Tax Rate for Village of Kewaskum Stays at \$39.74

TO ENFORCE SNOW REMOVAL ORDINANCE; BOARD TAKES ISSUE WITH ENGINEERS

The 1971 net tax rate for the Village of Kewaskum will hold at the 1970 rate of \$39.74 per \$1,000 assessed valuation.

A 1972 budget totaling \$968,279.54 calling for a tax levy of \$676,077.04 and a tax rate of \$42.33 was approved by the Village Board Monday night. A state tax credit of \$2.59 brings the net rate to \$39.74.

The budget is up \$71,489.60 but an increase of \$1.4 million in assessed valuation plus \$10,690 more in state tax credit offset the budget increase.

Complaints that some property owners are not clearing their sidewalks of snow and ice were aired. A village ordinance requires that walks be cleared within 12 hours after a snowfall or the snow will be removed by village workers and such cost will be placed on the tax roll.

Coinciding with that ordinance, the board approved a motion that property owners who fail to comply will be charged \$7.50 per hour or any fraction thereof, for snow removal. It was noted the ordinance will be strictly enforced.

Robert McMahon of McMahon and Associates, Neenah, appeared regarding \$817.65 which he said is due his firm of consulting engineers for services. Members of the board have withheld that amount from a bill of \$2,155.80 because they said they were not satisfied with his service.

McMahon said, "We were requested to proceed with a preliminary study on an addition to the sewage plant to eliminate odors and to bring it up to standards. We took 24 hour tests and the results gave us ideas how to proceed.

"Blowers were out of operation and we recommended one blower as part of the future project. We were requested to work on chlorination facilities. Then you weren't satisfied with the progress and we received a letter to stop work until further notice. Now I understand you have other engineers but we had proceeded in good faith," McMahon continued.

The McMahon firm originally designed the sewage plant in 1954, before Robert McMahon was a member. Trustee Charles Miller told him, "We are paying now for mistakes made when the plant was built. It gave off odors from the start and nobody came to check it," Miller charged.

McMahon noted that why was being discharged into the sewer at one time. They will always give off odors, he said. "Seems like I am being punished for mistakes made by my predecessors," he added.

Board members then took issue with McMahon on an assessor's map which his firm prepared. Village Attorney Roger McKenna told McMahon, "There is now a feud as to ownership of a small parcel of land at the north limits. There is a grave dispute as to where the north line of the village really is," McKenna contin-

ued; "and it is costing the village money to get this straightened out."

Noting that he would check his filing notes, McMahon replied, "I will get any information I can and send it to you." "I don't think you're being fair with us," said McMahon to which Village President Cyril Wieter replied, "The village feels the same way toward your organization."

It was noted that McMahon didn't actually finish the sewage plans and they were never forwarded to the village. No agreement was reached.

Five bids for a front end loader and two bids for a pick-up truck were opened and reviewed without action. The board approved revised plans for a 10-unit apartment building, as approved Dec. 3 by the state and a one-family residence, all in Bel-Ric Acres. A building permit was issued to remodel Campbell's Village Inn.

Operator's licenses were approved for Mrs. Geraldine Sengpiel, Mrs. Marion Bohn and Daniel and Phyllis Schmidt, for employment by Coulter's Liquor Mart.

Four Charged in Break-ins at Area Business Places

Facing two charges of burglary and theft following break-ins at two Town of Kewaskum business places Monday night, where they reportedly obtained loot valued at approximately \$440, are three area youths and a juvenile from the Edgerton area.

Held in custody at the county jail are two West Bend youths, 19 and 18, and a rural Kewaskum youth, 18. The 19-year-old West Bend youth is also charged with carrying concealed weapons. Dist. Atty. Robert Kauffman said four knives were found under the seat of his car, which allegedly was used in the thefts. The three were scheduled to appear in court Wednesday.

The fourth youth, 16, was scheduled to appear in juvenile court.

Kauffman said the youths are being charged with breaking into a machine shed at the Sunburst ski area where they allegedly took an assortment of tools and tool boxes valued at approximately \$200 and also entered Len & Rog's garage at the south outskirts of Kewaskum where eight automobile tires, a case of automatic transmission oil, two cases of soda, a set of socket wrenches and a tachometer were taken. The items were valued at \$237.52.

Electors to Vote on School Bond Referendum for Third Time Monday

Electors of the Kewaskum Community School District will have a third opportunity on Monday, Dec. 13, to vote on a proposal for school building additions in the district. The school bond referendum was already defeated twice at previous elections.

Voting will be done at four polling places in the district—Kewaskum Community High School, Beechwood Elementary School, Farmington Elementary School, and Wayne Elementary School. The polls will be open from 7 a. m. to 8 p. m.

The referendum question is whether the school district should borrow an amount not to exceed \$2,660,000 by issuing its general obligation coupon bonds for the purpose of building and equipping additions to the Farmington and Wayne Elementary Schools, and the Kewaskum Community High School and the Kewaskum Junior High School, and of building and equipping a new Kewaskum Elementary School in said school district.

The proposal being presented for approval this time at a cost of \$2,660,000 compares with that of \$2,605,000 in the September referendum and \$2,915,000 in the April referendum.

PLEASE TAKE NOTICE that a referendum election will be held by The Kewaskum Community Schools, Joint School District No. 2 of the Village of Kewaskum, Towns of Kewaskum, Barton, Farmington and Wayne, Washington County, Towns of Ashford and Auburn, Fond du Lac County, and Towns of Mitchell and Scott, Sheboygan County, Wisconsin, on December 13, 1971, on the question of whether or not the initial resolution set forth in the referendum question below shall be approved, said initial resolution having been adopted by the School Board of said School District on the 1st day of November, 1971.

RESOLVED that The Kewaskum Community Schools, Joint School District No. 2 of the Village of Kewaskum, Towns of Kewaskum, Barton, Farmington and Wayne, Washington County, Towns of Ashford and Auburn, Fond du Lac County, and Towns of Mitchell and Scott, Sheboygan County, Wisconsin, borrow an amount not to exceed \$2,660,000.00 by issuing its general obligation coupon bonds for the purpose of building and equipping additions to the Farmington and Wayne Elementary Schools, and The Kewaskum Community High School, and the Kewaskum Junior High School, and of building and equipping a new Kewaskum Elementary School in said School District.

EXPLANATORY STATEMENT

The electors will have an opportunity to vote either "Yes" or "No". A "Yes" vote will indicate an elector's approval of the borrowing in the amount and for the purpose described in the initial resolution, and a "No" vote will indicate the elector's rejection of such borrowing for such purpose.

INFORMATION TO ELECTORS

(a) Upon entering the polling place, an elector shall give his name and address before receiving the ballot from the ballot clerk. The initials of 2 ballot clerks must appear on the ballot. Upon receiving the ballot, the elector shall retire alone to a voting booth and mark his ballot. A ballot clerk may inform the elector of the proper manner for marking a ballot, but he shall not in any manner advise or indicate for whom to vote.

(b) On referenda questions, the elector shall make a cross or other mark in the square at the right of the answer which he intends to give.

(c) The ballot should not be marked in any other manner. If the elector spoils a ballot, he shall return it to an election official who shall issue another in its place, but not more than 3 ballots shall be issued to any one elector. Not more than 5 minutes' time shall be allowed to mark the ballot. Unofficial ballots or a memorandum to assist the elector in marking his ballot may be taken into the booth and copied. The sample ballot shall not be shown to anyone so as to reveal how the ballot is marked.

(d) After the official ballot is marked, it shall be folded so the inside marks do not show but so the printed indorsements and ballot clerk's initials on the outside do show. After folding the ballot, the elector shall leave the booth, give his name to the inspector in charge of the ballot box, hand him the ballot to be placed in the ballot box, and leave the polling place promptly.

(e) An elector may be assisted by 2 election officials of different political parties in marking the ballot if he declares to the presiding official that he is unable to read or that due to physical disability he is unable to mark his ballot. If an elector declares that he is visually handicapped, he may have anyone assist him in marking his ballot or operating a voting machine. The presiding official may administer an oath as to a person's disability.

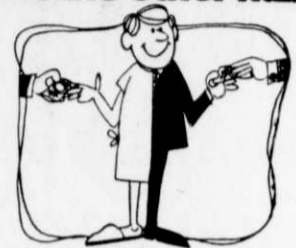

Provisions will be made for the submission of written statements and other exhibits in place of or in addition to the oral statements presented at the public hearing. This additional written testimony and exhibits may be filed with the Highway Commission if postmarked not later than midnight, December 27, 1971. Mail these statements and exhibits to the Highway Commission Secretary, Wisconsin Division of Highways, 4802 Sheboygan Avenue, Madison, Wisconsin 53702.

Relocation assistance will be available to persons who may be displaced by the later construction when the specific location for the improvement has been established.

Federal aid highway funds may be used as part of the cost of development and construction.

The Highway Commission will review the testimony and will consider any feasible location of the National System of Interstate and Defense Highways and of the State Trunk Highway System in the general areas indicated in this notice.

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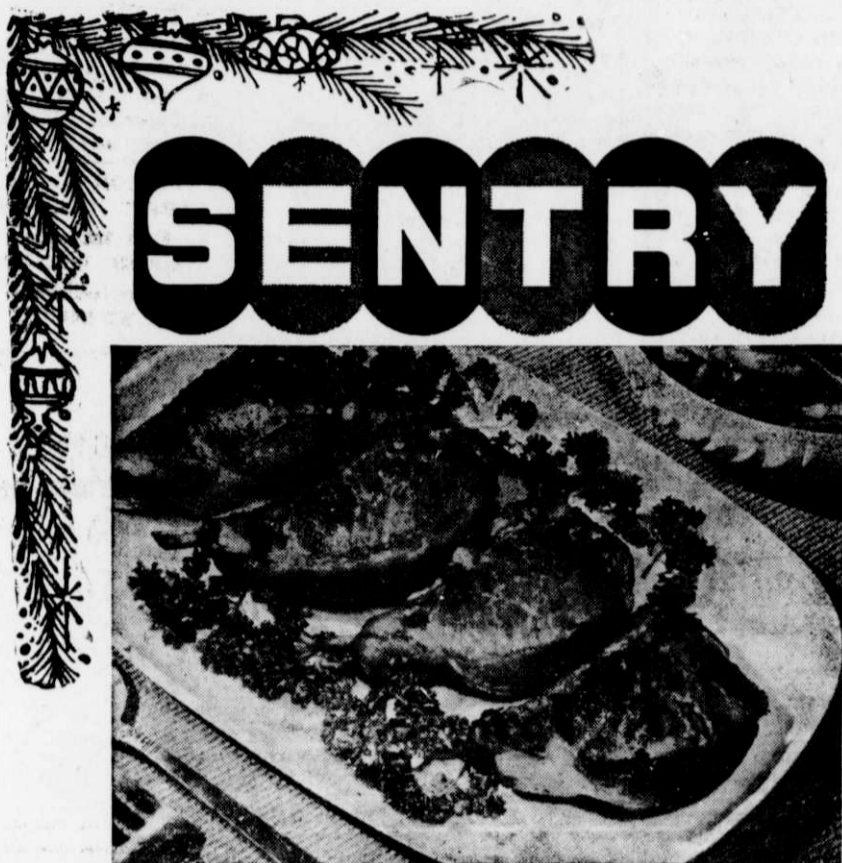
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Indians Nudge Owls in Opener, Trim Horicon

The Kewaskum Indians ran their early win streak to four straight with two more victories the past week. In their Scenic Moraine Conference opener with Slinger here Friday, they nudged the Owls, 57-54, and in a non-league contest at Horicon Tuesday, the Indians walked the Marshmen of the Flyway Conference, 75-56.

The scrappy Owls gave the taller Indians a real battle in the whistle-blowing, hard fought contest before an excited crowd. After Kewaskum took an 11-9 lead in the first quarter, the Owls knotted it at halftime 22-22. Paced by Mitch Misko and Tom Theusch, the Indians outpointed Slinger in the third period, 22-15, to pull away to a 44-37 lead. In the final stanza Kewaskum stretched its lead to 10 points, which appeared to be a safe advantage, but the aggressive Owls again closed the gap to 55-54, by Hunter's 8 points. It took a layup by Jim Kern in the final seconds to provide the clincher for Kewaskum's 3-point win.

Kewaskum was hurt when ace Glen Eichstedt had to sit out most of the third quarter with 4 fouls. He fouled out in the final period but he and Misko managed to take scoring honors with 15 points apiece, while Theusch had 12. Leading scorer was the Owls' Hunter with 22.

At Horicon Tuesday for the first time this season the Indians had an easy time of it as they thumped the outclassed Marshmen

by 19 points, 75-56. The game was never close and Kewaskum built up an 11-1 lead before Horicon knew what was going on. Paced by Jim Gaffke with 9 points and Craig Carr, Kewaskum went way ahead, 20-6 in the first stanza. Horicon cut the margin to 37-29 at halftime but the Indians continued to pour it on in the second half. They outscored Horicon in the third quarter, 16-13, and 22-14 in the final period.

Misko set the pace for the winners in the second quarter and Carr and Gaffke, Kewaskum's speedy guards, turned it on again in the final stanza. Between them they scored 15 of their team's 22 points in that quarter. Junior Gaffke paced all scorers with 20 points, while Carr and Misko each had 18. Eichstedt again ran into foul trouble and scored only 6 points, far below his 19 average. Schute and Bogenschneider led Horicon with 14 points apiece.

Tonight (Friday) the Indians play at Kettle Moraine, which shaded Pewaukee last week, 68-65. And next Tuesday the honeymoon will be over when Kewaskum travels to Mayville to clash headon with the also unbeaten, defending champion Cardinals. Mayville has another powerhouse this season with most of last year's stars back paced by high scoring Dan Heim who scored 33 points alone against Hartland Friday, and big 6-5 Jeff Stieve. (Mayville blasted Horicon by 32 points recently).

In the two other Scenic games Friday Germantown edged Grafton 68-67, and Mayville ran wild over Hartland 73-38.

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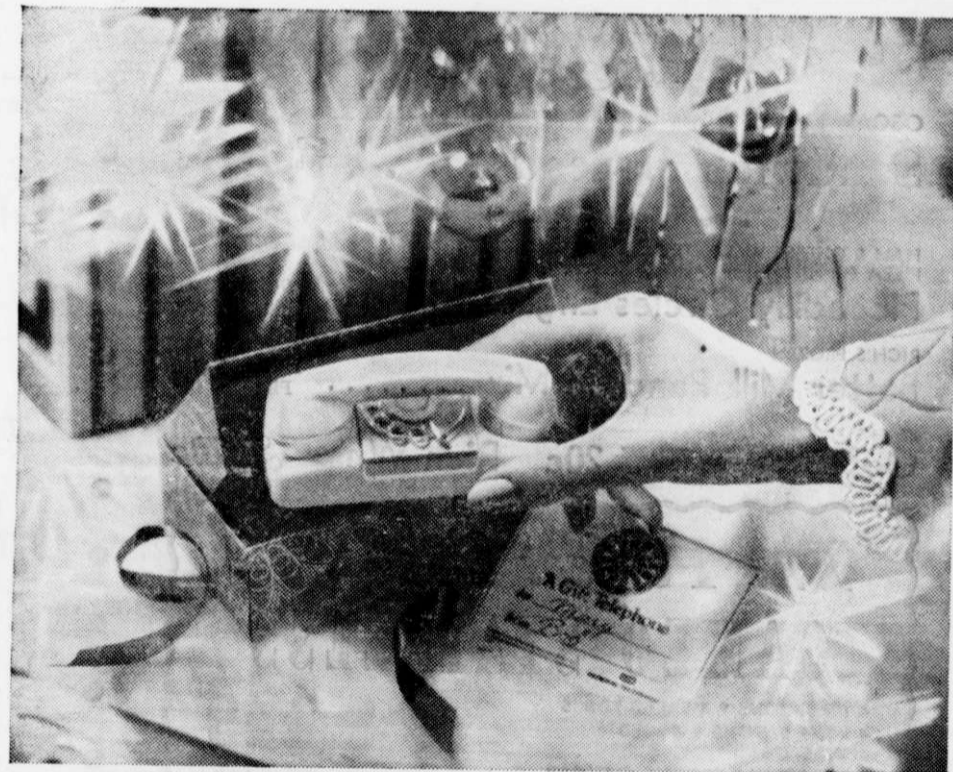
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
