## H. Ramthun & Son Business Sold To Kettle Moraine Electric, Inc.

NEW OWNERS WILL TAKE OVER FEB. 15

The H. Ramthun & Son Hardware, Plumbing and Heating business at 1261 Fond du Lac Ave., Kewaskum, which has been in the Ramthun family for 66 years, has been sold to Kettle Moraine Electric, Inc. of Kewaskum, in a transaction completed this week. The new owners will take over the business on Feb. 15.

The business was purchased by Henry and Emma Ramthun on May 18, 1906 from Frank and Mayme Day. It was operated by them until the death of Henry Ramthun in April, 1947, following which it was conducted by Mrs. Ramthun and her son Harvey until her death in April, 1951. Harvey and his wife Jean then operated the business until he passed away in December, 1968 and since that time Mrs. Ramthun has conducted the business with her son Harvey.

The plumbing, heating and bottle gas business and sheet metal work will be operated at the same address until further notice.

The new owners, Al Beisbier, Don Scheid and LaVern Schnabel of Kettle Moraine Electric, Inc. purchased the entire property consisting of the store building and living quarters with one lower and two upper apartments and rear workshop and storage building.

Kettle Moraine Electric, Inc. has been in business in Kewaskum for about four years. Up to now the business was conducted from Beisbier's home. For the present they will operate an electrical store at their new location and later will probably add a hardware store business with the possibility that they will also go into the appliance business.

Mrs. Ramthun will continue to reside in one of the apartments in the building and will serve as a clerk in the store for the new owners. Further announcements will follow and a grand opening will be held at a later date.

Mrs. Ramthun wishes to thank all her customers and friends for their patronage during the many years they have been business.

## Trucker Pinned Under Semi, Wife Comes to Rescue

Lawrence Galabinske, Jr., 30, a Kewaskum trucker, was removed to St. Joseph's Community Hospital, West Bend, when he was injured after being pinned under a semi-trailer tractor over an hour in sub-zero weather Friday evening when the tractor apparently slipped off a jack while he was putting chains on the tires.

The accident occurred on property to the rear of the Meyer Trailer Sales building on Hwy. 45 south of Kewaskum, where Galabinske keeps his vehicle.

Galabinske was found by his wife Katie, who went to the trailer sales property when she apparently became worried at his delay in returning to their home at 300 First St. in Kewaskum.

The area where Galabinske was working is some distance from the trailer sales building and his cries for help could not be heard. A wrecker from Kewaskum and the West Bend fire department rescue squad were called to the scene to free and aid the injured man. He was then removed to the hospital.

Galabinske's right arm was badly bruised but did not appear to be fractured. X-rays were taken to determine how badly the arm was injured. He returned home

## Adult Health Screening Tests Slated in Area

BUS UNIT TO VISIT KEWASKUM FEB. 16-17

The Adult Health Screening Unit from the State Division of Health has moved into the Kewaskum area. The bus is scheduled for the general public as follows:

Feb. 16 — Sentry Foods, 2:00 - 4:00.

Feb. 17 — Sentry Foods, 9:00 - 11:30, 12:30 - 3:00.

Feb. 21 — Boltonville Firemen's Hall, 12:00 - 3:00.

Feb. 22 — Allenton Fire Hall, 12:30 - 3:00.

Feb. 23 — Allenton Fire Hall, 9:00 - 11:30, 12:30 - 3:00.

Volunteer women from the areas will be available to assist with the registration. Preparation for registration includes:

1. Screenings at open centers must be 35 years of age or older.
2. Please wear shirts, blouses, or dresses with loose sleeves that can be easily rolled up.
3. Do not eat any fatty foods on the day of the test.

Everyone (EXCEPT KNOWN DIABETICS) taking the blood test is required to drink a special orange flavored drink **one hour before taking the tests.** This drink is distributed at the time of registration. Known diabetics may take the test, but should not drink the special drink.

The bus from the State Division of Health offers the following tests: Blood pressure readings to detect hypertension (high blood pressure) and blood tests designed to detect possible chronic illnesses such as diabetes, gout, high blood pressure, and diseases of the heart, kidney, liver, bone and some forms of cancer.

These screening tests are not diagnostic, any abnormal test results are reported to the family physician for further study and interpretation. It is hoped that early diagnosis before symptoms appear will result in better total health of citizens through life.

## 5% Pay Increase for Village Employees Approved by Board

### Area Without Light, Heat in Power Failure

A power failure which lasted almost two hours early Saturday evening in Kewaskum and surrounding area left approximately 1,200 or more customers without light, heat and power in very cold weather. The power failure covered a wide area.

Officials of the Electric Co. said the failure was attributed to a circuit breaker blowing up at the St. Lawrence plant on a high-line transmission, causing a reduction of power on a feeder line to the Auburn bulk station north of Kewaskum with resulting interruption of service to Kewaskum, Eden and the Scott station in the Town of Farmington. A circuit breaker at Campbellsport then failed to trip resulting in a complete outage in the area.

The Electric Co. reported that a repair crew was sent to Campbellsport to correct the difficulty there and five other repairmen were out at scattered points. The main outages occurred about 5 p. m. to 7 p. m. but some malfunctions were not corrected until about 8 p. m.

With no lights of any kind, it was very dark and residents really appreciated it when they came on again shortly before 7 p. m. The outage left homes without heat, stopped refrigerators, heating systems, machinery electric clocks.

The 6:30 p. m. Mass service at Holy Trinity Church was held as scheduled Saturday but it was a not scheduled candlelight service. Father John Budde said he received numerous calls prior to the service inquiring if the Mass would be read. He told them to come to church and bring flashlights along to read their missals, which some did. The service was held in a darkened church with candles in candlebras in the center aisle and on the altars providing the only light. Appropriately the theme of Fr. Budde's sermon was "Let your light shine before men, that they may see your good work." Normally crowded, the church was only slightly more than half filled for the service. One parishoner jokingly remarked it was so dark he thought he put a quarter in the collection box by mistake instead of a nickel. Another one who intended to attend the service said he couldn't get his car out of the garage when the electric opener failed to work.

### BID ACCEPTED FOR NEW POLICE CAR

A new salary and wage scale for municipal employes that reflects an increase of five per cent over the present pay scale was approved by the Village Board Monday night.

The percentage of increase is less than one year ago, when pay hikes averaged nine per cent. The new pay scale is retroactive to Jan. 1, 1972.

Re-bids for a new police car were opened and following the regular meeting, the finance committee recommended accepting the bid of Tom Jacoby Chevrolet of Random Lake. Low among four, the bid offers a 1972 Biscayne model at a list price of \$2,547 for \$1,200 cash plus trade-in of the one-year old police car.

The board originally called for bids to be opened Jan. 3. At that time only two were received, one for \$2,000 cash plus trade-in and the other for \$1,991 plus trade-in. The board rejected both bids because members felt they were too high. Neither of the original bidders came in with a re-bid.

Police Chief Donald Hlavaty reported that the state denied his request for a uniform 30 mile per hour speed limit from the north limits of Kewaskum to the Bonne Belle Motel. Presently, the speed limit on that route, through the village proper is 30 m.p.h. It increases to 45 in the area of the Kewaskum hill.

It has been felt that the rapid change in speed limits puts the motorist at a disadvantage. Hlavaty did not elaborate on the reasons for the state's denial.

In a letter written by Westra Construction Co., to Stone and Robinson, consulting engineers, the construction firm asked for a 60-day extension on the project at the sewage treatment plant.

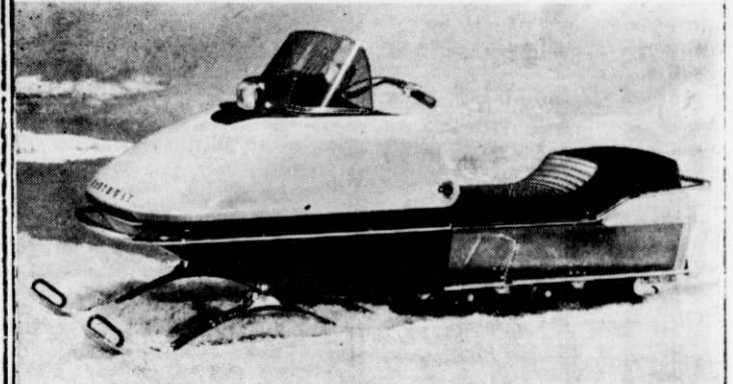

**Attention Snowmobilers!**

Regarding proposed Senate Bill pertaining to snowmobiles:

1. We find the words 'state aid' difficult to appreciate, as the money came directly from the snowmobile owners. The snowmobile owners are aiding the state, not vice versa. There is absolutely no need for the counties to develop trails in MOST areas of the state, as the snowmobile clubs are now doing a remarkable job of developing, marking, and maintaining trails and as each organization progresses, we are certain they will do an even better job.

There is no need to buy easements in MOST areas as the majority of landowners have consented to free access.

2. Increasing the fee at this time appears ridiculous since the last fee money has not been spent OR SO WE'VE BEEN TOLD! Are you aware of where your registration fee is going? How many people have seen the results of their money spent on registration fees. Also, are you aware that the monies are in excess of \$600,000.00 and are lying completely dormant at the present time.

3. While a snowmobile recreational council is a fine idea, we would urge it be elective by registered snowmobile owners only.

4. Regarding enforcement: Local authorities in cooperation with

snowmobile clubs are actually not having as great a difficulty as the news media would have us believe. 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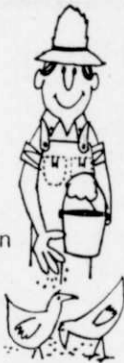

### Indians Routed By Germantown, Beat Pewaukee

After starting out the season with a 5-0 record, the fading Kewaskum Indians dropped below the 500 per cent mark for the first time Friday at Germantown, where they were soundly beaten, 80-55. But the Indians broke a 3-game losing streak and returned to an even 6-6 mark in the conference by defeating Pewaukee here Tuesday, 76-69.

Meanwhile Mayville wrapped up its second consecutive Scenic Moraine title by winning 2 more games. This is the Cardinals' fourth league championship in as many years, having won two titles in the Northern Little Ten Conference before entering the Scenic loop.

The margin by which the Indians lost at Germantown 25 points, came as a surprise. In their first meeting here earlier the Warhawks narrowly edged Kewaskum by just one point. Glen Eichstedt fouled out again and Jim Gaffke played with 4 fouls and this weakened the Indians.

Germantown jumped off to a 9-0 lead and outscored Kewaskum in every quarter and the Indians never came close. The second quarter hurt the most, in which Kewaskum was outpointed 26-14, putting them out of the running. They trailed at halftime, 44-26. The losers missed 15 free throws, which didn't help their cause. Germantown hit over 70 per cent on theirs.

The Hawks were deadly on their shooting, hitting 32 of 61 shots for a better than 50 per cent average. The Indians hit on only 35 per cent, accounting for the big difference. Germantown also controlled the boards pretty well.

The Henry brothers scored 35 points for the winners but Frank Blau took top honors with 22 on some good outside shooting. Jim Gaffke paced the Indians with 16.

Kewaskum played one of its better games against Pewaukee here Tuesday with 4 players scoring in double figures in a well balanced attack. The contest was close with the Indians moving ahead in the second quarter to stay. After a 19-19 first stanza Kewaskum was on top 35-32 at the intermission. The Indians increased their lead to 7 points in the third period and the final stanza was even.
