat in university dormitories.

This year, 168 students are enrolled, according to Maurice White, director of the program. In addition to Wisconsin students, four are from other states, one is from Brazil and ten are from Finland.

The short course program was set up in 1885 to teach Wisconsin farms management techniques and practices that would make farming more profitable. It has continued to this date, and is the only such program in U. S. universities.

## Over 80% of Goal Reached in Hospital Drive

The St. Joseph's Community Hospital Expansion and Development Campaign is continuing to make steady progress toward its goal of \$2,400,000, according to a report released this week by General Chairman, B. C. Ziegler.

Latest figures show that the total of pledges received now stands at \$1,924,000, or 80.2% of goal. This compares with the \$1,754,000, or 73.1% of goal, reported last week.

"Though we are continuing to make significant progress toward our goal, the job gets tougher all the time," Chairman Ziegler said. "As we approach the final weeks of the campaign, all divisions are now either in full swing or are nearing the end of their efforts. This means that the people who are out working right now and those potential contributors who remain to be contacted must provide the amount necessary to put us over the top."

"I remain as confident as ever that we are going to reach our goal. But, believe me when I say, it will take a total effort by all our workers and generous cooperation by those still to be contacted if our quest to provide better health care for our community is to be successful," Ziegler added.

The chairman urged those who still have not made their pledges to give serious consideration to the hospital drive's "Guidelines for Giving" when they are asked to contribute.

"These guidelines were very carefully developed on a graduated basis with each individual's particular financial situation in mind," he said. "The formula devised is similar to that used by the federal government in determining your income tax and we feel it provides a fair and equitable gauge as to what each individual's gift should be."

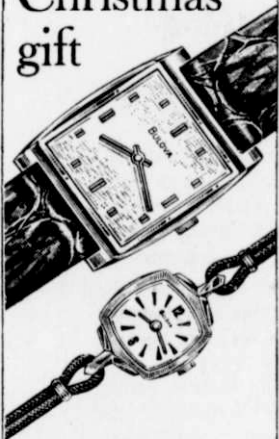

(d) After the official ballot is marked, it shall be folded so the inside marks do not show but so the printed indorsements and ballot clerk's initials on the outside do show. After folding the ballot, the elector shall leave the booth, give his name to the inspector in charge of the ballot box, hand him the ballot to be placed in the ballot box, and leave the polling place promptly.

(e) An elector may be assisted by 2 election officials of different political parties in marking the ballot if he declares to the presiding official that he is unable to read or that due to physical disability he is unable to mark his ballot. A last second shot just before the final horn sounded in the overtime period gave Kewaskum an exciting 61-59 win over the Campbellsport Cougars of the Flyway Conference in a non-league affair here Tuesday night. The victory was the second for the Indians and the defeat the first for the Cougars who had won two previous games.

tied at the quarter, 13-13, and again at the half, 30-30, after being tied up 5 times in the period. To start the second half the Indians spurred to a 37-30 lead and it appeared they were on their way but again the Cougars bounced back to bring it to 43-41 when the quarter ended. The score was knotted 6 times in the final quarter and the game ended up that way, 57-57. It was again tied in the overtime until Misko sank his clincher as time ran out.

The Cougars gave the Indians a surprising battle and the 11-day layoff since their last encounter showed in Kewaskum's ragged play at times. They will have to show improvement to be a contender in the rugged Scenic Conference.

Campbellsport almost beat Kewaskum from the free throw line, sinking 19 to Kewaskum's 11.

Tonight (Friday) the Indians host the Slinger Owls in their first conference tilt and next Tuesday play another non-conference contest at Horicon.
