3 Kewaskum Area Young Artists to Perform With Milwaukee Symphony

Three young artists from the Kewaskum area, students at Kewaskum High School, are among the 40 who will perform with the Milwaukee Symphony Orchestra in a concert Sunday, Feb. 20 at 3:30 p. m. at the Performing Arts Center in Milwaukee.

James Baumhardt was among the three top winners and will solo with the symphony at this concert. He is a recipient of a \$300 scholarship. Doug Acker and Glenn Asch were chosen as honorable mention winners in the competition. The 5th annual Young Artists Auditions were held Dec. 4 at West Division High School in Milwaukee. Judges for the competition were Kenneth Schermerhorn, symphony conductor, and the first-chair musician in the symphony. Over 70 young people entered this competition.

West Bend News General Manager, Mark Huber Dies

Mark W. Huber, 45, general manager of the neighboring West Bend News, passed away at 6:30 p. m. Monday, Jan. 10, at St. Joseph's Community Hospital there. He suffered a cerebral stroke Friday evening and never regained consciousness.

Mark, who was the last working newspaperman of three generations of newspapermen, was responsible for converting The News from a semi-weekly to a daily in 1970 and was instrumental in the merger of The News with Post Corporation of Appleton in 1969. He was well known in community press circles in Wisconsin.

His grandfather, Joseph F. Huber, purchased The News in 1905 when it was in its 60th year of publication. Later, in 1923, his father, Joseph J. Huber, took over and ran it until his death May 18, 1937. At that time his mother, Mrs. Kathryn H. Huber, became the publisher and Mark entered the business in 1954 after graduating from St. Norbert College.

Mark was born July 3, 1926 in West Bend, attended Holy Angels Grade School, West Bend High School for two years and was graduated from St. John's Military Academy, Delafield. He graduated from St. Norbert College with a degree in mathematics in 1949. His first two years of college work were at the University of Wisconsin - Stout at Menomonie. After St. Norbert's he did some graduate work in mathematics at the University of Wisconsin-Madison.

After college, he enlisted in the U.S. Army Corps of Engineering and served for three years during the Korean War as a topographer computer at the staff sergeant level. He was stationed for a year on Coviti Island in the Philippines.

Mark was past secretary of the West Bend Scholarship Fund, a member of Lt. Ray Dickop Post of the American Legion, West Bend Kiwanis Club, Moose Lodge, West Bend Country Club, St. Frances Cabrini Church where he was an usher, International Newspaper Promotion Association, National Newspaper Association, Wisconsin Press Association, West Bend Chamber of Commerce, Kettle Moraine UMCA, Milwaukee Press Club and was a Fourth Degree Knight of Columbus.

Surviving are his mother; a brother, Joseph F. Huber; a sister-in-law, Mrs. Joseph F. (Winifred) Huber; three nephews, Joseph (Linda), Greendale, John and David, and a niece, Lisa, all of West Bend; other relatives and friends.

A sister Barbara died in infancy. Visitation was at the Schmidt Funeral Home from 3 p. m. Wednesday and a parish vigil was held at 7:30 p. m. Services were held at 9:30 a. m. Thursday at the funeral home and at 10 a. m. at St. Frances Cabrini Church. Rev. Edmund Haen officiated and burial was in Holy Angels Cemetery, West Bend.

Two Charged in Theft of Roofing Material Here

Two Milwaukee young men were charged Tuesday with theft of 44 squares of 240 pound weight roofing shingles from a building site in Bel-Ric Acres at the southwest village limits, where many new homes and apartment buildings are going up.

Roger G. Bauers, 21, of 8084 N. 74th St. and Ronald R. Peters, 22, of 7904 N. 64th Court, both of Milwaukee, appeared before Judge Robert J. Stoltz in Washington County Court. They were released after each posted \$1,000 bail and the case was adjourned until 9 a. m. next Monday.

The district attorney's office said the two men were apprehended separately by two Washington County deputies after the truck which was hauling the shingles broke down along Hwy. 45 near Badger Road, about two miles south of Kewaskum. One of the suspects was asleep in the cab of the truck. The other was picked up as he was hitchhiking south toward Milwaukee to get another truck.

The roofing shingles were allegedly stolen in the early morning hours of Tuesday and were the property of Jack Forbe & Sons Roofing, Inc. of Brookfield. The firm is roofing two homes in Bel-Ric Acres subdivision. They were valued at \$500.

Firemen Answer 86 Ambulance, 19 Fire Calls in '71

When contacted this week, Fire Chief Armin Oppermann reported that the Kewaskum Fire Department answered a total of 86 ambulance calls by the rescue squad and 19 fire calls during 1971.

Included in the 19 fire calls were only three in the Village of Kewaskum. There were 11 in the Town of Kewaskum, three in the Town of Auburn, and two state forest calls. This total of 19 does not include two mutual aid calls to assist the West Bend and Campbellsport fire departments.

A combined total of 328 firemen fought the various fires during the year.

Five of the 19 fires were major conflagrations. They included the St. Michaels Church fire Jan. 4, the Ned Sengpiel guest house fire Feb. 1, the Marvin Tackes barn fire Aug. 19, the state forest grass fire Aug. 29 when about 10 acres burned over, and the Wimmer Lumber Co. sawmill fire Nov. 9.

Last Saturday night the firemen enjoyed their annual stag party at the fire station, with honorary firemen, some village board and village and county police force members as guests. Door prizes were awarded to all firemen, a delicious smorgasbord and refreshments served, cards played and a sociable night spent. The annual banquet for firemen and wives will be held in February.

Several new, young members have been admitted to the fire department recently to succeed retiring members.

George Martin On Study Trip To Costa Rica

George G. Martin, 1199 Kewaskum, St., is among 92 Carroll College (Waukesha) undergraduates participating in study trips during January, made possible under the 4-1-4 schedule that provides a full month between the fall and spring semesters.

Twelve students are in Italy for three weeks to study sculpture, architecture and ceramics. Fifteen are studying tropical ecology and marine biology in Jamaica. A group of ten are examining the classical heritage of Western Europe in France, Germany and Italy.

Women Voters League Announce Lawsuit Challenging Co. Board Reapportionment

The provisional League of Women Voters of Washington County last week announced a lawsuit was filed challenging the County Board Reapportionment in Washington County.

The plaintiffs in the action are Albert P. Schroeder of R. 2, West Bend; James Esselmann of R. 6, West Bend, a member of the town board of the Town of Trenton; Clem Mayer, president of the Village of Jackson; Vaughn Brown of R. 1, Fredonia, a resident of the Town of Farmington, and Judith Kautz of N 98, W 15757 Stribark Road, Germantown, an officer of the League of Women Voters. Mayer was acting on behalf of the Village Board of Jackson.

The plaintiffs charged that deviation of population between the largest district and the smallest district was 26.02%. They further alleged that census data was not used in determining district lines.

The lawsuit was commenced in the United States District Court for the Eastern District of Wisconsin and seeks to enjoin the clerk from printing ballots, accepting nomination papers, and assisting in the conducting of the county supervisory election until it is determined if the districts are in violation of the Fourteenth Amendment.

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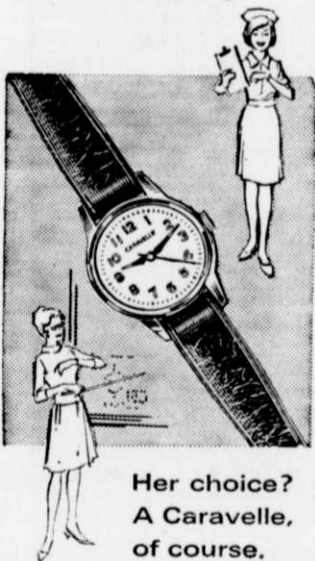

The Village Board of Kewaskum, Washington County, Wisconsin, met in regular monthly session in the Council Room of the Municipal Building. President Wietor presided and all Board Members were present.

The minutes of the meetings of October 19th, November 1st and November 10th were approved as presented upon motion by Trustee Herriges, seconded by Trustee Yoost and duly carried.

The first order of business was the public hearing on the proposed budget for 1972. There were no appearances either in favor of or in opposition to the budget as presented. The meeting was then declared closed. Motion by Trustee Kral, seconded by Trustee Behnke and duly carried.

GARBAGE PICKUP

Beginning January 17, 1972, garbage will be picked up one day per week instead of two times per week as at present. On Monday of each week all pickups will be made from Fond du Lac Avenue (including both sides of Fond du Lac Avenue) and east. On Tuesday of each week all pickups will be made from the area west of Fond du Lac Avenue. This schedule will continue until May 1, 1972, after which time we will return to twice per week pickup on Monday and Friday.

Trash (cans, bottles, metal, etc.) pickup will continue on the present basis, once every other Wednesday.

The Village encourages the use of plastic bags for garbage storage and as pickup containers. Preferably the bags should be inserted in a garbage can (if at all possible) for safety's sake and then placed at the curb for pickup. We hope this method will speed pickup and conserve man-hours.

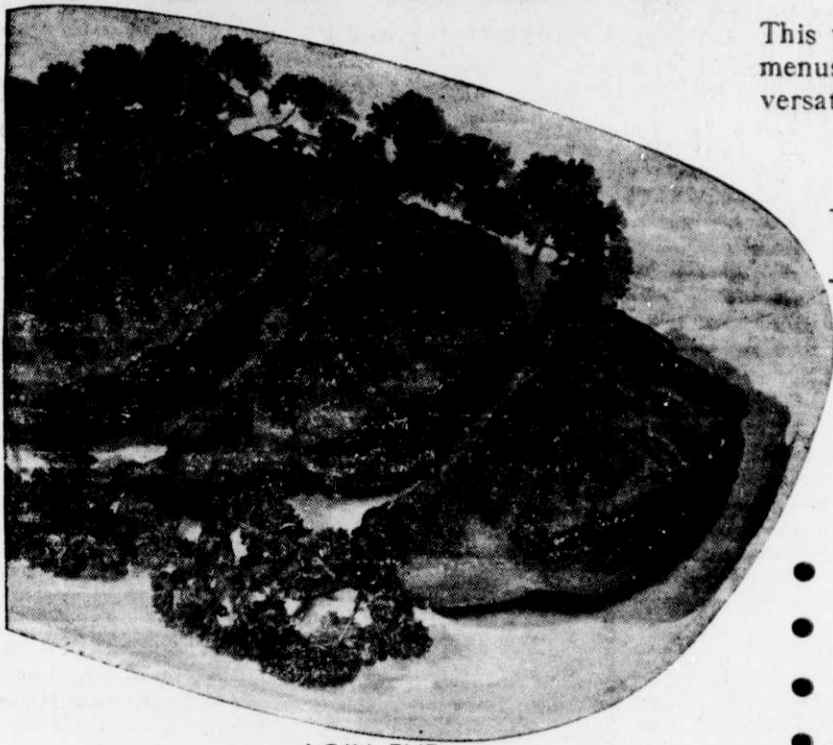

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Indians Win Over Pewaukee And Grafton

The Kewaskum Indians won two games the past week to take a firm grip on third place, a game behind Germantown and two back of unbeaten Mayville. Friday at Pewaukee the Indians rolled over the Pirates by a surprising 96-70 score and Tuesday on the home floor they downed Grafton, 61-51.

The Indians displayed a lot of offensive power in scoring 96 points at Pewaukee and winning by a margin of 26 points over the team that only lost to Mayville by 7 points Tuesday, 71-64. Two big quarters and a decided advantage from the free throw line proved too much for the Pirates. Mayville beat Germantown by 16 points in the battle for first place Friday, 64-48.

Kewaskum trailed at the quarter, 20-16, but started hitting in the second period to score 28 points to Pewaukee's 17 and led at halftime 44-37. The Indians increased their margin to 64-53 in the third stanza. Then Kewaskum turned the game into a rout in the final quarter, outscoring Pewaukee, 32-17, with reserves finishing the game.

Glen Eichstedt had one of his better nights, hitting for 26 points and top honors. Mark Misko contributed 21 and Jim Gaffke 16. Deck paced Pewaukee with 19 and Hansen added 12. Hitting on 33 of 67 shots, the Indians shot 31 per cent and connected on 28 free throws while Pewaukee sank only 14. The win broke a 3-game losing streak.

The Grafton game here Tuesday was more of a defensive struggle. The Blackhawks led for 3 quarters but a big 22 point output in the final period gave the Indians victory by a 10-point margin. Grafton was ahead at the quarter 19-13, at the half 34-30, at the end of the low scoring 3rd quarter 42-39. Then the Indians turned it on for 22 points while holding the visitors to 9 in the final stanza. Twelve of these points were scored on free throws.

In his match Rodenkirch pinned the Orioles' 310 lb. heavyweight, George Schulze, who was injured and couldn't continue after the match.

In the match against Cedar Grove the Indians led 21-11 but 3 pins in a row lost for them. Facing Plymouth last, the Indians took 8 bouts, 7 of them in succession, to win handily, 42-15. N. Fondy won all 3 of its matches and Cedar Grove 2. Kewaskum senior George Muckerheide was named the meet's outstanding wrestler. At 112 lbs. he pinned 2 of his opponents and downed the other 3-2. He was awarded a trophy for his effort.

Facing Whitnall of the Parkland Conference there Tuesday, the Indians had 3 varsity wrestlers out with illness and lost 24-20. Muckerheide, Steve Ruplinger and Bindrich missed the meet and this hurt. In Muckerheide's case, all Kewaskum would have had to do was have a sub because Whitnall had no wrestler at the 112 weight.

Again it was the free throws that mainly won the game as Kewaskum made good on 27 out of 37, while Grafton had only 10 chances and connected on half of them. The Blackhawks had 21 personals called on them and the Indians only 10.

Tom Theusch led all scorers with 15 points, followed closely by Eichstedt with 14. Bliese with 14 and Tillmann with 11 paced Grafton. The JV's lost to Grafton, 51-46.

Tonight Kewaskum travels to Hartland, which has a 1-5 record and holds last place.
