## No Primary Will Be Held Prior to School Board Election Due to Cost

CAR TO BE PURCHASED FOR USE BY DISTRICT TEACHERS

The Board of Education voted Monday night not to hold a primary election prior to the spring school board election in view of the fact that a primary would cost about \$1,500. As of Monday night, 10 persons had filed for election to three openings on the board.

For the first time, board members will be elected at the Spring election and electors will vote in their regular polling places, of which there are nine. Supt. Floyd Brenholt reported if a primary were held, voting would also take place in each of the nine polling places, rather than in one common location. This would account for the high cost.

Board members felt a primary isn't worthwhile at a cost of \$1,500 in view of the fact that voter turnout might be light. In that case, the vote would not truly reflect voter preference anyway.

It was decided to draw up specifications and call for bids on a new car for the district after hearing a report on what is available locally in new and used cars. The subject of buying a car, new or used, for use primarily by teachers who must travel to three outlying schools was discussed at the Jan. 31 board meeting. Figures gathered by Brenholt showed that owning would be cheaper than paying mileage.

Presently there are five who travel. They are being paid 10 cents per mile to drive their own cars. Two are a husband and wife team who must go in separate cars.

Board members Thomas Gundrum, Gerald Zimmer and Richard Theusch were assigned to check into what is available and bring back a recommendation. Of six cars looked at, they felt a 1972 Impala with between 3,000 and 4,000 miles at \$3,000 would be the best buy. The car was used in driver education but would not be available until April 1.

In the discussion, Gundrum said that he "had a few telephone calls" from electors on the subject. The gist of the conversations was "is it really wise to buy a car?" and "will other teachers demand one?"

Secor suggested buying a cheap car to see how workable owning is. Allen Tessar commented, "I can see saving money in owning but I am afraid of the end results. Scheduling its use must be flexible enough so the car is available to other teachers, also."

Secor observed that "from a public relations standpoint it probably doesn't look good but if we believe we can save money" to go ahead. Gundrum said, "I don't feel we have any obligation to buy a car." Brenholt contended that the only question involved is, "can the district save money?"

Possibility of renting space in the savings and loan building on Main St. to house the school district office was discussed at the suggestion of Brenholt. He reported he checked into the matter in view of the shortage of classroom space.

He said a room on the lower level is available for a monthly rental of \$70 or \$75, including light and heat. The district would have to provide janitorial services: "This would be a very inexpensive way to add a classroom," he observed.

Brenholt said his present office would then be converted into a badly needed classroom, for which it was originally intended. He said a room in the savings and loan building which will be offered as a community room is available for board meetings. The board felt there is enough merit in the plan to explore it further.

Approval was given to an expenditure of \$350 for student CESA. Purchasing by computer through CESA. Purchase of a floor scrubber for the elementary school for \$560 cash plus trade-in was approved.

The board approved signing of necessary contracts with the architectural firm of Schutte-Mochon to proceed with plans for a building adjacent to the high school as proposed. It will be needed during an overlap time in the split shift schedule which begins in the fall.

The matter of appointing a citizens committee on long range planning for the district was tabled. Two bus drivers told of mechanical defects in their buses. They were given assurance that the administration will investigate any written complaints from the drivers.

A report was given by Secor on the recent conference of the Wisconsin Association of School Boards he and Gundrum attended.

An executive session for discussions of administrative salaries and teacher contract renewals followed.

## Two Sentenced in Theft of Roofing Material Here

Two Milwaukee young men, initially charged with theft of roofing material valued at approximately \$500 from a construction site in Kewaskum, pleaded guilty to an amended charge of petty theft in court Monday and were fined \$150 each plus court costs of \$9 or ordered to spend 20 days in the Washington County Jail.

The men sentenced were Roger G. Bauers, 21, of 8084 N. 74th St. and Ronald R. Peters, 22, of 7904 N. 64th Court, when they appeared before County Judge Robert J. Stoltz.

The pair was apprehended when a truck containing the roofing material broke down when two tires blew out due to the weight of the roofing shingles. The shingles belonged to Jack Forbes & Sons Roofing, Inc. of Brookfield. The material was allegedly stolen on the night of Jan. 10.

## Rubicon Young Man Killed in Crash Near Here

A Rubicon young man, 25, was killed and four persons injured as the result of a two-car accident at about 5 p. m. Monday at the intersection of County D and the Town Line Road several miles southwest of Kewaskum, in the Town of Barton.

Victim of the mishap was Theodore Torres, Jr. of R. 1, Rubicon. He died at about 9 p. m. Monday of massive internal and head injuries at St. Joseph's Community Hospital, West Bend.

Torres was a passenger in a car driven by Douglas Strupp, 23, of R. 2, Kewaskum. According to the Washington County Sheriff's Department the car was headed south on Town Line Road and collided with an auto driven by Richard Prost, 22, of R. 2, Kewaskum, headed east on County D.

Injured were Strupp, with head lacerations; Prost, back injuries, and two passengers in the Strupp car, Michael Rosenthal, 22, of R. 1, Neosho, fractured hip, and Ronald Strupp, 22, of R. 2, Kewaskum, fractured ribs and internal injuries. A fifth passenger in the Strupp auto William Rosenthal, no address given, apparently escaped injury.

Prost was alone in his car. The injured were all taken to St. Joseph's Community Hospital.

It was the second traffic fatality of the year recorded in Washington County.

## Raymond 'Spitz' Jaeger Dies

Raymond "Spitz" Jaeger, 64 barber and tavern owner of Wayne, died early Thursday morning, Feb. 17, at St. Agnes Hospital, Fond du Lac.

Visitation will be at Miller's Funeral Home, Kewaskum, after 2 p. m. Sunday and a Rosary vigil will be held at 3:30 p. m. Funeral services will be held at 10:30 a. m. Monday at Holy Trinity Church, Kewaskum, with Rev. John Budde officiating. Interment will be in the new Holy Trinity Cemetery.

## Badger Packaging Workers Off Job

Employees of the Badger Packaging Co., Kewaskum, were off the job on Wednesday. Thurman Anderson, firm president, said the entire work force of 24 employees was probably out.

Anderson said he did not know whether it could be called a strike or not, nor the reason for the work stoppage. He said the company had dismissed three men last Friday and that may have been the reason. He also said the factory was not unionized.

Employees outside the plant Wednesday morning said they were on strike and protesting "certain working conditions." Some employees were to travel to Milwaukee to meet with Joseph Gilwaber, bargaining representative of the Allied Industrial Workers A.F.L.-C.I.O. The workers felt that a subsequent meeting with company officials would be held.

## 11 Candidates File for 3 Posts On School Board

Tuesday was the last day for filing nomination papers for running for the three open positions on the Kewaskum school board in the spring election. A total of 11 candidates filed papers before the deadline, assuring a merry race.

Two of the three incumbents filed nomination papers for reelection. They are Gerald Secor of the Town of Farmington, who was the first to file, and Allen Tessar of Kewaskum, who decided to file on the last day. John Jadro, the third incumbent, decided not to run. He has served on the Beechwood and Kewaskum K-12 board for the past 11 years and has been the clerk for the entire time.

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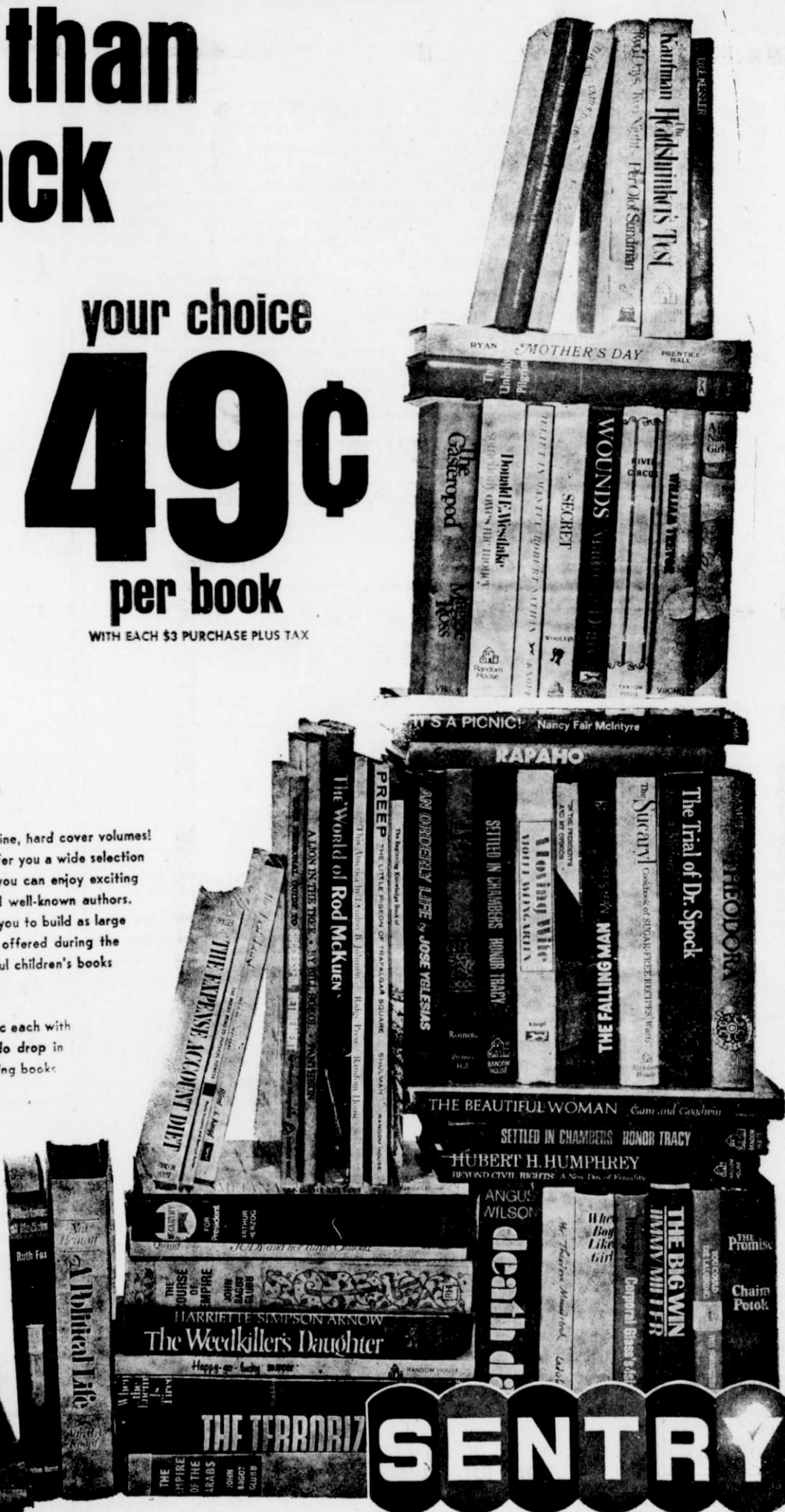
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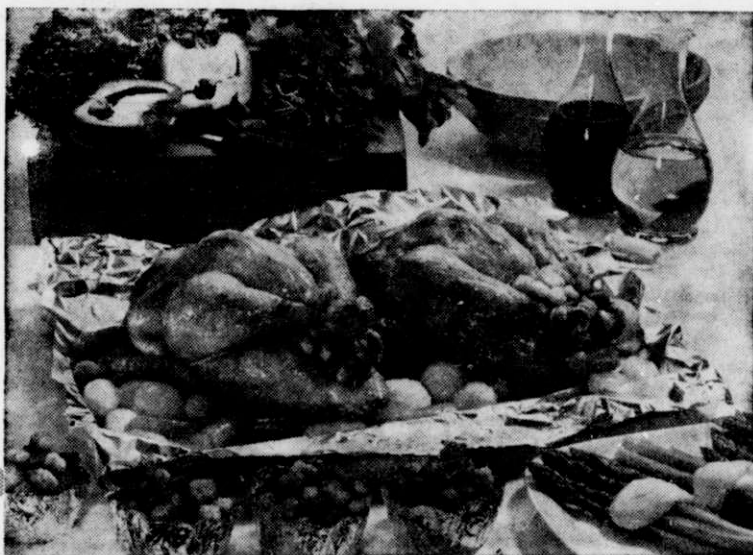

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#### NOTICE OF PUBLIC HEARING FOR THE CONSIDERATION OF THE LOCATION AND DESIGN ASPECTS FOR THE IMPROVEMENT OF HIGHWAY 41 BETWEEN THE RICHFIELD INTERCHANGE AND THE SOUTH WINNEBAGO COUNTY LINE WASHINGTON, DODGE AND FOND DU LAC COUNTIES

All interested persons are advised that a public hearing for the consideration of the location and design aspects for the upgrading of Highway 41 to freeway standards from a point about one-quarter mile northwest of Mayfield Road, just northwest of the Richfield interchange, in Washington County, to the south Winnebago County line is being planned by the Wisconsin Division of Highways. This project will not involve the section of Highway 41 between Highway 151 and Melody Lane near the west side of the City of Fond du Lac. This section was discussed at a similar public hearing held in Fond du Lac in 1970. This project involves access control, the addition of frontage roads, grade separations and interchanges to upgrade this section of Highway 41 to freeway standards. The project involves about forty-two miles and is a part of the continuing implementation of the State Highway Plan for 1990.

The Wisconsin Division of Highways, acting through its Highway Commission, will hold a public hearing on the above matter, as provided by law, at 10:00 a. m., on Tuesday, March 21, 1972, in the Theresa Legion Hall,

on Highway 175 in Theresa, Wisconsin.

As an informational service, staff engineers will be present at the Theresa Legion Hall from 4:00 p. m. until 8:00 p. m. on the day preceding the hearing, Monday, March 20, 1972, and on the day of the hearing, Tuesday, March 21, 1972, from 8:00 a. m. until the time of the hearing, for informal discussion of the proposal. A map of the proposed project will be on display.

All interested persons are invited to attend and present concise, relevant, oral or written statements concerning the economic, social and environmental impacts and effects of the proposed construction and whether it is or is not in the public interest and consistent with the goals and objectives of such area planning as has been promulgated by the communities.

Provisions will be made for the submission of written statements or other exhibits in place of, or in addition to, the oral statements presented at the public hearing. This additional written testimony and exhibits may be filed with the Highway Commission if post-marked not later than midnight, March 31, 1972.
